German Invaders Partially Successful in Riga Sector.

Sheer Force of Numbers Bends Line For Mile and a Half.

Petrograd, Jan. 24 .-A Bulgarian detachment crossing a branch of the Danube opposite Tultcha, was surprised by Russian troops and destroyed, the war office announced today. Prisoners to the number of 337 and 4 machine guns were taken. The state. ment reads:

"Rumanian front: On the Danube front scouting reconnaissances and infantry firing are proceeding.

"On the Danube, opposite Tultcha, the Bulgarians, about a battalion strong, taking advantage of the fog, crossed the Georgief branch in the morning. Our detachments, by a nocturaal surprise attack, destroyed, without opening fire, the detachment which was crossing, taking prisoners 5 officers and 332 men, and capturing 4 machine guns. # THE DIARY OF MARS.

Apparently the Bulgarians were not able to hold the ground on the north side of the southern estuary of the Danube, north of Tultcha, in Dobrudja, ocupation of which was announced in yesterday's German army headquarters' report. Today's statement, while somewhat ambiguously worded, apparently indicates a withdrawal of the Bulgarians to their former position on the southern side of the estuary.

This movement is the only important one that has occurred in the Rumanian campaign, so far as ahown by the Berlin report, Exterme coid weather is interfering with operations in the Moldavian mountain region, and there have only been skirmishes and artillery engagements along that front.

Attention again is turned to the Riga region on the northern end of the Russian front, where a renewal of the fighting is reported by Berlin. This was forecast by yesterday's announcement of the resumption of intense artillery fire in that region.

On the Franco-Belgian front the pronounced activity of raiding detachments is being continued. The French report mentions successful raids by French troops near Chilly, south of the Somme, and patrol operations in the Woevre district. Berlin reports numerous air engagements in which the Entente lost a total of six airpianes. Three German machines were brought down on the French front, Parls announces.

# DESERTER OF 33RD SENT TO PEN. FOR TWO YEARS TERM

Found Guilty of Perjury On

Has Long Criminal Record Behind Him.

Windsor, Ont., Jan. 24.—Clarence Edward Pangburn, alias Herbert Major Knowles, charged with se-curing traudulent attestation papers and perjury, was sentenced, the curing fraudulent attestation papers and perjury, was sentenced to two years hare labor in Kingston Penitentlary by Police Magistrate Leggatt this morning.

Pangburn, who has over fifteen aliases, was arrested in London, Ont., by Inspector Reynolds of the immigration department, Ottawa, in December, and was given 30 days for yagrancy. Investigation showed that he had deserted from the 33rd Bat-

Mounted Rifles, that he had been arrested at Cedar Rapids, lowa, for impersonating a federal officer, telling the authorities that he was a son of Sir Edward Harling, member of Parliament, Ottawa.

Pangburn was deported from Canada in 1909, upon completion of a one-year term in Central Prison, Toronto, for an attempt at jailbreaking at St. Thomas in 1908. Under various names Pangburn enlisted and dined by Detroit fillingry officers and entertained at a banquet at the Ponchartrain. When arrested he gave his name as Brewer, and admitted he was a deserter from the United States navy.

#### \$1,750,000,000 SECURITIES SOLD IN GREAT BRITAIN

London, Jan. 24.—Sir Felix Schuster, speaking today at the annual meeting of the Union of London and Smith's Bank, Limited, of which he is the governor, discussed the British financial situation. Regarding operations in the United States, Sir Felix said:

"In addition to loans a great many American securities have been sold. It has been estimated that £350,000,000 of American securities have been sold, but it is impossible to speak with certainty of the figures, which, however, are very large.

"It must be remembered we are financing not only our own but our allies' requirements."

#### GERMANY'S SORRY FOOD STRAITS BETRAYED BY OFFICIAL ORDERS TRYING TO REGULATE PRICES

Head of Regulation Board Admits Nutritive Value of 1916 Crops Below That of Previous Year, and Organized Distribution Imperative Because of Shortage of National Supply.

Berlin, Jan. 23-Via London, Jan. 24.—The advisory committee of the war food bureau has concluded a two-days' session devoted to a general review of the food situation. A detailed statement in regard to conmade by Adolph Batocki, president of the food regulation board Herr Batocki said that the chief difficulty lay in the shortage of the potato crop, enhanced by trans-portation troubles. He said that although the grain crops had been better than in 1915, the total nutritive value of the grain and potatoes together was less, and economical feeding was necessary to carry the year. 

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

### DOARD OF CONTROL HAS TOUGH JOB TO **GET OUT ESTIMATES**

Paring Needed and Little Left To Pare.

SOME SAVING PROPOSED

But Not Enough To Show Appreciably in the Tax Rate.

The board of control will wrestle with the estimates shortly, and it looks as if the controllers had quite a job on their hands.

The provisional rate, as struck by City Clerk Baker, is as follows; Schools, 10 mills; Victoria Hesnital, 2.25 mills; police, 1.66 mills; board of health, .22 mills; public library board, 46 mills; public library board, 46 mills; council, 11.30 mills, and patriotic, 5 mills; a total of 43.35 mills, parks, 46 mills, ebenture rate, 12 mills; council, 11.30 mills, and patriotic, 5 mills, a total of 43.35 mills.

There will be a little over 8 mills receipts, making the rate levied 35.04 mills.

The rate allowed by the municipal act is 20 mills for city purposes. This does not include the school rate, of course, which will be 10 mills. The council will have to reduce the expenditure from 20.04 to 20 mills, or any citizen can issue an injunction against the city to prevent the aldermen from levying any advance on 20 mills.

The joint purchasing of supplies may result in some saving—it is possible that it will, but it will have little effect on the tax rate. The most optimistic will not admit that \$500 can be saved the citizens in this way, and ifference in the tax rate. These are facts that are staring the taxpayers in the face, and there is no solution, except in increasing the receipts of the city in some way not yet devised.

Even after the guards reached his Even after the guards reached his cell, Tancreade continued to rave, scream and weep hysterically and only after some hours was he calmed.

He has never at any time attempted to do himself injury, but the jail authorities

He has never at any time attempted to do himself injury, but the jail authorities entertain fears that he may, and will, until his removal, see that he is watched more closely.

The confinement with no work has apparently broken down his mind.

His fellow countrymen have not yet made application to the department to have a medical board examine him as to his sanity, but may do so any day." said his counsel, F. E. Perrin.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—Auguste Bambert, a "rench reservist, reported missing august 24, 1914, and since mourned by its family, recently informed his wife his family, recently informed his wife that he was alive and well, a prisoner in the Sennelager Camp in Germany.

Madame Raymond of Colonne-Ricouart, who had worn mourning for her husband since October, 1914, also just received a letter from him dated at a German prison camp. He was taken prisoner at Lille during the German advance. Having resisted even after capture, he was taken before a court-mountial and sentenced to confinement until the end of hostilities. 
