### VOLUNTEER FLEET ORDERED HOME.

St. Petersburg, July 25. - The Associated Press is informed that the Russian volunteer fleet steamers Smolensk and St. Petersburg have already been ordered home, and that instructions for them to return have been cabled. The assurances given Great Britain on this point are declared to be satisfactory.

The instructions given the commanders of vessels repeat the order heretofore announced in the Associated Press dispatches, directing them to refrain from further attempts to stop merchantmen, either in the Red Sea or the Mediterranean.

The decision not to insist on the war status of the ships was probably reached at the conference held Saturday. The two ships may be brought to the Baltic and formally recommissioned.



Six-Round Bout Pulled Off-O'Brien Landed Oftener, But Not as Hard as Fitz.

Philadelphia, July 23.—Jack O'Brien and Bob Fitzsimmons today fought the fastest six-round bout ever witnessed in this city between men of their weight. When the gong announced the closing of the fight both men were on their feet, but both bore the marks of the gruelling fight they had just come through. Fitzsimmons lips were twice their normal size and his left eye was almost closed, while At Newark-Rochester-Newark game O'Brien's left, eye was also cut and

While O'Brien landed the greater number of blows, they did not do nearly so much damage as those landed by Fitzsimmons and the latter was the fresher at the close of the fight. There was not a clean knock down during the bout, but three times O'Brien went to the floor, twice in endeavoring to get away from Fitzsimmons and the third time partly from Fitz's right which landed on O'Brien's neck and partly through the latter's feet getting tangled. The fight was held on the National League baseball grounds, the ring being pitched directly between the pitcher's box and the grandstand, immediately over the home plate.




