Ottawa, Feb. 20. - Unless circumstances, at present unforeseen, occur to prevent it, the legislation to grant autonomy to the territories will be introduced on Tuesday. As already stated, there will be two provinces. Alberta and Saskatchewan. Edmonton will probably be the provision capital of Alberta, and Regina the provisional capital of Saskatchewan. The choice of a permanent capital will, of course, be left to the Provincial Legislatures. The dividing line between the two provinces will run north and south, following, in all likelihood, the 110th mcridian. There is a proposition that the northern limits of the two provinces should be extended to the ocean, but

Mounted Police, the two provinces will be relieved from the responsibility of policing the vast stretch of country to the north, so that they need feel no particular anxiety about the enlargment of their limits. The Province of Alberta may take in the whole of Athabasea. The expectation is that the number of members for each province will be fixed at 26, but it may be more. 

### The Monroe Doctrine.

The President of the United States. on his own initiative, has interfered to restore order in San Domingo, and cempel the island republic to respect its financial obligations. There is no warrant in international law for this intervention, the creditors of the little republic being European, and the President is charged with exceeding his constitutional powers in framing a treaty or protocol with the San Domingo Government, which became operative before the United States Senate had been consulted. On the latter point the President may be censurable, but in disciplining San Domingo the United States is accepting the logical conclusion of the Monroe doctrine as interpreted at Washington. The United States undertakes to say that no European power shall acquire a foot of soil. or extend its possessions, in the new world. Some of the Spanish-American republics have presumed upon this assurance to play high jinks with their foreign creditors, or with foreign investments. It has been necessary on several occasions within the past ten years for European powers to seize Spanish-American ports and impound the customs revenue for the satisfaction of their claims, Great Britain and Germany made a joint naval demonstration against Venezuela two years ago and took possession of the customs house at the principal port. It was their only recourse, after their overtures for a settlement had been flouted. They had no intention of treading on the coat-tails of the Monroe doctrine, and gave the Washington Government assurancess to that effect. The United States, however, was suspicious of Germany and tendered its good offices to bring about a reference to arbitration. This action established a precedent, which is being followed in the case of San Domingo. The United States has assumed full responsibility for the future good behavior of the Spanish-American republies. It is a large contract, and may involve the United States in no end of trouble, but it is the corollary of the up-to-date version of the Monroe doctrine. If the powers of Europe may not take the usual and proper steps to secure their rights, it is incumbent on the big republic to see that these rights are maintained. President Roosevelt has distinctly intimated that Uncle Sam will play the role of the big policeman in Spanish-America, and compel the lesser republics to preserve internal order and respect their internationa obligations. This is a purely arbitrary decree, but so is the Monroe doctrine as expounded by the United States. While other nations may dissent from that doctrine, they must give the United States credit for accepting its consequences by becoming sponsor for the good conduct of its troublesome little wards.

## New Features of Assessment Law

It is not generally known that the new assessment act carries an extension of woman's franchise. Unmarried woman will qualify as voters in municipal elections, if their income assessments are \$400 and over. This taxation of women's incomes is also an original feature. There is no distinction of sex in the income schedules. A woman who is not on the assessment roll as a householder will be taxed on exemption of \$400. If she earns \$600 anything or nothing. she will be taxed \$4 if the tax rate is 20 milles on the dollar. If she earns \$800 she will be taxed \$8, being a 20mill rate on \$400.

The new assessment act is a great improvement on the old one, especially in the abolition of the personalty tax but it is not a finality, and one year's experience of it in operation may suggest further improvements. The relation of forest area to rainfall is well known, but the connection between forest area and river flow is ot as generally understood, though it is quite as direct. The even flow of all and the very existence of some watercourses is dependent upon the preservation of the forests at their ources. In Southern France, in the beginning of the last century, the slopes of the Cevennes, the Pyrenees and the Alps were deforested, and left bare to the action of the elements. The results were the transformation of even-flowing streams into rushing torrents, the erosion of the slopes into gullies and ridges, destructive landslides, and the deposit of silt on the plains beneath to such an extent that some 8,000,000 acres of once fertile soil were involved in the disastrous consequences of forest destruction on 1,000,000 acres of mounslopes. France has already spent \$20,000,000 to help repair this condition, and it is estimated that \$30,000,000 more will need to be exbefore the area the state possesses, only some 800,000 acres. will be restored. A similar transgression in Canada against the law of nature will inevitably bring similar results. The need for the preservaton of the forests at the great headwaters of Canadian rivers must therefore be apparent.

The necessity for the planting of trees on the western prairie country of Canada is increasingly recognized, not only by governments, but by municipalities and individuals. The aesthetic beauty and economical value, not merely in money, but in the protection given to crops, groves and shelter belts, is now understood by every farmer of the west, and the number of these being planted is increasing every year. ## BOMB-THROWING IN PARIS STREETS

A Spaniard Severely Wounded Attacking the Mexican Legation.

and some anarchist pamphlets on Garcia, and a search of his lodgings led to the discovery of two bombs identical with that which he had exploded. Garcia arrived in Paris two days ago. The prefect of police is investigating the case. Garcia declares that he was born in Santanader in 1862, and denied that he is an anarchist. He is wounded in the arms and hands. Prompt action by the police prevented his being lynched.

The bomb was filled with dynamite, and the stone walls of the legation were somewhat damaged.

## **BIBLE SOCIETY** IN REVOLUTION

Stirring Up the Macedonian Troubles.

London, Feb. 20.-Sensational allegations against the British and Foreign Bible Society and its agents in Macedonia are published in Die Post, the Conservative semi-official daily German newspaper, and Die Deutsche, a widely-read monthly review, according to a dispatch from Berlin. It is stated by these journals that instead of distributing Bibles the society's agents in Macedonia systematically supported the revolutionary agitation carried on under the leadership of the notorious Sarafoff. No less than £50,000 is said to have been contributed by the society toward the revolutionary movement in Macedonia, so that funds which should have been applied for the distribution of Bibles were really used for the purchase of explosive bombs, arms and ammunition for the Macedonian revolutionary bands

They were associated with the revolutionary leaders, lodged in their houses, and accepted their companionship during their journeys. Similar accusations are brought against the British North American mission, which is accused of spending \$25,000 on behalf of the Macedonian revolutionary movement.

British Government is openly accused of encouraging the political agita-tion carried on by the agents of the Bible Society, and it is stated that the British consuls and consular agents throughout Macedonia gave similar sup-port to the revolutionary movement. Die Post adds that British intrigues in the Balkans, carried on under the dis-guise of religious philanthropy, are a menace to the peace of Europe.


