The day comes when they are incapable of deep feeling or strong passion. Their lives become so narrow and shallow that a great passion has no room to stir itself. The retribution of their sin is the hell of incurable flippancy.
Seriousness is an important element in one's fitness for service. There are men all about us who discuss great questions of political or social or moral reform, but their arguments and exhortations influence nobody, because nobody takes them seriously. They do not take themselves seriously. They are only acting a theatrical part, and that, too, for the fun of it, or the glory of it, or for some of its banal rewards. They have no convictions, and while they may speak entertainingly or write interestingly, their words produce no conviction.
