VERDICT OF THE PEOPLE

GREAT BRITAIN'S PRONUNCIATION AGAINST HOME RULE.

Lord Hartington and Salisbury set the issues for a new Government. The Parnellites determined to fight for the full measure—Tory gains victory.

LONDON, July 13.—Midnight.—Up to four 305 Conservatives and Unionists, Gladstonians and 72 Parnellites have elected. The standing of the parties now is as follows:—

The Chief of the Bismarcks. LONDON, July 13.—Lord Hartington arrived in London, Friday, and will confer with Lord Salisbury and other Unionist Ministers. An agreement has been arrived at by which Lord Salisbury accepts Lord Hartington's Home Rule policy, which involves the maintenance of the full powers of the Imperial Parliament. By the powers conferred on local ones in Ireland are delegated, not surrendered. Parliament, which body receives the right control and revise the action of the Government. The appointment of judges and legal education are central in the Imperial Parliament. Lord Hartington will submit to the Conservative Ministry, although he has pledged himself to support the Conservative and general policy of the Government.

In Gladstonian circles confidence is expressed that the Premier will confer with his colleagues on Saturday. The Parnellites say they will never accept Lord Hartington's scheme and will fight and wait until they have secured the passage of the full Gladstonian measure.

Lord Hartington on England's Enemies. LONDON, July 13.—In his speech at the last night Lord Hartington upbraided members of the Government, who, he said, while serving the Queen had formed an alliance with members of the Parliament party having at least connection with a nation whose aims were nefarious, whose ends were obtained by nefarious means. "If we yield now," he concluded, "to our Irish American enemies, in order to obtain a temporary respite, we ourselves will sooner or later have to fight a battle over with diminished means. If we persevere in English judgment, fortitude, sense and courage, we will defeat and crush the nefarious designs of conspirators against the Empire." Lord Hartington was enthusiastically cheered.

Mr. Parnell Repeats the Fenians. LONDON, July 13.—Mr. Parnell has written a letter in which he says "The statement of Lord Hartington that the Irish party National League are in union with America Fenians are untrue. I know nothing whatever of any Fenian organization in Ireland or America beyond what I have learned from the newspapers. I have never had any communication with the leaders of such organizations or accepted any alliance with them. I do not even know who the leaders are. The union of the National League and Fenians has never been proposed. If such a proposal ever been made I should have been consulted. I have always successfully excluded Fenians from the National League within the strict bonds of legality. In spite of the unblatant falsehoods which have partially and temporarily frustrated the noblest aspirations of the Irish people will continue to maintain possible and legal aspects, declining to give any pretext to Lord Hartington or his allies to resort to the brutalities of coercion."

Mr. Healy is Probably Right. LONDON, July 13.—At the regular fortnightly meeting of the National League yesterday, treasurer announced that the donations received from the United States for the Parliamentary Fund within the past two years amounted to \$80,000. P. M. Healy in address said although Irishmen were disappointed at the result of the election, they should not be despondent. The defeat, he said, was but temporary. One million voters had written "Home Rule" on their voting papers as against the unholy triple alliance of a coalition government, Parnell, and the Conservatives.

Labey's Comments. LONDON, July 13.—Mr. Labouchere wrote to the Daily News urging Mr. Gladstone to resign on the ground that he has a majority on everything except the Irish question, that the Unionists are not likely to support general vote of confidence in him.

Some Results. LONDON, July 13.—McCurtain (Parnell) has been elected to Parliament for Down.

Molloy (Parnellite) has been returned to the Birr division of King's County. The Tories in today's elections in South Dorsetshire, where Hamlyn de la Motte (Gladstonian), and the Liberal in Staffordshire, where Davenport (Conservative) defeated Crumpton (Gladstonian). In the division of Sturminster Newton, where Sturminster division of Yorkshire, has been elected by Morrison (Unionist). This Unionist gain.

Polling in the Newmarket division of Cambridgeshire had to be postponed to-day on account of rioting. Several police were hurt during the disturbance.

The Tories have won the southwest division of Devon and the Torquay division of Devonshire, electing in the former Makins (Conservative) over Parker Rhodes (Unionist) and Spicer (Gladstonian). In Torquay Mr. de la Motte (Unionist) defeated Molyer (Unionist).

They Found the Arrow. BARRAS, N.Y., July 13.—News has reached the city to the effect that a search party sent out by the Buffalo Yacht Club found the missing sloop yacht Arrow the afternoon three miles off Stonington Point on American shore. The boat was captured by three young men, Fuller, Townsend and Coffey, who were clinging to the bottom for life. They were much exhausted, but promptly taken aboard of the rescuing and saved.

Coming to the Convention. LINCOLN, Neb., July 13.—President Lincoln has received a message from Timothy Harrington stating that the report that the Honorary Deputation is not going to the National League Convention is a mere falsehood. Some members of the delegation, Mr. Harrington says, are already named, and he will send the names of all in a few days.

He Didn't Start. NEW YORK, July 13.—Col. Wm. H. G. who intended to leave New York this week to visit the North Pole, has been detained on the charge of stealing a bond. Daily Adams, the professional agent, was the complainant. Glider was held \$1000 for trial.

THE LAW WILL BE ENFORCED. No Trust in the Report that the Fenian Regulations Have Been Suspended. OTTAWA, July 13.—The report that Fenian regulations had been suspended from Ottawa that members of the club were trying upon their colleagues the rule of the David J. Adams and Ella M. Doe is officially denied. The Fenian law statute to be, if anything, more rigidly enforced just now than at any period since present policy was adopted. Though no violations have gone unpunished, it is said to have been simply owing to the absence of Canadian cruisers.
