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MRS. ALBERT E. GOODERHAM, Toronto. Ontario, President of National Chapter Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire: President of Hospital Ship Committee; Councillor of the Canadian Red Cross Society since South African War; Member of the Executive, National Relief Committee; Member of the Executive, Canadian War Contingent Association; Vice-President. Navy League of Canada; was created Lady of Grace of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem by His Majesty King George V., 1912.

Mrs. Gooderham has visited the Old Country twice since the outbreak of war; is very closely in touch with the war work over there, and among other splendid patriotic achievements established, with her husband Col. A. E. Gooderham, an Officers' Hospital in Hyde Park, London, opened by Her Royal Highness, Princess Louise, 1916.

Col. and Mrs. Gooderham also built and equipped a gymnasium at the Duchess of Connaught Hospital, Taplow, England.

It is impossible to give details of the immense volume of Imperial and patriotic work that Mrs. Gooderham has carried through since the outbreak of war; the various offices which she holds will indicate how much time and energy Mrs. Gooderham devotes to such work.

LADY DRUMMOND, Montreal, Quebec, is Assistant Commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross Society. She organized the Information Bureau of the Canadian Red Cross Society in London which was opened the day after the First Canadian Contingent landed in France. The Bureau was started with a very small staff. It has now 200 workers and 1,000 hospital visitors who write friendly letters to the parents of the patients. It provides the Canadian soldier with comforts and Canadian papers, and provides drives and entertainments for the convalescents.

Public recognition is gratifying. Lady Drummond is also a Lady of Justice of St. John of Jerusalem, but has won higher homes, in the devotion, the admiration, the respect felt for her by all those whose privilege it has been to come under the influence of so inspired a leader.

MRS. RALPH SMITH, Vancouver, B. C., first Lady Member of Parliament in British Columbia, and first lady to sit as Chairman on a Board of Arbitration. Ever since war broke out Mrs. Smith has been a most arduous war worker in many societies; was Municipal Regent for 1917 in Vancouver; has been President of the Women's Canadian Club and many other organizations.

MISS ROBERTA C. MACADAMS, M.L.A., Edmonton, Alberta, took a commission in the Canadian Army Medical Corps and went overseas attached to the Ontario Military Hospital Unit. Prior to this she was engaged in educational work in Alberta and had become supervisor of Domestic Science in the Edmonton schools, a department which she herself had pioneered.

In the summer of 1917, Miss MacAdams was returned to the Alberta Legislature as a representative of Alberta military forces in France and England and returned to Edmonton for the 1918 Session of the House where she proved herself an able advocate of the rights and interests of the fighting men abroad, and of better educational facilities for their families at home and for the province in general.

Returning to England in June, 1918, Miss Mac Adams resigned her military commission to associate herself with the work of the Khaki University of Canada, accepting the post of supervisor of women's staffs at the London headquarters of this thriving institution. Sensitive to her obligations to the men she represents, she is able to keep in touch with their interest and to devote considerable time to their needs and welfare.

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#### ENGAGEMENTS

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MRS, GEORGE BLACK, of Government House, Yukon, organized in the first year of war the LO.D.E. there and splendid work has been accomplished. Her husband took overseas the Yukon regiment. Mrs. Black accompanied him and is in charge of the Yukon Comfort Fund in London, England.

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MRS. COLIN CAMPBELL, Winnipeg, Man., Regent of the Municipal Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire in Winnipeg, established the first Convalescent Soldiers' Home in Canada, February 19th, 1915, also the first cemetery in the Empire for soldiers. She raised \$130,000 this year for war work. She also established the first LO.D.E. home for orphans and soldiers known as "Khaki Club," Winnipeg. Mrs. Campbell is an active member of many other war societies, and has made 37,554 visits to sick soldiers and established 16 libraries for schools where there are foreign pupils.

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# MRS. J. LORNE MacDOUGALL, Ottawa, Ont.,

was on the executive of the Women's Canadian Club when war broke out and suggested and organized a Belgian Relief Committee there. A large consignment of food and clothing was soon despatched. Other organizations in England and France were also helped. Later, a working club was formed in St. Andrews' Church and large boxes of clothing, socks and Xmas parcels were sent from there. Mrs. MacDougall is also an active member of the Re'l Cross and is associated with other boards in the City.

Her nieces, Mrs. Elbert Soper and Miss Katie MacDougall, are doing splendid work in London.

LADY PELLATT. Toronto, Ont., was appointed Chief Commissioner for Canada of The Canadian Girl Guides six years ago by the Headquarters Executive in London, England (the headquarters office being established at that time in Toronto) and now has over 11,000 members enrolled throughout the Dominion.

Companies in all of the provinces from Halifax to Dawson City have been registered and splendid progress has been made in all districts.

Ever since the beginning of the war the Girl Guides bave been engaged in war relief and patriotic work of every kind and wonderful results have been achieved.

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
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MRS. SEWELL. Quebec, Que., during the South African War was secretary of Red Cross work, and so, in 1914 when war broke out, she quickly and successfully organized and has been president of that organization ever since.

CAPTAIN MARY PLUMMER, O.C. Canadian Field Comforts Commission, is the daughter of Mr. J. H. Plummer, Sylvan Tower, Toronto, and was the originator and Hon. Sec. of the Hospital Ship Fund which was the first war work undertaken by the women of Canada.

Miss Plummer, together with Miss Joan L. Arnoldi, was given a commission and sent overseas in charge of Field Comforts work with the First Canadian Contingent in September, 1914. She was promoted to the rank of captain in 1916 and honorably mentioned for good work in 1917.

The Canadian Field Comforts Commission is the Military Organization for the distribution and forwarding of gifts to the Overseas Military Forces of Canada, and now has splendid quarters in the R.E. Barracks. Shorncliffe.

Since 1914, Captain Plummer has worked steadily for the Canadians in the field and, from the small voluntary work begun at Valcartier Camp and the trials and difficulties of the first famous winter on Salisbury Plain, the Commission has developed into the present large, efficient organization which is highly appreciated in the trenches and in Canada.

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MRS. FRED II. SMITH, Edmonton, Alberta, is Regent of the Municipal Chapter I.O.D.E., Edmonton.

The Municipal Chapter I.O.D.E. was formed in 1911 and now consists of twenty-five Primary Chapters.

The I.O.D.E. in Edmonton have responded to many appeals since the outbreak of war and their efforts at present are largely confined to patriotic work. In times of peace their work is of an educational nature. Prizes for essays are presented, libraries donated and flags given whenever appealed for.

Though the Municipal Chapter has jurisdiction over the various Primary Chapters, each Chapter works independently and arranges its own plan of work.







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MRS. J. A. MILLS, Vancouver, B.C., began Red Cross work two weeks after war broke out. The first shipments left Vancouver September 4th, 1914, and consisted of 240 pairs hand-knitted socks, 4 pairs mitts, 24 towels and 2 undervests.

She was elected chairman Supplies Committee. Superintendent of Supplies with volunteer committee of over 100 members; organized a volunteer knitting committee-who have at the present time five machines running-10 women knit sock legs free of charge for all Red Cross auxiliaries and LO.D.E. chapters and turn out 2,000 pairs of sock legs a week. She represents the Red Cross at the Mental Hospitals for Returned Soldiers, visiting weekly and taking parcels of smokes and other comforts. She organized a visiting committee for Military Hospitals; arranges transportation for convalescents to Chiliwack and Sardis week ends: purchases and ships to 300 branches, clast shipment going out being 145 cares—\$1 for hospitals and 64 for the field-which included 7,530 pairs of handknitted socks, 1,278 nyjamas, 1,254 stretcher caus and 2.562 towels). Airs Mills devotes all her time voluntarily. On Sundays she visits the hospitals and takes patients for drives.

MRS. M. R. GRIMSHAW, Peace River, Alberta, is prominent among the pioneer women war workers of Alberta. Mrs. Grimshaw was instrumental in the organization of the Peace River Chapter I.O.D.E., the most northern Chapter in Alberta, which was organized in July, 1917. She was elected its first Regent, which position she has occupied ever since the organization of the Chapter. She is an untiring worker and has simply devoted herself to this work, being largely responsible for the remarkable record of the Chapter.







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MRS. S. ROSENTHAL, Ottawa, Ont., has been President of the Ladies' Hebrew Society of Ottawa for the past eighteen years and since war broke out this Society has done splendid work.

She is also on the Board of Managers of the Perley Home for Incurables, Victorian Order of Nurses, Old Men's Home, Women's Canadian Club and the Great War Veterans' Association.

Among other workers in Ottawa is Mrs. Southam who has made hundreds of dollars for the Prisoner of War Fund. Associated with her are Mrs. W. B. Harshaw and Mrs. J. H. Carswell.

Miss Inglis of the Civil Service War Workers has also done a spiendid work.

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MISS MARY PINKHAM. Calgary, Alberta, has always been greatly interested in philanthropic and church work, and in particular, hospital work in Calgary.

She is Honorary Secretary-Treasurer of Alberta Red Cross Society since its formation in 1914. Was decorated an Associate of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

The other sister, Lieutenant Dorothy Cook, crossed in the first transport to do Canadian Red Cross work in London, opened the rooms at Tooley St. and later their own big warehouses. Miss Cook contracted diptheria and was invalided. Mrs. Code continued as Col. Hodgett's assistant until Dec., 1917, when her health failed and she was then made Home Sister and since that time has been remodelling homes for hospitals or convalescent homes as occasion demanded. It was through her efforts that Cliveden Hospital was obtained. the money being collected from Canadian people and societies in and around Ottawa. early stages of the war her many friends were always ready to respond to calls for help. She has never had a furlough and is still working. latest work was refitting and opening the Home for Canadian Nurses in London under the supervision of the LO.D.E. of Canada. She long felt the need for such a home for tired and unnerved nurses and speaks in glowing terms of the good already done and the cheeriness given by the opening of this much needed haven in London.

## ENGAGEMENTS

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MRS. DUNCAN SMITH, Edmonton, Alberta, Vice-President of The Edmonton Branch of the Red Cross Society. Since 1914 to the present 4.685 cases have been shipped to hospitals overseas containing a million and some odd thousand articles valued at approximately \$360,000.00.

The Society has in stock materials and supplies which approximately are valued at \$30,000,00.

In addition to the above, \$18,000 has been sent to our Provincial Headquarters.

In supplies forwarded, a specialty has been made of the larger and more expensive things such as kits, housewives' comfort bags, holdalls, pyjamas, doctors' gowns, surgical and service shirts, hospital suits, dressing gowns and bedding, besides the various bandages, towels and smaller articles.

For three years in succession 500 filled Xmas stockings have been sent as our share from Canada.

The women of the outlying districts and outskirts of the city are especially deserving of great praise, having walked or driven miles in all kinds of weather to distribute and collect the work.

Besides the staff of workers in the rooms, numbering about one hundred and twenty-five a week, there are two hundred and fifty circles and three hundred and fifty individuals in the city and a large number of outside auxiliaries who are responsible for making up the supplies.

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MRS. OLLIE, Vancouver, B.C., is 84 years old, At outbreak of war she was in the Yukon and responded to the first call for mufllers for the the North Sea sailors, and also socks. She turns in at least one pair a week to her Chapter. She made an Autograph quilt which realized .\$133; patched a satin one; embroidered a beautiful nightgown last year. She writes to scores of soldiers and lonely aged mothers. Her daughter, Mrs. J. J. Banfield, has been a prominent charitable worker for many years; was twice President of The Women's Canadian Club, and Treasurer of Municipal Chapter of '.O.D.E. and is also an ardent helper in office of Patriotic Fr

MRS, P. J. NOLAN, Calgary, Alberta, is one of the active Daughters of the Empire in Alberta. Is Regent of the Col. MacLeod Chapter, the largest and oldest Chapter in the City of Calgary. Mrs. Nolan has occupied this position for seven consecutive years and the record of this Chapter particularly during the war has been most commendable. Mrs. Nolan is one of the oldtimers in Calgary having lived in this city since she was a girl. Last year she was given the position of assistant to the Registrar under the Military Service Act. She immediately turned over the remuneration she received for this position to the fund of the Chapter which will be used for the purpose of building a monument to our Great War heroes. Mrs. Nolan is one of the two daughters of the Empire in Calgary on the National Executive, being a National councillor. At present she is overseas doing war work, where her only son is, who collisted two years ago.

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MRS. ARTHUR VAN KOUGHNET, Toronto. Ontario, represents various patriotic societies. She is President of the Queen Mary's Needlework Guild in Ontario which society supplies articles for the men at the front, both in hospital and the trenches.

She is Honorary President of the Women's Conservative Club and Association, which organized Soldiers' Comforts, the sock fund, and various other comforts for the soldiers.

She is Honorary Superintendent of Soldiers Comforts, Invalided Soldiers' Commission, Department of Soldiers Civil Re-establishment, an office which gives not only supplies of numerous and various kinds to the soldiers in the Military Hospitals in Districts 1, 2 and 3 (from London to Ottawa) but also she co-ordinates and directs all voluntary effort in connection with the hospitals under the Invalided Soldiers' Commission so that there will be no overlapping in the gifts donated.

Mrs. Van Koughnet is Convenor of the Soldiers' Comforts Department of the Women's Patriotic League. She organized Soldiers' Comforts in August, 1914, and through her organizations the first comforts were sent to Valcartier, later to Salisbury Plain, and from there to Belgium, France, Mesopotamia, Greece, the Dardanelles, and wherever the need seemed greatest. Under her convenorship millions of articles have gone throughout Canada and Overseas to give happiness and pleasure to Canadian soldiers.

She has taken an active interest in each of the large campaigns, such as the British Red Cross Appeal, the Navy Appeal, the Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross, and she has assisted regularly as well in the raising of money on tag

days and various other entertainments.

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MISS DAISY McGREGOR, Calgary, Alberta. There is one factor in war work that has counted for more than anything else. It is widely known, and yet it is not always realized, and that is the press. Without its backing all the various appeals would be useless and it is to the editors of the women's pages in our daily papers and magazines that the success of many a war appeal is due.

Miss Daisy McGregor is one in Alberta to whom the women owe a very great debt of appreciation for she has been the editor of a woman's page on one of the Calgary papers for five years. She has been all through the war appeals. that is not the greatest service she has done. She is the editor of the Alberta Women's Blue Book, a book that has aimed to place the work of the various women's organizations on record. And of course the work is mainly war work. is a safe hazard to say that in many years to come when women of the future generations are looking in the archives of our province to find a record of women's work they will consider that the woman who was responsible for the chronicle of it will have performed a very valuable work indeed. Miss McGregor has been president of Calgary Press Club for the last three years.



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

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MRS. JONATHAN ROGERS, Vancouver, B.C., Welsh by birth, speaks four languages, is an associate of the Royal Institute, a Member of the Victoria League; was a Delegate to The Peace Conference in 1913. Was President of The Women's Canadian Club 1912-13; also organizer and President of French Red Cross, also organized tag days for Syrian and Palestine Relief, the National Institute for the Blind, Serbian Relief, French Red Cross, Overseas Chaplains' Emergency Fund, Halifax Relief and publicity for British Red Cross Day. She has received two medals "La Societi's Francâis de Secours aux Bless's Militaires" in recognition for work done for French Red Cross.

MRS. HAROLD RILEY, Calgary, Alberta, has convened for tag days that have netted over \$50,000, which is only a part of the patriotic work done by her. Mrs. Riley is a veteran club woman of Alberta, and has been a charter member of practically all the important clubs in her home city and has been an officer of some kind in the majority of them. In war work her activities have been concerned chiefly with the Canadian War Contingent, the Col. Macleod Chapter I.O.D.E. the Allied Prisoners of War Committee. the Great War Veterans' Auxilliary. In civic work she is secretary of the provincial law committee, secretary Baby Welfare Association and secretary of the provincial board of the Antituberculosis Society.

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MRS. F. W. F. FIELD, Secretary of the Women's Canadian Club, Edmonton, Alberta. Its Membership is 365.

For patriotic purposes the club has raised: \$2.185.00 for the Allied Prisoner of War Fund. \$90.00 for the support of a Canadian Prisoner of war.

\$75.00 for the furnishings of a room in "The Next-of-Kin Home" for orphaned children or the soldiers.

\$1,343.00 for the Blind Soldiers of St. Dunstan. \$100.00 for a Life Membership of the Y.W.C.A. \$450.00, the profits from sale of Service Flags, has been spent for the benefit of the Military Hospital and the Convalescent Home.

The Executive has been indefatigable in its endeavors to make 1918 a record year for the Women's Canadian Club of Edmonton.

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Headquarters at Winnipeg has been under the supervision of Mrs. L. McMeans, since August, 1914. Under her capable administration the work has attained enormous proportions, the sum of \$279.914.52 has been raised for Field Comforts, the supplies being forwarded to Headquarters, Shorncliffe, for distribution. Since July 11th, 1918, \$1,687.44 has been sent to headquarters for Christmas parcels for "lonely Soldiers."

Though Miss Plummer and Miss Arnoldi founded this Commission and to them is due much distinction, to the indefatigable efforts of such women as Mrs. McMeans is due the growth and continuance of this great work.

"Bunny" the Staff Dog

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MRS. LORENZO EVANS, Quebec, Que., founded the "Home Workers' Club" nine days after war was declared to work for the needs of the Empire. Thousands of garments, socks, gifts, and toys were ready for the distressed Belgians when they landed in England, and rehef was continually sent during that first winter and still continues to be sent.

Tremendous work was done for the first Contingent at Valcartier, also in hospitals and over-

seas in England and France.

Comforts were regularly sent to Halifax for the Navy until the Quebec Navy League started

a year later.

Under this Home Workers' Club, the Quebec Toy Industry called "Quebec Home Workers' Patriotic Toy Industry" started and propoganda spread through Canada. Quebec was the first city to hold a Canadian Toy Exhibit in October, 1914. First prize was awarded to it by H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught.

By request the Home Workers' Club became the Quebec branch of Queen Mary's Needlework Guild and carries on its work under that

name.

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

MRS. V. SILLITOE. Vancouver. B.C., started her prisoners of war work in 1915, and in conjunction with Miss Pelly is still carrying on this noble work. Money is cabled every week to Mrs. Rivers-Bulklev. From August 13th, 1915 to July 10th, 1918, \$166,175 had been sent. The working expenses for this sum average one-half of one per cent, but these expenses are met by private donations. The "Woolies" (the invention of Mrs. T. Beresford Phenoe) are little figures of wool about 11 inches to 2 inches high and are reproductions of well known people and animals connected with the war. Her Maiesty Queen Mary has accepted a set and the late Duchess of Connaught was most interested in the industry. Several museums have acquired a set. There are 50 pieces to a set, From August, 1915 to July, 11th, 1918, \$18,321.32 was made. Flower stalls under the management of Mrs. Grange V. Holt and Mrs. Hutchins have realized from \$400 to \$500 per month. Miss Shirley Clement and Mrs. T. W. Turner realized considerable sums from the sale of bamboo knitting needles and home cooking.

Among others doing splendid work are Mrs. Homer Adams, Mrs. Boucher, Miss Polly Mc-Donald and Mrs. Max Reid.

MRS. ELIZABETH BAILEY PRICE, Calgary, Alberta, President of the Women's Press Club of Calgary for 1915-1916, was the originator of the Women's Press Club Blue Book (which recorded the work done by all the societies of Alberta). The first year of the war she was instrumental in getting the Calgary Press Club to get self addressed wrappers for old papers with the result that over 10,000 were sold and Alberta Boys were well supplied with home news.

She was the first secretary of the Peace River Chapter I.O.D.E., also secretary of the Allied Prisoners of War Committee in Calgary and member of the directorate of the national organization.

MRS. CREERY, Vancouver, B.C., since the outbreak of war has been a most active war worker. Her interests are now centered in the Army and Navy League which entertains sailors awaiting ships, also sailors in port and which also supplies knitted articles to them.


Her Majesty Queen Mary has accepted a set and the late Duchess of Connaught was most interested in the industry.


