A Pendant over a ball half hoifted, For feven do.
A Pendant under two balls clofe, For eight do.
A Pendant between two balls feparated, For nine do.
A. Flag of any color

The above are hoifted at the eaft or weft yard-arm, according to the quarter the veffel firit appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard, until the veffels can be feen when one or more of the following defcriptive colours will be hoifted at the maft head.
A Union, For a flag fhip with or without a fquadron.
Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two-decker.
Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a frigate.
Do with a white pendant over it, for a fmall armed veffel.
A red flag, pierced white, for a packet.
A blue pendant for a merchant flhip.
A red pendant, for a merchant brig.
A white pendant, for a topfail floop or fchooner.
A red flag for a neutral man of war.
Do. with a blue pendant under it, for a neutral merchant fhip. Do. with a red pendant under it, for a neutral merchant brig. Do. with a white pendant under it, for a do. floop or fchooner. Enemy's Signals :
A French Jack, for an enemy's fleet.
A blue pendant under a French pendant, for an enemy's fhipA red pendant under a do. for an enemy's brig.
A white pendant under a do. for a do. floop or fchooner, A Union Jack over Enemies fignals, denotes the veffels to be prizes.

## Signal of Diftrefs :

In cafes when immediate affiftance is neceffary, a ball at the maft head, in addition to the defcriptive colours of the veffel in diftrefs, and guns occafionally, until the fignal is attended to.

\(T \mathrm{HE}\) Parrfoorough packet fails regularly between Windfor and Parrborough twice in every week, and occafionally three times ; but always from Parrfoorough every Monday in the Summer feafi n , wind and weather permitting, fo as to be at ;Windfor on Tuefday, and will fail from thence the firft higl. water that happens, at or after 8 o'clock in the forenoon of that day.- The paffage money for each perfon is five thillings, and the freight for horfes and neat cattle, is feven fhilling and fix pence per head. The veffel is 42 tons burthen, and has goot accommodations for paffengers ; and likewife for taking ove1 horfes, neat cattle, flieep, \&c.

The following concife obfervations on Hempare publifbed by the Committee, appointed hy His Excellency Sir JOHN WENTWORTH, for the infor. mation of tho/e, who may be difpofed to cultivate that article.

\section*{SOIL.}

HEMP requires a foil which is naturally a loam, or is made fo by a due mixture of light and heavy earths. Sand and clay, for example, will make a loam, fit to produce any thing of a vegetable nature. This compofition fhould be confidered as the receptacle for manure ; the one or the other, when alone, poffefies either too little or too much enacity. In a due mixture of tinefe, fuited to the article to be cultivated, confifts the firft rule in the economy of agriculture. Wheat requires a loam where clay chicfly abounds; Hemp where fand predominates, and which is not fubject to be flooded by rivers or rains ; but hemp will thrive in a damp atmofpere, if free from f:oft, though it will not profper in wet land.

\section*{CULTURE.}

THE lant foull be, either, froft ploughed, that is laill in ridges, o as to expofe it to the froft, or it flould bave been cultivated, the feafon before in potatoes. Lard, if kept rich, and fowedalternately in flax ana bemp may be referved for thofe purpoles for ever; but the manure foula be a mixon well rotted, ploughed in or trenched in the fall of the year.If dejigned for feed, it cannot well be too rich, or fowed too thin.-If inftended for cordage, fuw a bufiel on an acre, and keep it rich. -If it is intended for limen, fow five pecks, and do not make it quite forich.

Never pull the male bemp by itfelf, it is a very laborious and painfui ta/k; and, befides, it is not good economy. Wben you want it for feed, Jow a fmall patch by itfolf and takecare to watch the fmall birds; which, inthis cafe, can be mere eafly done than in the cther method. If the feafon will permit it, fow from the 20th of April, to the \(1 / 2\) of May, at 1) lateft ; it will, in /ome fow feafons and /ituations, anfwer in Nova-Scotia; las late as the \(20 t h\).

Pull when the lower leaves begin to turn yellow and fall off, and the falks look ulitifs,-7 ie into bundles as big as you can grafi, when the Fands are ftretched, and the two thumbs and the two mildlle fingers are three inches a-part ; then place them incircles of five feet diameter to dry on end, with the tops tied together, euch bundic eight inches a-part, at be foot.
Here the farmer's labour phould ceafe, and be ought to fall to the bempmiller; but, if be chufes to be his own manufacturer, which is very bad economy, be may take the following directions.

\section*{TO ROI HEMP}

Torot in a running fream, isbal economy, for it wafes the barle. To rot in a lake is bad, in a lefs degree, it will kill the fifh, and if the lake fmall, it will injure the cattle, if they are fuffered to drink the water. bebefl rejervoir is a tank. So fituated as to be dug in the fide of a bill, near a meadow, and which can be tapped at bottom, and bave the water run in at pleafure at top. The water/bould be of a foft nature; if coming from a lake or a fream, which has run fome diftance, that will probabl. be the cale ; if coming inmediately from a fpring, it generally will provi, bard.-It/bould be well /beltered by trees or by a roof, to prevent the top water from becoming warmer than the bottom; and, thereby rotting the bemp unequally. If thir ispermittel to take place, the whole muft be bifted once, if not twice, which is an unpleafant operation.
this, forne people let off all tbe water, and fill againafrefb; but the bett, way is to bave a continual finall fiream, always running in, awd anothe, rusning out, by which means the warmth muft be equal throughout.The water, when done with, fould be conduited over the meadow, ann will greatly enrich it.

1 be bemp muft be well watched, as the time neceffary for rotting it will depend on the fate of the air from 3 to 10 or 15 days. Take out a bundle and dry it, and try it with the break.-73is operation of rotting. requires more nicety than any other in the whole procefs; - a crop maj be totally ruined by want of judgment; -or the labor, in the enfuing fages, may be doubled by it.

You may rot bempbyfpreading it thin on meadows or othergroundsrou may effect this operation by fetting it up thin, on end, againft fences. lecured by lines ; to be expofed, during the winter, to the frof. 1 bis laf. nethod is the beft for limen.

TO DRESS HEMiP.
Tou may as concife plain rule, manage in the fame way, in regard t: Breaking, Switching or Swingling or Scutching and Heckling, as with hax; but with coarfer machines and tools; only obferving, that bemp, tefigned forcordage, does not want keckling, bat it muft be well/witched or fwingled, or fcutched.

\section*{T) PACK.}

Make your bernp up into bands, as they are called, of fve pounds each. Having cut off the roots andfwitched it well, it will become thin, at the end, like a borfes tail; -twift it raund the rout end, and make a tie of it, leaving the other end loofe; then take it by the middle and make a twift of it, always placing the root ends outwards. Tise bundle /bould weigh five hundred weight. -It will, therefore, require one bundra. and eight band for the body of the bundic, and four others to make a nany bands to tie it firn together, after being prefled down with a twent), feet leaver, between two cbeeks, made into a frame, lined with plank. The bale, thus made, jbould be threefeet long, by about two feet fquare, at the ends.
If a farmer, fairly, eftimates bis labour and want of fkill, he will find that he gains no advantage by manufacturing bis own crop; -and that, by cultivating it only, it will be among the mof profitable articies be can fow.

The Fountains of Memory and Forgetfuln.fs.
THERE are two fountains in Befitia of an oppofite nature, thoug they are very near each other. Whofoever drinks of the one immediately lofes his memory, which he recovers upon drinking of the other; nay, if he drinks a double quantity of the latter, it b.comes chereby ftronger than it was before.
