For one fquare rigged veffel. One Ball

One Ball, half hoifted, For two

Two Balls close, For three do.

Two Balls feparated, For four, For five, do.

A Pendant of any colour, A Pendant under one ball For fix

A Pendant over a ball half hoisted, For seven do.

A Pendant under two balls close, For eight do.

A Pendant between two balls separated, For nine do.

A Flag of any color For ten or more.

The above are hoisted at the east or west yard-arm, according to the quarter the veffel first appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard, until the vessels can be feen when one or more of the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head:

A Union, For a flag ship with or without a squadron.

Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two-decker.

Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a frigate.

Do with a white pendant over it, for a fmall armed veffel.

A red flag, pierced white, for a packet. A blue pendant for a merchant ship.

A red pendant, for a merchant brig.

A white pendant, for a topfail floop or schooner.

A red flag for a neutral man of war.

Do. with a blue pendant under it, for a neutral merchant ship. Do. with a red pendant under it, for a neutral merchant brig. Do. with a white pendant under it, for a do. floop or schooner.

Enemy's Signals:

A French Jack, for an enemy's fleet.

A blue pendant under a French pendant, for an enemy's ship-

A red pendant under a do. for an enemy's brig.

A white pendant under a do. for a do. floop or schooner, A Union Jack over Enemies fignals, denotes the vessels to be prizes.

Signal of Diffress:

In cases when immediate affistance is necessary, a ball at the mast head, in addition to the descriptive colours of the veffel in distress, and guns occasionally, until the fignal is attended to.

HE first February 21st. invisible, the conjunction will be at 4h. 51m. in the evening, the Sun will be centrally eclipsed in lat. 11° South, and about 9h. 5m. to the West of the meridian of London.

The fecond will be August 16th, in the morning, invisible, but at London it will be visible, and eclipsed a little more

than three Digits.



The following concife observations on Hempare published by the Committee, appointed by His Excellency Sir JOHN WENTWORTH, for the information of those, who may be disposed to cultivate that article.

L EMP requires a foil which is naturally a loam, or is made fo by a due mixture of light and heavy earths. Sand and clay, for example, will make a loam, fit to produce any thing of a vegetable nature. This composition should be considered as the receptacle for manure; the one or the other, when alone, possesses either too little or too much enacity. In a due mixture of these, suited to the article to be cultivated, consists the first rule in the economy of agriculture. Wheat requires a loam where elay chiesty abounds; Hemp where sand which is not subject to be flooded by rivers or rains; but themp will thrive in a damp atmosphere, if free from frost, though it will not prosper in wet land.

CULTURE.

THE land should be, either, frost ploughed, that is laid in ridges, so as to expose it to the frost, or it should have been cultivated, the season before in potatoes. Land, if kept rich, and sowed alternately in slax and bemp may be reserved for those purposes for ever; but the manure should be a mixon well rotted, ploughed in or trenched in the fall of the year.—If designed for seed, it cannot well be too rich, or sowed too thin.—If intended for cordage, sow a bushel on an acre, and keep it rich.—If it is intended for linen, sow sive pecks, and do not make it quite sorich.

Never pull the male hemp by itself, it is a very loborious and painful task; and, besides, it is not good economy. When you want it for seed, sow a small patch by itself and take care to watch the small birds; which, in this case, can be more easily done than in the other method. If the season will permit it, sow from the 20th of April, to the 1st of May, at latest; it will, in some few seasons and situations, answer in Nova-Scotia;

as late as the 20th.

Pull when the lower leaves begin to turn yellow and fall off, and the falks look whitifh.—I ie into bundles as big as you can grafp, when the bands are stretched, and the two thumbs and the two middle singers are three inches a-part; then place them incircles of sive feet diameter to dry on end, with the tops tied together, each bundle eight inches a-part, at the foot.

Here the farmer's labour should ceofe, and he ought to fell to the hempmiller; but, if he chuses to be his own manufacturer, which is very

bad economy, he may take the following directions.

TO ROT HEMP

Torot in a running fream, is bad economy, for it wastes the harle. To rot in a lake is bad, in a lefs degree; it will kill the fish, and if the lake is small, it will injure the cattle, if they are suffered to drink the water, be best reservoir is a tank, so situated as to be dug in the side of a hill, near a meadow, and which can be tapped at bottom, and have the water run in at pleasure at top. The water should be of a soft nature; if coming from a lake or a stream, which has run some distance, that will probably be the case; if coming immediately from a spring, it generally will provided—It should be well sheltered by trees or by a roof, to prevent the top water from becoming warmer than the bottom; and, thereby rotting the semp unequally. If this is permitted to take place, the whole must be shifted once, if not twice, which is an unpleasant operation. To prevent

this, some people let off all the water, and fill again a fresh; but the better way is to have a continual small stream, always running in, and another running out, by which means the warmth must be equal throughout.—
The water, when done with, should be conducted over the meadow, and will greatly enrich it.

The hemp must be swell watched, as the time necessary for rotting is will depend on the state of the air from 3 to 10 or 15 days. Take onto bundle and dry it, and try it with the break.—This operation of rotting, requires more nicety than any other in the subole process;—a crop may be totally ruined by swant of judgment;—or the labor, in the ensuing stages, may be doubled by it.

You may not bempby spreading it thin on meadows or other grounds. You may effect this operation by setting it up thin, on end, against sence. secured by lines; to be exposed, during the winter, to the frost. I his last

method is the best for linen.

To DRESS HEMP.

You may as a concise plain rule, manage in the same way, in regard to Breaking, Switching or Swingling or Scutching and Heckling, as with slax; but with coarser machines and tools; only observing, that bemp, designed for cordage, does not want heckling, but it must be well switched or swingled, or scutched.

T) PACK.

Make your bemp up into bands, as they are called, of five pounds each. Having cut off the roots and fwitched it well, it will become thin, at the end, like a borfes tail;—twift it round the root end, and make a tie of it, leaving the other end loofe; then take it by the middle and make a twift of it, always placing the root ends outwards. The bundle bould weighfive hundred weight.—It will, therefore, require one bundre, and eight hand for the body of the bundle, and four others to make a many bands to tie it firm together, after being preffed down with atwent feet leaver, between two cheeks, made into a frame, lined with plank. The bale, thus made, fould be three feet long, by about two feet fquare, at the ends.

If a farmer, fairly, eftimates his labour and want of skill, he will simble that he gains no advantage by manufacturing his own crop;—and that, by cultivating it only, it will be among the most profitable articles he

can forw.

The Fountains of Memory and Forgetfulness.
