SIGNALS made at FORT GEORGE, when Vessels
are coming into Halifax Harbor :

The above are hoisted at the east or west yard-arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in, with the addition of a ball in the centre of the yard, until the vessels can be seen when one or more of the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head :

A Union, For a flag ship with or without a squadron.

Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two-decker.

Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a frigate.

Do with a white pendant over it, for a small armed vessel.

A red flag, pierced white, for a packet.

A blue pendant for a merchant ship.

A red pendant, for a merchant brig.

A white pendant, for a topsail sloop or schooner.

A red flag for a neutral man of war.

Do. with a blue pendant under it, for a neutral merchant ship.

Do. with a red pendant under it, for a neutral merchant brig.

Do. with a white pendant under it, for a do. sloop or schooner.

Enemy's Signals :

A French Jack, for an enemy's fleet.

A blue pendant under a French pendant, for an enemy's ship.

A red pendant under a do. for an enemy's brig.

A white pendant under a do. for a do. sloop or schooner,

A Union Jack over Enemies signals, denotes the vessels to be prizes.

Signal of Distress :

In cases when immediate assistance is necessary, a ball at the mast head, in addition to the descriptive colours of the vessel in distress, and guns occasionally, until the signal is attended to.

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SIGNALS made on the Ensign Staff at FORT GEORGE.

- A Red Flag denotes a vessel From Europe
 - A White Flag do. do. do. Newfoundland.
 - A Blue Flag do. do. do. West-Indies.
 - A Red Pendant do. do. do. United States.
 - A White Pendant do. do. A Coaster
 - A Blue Pendant do. do. from some part of the world for which there is no particular signal.
- A White Pendant over any of the above, denotes a vessel to have failed, either before, or at the same time, with one already arrived.

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1803.

Two ECLIPSES this YEAR, both of the SUN.

THE first February 21st. invisible, the conjunction will be at 4h. 51m. in the evening, the Sun will be centrally eclipsed in lat. 11° South, and about 9h. 5m. to the West of the meridian of London.

The second will be August 16th, in the morning, invisible, but at London it will be visible, and eclipsed a little more than three Digits.

By the latter road you clear the Ferry and Sands at Barronsfield, which are often troublesome to strangers; but when the tides are low, the former is the best way, the Ferry excepted.

For the information of Travellers between Windfor and Parrsborough, &c.

THE Parrsborough packet sails regularly between Windfor and Parrsborough twice in every week, and occasionally three times; but always from Parrsborough every Monday in the Summer season, wind and weather permitting, so as to be at Windfor on Tuesday, and will sail from thence the first high water that happens, at or after 8 o'clock in the forenoon of that day.—The passage money for each person is five shillings, and the freight for horses and neat cattle, is seven shilling and six pence per head. The vessel is 42 tons burthen, and has good accommodations for passengers; and likewise for taking over horses, neat cattle, sheep, &c.

Surprising Proof of Healthiness.

THOUGH the air of Greenland is very cold, yet it is so healthy, that the inhabitants are very rarely troubled with any disorder; and even those who are attack'd by a fever, are notwithstanding able to dine upon a piece of salt beef.

Severe Climate.

THOUGH Russia is the largest country in Europe, two thirds of it are covered with snow all the year. The air is sometimes so very piercing, that the inhabitants lose their noses, hands and feet; their spittle freezes as it falls from their mouth; even trees often burst with the violence of the cold: notwithstanding the summer is so very hot, that great lakes are often entirely dried up, and that the inhabitants faint as they pass along the streets.

Fact upon Fact.

AT Turnham Green lives a barber who the inhabitants esteem for his wit: he was sent for one day to shave the late Mr. Churchill, who lived in that neighbourhood: to excuse himself, he said he had been busy ever since five o'clock in the morning, which happened to be the day the Westminster militia was reviewed. Mr. Churchill asked him how many he had shaved, "Sir," replied the barber, "you make the hundred and fiftenth." "That is a great number," replied Churchill, "in so small a place. But I remember a gentleman in your way who used likewise to draw teeth, (that lived in a small village in Essex, of which I was curate) drew as many teeth one morning as completely paved a court yard larger than that (pointing to his own, which was twelve yards long and ten yards wide) and that he and his wife finished the work the next morning before eleven o'clock." "Yes," says the barber, "my wife helpt me to comb the wigs, and make the lather."

A surprising and magnanimous Anecdote of William Tell.

WILLIAM TELL was an illustrious Swiss patriot, chief instrument of the revolution which delivered the Swiss Cantons from the German yoke in 1307. Griser, the governor of these provinces for the emperor Albert, having ordered him under pain of death, to shoot at an apple placed on the head of one of his children, he had the dexterity though the distance was very considerable, to strike off without hitting the child. The tyrant, perceiving he had another arrow concealed under his cloak, asked him for what purpose? To which he boldly replied, "To have shot you through the hart, if I had had the misfortune to kill my son." The enraged governor now ordered him to be hang'd; but his fellow-citizens, animated by his fortitude and patriotism, flew to arms, attacked and vanquish'd Griser, who was shot to death by Till; and the association for the independency took place that instant, which has been since known by the name of the United Provinces of Switzerland.

A remarkable Story of Predestination.

NOT many years ago, a gentleman from a considerable distance, came upon a visit to a friend's house, another gentleman of this neighbourhood, and on the last day of his journey, was obliged to cross a great river, or arm of the sea, in a little ferry-boat, which he did prosperously enough; in his friend's house at night, being of the gay reasoning part of mankind, he, in the course of a mixed conversation, acquainted the company — "That his fortune had been told (or as the saying is, his nativity calculated) immediately on his birth, which was, that he would be drowned on the day he was thirty years of age, which (he gaily added) was that very day, pleasantly rallying the superstition of his mother, and the good women about her at his birth, and declaring that he crossed the said ferry with the more pleasure, in order to expose the weakness of such idle conceits. The company joined with him in his opinion all along, and diverted themselves much with the superstition of most women, and all common people.

But sitting up late, this same gentleman went by himself (which he had no occasion to do) much concerned in liquor, and unobserved by the rest, who were in the like condition, into a back yard, and hitting his foot against something in the way, pitched headlong into a deep well, where he was unfortunately drowned before any of the family missed him, or knew any thing of him.

Death strangely prevented.

IN the history of Muscovy, published by the ambassador Demetrius, we read the memorable fortune of a country peasant. This man, seeking for honey, got into a hollow tree, where was such plenty of it, that it sucked him up to his breast; and being unable to get out, he had lived two days upon honey only, and finding his voice could not be heard in that solitary wood, despaired of freeing himself from this sweet captivity. A huge bear came to the same tree to eat the honey, of which these beasts are very greedy, and descending with his hinder parts foremost, the poor fellow caught hold of his loins; the bear terribly frightened, laboured with all his might to get out, and so drew the peasant from his sweet prison, which otherwise had proved his grave.

To prevent the Biting of Musketoos, even in a Marsh, or guilt of them.

WHEN you have on your common Summer apparel, put on a pair of jack-boots, an oil-cloth great coat to reach the calves of your legs well wrapp'd round your body, with hood and cap on, so that it comes well under your chin and close to your cheeks; then put on a mask with glass to the eyes, and a piece of tin with holes like the top of a pepper-box (but mind that they are so small that the musketoe can't get thro') for the mouth-piece, and then put on a pair of stiff-toe leather gloves lined with fur: and in this dress a musketoe will never hurt you. Ha! ha! ha! ha! ha! ha! ha!

For an ague.—By Dr. Mead.

Take half an ounce of bark powdered, thirty grains of snake-root powdered, and forty grains of salt wormwood; mix all these well together, divide the whole into three equal doses, and take one in a glass of wine two hours before the fit comes on.—This has cured thousands. Or,

Take the herb called Cardus Benedictus commonly called Cardus) and make a strong tea of it—of which drink about half a pint. It is an excellent vomit, followed by a gentle purge.

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The following concise observations on Hemp are published by the Committee, appointed by His Excellency Sir JOHN WENTWORTH, for the information of those, who may be disposed to cultivate that article.

SOIL.

HEMP requires a soil which is naturally a loam, or is made so by a due mixture of light and heavy earths. Sand and clay, for example, will make a loam, fit to produce any thing of a vegetable nature. This composition should be considered as the receptacle for manure; the one or the other, when alone, possesses either too little or too much tenacity. In a due mixture of these, suited to the article to be cultivated, consists the first rule in the economy of agriculture. Wheat requires a loam where clay chiefly abounds; Hemp where sand predominates, and which is not subject to be flooded by rivers or rains; but hemp will thrive in a damp atmosphere, if free from frost, though it will not prosper in wet land.

CULTURE.

THE land should be, either, frost ploughed, that is laid in ridges, so as to expose it to the frost, or it should have been cultivated, the season before in potatoes. Land, if kept rich, and sowed alternately in flax and hemp may be reserved for those purposes for ever; but the manure should be a mixon well rotted, ploughed in or trenched in the fall of the year.— If designed for seed, it cannot well be too rich, or sowed too thin.— If intended for cordage, sow a bushel on an acre, and keep it rich.— If it is intended for linen, sow five pecks, and do not make it quite soric.

Never pull the male hemp by itself, it is a very laborious and painful task; and, besides, it is not good economy. When you want it for seed, sow a small patch by itself and take care to watch the small birds; which, in this case, can be more easily done than in the other method. If the season will permit it, sow from the 20th of April, to the 1st of May, at latest; it will, in some few seasons and situations, answer in Nova-Scotia, as late as the 20th.

Pull when the lower leaves begin to turn yellow and fall off, and the stalks look whitish.— Tie into bundles as big as you can grasp, when the bands are stretched, and the two thumbs and the two middle fingers are three inches a-part; then place them in circles of five feet diameter to dry on end, with the tops tied together, each bundle eight inches a-part, at the foot.

Here the farmer's labour should cease, and he ought to sell to the hemp-miller; but, if he chuses to be his own manufacturer, which is very bad economy, he may take the following directions.

TO ROT HEMP

Rot in a running stream, is bad economy, for it wastes the harle. To rot in a lake is bad, in a less degree; it will kill the fish, and if the lake is small, it will injure the cattle, if they are suffered to drink the water. The best reservoir is a tank, so situated as to be dug in the side of a hill, near a meadow, and which can be tapped at bottom, and have the water run in at pleasure at top. The water should be of a soft nature; if coming from a lake or a stream, which has run some distance, that will probably be the case; if coming immediately from a spring, it generally will prove hard.— It should be well sheltered by trees or by a roof, to prevent the top water from becoming warmer than the bottom; and, thereby rotting the hemp unequally. If this is permitted to take place, the whole must be shifted once, if not twice, which is an unpleasant operation. To prevent

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this, some people let off all the water, and fill again afresh; but the better way is to have a continual small stream, always running in, and another running out, by which means the warmth must be equal throughout.—The water, when done with, should be conducted over the meadow, and will greatly enrich it.

The hemp must be well watched, as the time necessary for rotting it will depend on the state of the air from 3 to 10 or 15 days. Take out a bundle and dry it, and try it with the break.—This operation of rotting, requires more nicety than any other in the whole process;—a crop may be totally ruined by want of judgment;—or the labor, in the ensuing stages, may be doubled by it.

You may rot hemp by spreading it thin on meadows or other grounds.—You may effect this operation by setting it up thin, on end, against fences, secured by lines; to be exposed, during the winter, to the frost. This last method is the best for linen.

TO DRESS HEMP.

You may as a concise plain rule, manage in the same way, in regard to Breaking, Switching or Swingling or Scutching and Heckling, as with flax; but with coarser machines and tools; only observing, that hemp, designed for cordage, does not want heckling, but it must be well switched or swingled, or scutched.

TO PACK.

Make your hemp up into hands, as they are called, of five pounds each. Having cut off the roots and switched it well, it will become thin, at the end, like a horse's tail;—twist it round the root end, and make a tie of it, leaving the other end loose; then take it by the middle and make a twist of it, always placing the root ends outwards. The bundle should weigh five hundred weight.—It will, therefore, require one bundle and eight hands for the body of the bundle, and four others to make a manybands to tie it firm together, after being pressed down with a wright's feet lever, between two cheeks, made into a frame, lined with plank. The bale, thus made, should be three feet long, by about two feet square, at the ends.

If a farmer, fairly, estimates his labour and want of skill, he will find that he gains no advantage by manufacturing his own crop;—and that, by cultivating it only, it will be among the most profitable articles he can sow.

The Fountains of Memory and Forgetfulness.

THERE are two fountains in Bessia of an opposite nature, though they are very near each other. Whosoever drinks of the one immediately loses his memory, which he recovers upon drinking of the other; nay, if he drinks a double quantity of the latter, it becomes thereby stronger than it was before.
