## HERSCHELL'S WEATHER TABLE

For foretelling the weather, through all the Lunations of asch Year, forever.
This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will, by simple inspection show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrence of the moon into any of its quariers, and that so near the truth, as to be seldom or never found to fail.

Observations. -1 . The nearer the time of the mon's change first quarter, full, and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.
9. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.
3. The nearer to mid day or noon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.
4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the foremoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and cotomn nearly in the same ratio.

happoning during six of the afternoon hours, i.e. from forr to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dopendent on the wind as is noted in the table.
6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causen, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring. yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.
7. To prognosticate correctly, esprcially in those casea where the wind is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

The above table was originally formed by Dr. Hersehell, and is now published with some alterations founded on the experience of Dr. Adam Clark.

In compliance with the usual custom, the publisher has inserted through the calendar pages of this A Imanac, a running account of the weather. It is, however, known that very little reliance is to be placed in such matters. For the accommodation of the curious, we insert Dr. Herschell's Weather Table, that those who believe in his principles, may caloulate the changes of the weather at their le sure.

The Moon's place in the Zodiac is also given. It has beea an ancient custom to apply this to the human frame, as operating on-particular portions of it. Those who place reliance in this notion, (which has long since been exploded by the learned,) will find out what they desire, by substituting the parts of the body, for the astronomical name given in the last column of the calendar pages, as anntzed:

## RECIPES, \&c.

Tootr Ache.-Alum reduced to firee powder, two drachms, nitrous spirits of ather, seven drachms; mix and apply them to the tooth, and a cure will be effected.

Bleeding at the Nose.-Blow powdered gum Arabic up it with a quill and the bleeding will stop.

To remove dirt from the eye.-Take a horse hair, loop it $u p$, holding the two ends, raise the eyelid and place the looped part under it, let the lid down and draw out the hair, retaining the hold of both the ends.
To tafe grease spots out of woollen.-Dissolve a piece of Pearlash, as big as a pea, in half a tea cup full of water, pour some of it on the spot and rub it with a woollen eloth till nearly dry, and the grease will disappear.

Frost bitten feet.-Take the fat of a dinghill fowl anu ub the place or places affected with it, morning and evening ver a warm fire; at the same time wrapping a piece of wool en cloth, well greased with the same fat, round the frost bittel sarts. In two or three days they will feel no pain, and in fiv, or six will be quite cured. If the inner bark of elder, or the leaves of plantain be first simmered with the fat, it will be the better.
Sun burn smarting.-Wash the parts well with strong sage ten or with cream.
A cut that festers.-Apply shoemaker's wax, and wash i with turpentire.


Fire and water proof cement.-To half a pint of vinegar add the same quantity of milk; separate the curd and mix the whey with the white of five eggs, beat it well together and sift into it a sufficient quantity of quick lime, to convert it o the consistency of thick piste. Broken vessels mended witl his cement, never af erwards separate, for it resists the action of both fire and water.
Cement.-Isinglass, boiled in spirits of wine, will produer a fine transparent cement which will unite broken glass so as in render the fracture serure and almnet imnercentible.



To keep avay Musquilors.-Attach a pitce of flannele sponge to a thread made tast to the top of the bedstead, w. he flannel or sponge with campherated spirits, and the Mus pitoes will leave the room.
A remedy for poison.- It is nothing more than two te: apoonsfit o! made mustard, miyed in warm water. It acts a in instantaneous emetic.
The Cramp.-If in the stomach, drink plentifully of stron yinger tea, as hot as you can bear it; if in the hands or legt bathe them in hot water.

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## COURTS OF LAW AND EQUITY.

The Court of Chancery was established in this Provines by act of Parliament, passed in March 1837, and has jurisdiotion in cases of fraud; in matters relating to Trust; and to Executors and Administrators; and to Mortgages; in Dower; in all matters relating to Infants, Idiots, and Lunatics and their Estates, except where otherwise special provision hath
$T_{1}$ Satu M the : H the: been made by law : in all matters relating to awards; to compel the specific performance of Agreements; in Discovery; to prevent suiss at law against conscience; to decree letters patent and repeal those erroneously issued; in waste; accident; account and co-partnership.

The Lieutenant Governor is Chancellor; Vice Chancellor, Robert S. Jameson; Registrar, William Hepburn. There are besides two Masters, an Accountant and a Sergeant-atArms. The enormous costs charged in this court, led to the passing of an Act, in 1840, authorising the appointment of Commissioners to regulate its practice and costs.

## Court of Queen's Bench.

Chief Juatice, the Hon. John B. Robinson; Puisne Judges, Hon. James B. Macaulay, Hon. Jonas Jones, Hon. Archibald McLean, and the Hon. C. A. Hagerman. Attorney General, Wm. H. Draper; Sulicitor General, Robert Baldwin. This Court has a Reporter, whose duties are now regulated under the direction of an act of the Legislature passed in Februaty, 1840.

The Court of Uyer and Terminer, General Gaol Delivery, and Nisi Prius, is held in the several Districts throughout the Province twice in the year; being at some convenient time in the spring and fall.

The Judges of the Queen's Bench, are allowed besides their salary by ac' of Parliament, $£ 25$ for travelling expenses, for every time they ppen a Court in any District, except the Home District.

A Court of General Quarter Sessions, under the superintendence of the Magistrates, who appoint a Chairman, and a District Court, in which a Judge appointed by the Executive presides, are held in every District thooughout the Province, four times a year. There is a Court of Requests for the recovery of small debts, under $£ 10,-$ Also a Probate and Surrogate Courts, having jurisdiction in matters relating to Wills \&e.

Terms of the Court of Queen's Bench for 1841.-There are four in the year, and at these times the Judges sit at Toronto and listen to the arguments of the Barristers, and decide Law questions, etc.-

Eastran District. - On the 4 ! h Tuesday in January and Aprit, and on the 2d Tuesday in July and Octover.

## District Courts.

These are held in every District at the time and place of holding the Quarter Sessions.-
The Term Court, in whien Law points and other matters of practice are settled, always precedes the time of holding the Quarter Sessions, and the District Courts as follows:that is, the terms of the District Court, severally commence on the Monday in the week next but one preceding the week, and at the place, in which the Sessions are holden, and end on the Saturday in the same week.
The District Court has jurtsdiction in all matters of contract from forty shillings to $£ 15$; and when the amuunt is liquidated or ascertained, either by the act of the parties or the nature of the transaction, to forty pounds. For instance, a promissory note under $£ 40$ can be sued in this Court, and an open but unsettled account of $£ 15$, or under, but not over that amount. Also it has jurisdiction in all matters of tort respecting personal chattles, when the damages to be recovered do not exceed $£ 15$, and the citle to lands is not brought into question. The ordinary cos's of a suit range from $\varepsilon \dot{5}$ to $£ 10$-is the Queen's Bench from $£ 10$ to $£ 30$.

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## Statute Labour, on Highway Rates.

Every male inhabitunt, from 21 years of age to 50 , not rated on the Assessment Roll, is liable to work on the highways two days. And by 59 Geo. III. chap. 8, section 2d, every person inserted on the Assessment Roll, is, in propurtion to the esimate of his real and personal property, stated on the said Roll, held liable to work on the highways and roads, in each year as follows:-If his property be not rated at more than $£ 25$, two days; from that to $£ 50$, three days; from that to $£ 75$ four days; from that to $£ 100$, five days; and
" $£ 500$ " 3500 , one day.

Every person possessed of a waggon, cart or team of horses, oxen or bensts of burthen or draft, used to draw the same, is liable to work three days.

Indigent persons, oppressed by sickness, age, or having a large family, can be exempted at the discretion of the Town Wardens.

Any persons liable can commute at 2 s . 6d. per day, if they think proper.

## The General Assessment.

Drwarding goods, wares or merchandize, for hire or gain, $£ 200$; every stud horse kept for hire or gain, $£ 99$; every horse of the age of three years and upwards, $£ 8$; oxen, of the age of four years and upwards, per head, $£ 4$; milch cows, per head $£ 3$; horned cattle from the age of two years to four years, per head 20s; every close carriage with four wheels, kept for pleasure ع100; every phæton or other open carriage with four wheels kept for pleasure only, $£ 25$; every curricle, gig, or other carriage with two wheels, kept for pleasure only, $£ 20$; every waggon kept for pleasure, $£ 15$; every stove in a room whe there is no fireplace, to be considered a fireplace.
All lands are rateable held in fee simple, or promise of simple by land board certificate, order of council, or certifi of any governor of Canada, or by lease. The snm levied no case to exceed one penny on the pound, for any one yes except the wages of members of the Assembly which are to levied in Addition.

The Queen, should she be possessed of, or in the artual occupation of any property in the Province, is excepted from the payment of taxes.

All Freeholders and Householders over 21 years of age are entitled to vote. The Officers to be chosen are: one Township Clerk, one Assessor, one Collector, a sufficient number of persons to serve as Pound-Keepers and Overseers of Highways, three Town Wardens, and by stat. 4, Wm. IV. ch. 12, from three to eighteen Fence Viewers. No Magistrate is liable to serve; nor other persnn, oftener than once in three year3, without his consent. Persons elected are liable to a penalty, if they de not within 20 days after their appointmont subscribe to a declaration, to be prepared by the Town-
ship Clerk. Town Meetings regnlate matfers relating to catile running at large, fines for breach of rules, height and description of fenees, dangerous pits, obnnxious weeds, \&e. Magistrates tohold a special sessions on or before the 3d Sat. urday in April in each year, at which road devisions \&r. are to be arranged. All statute labor is in be perfirmed between 10th May and 24th July earh year. For the duties of Town. ship Officers generally, see chap. 21, 1 Victoria 1837-8.
