

HERSCHELL'S WEATHER TABLE

For foretelling the weather, through all the Lunations of each Year, forever.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will, by simple inspection show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth, as to be seldom or never found to fail.

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change first quarter, full, and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

5. The nearer to mid day or noon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forencom to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and sutomn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full, and last quarter,

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happening during six of the afternoon hours, i.e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes. is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be within sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.

The above table was originally formed by Dr. Herschell, and is now published with some alterations founded on the experience of Dr. Adam Clark.

THE WEATHER.

In compliance with the usual custom, the publisher has inserted through the calendar pages of this Almanac, a running account of the weather. It is, however, known that very little reliance is to be placed in such matters. For the accommodation of the curious, we insert DR. HERSCHELL's Weather Table, that those who believe in his principles, may caloulate the changes of the weather at their le sure.

THE SIGNS.-EXPLANATIONS.

The Moon's place in the Zodiac is also given. It has been an ancient custom to apply this to the human frame, as operating or particular portions of it. Those who place reliance in this notion, (which has long since been exploded by the learned,) will find out what they desire, by substituting the parts of the body, for the astronomical name given in the last column of the calendar pages, as annexed :

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

Venus will be the Evening star, until May 14th, then Morning star until next year.

Jupiter will be Morning star until June 5th, then Evening star until December 2d, then Morning star until July 10th, Bext year.

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Mars will be Morning star until April 17th, then Evening star until next year.

Eaturn will be Morning star until June 21st, then Evening star until December 27th then Morning star until July 3d, 1842.

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1841.

There will be six Eclipses this year, four of the sun and two of the moon, as follows :

I. The sun will be partially eclipsed, January 22d. This eclipse will only be visible in a small portion of the Southern Ocean.

II. The moon will be totally eclipsed on February 5th. Eclipse begins, 7h 25m P. M Total ecl. beg. 8 33 Middle of ecl. 9 12 Total eclipse ends 10 58

III. The sun will be partially eclipsed, February 21. This celipse will be visible in the North Atlantic Ocean, Iceland and East Greenland.

IV. The sun will be partially eclipsed, July 18th. This relipse will be visible in Baffin's Bay, the Northern Ocean, Germany, Scotland, and the north of France.

V. The moon will be totally eclipsed August 2. Eclipse begins, 3h 9m. A.M. Total ecl., ends 5h 58m A. M. Total ecl. begins, 4 14 Middle of celipse 5 6

VI. The sun will be partially eclipsed August 16. This celipse will be visible in the south Pacific Ocean, and part of the Southern Ocean.

RECIPES, &c.

TOOTH ACHE.—Alum reduced to fine powder, two drachms, nitrous spirits of ather, seven drachms; mix and apply them to the tooth, and a cure will be effected.

BLEEDING AT THE NOSE.-Blow powdered gum Arabie up it with a quill and the bleeding will stop.

TO REMOVE DIRT FROM THE EYE.—Take a horse hair, loop it up, holding the two ends, raise the eyelid and place the looped part under it, let the lid down and draw out the hair, retaining the hold of both the ends.

TO TAKE CREASE SPOTS OUT OF WOOLLEN.—Dissolve a piece of Pearlash, as big as a pea, in half a tea cup full of water, pour some of it on the spot and rub it with a woollen cloth till nearly dry, and the grease will disappear.

To TAKE STAINS OUT OF SILVER PLATE.— The plate is to be steeped in soap ley for four hours, then cover it over with white ning, wet with vinegar so that it may stick thick upon it and dry it by a fire, after which rub off the whitening, and lass it over with dry bran, and the spots will not only disaptear, but the plate will look exceedingly bright.

To remove spots of ink from linen.—Take a mould candle is some pure tallow, melt it and dip the spotted part of liner in the melted tallow, then put it in the wash, when it will become perfectly white.

FROST BITTEN FEET.— Take the fat of a d inghill fowl and ub the place or places affected with it, morning and evening over a warm fire; at the same time wrapping a piece of wool en cloth, well greased with the same fat, round the frost bitter parts. In two or three days they will feel no pain, and in fivor six will be quite cured. If the inner bark of elder, or the leaves of plantain be first simmered with the fat, it will be the better.

Sun burn smarting.-Wash the parts well with strong sage tea or with cream.

A cut that festers .- Apply shoemaker's wax, and wash i with turpentive.

FIRE AND WATER PROOF CEMENT.— To half a pint of vinegar add the same quantity of milk; separate the curd and mix the whey with the white of five eggs, beat it well together, and sift into it a sufficient quantity of quick lime, to convert it to the consistency of thick paste. Broken vessels mended will his cement, never afterwards separate, for it resists the action of both fire and water.

CEMENT.—Isinglass, boiled in spirits of wine, will produce a fine transparent cement which will unite broken glass so as to render the fracture secure and almost impercentible.

Steele, Clerk; T. D. Campbell, Treasurer; David Fairbairn, Road Surveyor. Market, every day till 20'clock, except Sundays, Christmas, and Good Friday. Agent for Crown Lands and Clergy Reserves, District of Johnstown, Dr. J. W. Scott, of Preseott.

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COURTS OF LAW AND EQUITY.

The COURT OF CHANCERY was established in this Province by act of Parliament, passed in March 1837, and has jurisdiotion in cases of fraud; in matters relating to Trust; and to Executors and Administrators; and to Mortgages; in Dower; in all matters relating to Infants, Idiots, and Lunatics and their Estates, except where otherwise special provision hath been made by law: in all matters relating to awards; to compel the specific performance of Agreements; in Discovery; to prevent suits at law against conscience; to decree letters patent and repeal those erroneously issued; in waste; accident; account and co-partnership.

The Lieutenant Governor is Chancellor; Vice Chancellor, Robert S. Jameson; Registrar, William Hepburn. There are besides two Masters, an Accountant and a Sergeant-at-Arms. The enormous costs charged in this court, led to the passing of an Act, in 1840, authorising the appointment of Commissioners to regulate its practice and costs.

COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.

Chief Justice, the Hon. John B. Robinson; Puisne Judges, Hon. James B. Macaulay, Hon. Jonas Jones, Hon. Archibald McLean, and the Hon. C. A. Hagerman. Attorney General, Wm. H. Draper; Solicitor General, Robert Baldwin. This Court has a Reporter, whose duties are now regulated under the direction of an act of the Legislature passed in February, 1840.

The Court of Oyer and Terminer, General Gaol Delivery, and Nisi Prius, is held in the several Districts throughout the Province twice in the year; being at some convenient time in the spring and fall.

The Judges of the Queen's Bench, are allowed besides their salary by ac of Parliament, £25 for travelling expenses, for every time they open a Court in any District, except the Home District.

A Court of General Quarter Sessions, under the superintendence of the Magistrates, who appoint a Chairman, and a District Court, in which a Judge appointed by the Executive presides, are held in every District throughout the Province, four times a year. There is a Court of Requests for the recovery of small debts, under $\pounds 10.$ —Also a Probate and Surrogate Courts, having jurisdiction in matters relating to Wills &c.

Terms of the Court of Queen's Bench for 1841.—There are four in the year, and at these times the Judges sit at Toronto and listen to the arguments of the Barristers, and decide Law questions, etc.—

EASTER TERM, commences on the first Monday in February and ends on the Saturday of the following week. in A Wi Ind Ry Pes

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TRIMITY, on the second Monday in June, and ends on the Saturday of the following week.

MICHAELMAS, on the first Monday in August, and ends on the Saturday of the following week.

HILARY, on the first Monday in November, and ends on the Saturday of the following week.

Time of holding the Courts of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace.

JOHNSTOWN DISTRICT.—On the 3d Tuesday in February and May, and on the 2d Tuesday in August and November.

BATHURST DISTRICT.—On the 3d Tuesday in March, September, and December, and on the 2d Tuesday in June.

MIDLAND DISTRICT.—On the 4th Tuesday in January, and April, and on the 2d Tuesday in July and October.

EASTERN DISTRICT. - On the 4th Tuesday in January and April, and on the 3d Tuesday in July and October.

DISTRICT COURTS.

These are held in every District at the time and place of holding the Quarter Sessions.-

The Term Court, in which Law points and other matters of practice are settled, always precedes the time of holding the Quarter Sessions, and the District Courts as follows: that is, the terms of the District Court, severally commence on the Monday in the week next but one preceding the week, and at the place, in which the Sessions are holden, and end on the Saturday in the same week.

The District Court has jurisdiction in all matters of contract from forty shillings to £15; and when the amount is liquidated or ascertained, either by the act of the parties or the nature of the transaction, to forty pounds. For instance, a promissory note under £40 can be sued in this Court, and an open but unsettled account of £15, or under, but not over that amount. Also it has jurisdiction in all matters of tort respecting personal chattles, when the damages to be recovered do not exceed £15, and the title to lands is not brought into question. The ordinary costs of a suit range from £5 to £10—in the Queen's Bench from £10 to £30.

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Every person possessed of a waggon, cart or team of horses, oxen or beasts of burthen or draft, used to draw the same, is liable to work three days.

Indigent persons, oppressed by sickness, age, or having a large family, can be exempted at the discretion of the Town Wardens.

Any persons liable can commute at 2s. 6d. per day, if they think proper.

THE GENERAL ASSESSMENT.

By the 53th Geo. III, chapter 7, section 2d, the following is deemed rateable property at the given valuation :-

prwarding goods, wares or merchandize, for hire or gain, \$200; every stud horse kept for hire or gain, £99; every horse of the age of three years and upwards, £8; oxen, of the age of four ot rated years and upwards, per head, £4; milch cows, per head £3; thways horned cattle from the age of two years to four years, per head 20s: every close carriage with four wheels, kept for pleasure tion to £100; every phæton or other open carriage with four wheels on the kept for pleasure only, £25; every curricle, gig, or other carbads, in riage with two wheels, kept for pleasure only, £20; every at more waggon kept for pleasure, £15; every stove in a room when m that there is no fireplace, to be considered a fireplace.

TOWNSHIP OFFICERS.

Township Meetings to be held arnually on the first Monday in January, by notice of the Township Clerk, after receiving a warrant from any two Justices of the Peace acting for the division in which the townships are situated, at such place All Freeholders and Householders over as they may appoint. 21 years of age are entitled to vote. The Officers to be chosen are : one Township Clerk, one Assessor, one Collector, a sufficient number of persons to serve as Pound-Keepers and Overseers of Highways, three Town Wardens, and by stat. 4, Wm. IV. ch. 12, from three to eighteen Fence Viewers. No Magistrate is liable to serve; nor other person, oftener than once in three years, without his consent.
