PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

MANITOBA, lying between the parallels of 49° and 50½° of north latitude, and 96° and 99° of west longitude, occupies nearly the actual centre of the North American Continent. Manitoba also lies midway between the Arctic and Tropic Circles, and midway between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

The present area of the Province by system of survey, and exclusive of road allowances, is 9,008,640 acres, deducting for Half-breed grant 1,400,000, Hudson's Bay Company's twentieth and school section reserves 707,680, leaving available area of 6,900,960 acres within the present boundary. Each Township consists of thirty-six sections, of one square mile each, and road allowances in all cases will be one chain and a half in width.

Manitoba (then the colony of Assiniboia), having after the troubles of 1869-70 accepted terms from the Dominion Government for its entering the Confederation, was created a Province in July, 1870. The population at the first census, taken in December, 1870, was 11,965, divided as follows:

French Half-breeds...... 5,694 English do 4,076 Whites..... 1,614 Indians..... 581

At the present time the total population is roughly estimated at thirty thousand. As yet no agricultural statistics have been obtained.

The form of Government is similar to that of the other Provinces of the Dominion, but the Legislative Council being abolished by act of the Legislature, the Legislature consists only of a Legislative Assembly of twenty-four members, representing twenty-four constituencies.

The Executive consists of the Lieutenant-Governor, a Provincial Secretary, acting also as Attorney-General, a Provincial Treasurer, Minister of Public Works, and Minister of Agriculture, who is also President of the Council.

A liberal homestead law is in force in Manitoba, which exempts from seizure the debtor's ordinary furniture, tools and farm implements in use, also "one cow, two oxen, one horse, four sheep, two pigs, and the food for the same for thirty days, " and " the land cultivated by the debtor, provided the extent of the same be not more than one hundred and sixty acres, in which case the surplus may be sold with privileges to first mortgages. The house, stables, barns, fences on the debtor's farm, are, by this act, declared free from seizure, by virtue of all writs of execution issued by any court of this Province." No limit is placed on the value of the farm or home thus secured to the family, whatever its value may become. It may be safely asserted that this law will greatly advance immigration to this Province, and prove a blessing to thousands of worthy and honest men, women and children for every one unworthily shielded by its provisions.

The Red River rises in Minnesota, in the United States, close to the sources of the Mississippi, and enters British Territory at the Boundary line of Manitoba, about 120 miles from its mouth, where it discharges into Lake

Winnipeg.

It is not within the limits of this Directory to enter into lengthy details of the resources and advantages of Manitoba to the Emigrant and Capitalist, as also of its climate, soil and agriculture. For such information of a reliable nature, we would recommend a careful perusal of Mr. Spence's excellent and complete pamphlet on Manitoba and the North-West, copyrighted. In giving a brief historical sketch of Manitoba, we cannot do better than quote from an able article in Lovell's Gazetteer of British North America, with the kind permission of the Publisher of that valuable work.

"The name Manitoba, taken from a large lake, a part of which lies in the province, is a contraction, made by the old French Canadian voyageurs, of the Cree word, Manito-waban. Manito signifies supernatural divine spirit; and waban means a strait. As the waters of a strait in that lake are agitated in an unusual way, the Indians believed formerly there was therein something supernatural, a spirit that moved them, and so they called the lake Manitowaban.

The writer proceeds to say:

"This section of North America was first visited by the French. Chevalier de la Vérandrye built a fort at the mouth of the Assiniboine in 1731. The French continued to trade there alone for many years, but in 1767 the first English traders visited it, and soon several rival companies were in operation. These finally dwindled into the famous North West Company, which in its turn was absorbed by the Hudson's Bay Company, chartered by King Charles II. in 1670. The latter Company having sold a tract of Jand to the Hon. Thomas Douglas, Earl of Selkirk, on both sides of the Assiniboine and of the Red Rivers, his lordship planted there, in 1812, a colony known by the name of Selkirk Settlement, Red River Settlement, or also Assiniboia. In 1836 the Hudson's Bay Company repurchased from the heirs of Lord Selkirk the same tract of land ceded the Hudson's Bay Company repurchased from the heirs of Lord Selkirk the same tract of land ceded the Hudson's Bay Company repurchased from the heirs of Lord Selkirk the same tract of land ceded to his lordship in 1811, and continued to exercise authority over that portion of Rupert's Land by the appointment of the Governer and Council of Assimboia, which, in course of time, especially after the settlers had declared independence of trade in 1849, formed a rather independent administration for the local affairs in the colony, the limits'of which extended but fifty miles around Fort Garry. It is that colony that now forms the greatest part of the new province of Manitoba.

The Hudson's Bay Company never claimed any proprietary rights on the North West Territories proper. These Territories formerly included nothing but the lands east of the Rocky Mountains, watered by the rivers running towards the Arctic Sea. The Charter of the Company merely included Rupert's Land, i. c., the lands watered by the tributaries of Hudson's Bay.

These two immense portions of country outside of the province of Manitoba are now known by the same name of North West Territories.

In March, 1869, the Hudson's Bay Company agreed to hand to the Imperial Government their territorial rights and governing responsibilities, and on the 16th of July, 1870, England handed the whole to the Camadian Government. It was during that period that the Red River troubles the whole to the Canadian Government. It was during that period that the Red River troubles took place. The transactions between England and Canada, as well as the Hudson's Bay Company, having been made without consulting and even paying any attention to the Government and people of Assiniboia, a deep feeling of uncasiness arose, and the Canadian authorities, coming into the country before the transfer, met resistance. In the meantime a provisional government was formed by the settlers to secure their rights, and come to an agreement with the Dominion of Canada, delegated with the recognition. of Canada; delegates were sent to Ottawa for that purpose, and treated with the proper authorities. England urged the Ottawa Government to satisfy the people of Red River. Then the Bill of Manitoba and other guarantees were agreed to, and thereby the entry of Manitoba into the Confederation was effected.

The assessment for 1877 is expected to reach four millions. We are informed that the assessments of 1875 and '76 were incomplete, a very large amount of property having been left unassessed. This will explain the decrease of 1875 from the former and the very small increase of 1876.

CITY MARKET AND BY-LAWS.

The market of the City of Winnipeg is a model of convenience. It contains 10 butchers' stalls and 6 hucksters' stalls. The butchers' stalls are fitted up with all the modern improvements and in the best of style, well lighted and ventilated. The present Lessee is James Henderson, office in the building.

BY-LAWS ADOPETD BY THE COUNCIL ON THE 9TH DAY OF APRIL, 1877, AND AMENDED JUNE 11TH, 1877.

Whereas it is expedient to pass a By-law to establish Public Markets and Weigh Houses in the City of Winnipeg, and to regulate same,

Therefore, the Mayor and Council of the City of Winnipeg in Council assembled enacts as follows:

I. That from and after the passing of this Bylaw the following places shall be and they are hereby severally designated, and declared to be Public Markets of the City of Winnipeg, to wit:

CENTRAL MARKET.

In the West Ward, situated on the W. R. Ross Estate, between Main and Margaret streets, for the sale therein of all kinds of fresh salt and dried provisions and fish, including butcher's

meat, pork, salt and dried meat, turkeys, geese, ducks, poultry, game, butter, eggs, fruit, vegetables and all kinds of live stock and produce usually brought to and sold in Public markets.

WOOD, HAY AND STRAW MARKET.

II. That gore or wedge of land on the Bannature Estate, at the junction of Albert and Annie streets, presented to the City of Winnipeg by A. G. B. Bannatyne, Esq, M.P., shall be and is hereby declared to be the public Hay, Straw and Wood Market, for the sale thereon, respectively, of all kinds of hay, straw and firewood brought to this City for sale, and shall be designated as Hay Market No. 1.

III. The limits of the Central Market shall be as follows, namely: The western end of the ground floor of the new market buildings, and all the market grounds west of the main or outside entrances to the said western portion of the ground floor of said buildings.

IV. The limits of the Hay, Straw and Wood Market shall be the gore or wedge of land hereinbefore described, and the streets on each side thereof, to wit: Albert and Annie streets, provided always, that any part of the Hay, Straw and Wood Market which may be in or upon any of the streets aforesaid shall at all times be subsidiary to the use of the same as streets or thoroughfares, and so as not wholly or seriously to obstruct the travel thereon.

V. The Chief of Police, and under him the lessee of any public market, shall be the Superintendent of the Markets, and shall, under the control and direction of the Market Committee appointed by the Council, have the care and superintendence of the said markets, market places and weigh houses; and it shall be his duty to execute and carry into effect all regulations, orders and by-laws for the government of said markets, and to prosecute any breach thereof, and to keep a record of the same. The said superintendent and also his deputies or assistants, if any, shall be sworn in as special constables, and shall wear a badge indicative of his or their authority as such.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of the Markets, when necessary, or when directed by the Market Committee, to appoint proper persons to perform menial duties and services in and about the said markets and market places, whom he may remove at pleasure, and to whom such remuneration and pay shall be given as the Market Committee may from time to time determine; and the said Superintendent shall be held responsible for the good conduct and behavior of such persons while so employed. Negligence, incapacity, partiality or the slightest breach of trust in the performance of his or their duties shall subject the said Superintendent or assistant to immediate suspension by the Market Committee, who shall at once report the case to the Council for their decision.

VII. It shall not be lawful for the Superintendent, or any of his assistants, to trade, either directly or indirectly, in, or have any direct or indirect interest in the sales or profits of any things or animals which shall be brought or exposed for sale on any of the said Markets or Market places, or to purchase any such on behalf of any other person or persons; but the said

Superintendent or his assistants shall not hereby be prohibited from purchasing in the said Markets what may be necessary for the private use of themselves and families.

VIII. It shall be the duty of said Superintendent to cause all Markets to be kept open daily, except Sundays, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Dominion Day, and any day set apart as Thanksgiving Day, from five e clock in the morning, until four o'clock in the afternoon, from the first day of May until the first day of November, and from six o'clock in the morning until four o'clock in the afternoon, from the first day of November until the first day of May, in each and every year; Provided always, That on the Saturday in each and every week and on the days preceding any Holidays named in this clause the said Markets shall be kept open until ten o'clock at night, unless the Saturday fails on Christmas, New Year's, Dominion or Thanksgiving Day, in which case the said Markets shall be kept open until the same hour the preceding Friday night. The said Superintendent, or his assistants, shall attend the said Markets constantly during market hours.

IX. It shall be the duty of the said Superintendent to cause all dirt or filth in or about the said Markets to be removed with all possible celerity; to inspect all articles brought to the Markets; to decide all differences and disputes thereon between buyers and sellers; to classify all denominations of vendors in the said Markets; and to arrange all those contiguously, who deal in the same or similar articles; to arrange all vehicles brought to the said Markets; and to enforce with impartiality all regulations for the government of the same.

X. The said Superintendent shall be ex officio Weigh Master for the City of Winnipeg, and it shall be in addition to his duties as said Superintendent, to keep open the Markets, Weigh House or Weigh Houses, as soon as the same are established, and to attend thereat during Market hours for the purpose of weighing articles required to be weighed, and the scales, weights, and measures, and everything connected with them, shall be maintained in a clean and orderly manner; and he shall weigh and measure the different articles that are sold, or are to be sold, and disposed of in the said Markets, whenever required by the parties interested therein, or any one of them, for which weighing and measuring, he shall be entitled to ask, demand, and receive the charges set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

XI. It shall be the duty of said Weigh Master when any article or articles are brought to be weighed or measured, loaded on a waggon or other wabiele.

(1.) To furnish the owner or person having charge of the load, with a weigh note, dated, and signed by him, the said Weigh Master, setting forth the gross weight of such load, with the waggon or other vehicle, and the tare of the waggon or other vehicle, the net weight of the load, and name of the seller;

(2.) Whenever required to do so, either by the purchaser or seller, on the same day that he has weighed any load, and after the load has been unloaded, to weigh the waggon or other vehicle, upon w to endorse upon of such waggon

XII. There shall be a public Weigh House and Weighing Machine established at the Central Market, so soon as there are funds appropriated or applicable for the purpose, and there shall be established from time to time such other Weigh Houses and Weighing Machines, at such other place or places in the said City as may be expedient, and as the Council may by By-Law direct.

XIII. The purchaser of any hay, straw, wood, fresh meat, dairy produce, farm or garden produce, or any other article or thing sold by weight or measure may demand that the same shall be weighed or measured by the Weigh Master, or any of his sasistants; and the seller of any such hay, straw, wood, fresh meat, dairy, farm or garden produce, or any such other article or thing so sold by weight or measure, who refuses such demand or refuses to produce the "weigh note" relating to said purchase for inspection, when demanded by said purchaser, shall be deemed guilty of an infraction of this By-Law.

XIV. That all weigh notes given for articles or loads weighed by the said Weigh Master, or his assistants, shall be binding and final, as to their contents, upon all parties concerned in the buying or selling of the articles or loads.

buying or selling of the articles or loads.

XV. That all the Markets shall be kept open as provided in the eighth clause of this By-Law and only at such times as is therein provided. Butchers, however, may open their stalls and supply any steam boat or other vessel coming into the City after Market hours, upon application to the Superintendent or his assistants.

XVI. That every person selling meat or articles of provision by retail, whether by weight or measure, in the City, shall provide himself with scales, weights and measures, regularly stamped, marked and adjusted by the Inspector of Weights and Measures, but no spring balance, spring scale, or spring weighing machine shall be used, or allowed to be used, for any Market purpose.

XVII. That every person frequenting the Markets with articles of provision or produce for sale, shall place his waggon, sleigh, or other vehicle, in such order as the Market Superintendent shall direct, and no person shall be allowed to have any waggon, or other vehicle in the Markets, except in such place as may be directed by said Superintendent; nor shall any butcher or other person, place, tie, or allow to be placed or tied, upon any pathway or road surrounding any market any calf, sheep, swine, or other animal.

XVIII. That no person shall bring into, or leave in any of the public markets of the City, any waggon, cart, sleigh, or other vehicle, nor shall stand thereon to sell therefrom any article, not being farmer's produce or vegetables, or not expressly specified in this By-Law as allowed to be sold therein; nor shall any person sell any article in any of the public Markets in a manner contrary to the provisions of this By-Law

XIX. That in case any person sells, or exposes for sale, any goods, provisions, or other articles, contrary to any of the provisions of this By-

Law, the person so offending, shall, after being warned by the Market Superintendent, or other person duly authorized, be summarily removed, together with his goods, provisions, or other articles, out of the public Markets, or boundaries aforesaid, and every person or persons hindering, obstructing, or molesting the said Superintendent, or other authorized person aforesaid, in the performance of his duty, shall be subject to the penalties of this By-Law.

XX. That all butchers and other persons, who resort to, and use the public Markets, now or hereafter to be established within this City, for the purpose of carrying on their trade or calling, or selling or disposing of articles, in such Markets in the said City, shall be subject to the provisions of this D. I.

XXI. That no butcher or other person shall cut up, sell, or expose for sale, any fresh meat, in any part of this City, except in the shops or stalls in the public Markets, and that the said Butchers be restricted to the sale of flesh and fowl, and, until a Fish Market is regularly established within the said city, they be allowed to sell fish.

XXII. That any person or persons permitted to accupy, as a butcher, any of the stalls for the sale of fresh or salt meat, in any of the markets established, or which may be hereafter established in this City, shall keep his, her, or their stall in a clean and proper state, and shall not suffer any offel, hides, or any offensive thing, to remain on or near the premises after eight o'clock in the morning of any market day.

XXIII. That no person having a shop, stall, or standing in any of the Markets of the City, shall underlet the said shop, stall, or standing or shall place or leave any one in the same, under pretence of taking charge thereof, without having first obtained leave in writing from the said Market Committee.

XXIV. That no person shall place, or cause, or permit to be placed, in any of the passages or open spaces in any of the public Markets, any bench, table, chair, or any other article or substance whatsoever, which may be calculated to obstruct the free use of the whole of such passage or open space, without having first obtained leave in writing from the said committee.

XXV. That every farmer from the country may, after the hour of twelve o'clock noon, but not before he has paid the proper market fee at any of the public Markets, sell fresh meat, the produce of his own farm, by the quarter, or any greater quantity, and other articles of farm produce of his own raising, throughout the City.

XXVI. That no farmer, or any other person, shall sell or dispose of, or offer for sale, or exchange any article of provision, upon any of the public streets of the City, unless he or she has first been to one of the public Markets and

paid the proper fee.

XXVII. That no huckster or dealer, or his, her, or their servant or agent, or any person on his, her, or their behalf, shall directly or indirectly purchase, or cause to be purchased, from any farmer or other person, any meat, poultry, or other article of provision, brought in for sale, or offered for sale in this City, before the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of selling the same again, nor shall any huckster or dealer, or his, her, or their servant or

agent, or any other person, on his, her, or their behalf, act as the servant or agent of any other individual, in the purchase of any meat, or other article of provision, offered for sale in this City

before the hour aforesaid.

XXVIII. That hucksters, dealers, and all persons frequenting the public Markets, with poultry, vegetables, fruits, or farm or garden produce, shall have places assigned to them by the Market Superintendent, under the general directions of the Chairman of the Market Committee; and all hucksters, dealers, and other persons frequenting the Markets with poultry, vegetables, or farm or garden produce, refusing to remain in the places assigned to them shall be liable to the penalties hereinafter provided. Hucksters occupying stalls within the said Market are hereby prohibited from the sale of fish, flesh or fowl.

XXIX. The Market Committee, or any mem-

ber thereof, or the Health Inspector, may inspect all meats, or other articles of provisions, that may be exposed for sale in the public Markets, and, in his or their own discretion, may seize and destroy, or cause to be destroyed, such as may be blown, tainted or otherwise unfit to be

used as food.

XXX. The said Committee shall have the control over all the officers of the City employed in or about the public Markets, and shall have the power to make any regulations as to the Markets, or the lessees or occupants of the same, as to the officers of the City employed there, and as to all persons attending or frequenting the same.

XXXI. That the lessees of the market fees shall bave full power to collect all rates, rents and fees belonging to them, excepting the r nts of stalls, in the market buildings, and to dispose or remove any person refusing to pay the same, under the authority of the Mayor, Police Magistrate, or any Justice of the Peace for the

City of Winnipeg

XXXII. The butchers' stalls in the Central Market and any other market that may be hereafter established, and the hucksters' stalls in the same, shall be let annually in the wonth of January after the year 1877, by public auction—the said butchers' stalls at an upset price of five hundred dollars, and the hucksters' stalls at an upset price of two hundred and fifty dollars yearly rental, under regulations of the Market Committee; and for the present year the said stalls shall be let on the sixteenth day of April in same manner, possession to be given on the first day of May next, and written leases of the same shall be immediately thereafter executed, in which leases it shall be stipulated amongst other things, that the term of the said lease shall commence on the first day of February then next ensuing; that the rent shall be paid monthly to the Chamberlain on the first day of each month, in advance; that the lessees shall in no instance, directly or indirecly, sub-let the said stalls or any thereof, or otherwise dispose of any interest they may have in the same; that they shall not permit the said stalls or any part thereof to be occupied by any person or persons whomso-ever other than themselves, without the special consent of the Market Committee, obtained in writing; that they shall observe and comply

with all the rules, regulations, and by-laws now legally established, or that may be hereafter established, for the government of the public markets in this city; and that their neglect, omission, disregard or violation of any of the said stipulations shall have the effect of immediately annulling the said leases, and forfeiting their possession of the stalls.

XXXII 2. That on the sixteenth day of April in this year, and in every succeeeding year on the same day as the letting of the Market stalls, the lease of the tolls of the Public Markets in the City of Winnipeg, under this By-Law, for the year, or part of year, following, shall be put up by auction, and adjudged to the highest bid-der under regulations of the Market Committee. XXXIII. That all hay, straw, and fire-wood,

brought into the City, in a waggon, cart, sleigh, or other vehicle, to be sold, or offered for sale, shall be exposed for sale in the hay, straw, and wood market, as established by this By-Law, or which may be bereafter established in this City, and at no other place within the said City, and all such waggons, carts, sleighs, or other vehicles, shall be placed in said hay, straw and wood markets, in such order and position as the Market Superintendent shall determine, and no person shall depart from the line or order in which he has been placed, before he has disposed of his load unless to leave the Market, nor shall he loiter about the streets of the City with his load. There shall be paid to the lessee of the said Market, by the owner or driver of every waggon, cart, sleigh, or other vehicle, bringing into this City for sale hay, straw, or wood the fee or fees hereinafter provided in the schedule

XXXIV. In the event of hay, straw, or wood, being brought into the City, on any ship, vessel boat, raft, or craft of any description, to be sold thereout or therefrom, it shall be the duty of the owner or captain to report the same forthwith to the lessee of the hay, straw, and wood market, who shall be entitled to demand, and receive, and take, for every such ship, vessel, boat, raft, or craft, the fees as set forth in the schedule of fees hereunto annexed. Every person bringing hay, straw, grain fodder, feed, or wood, to the City for sale, by whatever mode of conveyance, shall be obliged to give to the proper officer, when required to do so, a true statement, to the best of his knowledge, of the

weight or quantity thereof.

XXXV. That every person buying or selling hay, straw or wood in the said City, may require the same to be weighed on any of the public scales of the City, or measured, as the case

PENALTY.

XLVII. Any person or persons guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this By-Law, shall, upon conviction before the Mayor, or any Justice or Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction, on the cath or affirmation of any credible witness, in addition to the penalties hereinbefore provided, forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the said Mayor, Justice or Justices convicting, a penalty not exceeding the sum of fifty dollars and costs, for each offence, and in default of payment thereof, it shall be lawful for the Mayor, or Justice or Justices of the Peace so convicting, or of any one of them, to issue a warrant, under his hand and seal, or in the case of the said Mayor, Justice or Justices of the Peace, or if any two or more of them are acting together therein, then under the hand and seal of one of them, to levy the said penalty and costs, or penalty or costs only, by distress and sale of the offender's or offenders' goods and chattels, and in case of no sufficient distress to satisfy the penalty and costs, or penalty or costs, it shall and may be lawful for the Mayor, or Justice, or Justices, convicting as aforesaid, or any one of them, to commit the offender or offenders to any lock-up house in the said City, or in the County of Selkirk, or in the Provincial Gaol, for a period not exceeding twenty-one days, unless the said penalty and costs, or penalty or costs, be sooner paid

Is situated on the north limits of the city of Winnipeg and of the Parish of St Boniface. In 1820 the Rev. J. West came out from En-

gland as chaplain to the Hudson Bay Co. One of his first works was the erection of a rude school house at St Johns, where he commenced to educate a few children. This building served also for a church. Mr. West only remained in the country for three years.
He was succeeded, in 1823, by the Rev. P.
Jones, as chaplain of the Company. The
Rev. Archdeacon Cochrane came in 1825, and commenced his long ministerial service of 40 years in the country, in the chapel erected by Rev. Mr. West. After a time the wood building was replaced by a stone building, which was known as the Upper Church, and in 1862, this in turn was replaced by the present St John's cathedral. St Johns also possesses a very extensive college, known as St. John's College, particulars of which will be found in the mis-cellaneous directory. A large tract of land has been purchased for the erection of a new institution, known as the St John College Ladies School. The nearest Post Office is Winnipeg.

OR ST. BONIFACE.

This Division comprises the Town and the Parish of St. Boniface, the Parish of Notre Dame de Lorette and the Settlement of Prairie Grove. No. of voters 240. Population about 1000

ST. BONIFACE,

Which is now the Metropolitan See of the R.C. Ecclesiastical Province of St. Boniface, was founded, in 1818, by Rev. J. N. Provencher, who was sent from Quebec with Rev. S. J. N. Dumoulin, at the request of Lord Selkirk, to establish a mission at Red River. The first chapel was built the year after their arrival. Rev. J. N. Provencher built the first stone house in the country. It was a small one, intended for his residence, and as an experiment to know whether he could succeed afterwards, with the material and hands in the country, to build a stone church. In fact the success of the experiment induced him to erect a large stone cathedral, in 1833, which was destroyed by fire on the 14th December, 1860. The actual cathedral was erected,

in 1862, by His Grace the Most Rev. Alexander Taché, Archbishop of St. Boniface. Rev. J. N. Provencher was nominated Bishop of Juliopolis, in partibus, and auxiliary to the Bishop of Quebec in 1820, Vicar Apostolic of the North West in 1844, and Bishop of St. Boniface in 1849. Died 7th June, 1853. Archbishop A. Taché was elected Bishop of Arath and coadjutor to the Bishop of St. Boniface in June, 1850. Consecrated 23rd November, 1851, and, succeeded to Bishop Provencher in June 1853

succeeded to Bishop Provencher in June 1853
St. Boniface is the proposed terminus of the Pembina branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which is to connect with the Trunk line near the point where the Main line crosses Red River. With these railway connections, the water facilities and the central position of the place, this locality will always be one of the most important places in the Province. The Town is well laid out with large and straight avenues and streets, and is growing with such rapidity as to become shortly a large and flourishing city. It possesses already a large woollen mill, three stores, well supplied, and several hotels, shops, general agencies, &c.

The Cathedral and the Archbishop's Palace are built of cut stone, from a quarry lying twelve miles below St. Bouiface, on the bank of Red River. The church is richly finished, and on the 24th June, 1875, a splendid organ, the first in the Province, was presented by friends from the Province of Quebec and inaugurated on that day.

St. Boniface has also a college, a boarding school for young ladies, a large hospital, and an orphan asylum. These three last institutions are under the direction of the Sisters of Charity.

Le Metis, the organ of the French population, is printed here, and it has a very good job printing office.

The Town connects with Winnipeg, by means of a steam ferry, crossing Red River every five minutes. Mail daily.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

Presbyterianism was first plauted on the banks of Red River, in the years 1813-15, when a considerable number of families, members of the Church of Scotland, were brought out from Sutherlandshire under the auspices of the late Sutheriandshire under the auspices of the late Earl of Selkirk. A young Minister had been appointed to follow them, but, as there seemed for some years little prospect of the settlement taking root, he did not come, and finally accepted an appointment elsewhere. After this the poor little colony appears to have been for gatten, and it was not till 1851 that the Presbygatten. gotten, and it was not till 1851 that the Presby-

terian Church of Canada sent out the Rev. John Black, to minister to them, and the first John Black, to minister to them, and the first congregation was organized in the December of that year. In the meantime the settlers had gladly availed themselves of the services of the Church of England. Mr. Black was joined in 1862 by the late Mr. Nisbet, and subsequently by others. The Presbytery was formed in 1870, Prince Albert Mission, in 1866, Okanase Mission, in 1873, and the Manitoban College opened at Kildonan in 1871, and transferred to Winnings in 1873. METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

At the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, which was held in the month of August, 1874, it was resolved to elect a Missionary Secretary to search out new mission fields, and to arrange for their cultivation. The Rev. James Gardiner was elected to this office. A meeting of the Methodist Epis-copal Mission Board was held in June, 1875, when it was decided to open missionary opera-tions in the North-West, and the Missionary Secretary was requested to visit that Territory for the purpose of surveying the field, and, if he deemed it expedient to do so, to locate a mission station in some parts of the Province of Manitoba. Mr. Gardiner spent parts of the months of July and August in Winnipeg. On his return he met the Bishop on the 8th day of September, and reported that the Church should undertake mission work in Manitoba. Upon the Missionary Secretary's recommendation, the Rev. Daniel Pomeroy was appointed to this field. Mr. Pomeroy entered romptly upon the work. He arrived at Emerson on the 26th day of September. Having organized a mission, comprising the town of Emerson and the surrounding settlements, and built a house for the minister, Mr. Pomeroy visited Winnipeg on the 11th day of November, and succeeded in establishing another mission, and in making arrangements for the building of a church in the city. On the 3rd day of December a mission was organized at Morris, and on the 13th of the same month another mission was organized at the Pembina Mountains. In the spring of 1876 Revs. James A. Campbell and Andrew W. Ed-wards were appointed to assist Mr. Pomeroy. Mr. Campbell was stationed at Winnipeg, under his superintendence. A Church edifice has been erected, and a charter has been obtained for a college. Mr. Edwards was in charge of Emerson, and also succeeded in building a church there. Mr. Pomeroy resides at Morris, (Scratching River), and has labored during the past year, on the Morris and Pembina Mountain missions. The Methodist Episcopal Church has, at present, in this Province, three Missionaries, four Local Preachers, over one hundred members, four hundred adherents, four missions, two churches, two parsonages, several church sites, situated in important places in the Province, and four Sunday-schools.

ST. BONIFACE COLLEGE.

A school established in 1818, and incorporated

as a college in 1871. Rev. J. N. Provencher, who was afterwards elected first Bishop of St. Boniface, opened the first regular school in the country in 1818, in

his own residence. Having hardly room enough for himself in his small house, he, nevertheless, gathered Half-breed children, and taught them reading and writing. Some of his scholars were even taught classics, and with such success that Rev. S. J. N. Dumoulin, in a letter dated March 10th, 1824, and lately re-published, could state, "that several children were already advanced in Humanities."

ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE.

A school was established at St. Johns by the Rev. l. West, when he came to the country in 1820. This was continued and extended by the Rev. Mr. James. At last the Rev. J. Macallum, M.A., became the head of it. It now consisted both of a higher school for boys and for young ladies. Mr. Macallum died just as the first Bishop of Rupert's Land arrived in the Prov-He carried on the boys' school under the name of St. John's College for about 7 years, and for some years he also had a ladies school. On the arrival of the present Bishop of Rupert's Land he endeavored to revive the college. He found left behind by his predecessor a small, but well chosen library, and some buildings. The college classes were resumed on Nov. 1st, 1866, the Bishop of Saskatchewan being the warden. St. John's college has since then been gradually extended. It is now incorporated, and closely connected with another incorporated body, the Dean and Canons of St. John's Cathedral. Certain endowments have been obtained, and statutes given, which can only be changed now by the joint action of the Diocesan Synod of Rupert's Land and the Bishop.

The college has received the assent of the Synod of Rupert's Land for taking advantage of the provision in the Act of Parliament founding the University of Manitoba, so, then, arrangements are being made for granting the Degrees of B. D. and D.D.

REGISTRATION OF PARTNER-SHIPS.

former. Everyone is liable to the fine who does not register the partnership, or changes in it, within six months. Persons withdrawing from partnerships, continue to be liable for the debts of the firm, when notice of withdrawal is not legally registered. Any one can inform.

THE LAW RELATING TO ENDORSING.

Endorsers upon Notes and Bills of Exchange must be notified on the third day of grace (no other day will do) if the Note or Bill is not paid by the maker or acceptor. Notice duly mailed to the Endorser's address, is a legal notification, and will hold the endorser responsible. In case of more than one endorser, the Bank or holder of the Note or Bill can elect to proceed against any one or all of the endorsers as they may deem best. In the case of paper known as "accommodation paper," endorsers are liable to each other share and share alike; but in other cases, endorsers are liable according to their priority. When one endorser only is notified, if he, himself, notifies the others on the day on which he receives notice of protest, their responsibility is continued. An endorser compelled to meet a Note or Bill, can proceed against the maker or any endorser who may precede himself, but not against those who signed subsequently. Unless made through a Notary, no protest is binding on an endorser. It will pay business men to keep these simple rules in mind.

TRADE OF MANITOBA.

The statistics of the trade of Canada, says the Monetary Times, during 1875-76 have now finally been revised, and vary very little from the figures we have already published. The total imports "entered for consumption" during the twelve months were of the value of \$94,733,218, and the exports \$80,966,435, making the total trade of 1876 to have been \$175,699, 653. This is close upon \$350,000 more than was given in the approximate statement.

In referring to this province it says:—
"Manitoba is the youngest province in the Dominion, but by no means the least promising. Its trade is steadily augmenting. The total value thereof in 1876 was \$2,505,615, of which \$1,735,427 were imports and \$770,188 exports. The latter, up to this time, have been chiefly furs. Its imports are largely obtained from Ontario and Quebec, and are familiar to our mercantile friends. Manitoba and the Northwest generally promise to prove, before many years, a valuable field for Canadian manufac-

Of the Northwest Territories it says :- "No returns are given of the trade of these territories, except the statement that the revenue collected in 1875 was \$6,765, and last year

NAVIGATION ON RED RIVER.

In the winter and spring of 1859, Anson Northup, now a resident of Duluth, transported machinery and timbers from the mouth of Gull river, at its junction with the Crow Wing river, to a town, known at that time as Lafayette, on the Red River. The machinery and timbers were from the North Star, running on the

Upper Missouri from St. Anthony to Pokegama Falls previous to 1859. After passing a course of reconstruction, the boat was launched and called the Anson Northup, making the first trip to Abercrombie in May, 1859, and was run successfully during the seasons of 1859, 1860 and 1861, and in the spring of 1862 was sunk by the ice gorge below Lower Fort Garry, and was never raised from her watery grave

The International was built at Georgetown in 1862, and has been navigating the river successfully since that time, and is to-day a No. 1 boat, 136 feet long and 26 feet beam. Her machinery was taken out of a boat called the Freighter, which plyed on the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers some years since, going at the time to the foot of Big Stone Lake, Mr. C. V. P. Lull, a well-known settler, superintending its work

In 1871, the Selkirk, stern-wheeler, was built by Hill, Griggs & Co., of St. Paul, at Fort Abercrombie, a medium sized boat

The Dakota was built by N. W. Kittson, at Breckenridge in 1872, also a stern-wheel boat

The Alpha was built by J. W. McLane, at Breckenridge, in the spring of 1873.

The Cheyenne at Grand Forks in 1873, a side-wheeler.

The Manitoba and Minnesota were built by the Merchants International Steamboat Company in the spring of 1875, in Moorhead, and are the finest boats on the river now, but were purchased by the Red River Transportation Co. in 1876

The amount of freight transported by these boats is immense, to say the least.

DISPOSAL OF UNPAID OR INSUFFICIENTLY PAID LETTERS MAILED IN CANADA.

If for Places within the Dominion .- A letter wholly unpaid is not forwarded, but is sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa. If pre-paid at least one rate, that is, 3 cents, the letter is forwarded to destination, but is rated with double the deficient postage. This rule applies also to city or "drop" letters, the postage on which is

If for the United States .- A letter, whether wholly unpaid, or insufficiently paid, is not forwarded from Canada, but is sent to the Dead Letter Office, in Ottawa, in order to be there opened and returned to its writer.

If for the United Kingdom .- A letter wholly unpaid is forwarded, but is rated with double postage, that is, 5 pence sterling per ½ ounce. If it is insufficiently pre-paid, it is charged at the same rate, deducting what may have been

If for other British Colonies or Foreign Countries (except France) .- A letter, whether wholly unpaid, or only insufficiently paid, is sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

LOCAL OR "DROP" LETTERS.

One cent per half ounce, to be pre-paid by Postage Stamp.

POSTAL CARDS.

Canadian Postal Cards of one cent each circulate within the Dominion, -and are transmissible, without further charge, to the United States and Newfoundland.

Newspapers.—Between places in the Dominion, to the United States, to Newfoundland, publishers pre-pay their edition in bulk, at the rate of one cent for each pound weight; no further charge on delivery. Transient newspapers within the Dominion, to the United States and Newfoundland, one cent per four ounces, to be pre-paid by stamp. Transient papers for the United Kingdom, two cents per four ounces.

Periodicals.—Published in Canada not less frequently than once a month, sent from office of publication, or from news agencies, for places in the Dominion, to the United States or to Newfoundland, the postage rate is the same as for Newspapers, i.e., one cent per pound, when paid by the bulk weight; Transient periodicals, one cent per four ounces. Newspapers and periodiicals for the Dominion, the United States and Newfoundland, weighing less than one ounce each, may be posted singly, if pre-paid by stamp, one half cent each.

Newspapers to France and samples are sent at the above "French Book Post" rates.

A "book packet" may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature and art, maps or prints, photographs, daguerreotypes, when not in glass or in frame containing glass; any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters), and the books, maps, papers, &c., may be either written, printed or plain, or any mixtures of the three, and may be either British, Colonial or Foreign. Book packages must be open at both ends or both sides.

Patterns.—Rates between Canada and United Kingdom and France, same as for Book Post.

Patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; nor must the quantity of any material or article sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic

Patterns, &c., must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. ples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, simply tied at the neck, or, provided that bags be transparent, they may be entirely closed, if they are for delivery within the United Kingdom. Bags, however, entirely closed, even though they be transparent, must not be used for the transmission of seeds to foreign parts. Patterns and samples of merchandize, not exceeding the weight of eight ounces, addressed to the United States, may be sent at the rate of ten cents for each package.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to France or Portugal must not exceed 18 inches in length, and 12 inches in width or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

Parcels can only be sent by Post to places in Canada. Postages and registration fee must be pre-paid. The limit of weight to Parcels is 4 lbs.

TRANSMISSION OF PATTERNS AND SAMPLES WITHIN

Patterns or samples of merchandise, and goods for sale, not exceeding twenty-four ounces in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per four ounces, under the following regulations :

I.—Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, or in bags entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the officers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

II .- The packet may bear on the outside the address of the sender, in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intendedalso a trade mark and numbers, and the price of the articles enclosed; inside there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves—the particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers and price, may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet, at the option of the sender.

III. - Any sample or pattern packet containing a letter, or otherwise violating the conditions of the preceding rules, is to be rated and treated as a letter

IV .- The rate of one cent per four ounces is to be pre-paid by postage stamp,-and if such rate be not fully pre-paid by the stamps affixed, the package is to be rated with the deficient postage, and a fine of five cents in addition.

V .- Packets of samples or patterns may be registered on pre-payment by postage stamp of a registration fee of five cents in addition to the postage rate,—and provided such packets be duly handed into the Post Office for registration.

A registration receipt or certificate should always be obtained for such packages when presented for registration.

VI.-No packet of samples or patterns must exceed twenty-four ounces in weight; any packet exceeding that weight is to be sent to the Postmaster-General.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause: To enclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or to enclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers), is an offence punishable by a penalty of not less than ten and not exceeding forty dollars.

Miscellaneous Postal Matter—On books, pamphlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, prices current, hand-bills, book and newspaper manuscripts; printers' proof sheets, whether corrected or not; maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs; photographs, when not on glass or in cases containing glass; sheet music, whether printed or written; documents, wholly or partly printed or written, such as deeds, insurance policies, militia and school returns, or other documents of like nature; packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions or grafts; patterns or samples of goods or merchandise, when posted in Canada for any place in Canada, the rate of postage is one cent per four cunces in weight, to be pre-paid by postage stamp, or by the use of stamped post bands when suitable for the purpose. No letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter

must be sent or enclosed in any article of miscellaneous mail matter; and all transmissions authorized by this regulation must be put up in covers open at the ends or sides, or in such manner as to admit of inspection to ensure compliance with this condition If enclosed in seased envelopes, notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged.

Miscellaneous mail matter as above specified, when addressed to the United States or to Newfoundland, may be forwarded when pre-paid the one cent per 4 oz. rate, as if addressed to a place in Canada, with the exception of packets of samples and patterns of merchandise addressed to the United States, on which the special rate of ten cents must be pre-paid.

Money Orders in Canada.—All the Money Order Post Offices in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia, are authorized to draw Money Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each as the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz:—

The Money Order Post Offices in the Dominion are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, British Columbia, and Newfoundland: and the Postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to the issues as the intending remitters may desire.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

1. The Post Office Savings Bank commenced operations in Ontario and Quebec on the 1st

April, 1868.

2. The direct security of the Dominion is given by the Statute for all deposits made.

3. At each Savings Bank Post Office the Savings Bank regulations may be read bythe public, giving full information with respect to the mode of depositing and withdrawing money, and these regulations are printed upon the cover of the Pass Book supplied to each depo-

 Any person may have a deposit account, and deposits are received daily during the ordinary hours of Post Office business, of any number of dollars, from \$1 up to \$300, the total amount which can be received from a depositor in any one year, except in cases to be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General.

5. The Postmasters of the Savings Bank Offices will act as agents for the receipt of the money deposited for transmission to the Postmaster-General, and for the payment by the Postmaster-General of money withdrawn by depositors.

6. Each depositor is supplied with a Pass Book, and the sums paid in, or withdrawn, are entered therein by the Postmaster receiving or paying the same. In addition, a direct receipt for each amount paid in is sent to the depositor from the Postmaster-General, and the Post master General will issue a cheque payable at any Post Office Savings Bank desired, for any sum withdrawn.

7. Every depositor's account is thus kept with the Postmaster-General, and a depositor may pay into his or her account with the Post Office Savings Bank at any of the Savings Bank Post Offices, which at the time may best suit his convenience, and exercise the same choice in drawing out money, subject only to the obligation of producing the Pass Book, in proof of identity whenever paying in or drawing out deposits.

8. Interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum is allowed on deposits.

Postmasters are forbidden by law to disclose the name of any depositor, or the amount of any sum deposited or withdrawn.

10. No charge will be made to depositors on paying in, or drawing out money, or for postage or communications with the Postmaster-General in relation thereto.

11. The Postmaster-General will always be ready to receive and attend to all applications, complaints, or other communications addressed to him by depositors or others, relative to Post Office Savings Bank matters.

For the receipt, conveyance, storage and delivery of Gunpowder, under the authority of the 38th Victoria, Cap. 20, of the Statutes of Manitoba.

No. 1. The Powder Inspector, or any deputy or deputies appointed under Cap. XX. of the said Manitoba Act, shall from time to time, at any reasonable hour visit and enter any building or premises wherein gunpowder is stored or kept for sale, or wherein he has reason to believe it is to be stored or kept, and shall report to the Treasury Department, Winnipeg, any infraction of the law or of these regulations which he may have discovered in any such visit or inspection.

No. 2. No gunpowder shall be conveyed through or along any street of any incorporated towns or cities in the Province of Manitoba, unless contained in packages of the description hereinafter mentioned.

No. 3. The vehicles carting gunpowder in the said incorporated towns or cities of the Province of Manitoba shall be kept at a distance of one hundred yards at least from each other.

No. 4. No gunpowder over twenty-five pounds weight shall be conveyed and brought for being shipped on any vessel, railroad, or conveyance of any kind (within any of the said incorporated towns and cities in the said Province of Manitoba) unless the kegs containing the same be packed in boxes or casks without any combustible material being used in the packing of the said boxes or casks.

No. 5. No larger quantity than twenty-five pounds of gunpowder shall be in or upon any vessel, railroad or other means of shipping or transport within any of the said incorporated towns and cities of the said Province of Manitoba, unless the kegs containing the same be packed in boxes or casks, unbroken and well secured, with the word "Powder" written in large letters on the outside thereof; and each box, cask or package shall moreover be marked on both ends or both side with the word "Powder" in large letters; and no gunpowder shall be conveyed or transported in any vessel or upon any railway within the Province without being packed as aforesaid, except in fireproof railway cars, built expressly for the purpose of carrying gunpowder.

No. 6. No gunpowder, except it be packed as mentioned in No. 5 of these regulations, shall be carried, conveyed or delivered at any place, or on board of any ship, vessel or railroad within any of the incorporated towns and cities of the said Province, unless the said powder be conveyed in vehicles which shall be duly numbered and approved of in the manner hereinafter provided for, and which shall be of the following kinds or descriptions, to wit: closed and covered vehicles, the tops and sides of which shall be securely covered with tarpaulin or oil cloth; and the body of such vehicles shall be fastened with no other kind of metal than copper, brass or zinc; the door of the said vehicle shall be closed at all times excepting when powder is being put into or removed from the said vehi-cles, and the word "Powder" in both the English and French languages, shall be painted in large letters on each side of the said ve-

No. 7. No such vehicles as described in No. 6 of these regulations shall be used to carry or convey g.apowder, or to deliver powder, until authority shall have been obtained for each and every year to that effect, and until the said vehicles shall have been duly registered at the office of the Powder Inspector and a certificate and number obtained from that officer, for which certificate a fee of five dollars shall be paid. The said number shall be fastened to the said vehicle in a conspicuous place, a shall be directed by the Powder Inspector.

No. 8. No person shall be allowed to drive any such vehicle without having previously obtained a permit from the Powder Inspector, who shall be entitled to a fee of one dollar for the same.

No. 9. Large boxes, casks or packages containing kegs of gunpowder may be carted or conveyed in carts, trucks or waggons, such as are used for ordinary purposes (without requiring to be licensed), provided that the same shall be well secured and covered with a tarpaulin or oil cloth, sound and unbroken, with the word "Powder" written in large letters on the outside thereof; and each box, cask or package shall, moreover, be marked on both ends or both sides with the wora "Powder" in large letters.

No. 10. No person whatever carting or handling gunpowder shall have about his person or clothes, any lucifer matches or other substance of a dangerous or inflammable nature.

No. 11. Packages, kegs or casks of powder shall be carefully carried to and from the vehicles employed in the conveyance of the same; and the said packages, kegs or casks, while in transitu, shall not be broken or opened, nor powder removed therefrom; and the same shall be carried as aforesaid, and not rolled along the floor or the earth.

No. 12. When gunpowder in larger quantities than twenty-five pounds shall have arrived at its immediate destination, if within some of the incorporated, towns or cities in the Province of Manitoba, it shall not be there detained for a longer period than is necessary to forward, repack and distribute the same, in conformity to these regulations, or send it to a licensed powder magazine, and in no instance exceeding four hours from the time of its arrival; otherwise it will be deemed to be stored within the meaning of the Statute of Manitoba, 38th Vicoria, Cap. 2.

No. 13. Whenever gunpowder shall be found stored within some of the said incorporated towns or cities in the Province of Manitoba, in a larger quantity than twenty-five pounds in weight within any building or premises, against the provisions of the Statute 38 Vic., Cap. 20, the same shall be taken in charge by any memher of the police force, by any Powder Inspector, any of his deputies, or person authorized by the latter, and transferred to a licensed powder magazine, if there be one in the vicinity, or otherwise kept in safe keeping if there be not one, under any order of any Judge of the County Court or Police Magistrate, until, in case of conviction, the fine hereafter mentioned, and costs of removing and taking care of said powder, and costs of prosecution, be paid; or until an order to release the same be granted by the Judge or Magistrate, before whom the charge has been brought.

No 14. Any person offending against any one of the provisions of these regulations shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars for each offence.

So soon as powder magazines are built near the incorporated towns or cities in conformity to law, regulations will be made respecting the conveyance of powder to and from, and the storage thereof therein.

The following shall be the price of licenses for the sale or keeping for sale of gunpowder under section 5, 38 Victoria, Cap. 20, viz:

Quantities over twenty-five lbs. or one dozen canisters of one pound each sold at any time shall be considered as wholesale, and lesser quantities than above mentioned as retail.

A fee of fifty cents for each such license shall be paid the Powder Inspector in addition to the license fee mentioned above.

For every license of a year to keep or use a powder magazine, \$50.

BOUNDARIES OF THE PROVINCE OF MANITOBA.

The actual boundaries of the Province of Manitoba are as follows, viz:—

Commencing at the intersection of the international boundary, or forty-ninth parallel of north latitude, by the westerly boundary of township number one in the twelfth range west of the principal meridian in Manitoba, thence due north. following the westerly boundaries respectively of townships one and two, to the intersection thereof by the southerly limit of the road allowance on the first correction line: thence due west along the latter to the intersection thereof by the westerly limit of township three in the aforesaid twelfth range west; thence due north. following the westerly limits respectively of townships three, four, five, and six in the said twelfth range, to the southerly limit of the road allowance on the second correction line; thence westerly upon the latter to the intersection thereof by the westerly limit of township seven in the aforesaid twelfth range; thence due north upon the westerly limit respectively of townships seven, eight, nine and ten, to the southerly limit of the road allowance on the third correction line; thence due west along the latter to the intersection thereof by the westerly limit of township eleven in the said twelfth range west of the principal smeridian; thence due north along the westerly iimit respectively of townships eleven, twelve, thirteen and fourteen, to the southerly limit of the road allowance on the fourth correction dine; thence westerly along the latter to the intersection thereof by the westerly limit of township fifteen in the said twelfth range west of the principal meridian; thence due north along the westerly limits respectively of townships fifteen, sixteen and seventeen in the said twelfth range west, to the southerly limit of the road allowance, the northerly boundary of the said township number seventeen; thence due east, following the said southerly limit of road allowance between townships seventeen and eighteen in the system of Dominion lands surveys (the said lines crossing Lakes Mani-

toba and Winnipeg), to the easterly boundary of township seventeen in the tenth range east of the principal meridian; thence due south along the easterly boundary respectively of townships seventeen, sixteen and fifteen, to the southerly limit of the road allowance on the fourth correction line; thence due west along the latter to its intersection by the easterly limit of township fourteen in the aforesaid tenth range east; thence due south along the easterly limit respectively of townships fourteen, thirteen, twelve and eleven, to its intersection with the southerly limit of the road allowance on the third correction line; thence due west along the latter to its intersection with the easterly limit of township ten in the said tenth range east; thence due south along the easterly limit respectively of townships ten, nine, eight and seven, to the intersection thereof by the southerly limit of the road allowance on the second correction line; thence due west along the latter to its intersection with the easterly limit of township six in the said tenth range east of the principal meridian; thence due south along the easterly limit respectively of townships six, five, four and three, to the intersection thereof by the southerly limit of the road allowance on the first correction line: thence due west along the latter to its intersection with the easterly limit of township two in the said tenth range east; thence due south along the easterly limit respectively of townships two and one, to the intersection thereof by the forty-ninth parallel of north latitude, or the international boundary line aforesaid; and thence due west, following upon the said forty-ninth parallel of north latitude, or the international boundary line, to the place of beginning.

a petition being presented to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council of a majority of resident ratepayers, of the said sub-division of county, affirming the expediency of the said sub division of county being separated from the county for judicial, registration, and other county pur-poses, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may by proclamation declare such sub-division of county a separate county, as aforesaid, and appoint the necessary county officers, and do anything necessary to the establishment of said subdivision into a distinct county; and any provisions contained in any Act heretofore or hereafter passed with reference to any right, privilege or immunity of any county in the Province, shall apply to such county, if applicable; and every Act now in force, or that hereafter may be in force with reference to the counties in this Province, shall apply to such county; and after all such sub-division or sub-divisions of county in any of the counties created by this Act shall have become a separate and distinct county or counties, as aforesaid, the sub-division of the county wherein the county business will be then principally transacted shall also become a separate and distinct county.

Any of the sub-divisions of county created by this Act shall be entitled to become a separate and distinct county for municipal purposes, under the provisions of an Act passed at this session respecting county municipalities, as soon as such sub-divisions of county shall contain

two hundred resident voters.






