# THURSDAY, February 16, 1860.

THE House having, by several Proclamations hereto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business;

And being met,—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Henry Palmer, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod.

Mr. Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber;

And being returned,-

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, and which was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

It affords me great satisfaction to meet you, assembled as you now are for the discharge of your important duties.

In alluding to those subjects to which I would more particularly direct your attention, I am persuaded that you will, on entering on their consideration, do so with the sole desire to further the best interests of this Colony.

I would direct your attention to the necessity which exists for perfecting the present system of Education throughout the Island; and more particularly would I invite you to consider the propriety of re-constructing the arrangements on which the Central Academy is now based, in order that the increasing requirements for instruction in the higher branches of learning may be met, and the usefulness of that establishment augmented.

The arrangement under which the Public Roads, Bridges, and Wharfs are at present maintained and repaired, is somewhat irregular and unsatisfactory. This subject is well worthy of your notice, so that you may concert and mature a more efficacious method.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The Address which, last Session, you submitted to the Crown, praying that a Commission be appointed to investigate and settle the whole question of Land Tenures, was graciously received by Her Majesty. A considerable delay has occurred at home in arranging the preliminaries of the Commission, but that delay was unavoidable. A very short time will now suffice to complete the formation of a Commission, from the labors of which I anticipate the best results.

I have directed the Accounts of the last year, and the Estimates for the present, to be laid before you. These have been prepared with every attention and economy, and with a due regard to the efficient performance of the public service.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I rejoice to be able to announce to you that the Revenue, at the termination of the financial year, exhibits a very satisfactory appearance; still, as the public debt is considerable, it will be your duty to use your best endeavor to maintain, and, if possible, augment the income of the Island.

In this direction much may be accomplished by a greater attention being bestowed on the manner in which the Duties on Foreign and Home made Spirits are imposed and collected. The Laws, also, regulating the issue of Tavern Licences, I commend to your consideration, for revisal.

The want of Lighthouses on the East and North Capes of the Island has been long seriously felt, and their absence has occasioned great loss of life and property. I have communicated with the Governments of the adjoining Provinces, with the view of obtaining their assistance and co-operation with us to make good this deficiency. On receiving replies, I shall direct them to be laid before you. The method at present adopted for the collection of Light duties appears defective, and is capable of being advantageously re-adjusted.

A preliminary arrangement has been made by the Government with the Bank of Prince Edward Island, by which, for the future, Treasury Warrants can be at once exchanged for cash. The absence

of this facility has been felt as a great inconvenience. To confirm this arrangement, an Act of the Legislature is required.

I have received from His Grace the Duke of New-castle a Despatch, which shall be laid before you: it relates to the subject of the pre-payment of Letters addressed to England. This system prevails in all the other North American Colonies, and is productive of much convenience: I therefore feel assured you will give the matter your consideration, with the view of complying with the wishes of Her Majesty's Government, that it be adopted in this Colony also.

The several Acts of the Legislature of last Session have received the approval of Her Majesty, and are now in operation:

From the Statute Book of the Island not having been revised for some years, much benefit would result from the consolidation of the Laws, to the propriety of which I would direct your notice.

We have reason for deep thankfulness to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest and general prosperity with which, during the past year, this Colony has been blessed; and I fervently pray that His favor may be continued to us, and that His wisdom may direct your deliberations, for the advancement of the welfare of this Island.

George Beer, Esquire, having been returned a Member for the Town and Royalty of Charlottetown, in stead of the Hon. Edward Palmer, appointed a Member of the Legislative Council, appeared at the Bar; and being led into the body of the House, and introduced to the Speaker by Mr. Davies and the Hon. Mr. Haviland, two of the Members, took the Oaths and his Seat.

Resolved, That a Committee of three members be appointed, to receive tenders for the printing of the Journal of this House, for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Haviland, Mr. Ramsay, and Mr. Sinclair do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed, to provide Stationery for the use of the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth, Mr. Howat, and the Hon. Mr. Perry do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to examine and report on the Public Accounts, with power to send for persons, papers, and records.

Ordered, That Mr. Macneill, Mr. Beer, Mr. Davies, Mr. John Yeo, the Hon. Mr. Thornton, Mr. Sinclair, and the Hon. Mr. Kelly do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed, to examine what Laws have lately expired or are near expiring, with leave to report, from time to time, by Bills or otherwise.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth, Mr. Howat, and the Hon. Mr. Perry do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to examine Bills to be engrossed or that have been engrossed.

Ordered, That Mr. Macneill, Mr. J. Yeo, Mr. Beer, Mr. Davies, and the Hon. Mr. Thornton do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed, to revise the Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Gray, the Hon. Mr. Pope, and the Hon. Mr. Whelan do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of six Members be appointed, to keep up a good Correspondence between the two Branches of the Legislature, and to report their proceedings from time to time, with power to send for persons, papers, and records.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Longworth, the Hon. Mr. Gray, the Hon. Mr. Yeo, Mr. Douse, Mr. Howat, and Mr. Knight do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. Davies, Mr. J. Yeo, Mr. Howat, Mr. Beer, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Ramsay, and Mr. Holm do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That the Hon.Mr. Longworth, Mr. Beer, Mr. Howat, Mr. Holm, and Mr. Knight do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That a Copy of the Journal of this House be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, each day, as soon as may be, after the adjournment.

Resolved, That William M. Howe, Esquire, be appointed Reporter to this House.

The Hon. Mr. Coles moved that Mr. Anthony Begley be appointed additional Reporter.

Mr. Haviland have leave to introduce a Bill to enable the Controller of Navigation Laws in this Island to grant and issue Fishing Licences to Citizens of the United States, for Vessels built in Prince Edward Island, and owned by them.

He accordingly presented the said Bill morrow, at Ten o'clock. to the House, and the same was read the

first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Monday next.

Resolved, That the postage on all letters and printed papers, both foreign and inland, to members of this House; and the postage on the same when inland only, from members of this House, shall be charged to the Contingent Accounts of the House.

Resolved, That the Rev. Louis Charles Jenkins, D. C. L., be appointed Chaplain to this House.

A Member having called the attention of the House to the circumstance of the Journals of the House, of the past Session, not having yet been published, it was thereupon—

First, — From Mr. J. Barrett Cooper, offering to perform the work at the rate of twenty-five shillings and sixpence, per sheet of four pages; binding, four shillings and sixpence per copy; stitching, one shilling and sixpence each copy.

Second,-From Mr. George T. Haszard, proposing to print the Journals at the rate of thirty-one shillings and nine pence, each copy of four pages. binding, four shillings and sixpence each copy: stitching, one shilling and sixpence each copy.

Third,—From Mr. John Ings, undertaking to print the Journals at the rate of thirty-two shillings and threepence, per sheet of four pages; half binding, four shillings and sixpence each copy; and stitching, one shilling and sixpence per copy. MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

- 1. We, the Representatives of the People of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament convened, respectfully thank your Excellency for the Speech with which your Excellency was pleased to open the present Session.
- 2. We beg to assure your Excellency, that on entering upon the consideration of those important subjects to which your Excellency has particularly directed our attention, it will be our sole desire to promote the best interests of the Colony.
- 3. In legislating upon the important subject of Education, it will be our aim, as far as possible, to perfect the system at present in operation in this Island; and in connection with this subject, we agree with your Excellency that it will be necessary to revise the Laws under which the Central Academy is now established, in order that the usefulness of that institution may be augmented by imparting to it a higher status, and thus enabling the rising generation to enjoy the great advantage of obtaining instruction in the higher branches of learning within the Colony.
- 4. We concur with your Excellency that the system under which the public roads, bridges, and wharfs are at present maintained, is unsatisfactory; and this subject shall receive our best consideration, with the view of providing a remedy.
- 5. We are gratified to learn that the Address to the Crown which the House of Assembly agreed to in its last Session, upon the subject of the Land Tenures, has been graciously received by Her Majesty, and that the preliminaries regarding the appointment of a Commission on that important question will soon

be perfected; and we concur with your Excellency in anticipating the best results from the labors of the of last Session have received the approval of Her Ma-Commissioners.

- 6. The Accounts of the past and the Estimates for the present year, when laid before us, shall receive our best consideration; and in voting the supplies, it will be a matter of satisfaction to know that the Estimates have been prepared with every attention to economy, consistently with a due regard to the efficiency of the public service.
- 7. It is pleasing to know that the Revenue for the past year exhibits so very satisfactory an appearance; and considering the amount of the public debt, we fully agree with your Excellency as to the duty incumbent upon us of increasing, if possible, the income of the Island; and we think, in common with your Excellency, that this may be partly attained by a more careful attention to the manner in which the duties on foreign and home-made spirits are imposed and collected.
- 8. The Laws regulating the issue of Tavern Licences shall receive our best consideration, with a view to their improvement.
- 9. We are pleased to know that your Excellency has been in communication with the Governments of the neighboring Provinces, for the purpose of obtaining their co-operation in establishing Lighthouses on the East and North Capes of this Island, -and any communications on that subject which may be laid before us by your Excellency shall receive our earnest
- 10. The subject of Light Duties in this Island shall receive our closest attention, in order to improve the mode of collecting the same.
- 11. Sensible of the advantages which will result to the public creditor from the arrangement which your Excellency's Government has made with the Bank of Prince Edward Island, under which Treasury Warrants in future will be paid on presentation, we will cheerfully pass an Act for the purpose of giving effect to this arrangement.
- 12. The Despatch from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, referred to by your Exceliency, relative to the pre-payment of letters addressed to the United Kingdom, when laid before us, shall receive that attention which its importance demands, so that the wishes of Her Majesty's Government, in this respect, may be carried into effect.

- 13. It is gratifying to know that the several Acts
- 14. We concur most fully in opinion with your Excellency, that in consequence of the Laws of the Island not having been revised for several years, great advantage would result from their consolidation, and it will be our duty to perfect a measure for the purpose of remedying the evil.
- 15. The bountiful harvest and general prosperity with which, during the past year, this Colony has been blessed, call forth the expression of our deepest thankfulness to Almighty God; and we humbly pray that the Divine favor may be continued to us, and that His wisdom may control our deliberations for the promotion of the best interests of this Colony.

And the report being again read,

The Hon. Mr. Coles moved to amend the said Address, by expunging the whole of the 5th paragraph, and inserting the following in lieu thereof:

"We are gratified to learn that the Address passed by this House, last Session, recommending the appointment of a Commission to investigate the whole question of the land tenures, has been graciously received by Her Majesty; but the delay which has occurred in appointing this Commission, since the Address was laid before Her Majesty, has caused much disappointment to the inhabitants of the Colony; and should the benefits expected from the contemplated Commission not prove satisfactory, the House of Assembly deem it their duty to observe, that the only other way in which the question of the land tenures can be satisfactorily and equitably settled, would be by instituting an inquiry, through the agency of a Court of Escheat, into the conditions of the original grants. In the meantime, the House respectfully request that your Excellency will use your influence with the claimants of Township lands, with the view of postponing the enforcement of the payment of the back rents, in accordance with the suggestion made by the House of Assembly in their Address of last Session, now under the consideration of Her Majesty's Colonial Minister."

RESOLVED THEREFORE, That in view of this expression of opinion by the Duke of Newcastle, it appears doubtful whether the Address and Resolutions of this House were presented to Her Majesty, and it is evident to this House that Her Majesty the Queen is not yet advised to listen to the suggestions of the people's representatives in this Colony, as detailed in their Resolutions of last Session, and that the action of this House upon the question has, therefore, as yet, been rendered nugatory.

Spirits, viz: brandy, 4s. 6d. per gallon; whiskey and gin, 4s. per gallon, proof per Syke's hydrometer.

Cordials, 4s. 6d. per gallon.

Lemon syrup, shrub santa, 1s. a gallon.

Tinctures, 2s. per gallon. Dried fruit, 1d. per lb.

2. Resolved, That the ad-valorem duty be increased from six and a quarter per cent. to seven and a half per cent.

ments, in consequence of their having partially formed a brush dam from the main shore to the old channel, a distance of some seven chains, thereby contracting the ingress and egress of the water, which has caused itself to cut out the said channel to a depth of eight feet at ordinary, and ten feet at spring tides, where formerly persons could easily walk across the same at low water; and as the object of petitioners' present application appears to further facilitate these improvements, by securing the dam with additional brush and stone ballast, and also, if encouraged with further means, to build a wharf at its entrance, thus affording convenience for shipping off their produce, as well. as to make it a harbor of refuge for fishing. crafts and other vessels sailing on this coast, your Committee strongly recommend that a liberal grant be given by your Honorable House, for the purpose of further assisting them to carry out this very desirable improvement, which must, when completed, prove of great atility to the shipping interest, as well as the public at large.

Your Committee prefix a Table, marked (F.), shewing the Imports and Exports for the past four Years. The estimated value of ships sent abroad for sale has been included in the Exports, deducting one-fifteenth part of the tonnage annually registered for vessels not built for sale, but owned as coasters and traders. No part of the freights of such ships, sent abroad for sale, or of the freights of trading vessels owned on the Island, has been included in the Export. Your Committee are of opinion that if a fair proportion of said freights was allowed, the balance of trade would not appear against the Colony.

A gratifying increase in the exports of Agricultural Produce and of the Fisheries, for the years 1858 and 1859, over the Years 1856 and 1857, and a very great decrease in the tonnage of ships exported during the same period, will be observed by reference to the Tables, which, your Committee submit, indicate a more healthy state of trade. A balance of £11,000 appears in favor of the Colony in 1858, which your Committee attribute to large importations of goods, in the fall of 1857, beyond the requirements of the country. A commercial panic occurred just after, whereby shipbuilding operations were largely suspended, and the goods then imported for that purpose lay over for the consumption of succeeding years.

Your Committee observe that the expenditure for the past year has been increased to the extent — in round numbers — of £2300, for items of expenditure of the previous financial year, ending 31st January, 1859.

A list of Warrants issued after that date, in payment of the said items of expenditure, is hereunto annexed (which list does not include the Warrants issued in payment of the salaries of school teachers).

porter to Legislative Council, 30%. Harbor-master, Charlottetown, 30%. New Desks for House of Assembly, 47% 17s. Repairs of Government House, 57% 1s. Expences of Board of Health, 126% 4s. 2d. Five copies of the Blue Book, 55% Labor, assisting the Surveyor General on public lands, from 1855 to 1859, 105% 10s. Commissioners, issuing Treasury Notes, 42% 11s. 3d. Jails, King's and Prince Counties, 113% 5s. 11d. Road Correspondent, 250%. Printing, 269% 16s. 1d. Superintending printing Journals, 75% Lunatic Asylum, 200%.

The sum of 3301*l*. 11s. 10d. was also paid the Vendors of the Worrell Estate and Lot 11, being, your Committee believe, balances admitted to be due by the late Government.

An increase over the expenditure of the Financial Year, 1858, appears under the following headings in the classified Accounts, viz: Education, 757l. 11s. 8½d. Opening roads on public lands, &c., 252l. 9s. 1d. County Jails, 171l. 3s. 4d. Expences of late Elections, 383l. 6s. 8d. Lunatic Asylum, 125l. 1s. 2d. Expences, arresting W. Hughes, 137l. 1s. 6d. Extra members of the House of Assembly, 384l. 14s. These amounts do not show the actual increase in the departments of Education, County Jails, and Lunatic Asylum, as part of the expenditure of the Financial Year 1858 has been included under those headings.

Your Committee submit that 5600*l.*, of the preceding amounts, ought not to be considered as forming part of the ordinary expenditure of the past year, as part of said moneys was appropriated in the Session of 1858, and part expended under the provisions of the Land Purchase Act.

The amount paid for Public Printing was 909l. 19s. 10d., out of which 526l. 1s. 9d. were paid to the late Queen's Printer for his Account to 17th April last, although, as your Committee are informed, a portion of the work was not completed when so paid for.

The Receipts from Public Lands (exclusive of Crown Land), for the past year, ending 31st January, 1860, have amounted to 2054L 0s. 9d. The interest and expences, as shown by the Accounts for the same time, amount to 1958L 18s. 10d., to which is to be added the interest on Debentures issued during the past year, and not included in the Commissioner's Account. The items of expenditure are, Annual interest on debentures issued prior to last year, 1027L 10s. Interest on debentures, issued last year, estimated at 95L 10s. Opening roads, 270L 4s. 9d. Assistant surveyors, 38L 2s. Wood rangers, 27L Balance due J. Ball's assistants, for old surveys, 105L 10s. Loss of Land tax, 171L Commissioner's salary and journeys, 319L 12s. 8d. Total amount of expences, 2054L 9s. 5d.

The acreage sold was 3738, at an average price of 8s. per acre, and realized 1424l.
9s. 11d.

From this statement it appears that a trifling loss has arisen from the working of the land for the past year; and as the total receipts up to 31st January, 1860, 96221. 15s. 6d., appear to have been absorbed in interest and expences on the said public lands, — particularly the Worrell Estate, — your Committee recommend the balance of land on hand to be disposed of as quickly as possible.

37,446 acres of lands remain unsold; and to expedite the sale thereof, fifteen miles of roads require to be opened at a probable cost, from information received from the Commissioner, of 300%.

Your Committee remark, that the sum of 92861. 17s. 6d. has been collected as duties on 61,366 gallons of Wine, Brandy, Gin, Rum, and Whiskey, for the past financial year, being an increase over the preceding year of 15,314 gallons, and an increase of duty of 23471. 12s. 5d. This large consumption of intoxicating liquors your Committee submit, must have a demoralizing effect on the people of this Island, and is entitled to the deep consideration of your Honorable House.

The article of tobacco, imported and home manufactured, entered for the past year, is 151,544 lb., being an increase over the previous year of 42,338 lb.

Your Committee find an increase of nearly 50 per cent. on the amount of Light and Anchorage Dues for the year ending January, 1860, over the preceding year.

The Public Wharfage for the year ending January, 1859, was 11. 8s. 4½d., and for the year ending January, 1860, is 391. 16s. 10d. These satisfactory results your Committee, in some measure, attribute to the efficiency of the officers connected with those departments.

The Impost Accounts for many of the Outports have largely exceeded the previous year, shewing a due discharge of their important duties by the different Collectors.

The Returns from the port of Georgetown fall short by 21531. 18s. 3½d. those of the previous year. This deficiency, your Committee believe, is occasioned by no dutiable goods to any extent, compared with previous years, for other parts of the Island, being entered at said port last fall.

Your Committee recommend that due economy be exercised in respect of the expenditure attending Light Houses and Jails, and that criminals confined in the Jails should contribute by some light labor to assist in making those institutions self-sustaining,—the same as obtains in the United States and the neighboring Provinces.

In the Post Office department a falling off of the receipts appears, to the amount of 4401. 7s. 9d. This, your Committee find, is caused by only nine months' receipts from that department appearing in the past year's Accounts.

The Returns of the Road Correspondent are satisfactory, so far as the Books in that department are concerned; and your Committee find that that officer has succeeded in disposing of the Warrants issued for the Road service without submitting to any loss, by discount, notwithstanding Warrants were generally at a discount in the market at the time he made sale of them. His Accounts are now audited quarterly; but previously to his accession to office, your Committee are informed, the Accounts in his department were only audited annually.

George Dundas, Lieutenant Governor.

A communication from the Earl of Selkirk, expressive of his willingness to dispose of his Township Lands on this Island, having been received by the Lieutenant Governor, he embraces an opportunity, before the termination of the Session, of communicat-

ing this offer, and the terms on which it can be accepted, to the House of Assembly, in order that the House may express its opinion on the subject.

Lord Selkirk's property, including both leased and unleased land, is in extent, about 48,000 acres, and for this he will accept two shillings and four pence, British Sterling, per acre.

The Lieutenant Governor will be glad to be made acquainted with the views of the House, with regard to the propriety of the purchase of the property by the Government, before the closing of the English mail, on Monday, April 30th.

Ordered, That the thirteenth rule of the House be suspended, and that the Hon. Mr. Gray have leave to introduce a Bill to establish a College in Prince Edward Island, under the name and style of the Prince of Wales' College, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned.

### MESSAGE:

GRORGE DUNDAS, Lieutenant Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor is desirous that the Heuso of Assembly should understand, in reference to his Message of yesterday, that the terms on which the Selkirk Estates are offered, include, at two shillings and four pence an acre, all arrears of rent.

Lord Selkirk's Retates are estimated at about 48,000 acres, and are situated on Townships Nos. 58, 57, 58, 59, 60, and 62.

Government House, April 28, 1860.

And the said Message having been read by the Clerk,

Ordered, That the said Message be referred to the Committee of the whole House to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency, presented yesterday, on the same subject.

The Order of the day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the Messages of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the subject of the offer of the Earl of Selkirk to dispose of his township lands on this Island, being read,

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Sinclair took the chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair.

And Mr. Sinclair reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the matter to them referred, and had come to two resolutions thereon, which he was directed to submit to the House whenever it shall be pleased to receive the same.

Ordered, That the report of the Committee be now received.

The resolutions reported from the Committee were then read by the Clerk, and are as follow:

- 1. Resolved, That it is expedient for this House to authorise the Government to purchase the Selkirk Estate at the rate of two shillings and four pence, sterling, per acre, including all arrears of rent now due thereon.
- 2. Resolved, That a Bill be introduced to amend the land purchase Act, by extending its provisions from thirty thousand to forty thousand pounds.

And the said resolutions being again severally read.

The Hon. Mr. Coles moved to amend the same, by leaving out all after "Resolved," and substitute the following:

"That any extension of the land purchase Act, pending the discussion of the contemplated Commission, or purchasing any lands without an investigation of the grants, would lessen the efficiency of the Commission so to be appointed."

Mr. Gray, from the Committee appointed to prepare and bring in a Bill pursuant to the last preceding resolution, presented to the House a Bill—as prepared by the Committee—to increase the amount authorised to be loaned by the land purchase Act; and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time on Monday next. 10.737.

May it please your Excellency:

On behalf of Her Majesty's faithful Commons of Prince Edward Island, I have now to present the following Bills of Aid and Supply, voted to Her Majesty during the present session, to which I have humbly to request your Excellency's assert, viz;

To each of which, His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

The state of Public Business enables me to release you from further attendance in your legislative capacity.

In closing a Session of more than ordinary importance, and productive of a large amount of useful and practical legislation, it affords me great pleasure to express my sense of the zeal and assiduity with which you have performed your laborious duties.

One of the most prominent objects of your care has been to provide a means of rendering more complete your system of training and educating the youth of the Colony. I fully rely on the efficiency of the improvements which, on that important subject, you are about to introduce; and I look forward with pride to the contemplated establishment of the Prince of Wales' College.

Circumstances constrained me, in the course of the session, to make an essential alteration in the composition of the Upper Branch of the Legislature.

For this change I had been by no means unprepared; the possible necessity of it having been anticipated, not only by myself, but by Her Majesty's Government.

I have now every confidence that this aleration will result in producing that harmony between the two branches of the Legislature which I was so anxious to secure.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

In the name of Her Majesty, I return you my thanks for the liberality with which you have granted supplies for the Public Service, and the solicitude with which you have provided for the augmentation of the Revenue.

I need not acquaint you of the approaching formation of that Commission which was the subject of your Address to Her Majesty last year. Your own energy, and the desire you have evinced to carry out, in this matter, the views of the Imperial Government, have tended in no small degree to this issue. In connection with this subject, I cannot but express the satisfaction I feel at your having agreed to the judicious purchase, from a non-resident Proprietor, of a large Estate in the Island. This arrangement will not only place it in your power to relieve the industrious Tenant, and enable him to become a freeholder, but it will throw open much Wilderness Land to profitable occupation.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

It has been my pleasing task to transmit, for the purpose of being laid at the foot of the Throne, your loyal and affectionate address to Her Majesty, expressive of your desire to receive and welcome to your shores His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, whose visit this Summer to a neighbouring Province had been officially announced. Although there has not yet been time to receive a reply to this Address, I think I may congratulate you and myself on the well-founded hope that we shall have the opportunity of personally paying our homage to the Heir of the Throne of England, the grandson of the Prince whose name is perpetuated in that of our Island.

You are now about to return to your respective Districts and homes. While you are receiving from your constituents and friends those acknowledgments which your arduous and useful services here so justly entitle you to claim at their hands, let me remind you to use the influence inseparable from your position to encourage and foster that spirit of contentment and good-will now happily prevailing throughout the Island, and which is, under the blessing of Almighty God, so calculated to promote the welfare and prosperity of the people.

After which, the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said:

GENTLEMEN;

During the last sitting of your Honorable House, I was engaged in the service of Mr. Whelan, as a Printer; and when notice was given to the different Printers in the City, by your Honorable House, for tenders for printing the Journals of the said last session, Mr. Whelan drew up a tender for the same, which he requested me to sign. Not having the least doubt that Mr. Whelan would faithfully fulfil the contract, which was virtually his. I signed the said tender, and Mr. Whelan addressed it to the Chairman of the Committee appointed to receive the same. Mr. Whelan's tender, signed by me, being the lowest, was accepted, as your Honorable House is aware. The bond required to complete the agreement was also signed by me, at the request of Mr. Whelan. And I may remark to your Honorable House, that at the time of signing the bond, Mr. Whelan mentioned to one of the sureties that I was merely nominal, and only going to do the work, or words to that effect.

I humbly submit this statement, in the earnest hope that your Honorable House will take the matter into consideration, and relieve me from the very disagreeable position in which I am placed. If necessary, I will certify to all of the above on eath.

# Report of the Medical Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum.

January 31, 1860.

### GENTLEMEN;

I HAVE the honor of submitting, for your inspection, my tenth Annual Report, comprising the Medical Statistics of the Lunatic Asylum, with the admissions, discharges, and remedial results on the patients under treatment, for the last twelve months.

On inspecting the details of the accompanying Chart, which I have endeavored to render as self-explanatory as possible, you will observe that during the year just ended not less than thirty-three lunatics have been under treatment in the Asylum, viz: twenty-four males and nine females.

Among the said thirty-three patients four deaths have occurred among the males, viz: one from bilious diarrhœa; a second from rapid mortification of the arm; a third was admitted in an apoplectic fit, from which he never recovered; and a fourth died in a fit of epilepsy, occasioned by inebriation.

Of the total number, seven have not improved, being generally chronic cases of long standing; four have improved; thirteen much improved; and seven have recovered, chiefly among those admitted during the last twelve months, being recent cases; and twenty-one still remain in the establishment.

The Paupers, a corps of invalids, amount to eighteen during the past year. Many of them are very aged, — five are octogenarians, or over 80 years, and are, generally speaking, very helpless.

The eldest died at the extreme age of 86, from a few days' indisposition, a breaking down of the system; a second under similar circumstances, complicated with bronchitis. A third was unfortunately drowned while bathing in the river, apparently from an apoplectic attack. A fourth from diabetes mellitus, a generally fatal and intractable ailment. A fifth from acute diarrhea, occurring in a constitution already broken down with a

chronic abscess, only three days after admission. And a sixth from a fit of apoplexy having been admitted in an insensible state, from which he never recovered.

With respect to the general efficiency of the Asylum, I may observe, that its usefulness to the country would be materially advanced were the number of Paupers diminished and that of the Lunatics proportionally increased,—thereby affording more general relief to those afflicted with that most deplorable of human ailments.

Though now in the depth of winter, the atmosphere of the building is maintained at a temperate heat by the new hot-air stoves. The inmates are well supplied with warm bedding and nourishment, and the attendance they receive is ample and attentive.

SIR:

I have communicated to the Post-Master General your Predecessor's Despatch, No 30, of the 14th May, reporting the failure of his endeavors to procure the concurrence of the Government of Prince Edward Island in the establishment of the system of compulsory pre-payment of postage on letters passing between this Country and the Colony.

As Prince Edward Island is the only one of the North American Colonies between which and the United Kingdom pre-payment is not in operation, Her Majesty's Government are anxious that this exception from the common rule should cease; and it will, therefore, be desirable that you should invite the Legislature to reconsider the subject.

It would, certainly, be most convenient that the system should be adopted and brought into operation, purely and simply, as proposed by Her Majesty's Government.

But, on the other hand, you will understand that, if the Legislature should wish, in some measure, to qualify the compulsory nature of the arrangement, with respect to letters sent to this country, there would be no objection, on the part of the General Post Office, to waive the detention of letters for non-payment, provided that all unpaid and insufficiently paid letters should be charged with the amount of deficient postage, together with a rate of 6d., in addition, as a fine.

If that proposal should be adopted, the postage collected on either side, on the delivery of unpaid letters, would, of course, be divided in the usual proportions of one sixth to the Colony and five-sixths to the Mother Country; and the receiving office, after deducting a sufficient proportion to satisfy the claim of 1d. or 5d. the single rate (as the case may be), from the postage collected on the delivery of insufficiently paid letters, would account for the remainder to the dispatching office,—the fines on the classes of letters to be equally divided between the two Post Offices.

Sir:

I have to acknowledge Sir D. Daly's Despatch, No. 29, of the 13th May last, addressed to Sir E. B. Lytton, transmitting an Address to Her Majesty from the House of Assembly, in pursuance of certain resolutions of the House, praying that Her Majesty would direct a Commission to inquire into the existing relations of landlord and tenant in the Island, with a view to the passing of remedial measures. The House of Assembly also propose that this Commission should direct its attention to the fishery reserve question.

The resignation of Her Majesty's late Government has prevented an earlier answer to your despatch.

The Assembly, in their Address, not only pray for the appointment of a Commission, but they ikewise indicate in detail the measures which, in their opinion, should form the basis of that arrangement between landlords and tenants, which the Commission should endeavour to bring about. Now, without expressing any opinion adverse to the appointment of such a Commission, I am convinced that any prospect of a beneficial result from its labours would be nullified, if its action were fettered by such conditions as the Assembly would thus impose.

I cannot advise Her Majesty to entertain the question, unless it is fully understood that the Commission are at liberty to propose any measures which they may themselves judge desirable.

I have communicated this correspondence to Sir S. Cunard, as representing the landowners in this country, with a letter of which I enclose a copy.

#### My Lord Duke;

- 1. I have the honor to acknowledge to receipt of your Grace's Despatch, No. 11, of date 6th September, 1859, in which, with regard to the proposed Commission to inquire into the existing relations between landlord and tenant in this Island, your Grace expresses your opinion that any prospect of a beneficial result from the labours of that Commission would be nullified, were the independent action of the Commission fettered by its having prescribed to it by the House of Assembly, any particular measures, as a basis of that arrangement which it should be the endeavour of the Commission to bring about.
- 2. I laid your Grace's Despatch before my Executive Council, who unanimously assured me, that nothing could have been further from the wish of the House of Assembly than in any way to meed the free and in lependent action of the Commission, were your Grace to sanction its appointment; and that the principal reasons for passing the resolutions, which appeared to your Grace to indicate the circumscribing of the powers of the Commission, were to point out the existence of difficulties which a Commission might remove.
- 3. Under these circumstances, I have only to add, that while it is the wish of the Government of this Island that the Commission should be at liberty to propose any measures which they may themselves judge desirable, yet the Government trusts that the suggestions of the House of Assembly, as contained in these resolutions, may not be lost sight of by the Commission.



# EDUCATION.

# BOARD OF EDUCATION,

February 23d, 1860.

In transmitting the Report of the Visitor of Schools, the Board of Education deems it its duty to submit, respectfully, for the consideration of the Legislature, certain provisions of the existing Education Law, which, in the judgment of the Board, require revision, as well as to offer some suggestions, calculated, if embodied in an amended Act, to improve, or render more efficient, the whole system of public instruction in this Colony.

The amendments desiderated, are referred to under the following heads:

# TEACHERS; THEIR CLASSES AND SALARIES.

A new gradation, according to seniority, combined with efficiency and merit, recommended.

- 1st. All teachers now licensed to be called in, re-examined, and classified Nos. 1, 2, and 3.
- 2. All future teachers on receiving licence, to receive from the Treasury Forty Pounds, per annum; at the end of two years, to be re-examined on professional attainments, character, and success in teaching, in order to receive the 2d Class Salary of Fifty Pounds; and after three years further teaching, to receive, on a successful examination, the highest Salary of Sixty Pounds, yearly.
  - 3. Payments of Salaries to be made Quarterly.

Acadian teachers to be put on the same footing as other Schools, supported under this Act.

# AVERAGE DAILY ATTENDANCE OF PUPILS.

Where 40 children reside in the District, the average daily attendance should be kept at the present standard, viz: 20; and where upwards of 40, then half the number in all cases to be the standard average attendance.

Whenever the daily average attendance falls below the prescribed standard, then the amount of Salary ought to be in proportion to the actual average attendance, say, at the rate of Thirty Shillings per head, as in minor districts.

## BOUNDARIES OF DISTRICTS.

All doubt should be removed, as to the power of the Board to alter, enlarge, or diminish the size of Districts, without any formal application of the inhabitants, or the necessity of appointing a Commission of enquiry—the same to be, as before, subject to the approval of the E secutive C ouncil.

Power may also be given to inhabitants to order at a meeting, enlargement of School-houses, and to assess for the same, as well as for the original building of it, and also for the final completion of School-houses, if the original specification shall be found not to have fully provided for the same.

All School-houses hereafter to be built and fitted up according to plans to be furnished by the Board.

### SCHOOL TRUSTEES.

Where disputes arise, or doubts exist, as to who are the legal and proper Trustees of a School District, the Board of Education should be empowered, by any means they think proper, to examine into circumstances, and determine who are the Trustees; and a certificate, setting forth the names of the Trustees, signed by the Secretary of the Board and two Members, shall be final and conclusive proof of their appointment and powers.

Where the Board find it impossible to determine who are Trustees, they may order, at any time, a new election of Trustees on a certain day, which being posted on the School-house of the District six days before the day of election, shall be sufficient to call the inhabitants together; and the Trustees then elected, on confirmation by the Board, shall be deemed to be in office until the first day of July next after the date of election, or until some new election shall take place.

#### SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

Establishment of Libraries, in connection with District Schools, is recommended; when a certain sum is voluntarily contributed by the inhabitants, an equal amount or proportionate rate to be appropriated out of the public funds.

### SUPERANNUATED FUND.

The establishment of a superannuated fund, to form an annuity for teachers incapacitated for duty from any cause—such annuity or retiring allowance to be proportioned to length of service, and to the amount which may be contributed yearly, by the teacher claiming the benefit of such fund.

#### NORMAL SCHOOL.

The Board of Education has more than once expressed a decided conviction that the appointment of a Second Master, or additional Teacher, is indispensible to the efficiency of the Normal School, The appointment of this teacher, either as Rector or as Assistant Teacher, cannot any longer be deferred without great detriment to the educational interests of the country. This fact is forcibly impressed upon them on every occasion on which they are called to examine candidates for the office of Teacher.

The term of attendance at the Normal School should be extended from three to five months. The year to be divided into two terms of five months each; candidates for the Teacher's office to be entitled to examination at the end of the first term, and if found not qualified, to be required to attend the second term. All candidates to be examined before being admitted into the Normal School.

The buildings are not such as the Board can approve. The old building should be removed; another of larger and proper dimensions erected in its stead, and with the face toward the street; and it should be properly furnished.

Persons holding recent certificates or diplomas from any British or Provincial training institution to be placed on the same footing as those holding certificates of attendance at the Normal School. Two of the City Schools might also be merged in the Normal School.

Instruction and training in morality, being an essential, and the highest part of Education; and the Bible—God's revealed will to man, irrespective of nation or language,—being the only infallible standard of morality, it is necessary and proper that all the youth of our land attending all our public schools, of every grade, should have their minds moulded and regulated by its sacred teachings,—therefore the Board recommend that the introduction of the Bible into all our public schools, of every grade and class receiving support from the Public Treasury, be authorized; and that the teachers be required to devote one half hour of the former part of each school day to moral training from the Bible—no sectarian teaching being allowed; and the teacher's remarks to be simply explanatory and practical; the children of Roman Catholics to be allowed to use their own version of the Bible, when preferred; and no children being compelled to receive these instructions, whose parents or guardians may object to the same.

The Board would also take the liberty of stating, that they conceive the time has now come when our educational establishment should be completed by the crowning addition of a Provincial College. Past Acts and educational progress have paved the way for this highest and necessary addition. To supply it with Students, three or more intermediate or High Schools might be called into operation. A new and complete Educational Act, embracing the College, the High Schools, the Normal School properly equipped, and the needed amendments of Common School regulations, would be hailed as a signal advance in the educational interests of the country. All which is humbly submitted.

## SCHOOL VISITOR'S REPORT,

FOR THE YEAR 1859-60.

To the BOARD OF EDUCATION.

## Gentlemen;

In submitting to you a Report of my labors as Visitor of Schools, it is proper to state at the outset, that several circumstances have contributed to prevent my inspecting as many Schools as might probably have been expected.

In the first place, several Schools in districts widely separated, had not been visited by the last Visitor, and it was therefore necessary that they first should receive my attention.

Again, since my appointment, the two vacations for the year have occurred, in which the Schools are closed.

And further, several special cases, requiring immediate investigation, in extreme sections of the country; and the prevalence of contagious diseases in many settlements of the three Counties, have materially interfered with the Visitor's facilities for undertaking the whole field.

Notwithstanding these drawbacks, I visited many schools in each of the three Counties; some of them several times. It was desirable that it might be known whether the instructions of the Board were put in operation. Such frequent visitations to the same schools is considered more conducive to the establishment of a proper system and the introduction of necessary reforms, than a passing examination which is not to be repeated till some time the following year. Hence the value of the Visitor's inspection is to be estimated by the progress in improvements, rather than by the mere number passed over.

Although all the schools have not yet been seen, as three months of the year are still future, I expect to be able to report, before the end of the year, the actual number of schools which have been in operation and their general character.

The attendance indicates that a very large proportion of the rising generation are absent from School Such, indeed, is the irregularity in attendance, that some efficient means must immediately be taken to remedy it, if our Free School system would not prove a failure.

I have not entered now into a minute detail of our schools, except those in the City, although the materials are all before me; because they present, as the Board well know, a great similarity to the particular Reports so frequently laid upon your table; and because I believe it is a waste of time and money to draw out and publish such voluminous details, of very doubtful value.

I would generally mention, that there is a decided improvement in the method and the means of communicating instruction, and also in the quality imparted. As would be expected, some districts exhibit their improvements more than others, but there must be a full and constant attendance of the children in each district, to render the advancement prominent and satisfactory. Where the same teachers have been retained for several years, in general, satisfactory success has attended their continuous efforts. I have urged upon teachers the importance and propriety of devoting labour and time to the directions of the Board for teaching the elements of reading and spelling. General attention is now given to Dictation Exercises, Arithmetic in its various phases, mental and written, is a prominent study in all the schools, and in many, pupils have attained excellence in this branch.

General Information, or teaching common things of a practical nature not usually learned in books or by regular lessons, is also in the routine of some schools. These exercises are chiefly performed by means of oral instruction, and may be made so interesting and attractive, as to awaken generous emulation and a laudable spirit of enquiry. The teaching of a knowledge of common things prepares the way for such methods and subjects of instruction as advance the standard of general intelligence in schools in which such lessons are skilfully taught.

The changes in the Normal School, proposed by Mr. Webster, the H.M., I submitted in my monthly Report, to your meeting for the last month. Mr. McNeill, your Socretary, who conducted this Institu-

tion for the summer term, until the incumbent's appointment, is reliable authority for advice on educational improvements, either in the City or rural districts.

On this topic, I would recommend, that applicants for admission to the training department as pupil-teachers, would be examined previously to enrolment, on a certain course of subjects prescribed by the Board, and after attending classes in the Institution for a session, as required in the School Act, learning "what to teach and how to teach," they may then apply for a Diploma.

Thus,—a criterion to decide on the competency of candidates would be established, and a suitable selection could be made, to elevate the standard of qualifications and increase the efficiency of the staff of teachers.

But to secure such important improvements, the training in the Normal School must prepare for the introduction of a uniform system in all the schools; and to consummate this desideratum, a digest of the Principles of the Science of teaching, modified to supply our exigencies, should be compiled and condensed in a Manual of Instruction and Discipline, as a Guide to District Teachers.

The provision for scholarships in the Academy has excited rivalry in country schools for excellence in intellectual acquirements; and a small bonus, granted to buy illustrative apparatus for a Teachers' Institute, when organized in any electoral district, would be likewise good policy. One great difficulty in improving the profession is the isolation of the individuals who make up that profession—but the organization of Teachers' Institutes would excite intense professional interest. In these gatherings, Teachers meet and mingle, and the Teachers' spirit is awakened. They assemble at some central place, and employ a distinguished teacher to preside over their meeting and give them instruction. The exercises are interspersed with discussions, and the evening is occupied by lectures on educational subjects.

I now respectfully submit a brief summary of subjects for the consideration of the Board.

- 1st.—The Board should be invested with ample discretionary power to re-adjust school-district organizations;—to avoid controversies on the construction of the law, or other altercations arising from a variety of complicated circumstances, often of a trivial character, and causing serious consequences.
  - 2d.—The expediency of an improved style of school architecture, with appropriate appurtenances
- 3d.—The District meetings for the engagement of teachers should be held simultaneously, at a certain fixed time, and their salaries paid quarterly.
- 4th.—Teachers distinguished for merit, fidelity, and long experience in the profession, should b suitably encouraged.
  - 5th.—Gradation of schools in the City, Georgetown, and several populous Districts.
- 6th.—Duplicates of Registers should be preserved in every school, for reference, to ascertain the actual progress, proficiency, and attendance.
  - 7th.—A Hand-book of the geography and history of the Island is required.

Sth.—The organization of Teachers' Institutes and District Libraries should be encouraged.

The Report last published includes details for 1858, and up to the end of April, 1859; embracing the term when all the schools are in full operation, and in the most favourable condition for examinations.

There are two sets of scholars—for the country schools—one for summer and the other for the winter term.

In the busy seasons, young children, if able to travel, are sent to save time and trouble at home, and perhaps, to keep up the average, to avoid the closing of the school. Such were the general characte and condition of the schools, when I received my Commission.

I have had correspondence and intercourse with the majority of the teachers, for the adoption of the course of instruction ordered by the Board, and also to procure statistics necessary for my subsequent guidance.

The examinations of the schools not having been yet completed—from hindrances already mentioned,—I have not deemed it proper to present, in detail—with the exception of the City schools,—any exposition of their comparative condition and efficiency; thinking it expedient to withhold them for a future Report, and to offer, at the present time, such general observations as a partial view of the schools has suggested.

Frequent intimations of the closing of schools from sickness are sent me. In Princetown and other places the Board of Health or other authorities have interfered.

Such afflictive visitations of Providence, and other unforeseen emergencies, have occasioned serious embarrassments.

However, I purpose to proceed to New London, Cavendish, and adjacent localities—overlooked; not inspected since Mr. McNeill's visitation in 1857;—then, after completing a circuit of these districts and others claiming immediate attention, I intend to commence a continuous course of visitation, and report the relative efficiency of the schools.

The undersigned is impressed with the conviction that the solution of the most important practical question which concerns the future of our country—how shall our system of public instruction be improved?—will receive the generous consideration of the Legislature.

Our City Schools the past year have been successful. Their progressive improvement has been evident and gratifying; but there is still much to be done before they are brought to that state of perfection at which they should arrive. An important improvement might be introduced by dividing and grading our schools. The advantages of this system are numerous and great. At present

large and small pupils are mingled promiscuously together without any regard to their comparative age or attainments. On the new system, scholars of the same age and qualifications are gathered into the same school, have teachers qualified to instruct them, and the intermediate and primary scholars can be taught by females. The teacher will have fewer classes, and more time to bestow on each. The scholars are arranged where they will assist and not perplex each other, consequently the instruction imparted will be more thorough. In view of these considerations the graded system is earnestly recommended to the attention of the Board as an important improvement. A well defined and specific course of study should be assigned to each school. Urbanity of manners is expected from scholars in the City Schools. It is as just for them to learn how to behave as to acquire knowledge. Scholars should not be guilty of boisterous shouting and disrespectful hooting at those who pass by. In former days, considerable attention was given to this branch of education. Good manners have an intimate relation to good morals.

### POWNAL DISTRICT.

The appearance of this school answers the liberal provision made for it. The house is commodious, accommodates two departments, a male and female, is well provided with maps, elegant globes, and a large black board.

At my visitation in December last, the Masters of the other City Schools were present, by special visitation at my suggestion. In order to awaken a spirit of generous emulation and brotherly love in the profession, I recommended that the teachers in town and country of contiguous schools would agree to have monthly examinations in regular succession; as such conferences afford the advantages of associations for mutual improvement, and also a reliable criterion to ascertain a comparative estimate of skill and success in their responsible vocation.

At the exercises, the scholars shewed a creditable spirit of attention, and alacrity in reading; the enunciation was full and distinct; the pronunciation, with slight exceptions, accurate; and the expression of spirit and feeling in the recitation of interesting pieces of prose and poetry, very remarkable. In every department the investigation has been carried beyond the text book.

A searching examination of a large class on a variety of subjects—called the "General Information Class,"—shewed that a spirit of inquiry and reflection had been elicited.

Mr. Roche has had the principal management of this School for many years, the children of the district, with few exceptions, are entrusted to him, and he has consequently enjoyed peculiar privileges for the exhibition of tact and talent in promoting the progress and proficiency of his pupils in the primary and higher branches of education. Teachers, in general, encounter embarrassing difficulties in systematic arrangements, both from the irregular attendance and the frequent removal of children from school by parents—from capriciousness in most cases.

### ROCHFORT DISTRICT.

This school, notwithstanding its position on one of the noisy thoroughfares of the city, is so far back from the street and so arranged that its situation is good. Mischief-makers caused a vexatious

altercation between the master and a parent opposed to corporeal punishment; this untoward circumstance raised some excitement that soon subsided. When parents lend an ear to the complaints of their children in matters of discipline,—they paralyze the efforts of the teacher. In the government of a school composed of children varied in character and disposition, great patience and judgment are needful. Neither the pleasure nor displeasure of children should be consulted in the proper management of a School. Now, the good order, the attention, the docility, the decent demeanour, in the School, reflect credit on the master and his pupils.

The appearance, on examination, was very creditable. Parsing and Analysis excellent; the acquaintance with Geography respectable; in Spelling, the words were defined; the Reading was distinct, and proper attention paid to the emphasis and cadence; the writing department is satisfactorily conducted; the members of the Arithmetical Classes are making creditable progress; and the proficiency in the Elementary Rules is a prominent feature of the system pursued in this School, which is evidently in a prosperous condition.

#### HILLSBOROUGH DISTRICT.

The Trustees should, without delay, either enlarge the School-room or provide another. The pupils are at present grouped on the seats, and there is not sufficient space for class exercises, and in other respects the capacity of the School-room is objectionable. The relation between the master and his pupils seems to be what it should be. The oral examinations shewed the Reading to be good, and that pains are taken to make the scholars understand what they read. The appearance in Grammar, Arithmetic, Writing, and Geography, was equal to the average; some specimens of writing, consisting of copies and grammatical exercises, were neatly executed. The pupils are apparently diligent, and the master attentive and active. Besides the Register furnished by the Board of Education, there is a journal kept to record the quarterly statistics of the School.

### KING SQUARE.

Mr. James McNeill has had the charge of this School for nine months, and by his praiseworthy devotion to his profession, and the fidelity with which he has discharged the duties of Teacher in this School, he merits suitable acknowledgments. The order in the classes, the progress in study and the prompt obedience of the pupils to the requirements of their teacher have been creditable.

### FEMALE SCHOOLS.

Kent.—Miss E. McKinnon has taught this School for many years, and has been very successful in her efforts to improve it. The Teacher seems to have entire control over the scholars, without the exercise of much severity. Every branch taught is well taught. The different classes made creditable progress in all their studies.

SYDNEY.—This is a very interesting School. Miss McDonald has laboured with patience and perseverance to discharge her arduous duties. She has large classes under her instruction in the several branches taught in district primary schools; and the order and discipline of the scholars shew that she exercises ingenuity and energy in their intellectual and moral improvement.

POWNAL.—The School-house is comfortable and commodious; apartments are suitably arranged for teaching two or more branches simultaneously without confusion. Miss Scantlebury is competent, kind, faithful, and thorough in her instructions. Her examinations have been satisfactory.

#### ORPHAN SCHOOL.

Mrs. Clark has charge of this School, and labours conscientiously. To train the neglected and indigent is a work of peculiar difficulties at all times, but especially in winter, when the want of clothing and shoes causes irregular attendance.

Bog Free School has been for many years conducted by Miss Harvie, whose reputation as an accomplished and assiduous teacher renders it unnecessary to speak at any length either of her method or success. She has a suitable supply of objects and pictures to enable her to make the lessons in the elementary branches attractive and interesting. There are fifty-eight scholars enroled, the daily attendance varying from thirty-nine to forty-seven. Her public examinations are generally well attended by ladies and gentlemen interested in the prosperity of the school.

## JOHN ARBUCKLE, Esquire, A. M., Inspector of Schools.

Sir;

In compliance with your request, I hasten to put you in possession of my views with regard to the Normal School, and the measures necessary to be taken in order to make it an efficient instrument for the training of teachers.

I need not say that, in its present condition, it is not at all calculated for that object. This is well known to you. It may not be improper, however, to state some of the reasons.

There being but one Master in the establishment, he is compelled to divide his time between the pupil-teachers and the pupils of the model school, and consequently can do full justice to neither. He is unable to devote that time to the model school which is necessary to make it worthy of the name; so the students are deprived of the advantages of seeing the system exemplified in the practical workings of a thoroughly organized model school. Nor has he the necessary time at his disposal for imparting to the students in attendance a thorough knowledge of the theory and practice of teaching, and for giving them such instruction in common branches of learning as is desirable for raising the standard of the literary qualifications of teachers. Again, the practice to which he is obliged to resort, of requiring the students to give instruction in the model school, and depending on them to perform a considerable portion of the daily labor, is highly injudicious, as it is as useless to the students as it is injurious to the pupils they teach. The pupil-teachers should teach in the model-school, but not till they have acquired a knowledge of the system; and then no saving of time can be affected, for their practising must be carried on under the eye of the master. The furniture is very unsuitable, the seats being without backs, and high enough for men, and no desks being provided to contain books, &c. These and other defects in the furniture render the carrying out of the system impracticable. Besides, many things, quite as necessary for a model-school as the school-room itself, are wanting; but I need say no more on this subject, as all are aware of the present inefficiency of the institution, and only wish to hear of measures for its improvement.

You are aware, Sir, that a properly equipped model school is indispensible for such an institution as the one under consideration. The model school of Nova Scotia comprises three schools or departments, each having its own teacher, and all united under the same roof, and under the control of the principal. The highest of these is intended to prepare the pupil for College. This department we might dispense with for the present; and our model school would answer our purpose equally well with only two departments, a primary one taught by a female, and a higher one taught by a male. These two departments, under well-trained teachers, and with suitable apartments furniture, &c., would constitute a complete and efficient model school. Being provided with a smodel school, the head master could devote the whole of his time and energies to the improvement of the pupil-teachers. His duties would be,—to make them thoroughly conversant with the branches they are to teach, and best methods of teaching; to superintend their practising in the model school, and to exercise a surveillance over the whole establishment. This would make our

institution a complete Normal School, having the necessary parts of teachers' seminary and model school, and provide the appropriate means for fitting teachers for the proper discharge of the duties of their profession.

My communication in February to the Commissioners of the Board of Education, intended for their practical use, and not for publication, was merely a condensed recapitulation of such facts and suggestions as I thought should be submitted by me in my Report to them for that month.

When I received official intimation of my appointment, I applied to the Government for instructions, and was referred to the Board for special directions, as I was to act under their authority.

The document prepared for my guidance in the discharge of my duties I received on the 26th May. It is an excellent synopsis of the method of instruction and discipline to be pursued by licensed teachers—"permissu superiorum"—and evidently signifies that the inspection of schools would be conducted in future on the improved system now adopted in other countries.

I expected to derive important advantages from a careful perusal of Mr. Irving's Report, but as he was privileged to follow his own predilections, and adapt his proceedings to any emergencies, and as my duty was defined in a digest of directions, to qualify myself for the efficient performance of the requirements of the Board, I had to consult other authorities for information, to do the work assigned me in strict conformity to the course prescribed.

Having studied some of the most approved modern publications on the science of education and the art of teaching, I selected a series of lessons assimilated to processes recommended by eminent instructors, and modified to suit our exigencies.

The exercises were explained on the black board, and "viva voce" illustrated, consequently it is difficult to elucidate the spirit and method of the examinations.

However, in compliance with your intimation of the injunction of the Honorable the House of Assembly, dated the 9th ultimo, and transmitted to me on the 6th instant, a few days after my return from my circuit in Prince County, and the adjacent settlements in the District of New London, I proceed to give, as demanded, a descriptive exposition of the plan on which I conducted my

arrangements and visits, presuming the order has been issued purposely to procure an accurate criterion to decide on the merits of the innovation on the customary course formerly pursued.

The several sections of the synopsis prepared by the Board of Education indicate the spirit and principle of their settled policy.

The establishment of a uniform system of instruction and discipline—but "to change is not to reform,"—and, as I would be responsible for the results of the experiment, introduced under my immediate supervision, I determined to exercise care and caution in my arrangements for the introduction of improvements.

Moreover, a majority of our teachers needed time to prepare for the transition from the old to the now method—indeed, some of the most experienced and skilful in the profession assured me, that, in the summer season, there were very few schools in which I would find a class competent to undergo such an examination as my instructions inculcated.

In course of my official circuits, private individuals applied for something like a key to this agreeable mode of conducting exercises in reading, and the teachers took notes of the lesson and examination. The prominent feature of the plan is to ascertain whether a pupil knows as much of every word he reads in his lessons as the instructor himself, and if not, it is the province of the latter to afford all the information he can, and make the words so transparent to the scholar, that the objects they represent "may be seen through them."

This plan is practicable in private families as well as in public schools; a few experiments will immediately reward the diligence of those who attempt it; the accomplished teacher will readily decide the limits to which such lessons should be restricted.

The design of the selections made for examinations has been generally approved when explained, and where there has been a fair opportunity of testing the experiments, its attractive novelty captivated the attention of all present—in fact, in several districts the sympathies of intelligent persons, from ranks which, on other public occasions, are always arranged in hostile attitudes against each other, have been enlisted to recommend it.

Roots, with prefixes and affixes, have been previously learned by rote in many schools; but the progressive lessons now exemplified have been prepared to provide a model unfolding the method of combining prefixes with roots, and likewise a specimen of the analysis of words by a minute dissection, which would furnish ample elucidation for any teacher of ordinary talent and tact to elicit the ingenuity of his pupils.

Believing that the syllabus of didactics given for guidance in the exercise of my office was designed to place the profession of teaching on the true basis, by elevating the qualifications of instructions, my efforts invariably tended to this point, keeping steadfastly in view the restrictions thus imposed, my aim has been to find out first the best things to be done, then to try to do them in the best manner I could. Therefore, in compiling a concise course of elementary exercises, I thought that a series of examples, purposely selected, would be a suitable preparation to test the

improvements that the Board of Education—according to my interpretation of their instructions—wished to introduce. After a cursory examination by the teacher—as my object was to reach the elementary steps in every branch taught—I gave lessons in the rudiments of the departments, illustrating occasionally the method of teaching the alphabet and elementary sounds on the phonetic process; a simple contrivance by an eminent educator, makes this exercise a very pleasing drill to children. The characteristic of this ingenious plan is—to teach first sounds, and then their symbols, instead of presenting a letter at the outset to look at, and name it. In my opinion, neglect of elementary teaching is the cardinal defect in our educational system. I refer to the want of profitable employment in the lower classes. The manner in which examinations have usually been conducted and reported has had in this respect an injurious effect.

To merit confidence and commendation, the teacher considers it expedient to prepare the highest classes for an exhibition of their performances in some favourite lessons in a superior style. The teacher is obliged, in self-defence, to be always ready for the day of trial.

In places where the new system of preparing School Reports has been adopted, there is not now a disposition, as formerly prevailing, to show prominently at examinations the acquirements of the advanced pupils.

Every intelligent observer must be sensible that the variety of age, studies, and proficiency, to be found in our District Schools is the aggravating cause of the chief difficulties which embarrass teachers; as of course one class only can be taught at a time, the youngest pupils who need most guidance can learn nothing or next to nothing while the teacher is occupied with their seniors.

It is therefore necessary to create a public sentiment in favor of elementary culture in the primary branches. At a recent convention of teachers in Massachusetts, it was remarked, that in order to form a complete system of public instruction, it was necessary to have the training of Normal Students strictly confined to that department of the science and art of teaching which is applicable to the primary classes.

As peculiar tact is necessary for teaching the initiatory steps in the rudiments of education, it is recommended, that the elementary classes should be entrusted to accomplished masters, of experience in the profession, and an adequate provision be made for their remuneration.

Formerly, in the management of seminaries for teachers, their object had been engregiously mistaken, as their students were chiefly instructed in the higher branches, instead of trained in the art of teaching.

The organization of Normal Institutes or teachers' meetings, as now conducted on improved principles, should be suitably encouraged. By convoking a group of teachers in a school similar in character to their own, a good opportunity is given to enjoy the advantages of what may be regarded as the best element of the real Normal School. A spirit of generous emulation is thus raised, and in the competition to obtain distinction, teachers strive to show experimentally their ingenuity and efficiency. In order to direct aright our efforts to improve our own system, to ascertain the mistakes to be eluded, and the proper plans to be pursued, it will be more profitable to defer

in the mean time the discussion of our deficiencies, and to consider what is approved or attempted in other places proverbial for judicious schemes for social advancement.

The division into classes uniform in their studies, is the distinguishing feature of the graded system. By this classification all the alphabet scholars are comprised in one school, and the other departments in similar combination. This method, modified, could be advantageously introduced into our city, and some rural settlements where schools are in proximity.

Aid and advice should be provided for teachers to perfect themselves in the art of teaching and governing district schools; such facilities and inducements must be the principal reliance for remedying existing evils, and for introducing valuable improvements.

Many of our teachers are intelligent, energetic, and faithful in their attention to their arduous duties. These will cordially co-operate in elevating the standard of district school instruction. But some few there are who would object to any plan proposed, except that of diminishing their labours or increasing their salaries.

Hoping that this outline of what I have done, what I have attempted, and the reasons assigned for the course I have adopted in the performance of the duties of my office, may, in a measure, answer your enquiries.

Every person entrusted with the supervision of Schools must study the objects and advantages of examinations. The benefits accruing depend upon the principles and process of investigation

and in ascertaining the preceding teaching: suggestive directions should, at the same time, be incidentally given for the methods of subsequent instruction and training.

And as the plan of examinations which I have adopted differs from the customary course, a few explanatory examples may be necessary to illustrate its principles, and exhibit the manner in which it may be used in tuition, I give therefore sketches of the exercises actually discussed in several schools visited during my circuit, last month:

- Q. What is the literal meaning of the word "attraction?" A. Drawing to.
- Q. From what is it derived?

  A. Attract.
- Q. What does the first syllable, or the prefix of that word signify?

  A. "To."

A. "Ad."

- Q. What was the original form?
- Q. Give other forms of "ad" with examples?
- A. Aspire, accede, affix, aggravate, alleviate, annihilate, append, arrogate, assimilate.
- Q. Give a word signifying to draw from?

  A. Attract, abstract.
- Q. How should you express to draw together? A. To contract.
- Q. How would you express "to draw out?" A. Extract.
- Q. How would you express "to draw under?" A. Subtract.
- Q. When a scholar is easily guided, what adjective applies?

  A. Tractable
- Q. What is the contrary?

  A. Intractable, or untractable.

### ARITHMETIC.

Aware that Arithmetic is too frequently begun to be taught by abstractions, I used a portable Numeral Frame for introductory instruction, and this simple apparatus enabled me to make exercises in this branch easily understood even by the youngest children.

Fractions will prove no puzzle by such explanations as may be given by means of this instrument.

Example: - Move forward four balls, and ask-

Teacher-How many have I moved forward? Four.

How many more than four? None.

How many less? None.

Then four is the whole of four.

Move forward another four.

How many more? Four.

Is it the same number? Yes.

Then four is equal to four.

Tell me how many equal parts are here? Two.

How many altogether? Eight.

Then separating them, say—and one of these equal parts is half of eight, and the half of eight, four.

How many equal parts now? Three.

How many in each equal part? Four.

How many altogether? Twelve.

Then four is the third equal part of twelve.

Or the third of twelve.

Then the pupil may repeat understandingly four is the third of twelve.

## Extract from Simpson's visit to Flanders.

### WATERLOO.

"From eleven in the morning till seven at night the battle consisted of a succession of similar reiterated assaults on the part of the French, with unabated fury, and increasing numbers, and often with a boldness which perplexed our soldiers, and put their matchless firmness to the utmost trial. It may be believed that every fresh onset swept away multitudes of our infantry; still the survivors gave not an inch of ground, but made good the lines, and formed the squares. No men in Europe could have endured as they did. Again and again, the enemy's cannon and cavalry rebounded from their adamantine front, dismayed and scattered. These were the BREATHING times of our heroes!! Line was with admirale alacrity formed for a greater breadth of fire than the squares afforded, immediately on seeing the back plates of the cuirasses, when masses of French infantry approached with a heavy fire of musketry. From Lieutenant Governor George Dundas, to the Governor General and the Lieutenant Governors of the North American Provinces.

Government House, Prince Edward Island, January 27, 1860.

Sir;

I have to invite your Excellency's attention to the absence of Lighthouses on the East and North Capes of this Island, and to urge the expediency of placing lights on these two points, the dangers of which might be thus materially lessoned by their position being indicated to the many vessels passing up and down the Gulf of Saint Lawrence.

From the principal harbors of this Island being those of Charlottetown and Georgetown, and from their trade being almost exclusively confined to countries lying to the southward, the establishment of Lighthouses on the Capes I have named is, as regards the vessels of this Colony, a matter of much less importance than to those of strangers.

Many vessels belonging to the adjoining Colonies having been wrecked in the neighborhood of these headlands within the last few years, my Government is desirous of ascertaining the willingness of the Governments of the other North American Provinces to contribute to placing and maintaining efficient Lighthouses on the East and North Capes of this Island, and it is with this view I now address your Excellency.

Should this proposal meet with your Excellency's approbation, and should you recommend toyour Council that a small sum of money be granted towards the erection and maintenance of these Lighthouses, my Government is prepared to ask the Legislative Assembly of this Island to vote a sum of money for the same purpose.

In this event, the details of the work and the amount of the respective shares of the expense to be borne by each Province, would be settled by Commissioners.

# Report of Theophilus Stewart, Esq., Indian Commissioner.

CHARLOTTETOWN, 19th March, 1860.

Sir; I beg leave to enclose herewith certain Returns, showing the expenditure of two several sums of £5 and £12 10s. received by me as one of the Indian Commissioners; and also showing a small sum requiring to be provided for to cover the expenditure for the year 1858.

The Indian Act, requiring the Commissioners, at the close of every year, to furnish the Lieutenant Governor, for the information of the Legislature, with reports of their proceedings, and an account of their receipts and expenditures, with the number of heads of families settled and children educated, and generally such other information as may enable the Lieutenant Governor and Legislature to judge of the value and correctness of their proceedings, it must suffice that I briefly advert to the desire now happily expressed by the majority, if not all, of the resident Indians with whom I have come in contact, to be permitted to avail themselves of some favorable spot of land where each individual or family amongst them may plant and sow for themselves; its hould therefore be the duty of the Commissioners to make such land or portions of land as have been already set apart for their use by the Government available for them in one way or other. I regret that I have not had an opportunity of personally inspecting the reserveof 92 acres on Lot 55. It has been represented as an unfavorable site; and if this be really the case, means might be taken to provide a substitute for it in some more favorable and suitable locality. Then, there is a tract on Lot 15, set apart by the Government in the same way, but which my brother Commissioner informed me had been taken possession of and occupied by some of their white brethren, if it were not so at the time of its having been so set apart. An investigation into the particulars connected with the pre-occupation of this last mentioned tract would necessarily require a little. time, and authority to incur the expense which would be attendant upon the accomplishment of this object. In the mean time, it is desirable that the Legislature should so strengthen the Commissioners' hands as to enable them to turn their present prevailing disposition to agricultural habits to the best account. Unless this is done, the past liberality of the Legislature will only have tantalized them. A pair, or a couple of pair. of young oxen will be required at Lennox Island, the head-quarters of the tribe, where virty families annually congregate, and where considerable preparations have been made. for the operations of the plough the ensuing spring, by about twelve of these families, or heads of families; and unless they are provided with this important and necessary auxiliary to successful husbandry, their progress will necessarily be greatly impeded, if not obstructed. I was gratified on receiving the application for the oxen, and I have no doubt a similar feeling will be indulged by the Legislature. They will also, in particular cases, require to be assisted in the purchase of seed potatoes, and of a limited subsistence while putting these in the ground.

I am informed by the Morell section of the tribe, that it is their intention to commence operations on the land provided for them on the Morell as soon as the spring opens. In this case, the Commissioners will require to be furnished with the means of assisting them in the purchase of seed and of a limited subsistence, the planting sea-

son, which, with them, will be of very short duration.

In referring to that section of the tribe occupying in summer the Ordnance Reserve of ten acres at the opening or entrance of this harbor, they will, to the number of six or seven families, require, in like manner, to be assisted in the purchase of seed, &c. There are also two or three families in the neighborhood of Georgetown, who will doubtless be looking for, and whom it would be advisable to extend assistance to in the same manner.

I can only refer to one family actually settled,—that of Matthew Prospers, on Lot or Township No. 63. The number of Indian children attending different schools I am not informed of, further than of two of them who, in 1857, were so, near Murray Harbor; one of whom the then Visitor certified to having examined, and being much gratified with the progress he had made. Two other children of the name of Thomas have been, the present winter, attending school in this neighborhood, and I have little doubt that other children have been enjoying a similar privilege, though, from the poverty and wretchedness of their parents, many others have been hindered doing so. Something in the shape of public or private aid might be availed of, to give effect to the disposition generally of the parents, that their children should partake of the benefits of our educational system. I shall be excused in drawing attention to the disadvantages experienced by our Indians in the want of a market for their manufactures. These, in numerous instances, they are compelled from necessity to part with in barter, at reduced prices, so that it is matter of wonder how many of them are able to exist. It is now upwards of six years since an Industrial Establishment was opened at Hantsport, Nova Scotia, where their Indians repair with their wares, which are taken at liberal prices; thus increased comforts result, and every pretext for idleness, begging, and poverty are taken away. It is time for this Island to follow in the wake of the Nova Scotians in this particular, and provide similar facilities for our resident Indians, who necessarily require the same or a similar process to be used in order to their elevation from their depressed condition, particularly if, as is anticipated by some of their enthusiastic friends,—they, that is, the different tribes of this portion of the great human family,—are distined in the future to become ministers, merchants, lawyers, doctors, judges, and mechanics, farmers, et hoc omne

It has been my privilege to have made the Executive informed, at an early period of the winter, of the want and destitution then existing among several families who were encamped in the neighborhood of the city; and the amount which the Executive considered I was at liberty to expend has only enabled me to alleviate, in a very circumscribed manner, the sufferings and privations of a very limited number of the families referred to.

These, under existing circumstances, act very oppressively upon them; and when a like exemption has been enjoyed by their brethren for years in all of the other provinces, the request they now humbly make on this point, it is hoped, will not be deemed unreasonable.

#### GENERAL POST OFFICE, CHARLOTTETOWN, FEBRUARY 24th, 1860.

Sir: As several matters connected with the Postal arrangements of the Island have been brought under my notice, during the past season, and some alterations have been made to afford additional accommodation and convenience to the merchants and other residents situated in the western sections of the Island, and as this accommodation has caused much additional labor, and has required increased attention to be given by several Postmasters, I would take the liberty respectfully to bring under the notice of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in Council, some communications I have received pointing out the inadequacy of the remuneration now allowed by statute to several officers of the Department who have duties of importance to perform.

During the past summer, to prevent any delay in the transmission of the correspondence originating in the western parts of the Island addressed to Canada, New Brunswick, and the United States, I caused an interchange of mails to take place between several offices on the route between Summerside and Tignish, and had all the correspondence sent to Summerside, where it was forwarded by Steamer direct to Shediac, from whence it was despatched to its destination. This interchange of mails can only be correctly performed by competent officers; and it requires both care and attention to prevent loss to the Department, by examining minutely the paid correspondence received

and forwarded.

The Postmasters at Tignish, Cascumpec, and St. Eleanor's have intimated to me the impossibility of their appropriating so much of their time as is required without additional remuneration; and as it would be a loss to be deprived of the services of the officers now conducting these offices, I would respectfully urge upon His Excellency, in Council, to be pleased to cause such additional remuneration to be granted to them as may seem reasonable.

The Postmaster at Souris has also called my attention to the same subject, which I also take liberty to lay before His Excellency the Licutenant Governor, in Council.

Under the Statute of the Island, the sum of Two Pounds per annum, in addition to a percentage on the amount collected, is indiscriminately granted to the several county Postmasters, some of whom have a duty of importance to perform, while others have very little to attend to.

Some few years ago, an addition of Ten Pounds a-year was allowed to the Post-masters at Georgetown and Summerside, which they were and are still entitled to; and as the officers referred to in this communication have important duties to perform, I have taken the liberty to submit their claim to His Excellency in Council.

I will annex a statement of the amounts collected at the several country offices for the last two quarters, ending the thirty-first of December last, that His Excellency may

see that the increased remuneration now sought is only such as may be expected for the duties required to be performed; and I would humbly suggest, that whatever additional sum may be allowed to any officer, it may be paid quarterly, that in case of resignation or removal, each officer may receive the sum he is entitled to.

The office at St. Eleanor's is the deposit for all the mails transmitted to and received from the several offices west of St. Eleanor's; and the Postmaster has to make up mails semi-weekly for Summerside, Port Hill, and Travellers' Rest, besides his correspond-

ence with this office.

When I took the liberty, a few years ago, to solicit the appointment of a second Clerk in the General Post Office, I pointed out the necessity of making the salary such as to induce a competent and active young man to accept the office, and one whose business habits were such, that as the business of the department increased he might reasonably look forward for prometion, and thereby feel it a duty to be diligent and attentive, and strive to become fully acquainted with all the details of the Department.

The sum of One Hundred Pounds per annum was allowed, and paid for several years; but I regret to state that during the last Session of the Legislature it was reduced; and I find that a careful and attentive young man that has been appointed to the office

cannot continue to hold the appointment at the reduced salary.

The duties that have to be performed are urgent and constant, and require an attendance of thirteen hours every day, except Sunday, or from seven in the morning until eight at night. I, therefore, respectfully beg that the salary of One hundred Pounds per annum be paid from the first of January last.

A number of offices set up during the last few years are in want of a letter case, and some of them require a stamp and seal, with the name of the office, which, if His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor would be pleased to recommend being provided,

they would afford greater safety and be of much convenience.

In conclusion, I would beg to state, that the revenue of the Department, for the two quarters ending the 31st December last, and paid into the Treasury, exceeds the amount collected in the corresponding Quarters of the year previous in the sum of Ninety-seven Pounds one shilling and eightpence.

#### Post Office, Cascumpec, 10th February, 1860.

SIR; You are aware that the duties to be performed in this Office are arduous in proportion to those in the majority of Post Offices throughout the Island, although the Legislative allowance is the same, being the low sum of Two Pounds per annum.

The large amount of American communication through this office increases the labor in it, especially in the summer season; so that it requires the sole time and attention of one person for about four months of the year,—that is, while the fishing fleet is

in the Bay.

The pre-payment of American postage being optional with the sender, the "unpaid" letters, being by far the greater portion, have to be received, marked, and mailed without any remuneration whatever. I think it is, therefore, but reasonable that the salary

should be increased. The community are desirous that I should retain the office, therefore I would not feel disposed to resign.

My Dear Sir; At the request of Mr. Desman, I now write you to call your attention to the inadequacy of the remuneration for the service performed by him in our Post Office, and can state, on my own personal knowledge, that for some two or three months last past the trouble, annoyance, and worry in keeping the Post Office here has been far greater than it has ever hitherto been, owing to the irregularity of the time the carrier arrives with the mails,—say from 10 o'clock, p. m., to 6 o'clock, a. m.

Another piece of extra service is forwarding the mails to the Eastward.

I am aware that of yourself you can make no addition to the pay of any of the country way-office keepers, but your recommendation at head quarters might be the cause of getting an Act passed to enable the Government to give a little more remuneration where thought absolutely necessary.

A weekly mail, all the time our harbors are shut by ice, would answer just as well

as twice a week.

From the Duke of Newcastle, to Lieutenant Governor Dundas.

Downing Street, 17th September, 1859.

Sir;

I transmit to you an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, "to repeal, as regards the "Colony of Victoria, and to enable other Colonial Legislatures to repeal certain provisions of the "Imperial Acts of the Fifty-fourth year of George the Third, chapter fifteen, and of the Fifth and "Sixth years of William the Fourth, chapter sixty-two."

This Act originated in a correspondence with the Governor of Victoria, with which it is not necessary I should trouble you. But the portion of the Act which enables Colonial Legislatures to repeal provisions of the former Act, 54 Geo. 3, cap. 15, relates to all the Australian Colonies; that which enables the repeal of provisions of the 5th and 6th William 4, cap. 62, sec. 16, to all the Colonial possessions of the Crown.

CAP. XII.

An Act to repeal as regards the Colony of Victoria, and to enable other Colonial Legislatures to repeal certain provisions of the Imperial Acts of the Fifty-fourth year of George the Third, Chapter Fifteen, and of the Fifth and Sixth years of William the Fourth, Chapter Sixty-two.

[8th August, 1859.]

Whereas by the First, Second and Third Sections of an Act passed in the Fifty-fourth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act for the more easy Recovery of Debts in Her Majesty's Colonies of New South Wales.' Provision was made for the proof, by affidavit, †8

affirmation, or otherwise, of certain matters requiring to be proved before any Courts of Law or Equity in New South Wales or its dependencies, and for the punishment of persons guilty of making such affidavits or affirmations falsely: and whereas, by the fifteenth and seventeenth sections of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the Fifth and Sixth Years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to repeal an Act of the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for the effectual abolition of Oaths and Affirmations taken and made in various departments of the State, and to substitute Declarations in lieu thereof," and for the more entire suppression of voluntary and extra judicial Oaths and Affidavits, and to make other Provisions for the abolition of unnecessary Oaths. Provision was made for the proof by Solemn Declaration or otherwise of certain matters or things requiring to be proved before any Court of Law or Equity in Her Majesty's Possessions abroad: And whereas it is expedient that the provisions above recited should be repealed as regards the Colony of Victoria, and that as well the said provisions as the Fourth Section of the said first-recited Act of Parliament should be alterable or repealable as regards any of Her Majesty's Possessions abroad by the Legislature or other Legislative authority of such Possession: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords spiritual and temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same as follows:

- I. The First, Second, and Third Sections of the said first-recited Act of Parliament, and the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Sections of the said secondly-recited Act of Parliament, shall be and they are hereby repealed so far as they apply to Her Majesty's Colony of Victoria.
- II. It shall be lawful for the Legislature or other Legislative authority of any of Her Majesty's Possessions abroad to which any of the Provisions contained in the said first-recited Act, or in the Fifteenth or Seventeenth Sections of the said secondly-recited Act, shall apply, to repeal, alter, or amend all or any of the Provisions, so far as applicable to such Possession, in like manner and subject to the same conditions as if the same had been originally enacted by such Legislature or Legis lative authority.

## Petition of Duncan Macphee, regarding the sum voted by the House of Assembly for Prince Street Wharf.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;

Your Petitioner begs leave to lay before your Honorable Board the following circumstances:

Your Petitioner, in conjunction with his partner—Hector Maclean — petitioned the Legislature for some compensation for losses sustained by themselves in the Construction of the Ferry Wharf, at Charlottetown, which was completed during last year. The present House of Assembly—during the late Session—was pleased to grant them the sum of Fifty Pounds.

Your Petitioner has since applied to the Clerk of your Honorable Council for the sum of Twenty-five Pounds, being his share of the Grant, and has been informed that the above named sum of Fifty Pounds was not placed in the Appropriation Bill, through some mistake, and, owing to the hurry of the Session when near its close, it was overlooked.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Executive Council, dated 22d November, 1859, approved by His Excellency the Governor General.

On a communication, dated 21st instant, of the Honorable the Minister of Finance, stating the it is desirable to extend the arrangements whereby certain productions of the several British N. A. Provinces are reciprocally admitted free, so as to include all articles either produced or manufactured within the said Provinces.

That it would also be important to ascertain how far it might be practicable to assimilate the Tariffs of the several Provinces, so as to permit entire Free Trade between them; and he recommends that your Excellency be requested to communicate with the Lieutenant Governors of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Governments of those Provinces are prepared to unite with Canada in recommending Legislation for the purpose of establishing reciprocal free interchange of all productions and manufactures of the respective Provinces, and further to enquire how far it might be practicable to assimilate the tariffs of the several Provinces so as to permit entire Free Trade between them.

The Committee concur in the recommendation of the Minister of Finance, and submit the same for your Excellency's approval.

Government House, Prince Edward Island, January 24, 1860.

Sir:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Excellency's despatch of date November, 24, 1859, enclosing the copy of a report of your Excellency's Executive Council on the subject of the expediency of extending mutual arrangements between the several N. A. Colonies, whereby all the manufactures or productions of these Provinces should be reciprocally admitted free. The copy of this Report I have laid before my Government. Constituted as the Tariff of this Colony at present is, there will be considerable difficulty in carrying out such an arrangement as that indicated in the above report, without returning to a Protective Policy which has long been abandoned; or without appearing to place restrictive duties on articles of American manufacture contrary to Treaty.

The Revenue of this Colony is raised by duties placed on articles imported irrespective of whence they come—the same rate being laid on British as on American productions. It would therefore be extremely difficult, if not impossible, to draw a line whereby the productions and manufactures of the N. American Provinces should be admitted free into Prince Edward Island, and the same articles produced or manufactured elsewhere be subjected to a duty.

At the same time, the Government of this Colony is desirous of considering any suggestions which your Excellency may please to make for the general benefit of Her Majesty's N. A. Provinces and they will give their utmost attention to whatever particulars or details in connexion with the subject your Excellency may submit to them.

To the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury.

Your Lordships having referred to us the annexed letter from Mr. Elliot, transmitting the copy of an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, entitled "An Act for raising a Revenue," and requesting that your Lordships will inform the Duke of Newcastle whether the Act may be left to its operation.

We Report-

That by the 5th section of the Act, Spirits from other places than Europe, the British West Indies, or any British Possession in North America, are prohibited to be imported into Prince Edward

Island in any cask or package not capable of containing as least sixty gallons, whereas in the United Kingdom the restriction with respect to Spirits is confined to casks or packages containing less than twenty gallons.

It may, however, be presumed that the Legislature of Prince Edward Island have sufficient reason for adopting so stringent a regulation, and as neither the section referred to, nor the other provisions of the Law are repugnant to the Imperial Customs' Laws, we see no objection to the Act being left to its operation.

From His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, to Lieutenant Governor Dundas.

Sir;

With reference to my Despatch, No. 11, of the 6th of September last, in which I informed you that I had communicated to Sir Samuel Cunard, the correspondence which had taken place upon the subject of the appointment of a Commission to propose measures of arrangement between Landlords and Tenants in Prince Edward Island, I transmit to you the copy of a letter which has been addressed to me by Sir S. Cunard, and several other proprietors of land in the Island.

The Proprietors, it will be seen, do not think that the appointment of a Commission in the manner proposed by the House of Assembly in their Address of the 9th of May last, would be the most desirable mode of proceeding, as the labours of such a Commission could only terminate in a Report, the conclusions of which would not be binding on any of the parties interested. They suggest, therefore, instead, that three Commissioners or Referees should be appointed—one by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and the third by the Proprietors—and that they should be invested with power to hear and determine all the questions in dispute. It is further suggested, that the expense of the Commission should be divided equally between the Crown, the Tenants, and the Proprietors.

If the consent of all the parties can be obtained to this proposal, I believe that it may offer the means of bringing these long-pending disputes to a termination. But it will be necessary, before going further into the matter, to be assured that the Tenants will accept, as binding, the decision of the Commissioners, or the majority of them; and, as far as possible, that the Legislature of the Colony would concur in any measures which might be required, to give validity to that decision. It would be very desirable also, that any Commissioner who might be named by the House of Assembly on behalf of the Tenants, should go into the enquiry unfettered by any conditions such as were proposed in the Assembly last year. I have, therefore, to request that you will ascertain and report to me whether the Tenants of Prince Edward Island, or the House of Assembly, on their behalf, are prepared to agree to the proposed reference.

My Lord Duke;

We have been furnished with a copy of a Memorial, addressed to Her Majesty by the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, on the subject of the questions which have arisen in connection with the original Grants of Land in that Island, and the rights of Proprietors in respect thereof.

We observe that the House of Assembly have suggested that Her Majesty should appoint one or more Commissioners to enquire into the relations of Landlord and Tenant in the Island, and to negociate with the Proprietors of the Township Lands for fixing a certain rate of price at which every Tenant might have the option of purchasing his Land; and also to negociate with the Proprietors for a remission of the arrears of rent, in such cases as the Commissioners might deem reasonable, and proposing that the Commissioners should report the result to Her Majesty.

As large Proprietors of Land is this Island, we beg to state that we shall readily acquiesce in any arrangement that may be practicable, for the purpose of settling the various questions alluded to in the Memorial from the House of Assembly; but we do not think that the appointment of Commissioners, in the manner proposed by them, would be the most desirable mode of procedure, as the labours of such Commission would only terminate in a Report, which would not be binding on any of the parties interested.

We beg, therefore, to suggest, that instead of the mode proposed by the House of Assembly, three Commissioners or Referees should be appointed—one to be named by Her Majesty, one by the House of Assembly, and one by the Proprietors of Land; and that these Commissioners should have power to enter into all the enquiries that may be necessary, and to decide upon the different questions which may be brought before them, giving of course to the parties interested the opportunity of being heard.

We should propose that the expense of the Commission should be borne by the three parties to the reference, that is to say, in equal thirds, and we feel assured, that there would be no difficulty in securing the adhesion of all the landed Proprietors to a settlement on this footing.

The precise mode of carrying it into execution, if adopted, would require consideration, and upon that subject we trust that your Grace would lend your valuable assistance.

Correspondence in reference to taking the Census of the whole of the British Empire.

[CIRCULAR.]

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Downing Street, 31st January, 1860.

Sir;

I have received a Despatch from the Governor of South Australia, of which I enclose a copy, referring to an Act which had been passed by the Legislature of that Colony, for taking a census of the inhabitants for the years 1860-1861. That Despatch encloses copies of a correspondence with the other Australian Governments on a proposal for taking a census in all those Colonies, simultaneously with that of Great Britain.

I directed a reference of that despatch to be made to the Registrar-General for his report, and I transmit for your information a copy of his reply to such reference.

Governor Sir R. Macdonnell has suggested the advantage which might result from the measure of obtaining at the same time one uniform Census throughout the whole of the British Empire, or at east throughout all the principal British Colonies.

You will perceive that to whatever extent that proposal might be finally adopted, the Registrar-General is at present unable to afford the information necessary for giving effect to it, as no scheme for the Census of the United Kingdom has been approved by Her Majesty's Government with a view to its being submitted for the consideration of Parliament, nor as yet has the exact day for the Census of 1861 been fixed upon. I would call your attention to the extract which accompanies the Report of the Registrar-General, containing the decision as to future Censuses in Europe, which has been arrived at by the International Statistical Congress in 1857, at Paris, and to which Congress Her Majesty's Government sent delegates.

The Registrar-General also intimates that the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council have passed a minute appointing a Committee to make necessary preparations for the next meeting of that Congress in London, in the month of July, 1860, at which possibly it might be considered desirable in some Colonies that delegates should attend on their behalf.

If any further details should be desired by your Government, in order to secure uniformity of plan, in the event of the project being adopted, I would suggest that you should place yourself in direct communication with the Governor of South Australia.

The Governor of South Australia to the Duke of Newcastle.

### Government House, Adelaide,

15th September, 1859.

My Lord Duke;

- 1. In my Despatch, No. 350, of even date herewith, I have had the honor to transmit Act, No. 12, of last Session, being an Act to take a Census of this Province in 1860 or 1861.
- 2. It had occurred to me when the Act was first introduced, as an Act to take a Census in 1860, that the advantages of a Census, either in this or any other of the Australian Colonies, would be much enhanced if it could be taken simultaneously in all. As my Ministry agreed with me in opinion, a suggestion was made in a circular sent by this Government to the other Australian Colonies, to the effect that such a Census should be taken in all simultaneously every five years.
- 3. In the mean time, I communicated my views to His Excellency the Governor-General, who in reply proposed to carry the proposition still further, and to have the Census of these Colonies taken simultaneously with that in Great Britain, and his Government subsequently drew up a circular embodying that view.
- 4. I had, however, previously suggested to my Executive Council an alteration in the South Australian Act as it had been first passed, which alteration, on the 15th July, I recommended by a message to the local Parliament, with a view to extending the period for taking the census to the year 1861, inclusive. That suggestion was adopted, and the Act passed in its present form.
- 5. Since then the enclosed correspondence on the subject has been received from Victoria, and your Grace will perceive that the Registrar-General of that Colony is not merely anxious to carry out my proposal, as well as that of the Governor-General, but also very properly draws attention to the necessity of adopting a uniform Act, and similar forms for that purpose.
- 6. As there now appears a fair prospect of a scheme being adopted in these Colonies,—especially as the postponement of the census till 1861 will facilitate unity of action,—it occurs to me that I ought to lose no time in apprizing your Grace there f. I entertain a hope that you may consider the matter worthy of the attention of the Registrar-General in England, and that he may be inclined to offer some suggestions as to the forms of returns most advisable to adopt, and may also supply these Governments with other valuable hints as to the draft Bill most suited to effect the common object of these Colonies, if they are to act in concert with the authorities in England.
- 7. I have no doubt that the same officer might also furnish several useful forms for the scientific classification of the information to be obtained; and it might perhaps occur to Her Majesty's Government to take steps at the same time for obtaining an uniform census on the same day through the whole of the British Empire, or at least through all the principal British Colonies.
- S. In any case, I feel that, in attempting to secure unity of action here, suggestions emanating from Her Majesty's Government in England, or from so high an authority as the Registrar-General there, would probably have more effect in ensuring that unity than suggestions emanating from any

local Government. I have, therefore, brought the subject under your Grace's consideration, and now respectfully submit to you these observations, together with the enclosed correspondence, in the hope of promoting thereby an object of so much general interest.

In reply to your letter of the 2nd instant, I have to state, for the information of the Duke of Newcastle, that as yet no scheme for the next census of the United Kingdom has been approved by Her Majesty's Government, with a view to being submitted to the consideration of Parliament, nor as yet has the exact day in 1861 been decided upon when the census will be taken, it not being possible to have it on the same day as in 1851, as the 31st March, 1861, will be Easter Sunday.

I am, therefore, at the present moment unable to supply the Governors of the Australian Colonies with the information they require for their guidance; but I will take care to call the attention of the Duke of Newcastle to the subject at the earliest possible period, and I shall have much pleasure in supplying his Grace with the required documents.

In the meantime, I now forward, for the information of the Governors of the Australian Colonies, an extract containing the decision as to future censuses in Europe which was arrived at by the inter-

national Statistical Congress in 1857, at Paris, to which Congress Her Majesty's Government sent delegates.

The Duke of Newcastle may perhaps not have heard of the meetings of this Statistical Congress, but they have been assembled at three different capitals,—at Brussels, in 1853; at Paris, in 1855; in Vienna, in 1857.

I will thank you to state to his Grace that the Lords of the Privy Council passed a minute on the 19th instant, appointing a Committee to make the necessary preparations for the next meeting of the International Statistical Congress in London, in the month of July, 1860.

If this were made known in the chief Colonies, delegates may perhaps be sent to this country to attend that proposed Congress as representatives of some of the Colonies.

It will probably be within the recollection of the Duke of Newcastle, that public attention having been called to the incomplete state of the Official Statistics compiled by the Governments of the various nations of the world, and the absence of such uniformity in the manner in which even those incomplete statistical returns are published by the respective countries as would facilitate comparisons between them, an International Statistical Congress was, a few years ago, organized, for the purpose of taking steps for remedying these evils, with the sanction and co-operation of the Govern-

ments of many of the leading States of Europe. That Congress has already assembled on three separate occasions, in the several Capitals of Belgium, France, and Austria, and considerable advantage has already been derived from its labors.

On the occasion of the last meeting of the Congress at Vienna, in the year 1857, it was arranged, with the concurrence of the then Government of this country, that its next meeting should take place in this metropolis,—an intention which Her Majesty's Government now propose to cause to be fulfilled in the course of the ensuing summer.

With this object in view, the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have recently appointed a Committee for the purpose of making the necessary preparations for that meeting; and it has already been decided that it shall take place in the week commencing on the 16th July next.

It appears to their Lordships to be desirable that the Colonies of the British Empire should not be left unrepresented, on an occasion on which the representatives of so many Foreign Countries may be expected to attend, in accordance with the invitations to that effect now being dispatched by the Foreign Office, and which presents so favorable an opportunity of facilitating the realization of the important objects already referred to.

I am, therefore, directed to request that you will suggest to His Grace the expediency of procuring such of the Colonies named in the margin as His Grace may approve, to be so represented at the Congress, either by invitations addressed to the local Governments and Committees, or (if these are too distant) through the agency of distinguished gentlemen connected with them now in Europe. Any gentleman who may be thus deputed, or whose attendance may be thus sanctioned, should be requested, previously to the assembling of the Congress, to place himself in communication with the Committee above spoken of, which is now meeting, under the directions of this department, with reference to the subjects for discussion.

Sir:

I have received from the Secretary of State for War, two letters, of which I enclose copies herewith, explaining the measures which would be requisite in order to give effect to the recommendations of Lieutenant General Sir Fenwick Williams, for the defence of the Provinces of Newfoundland, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. These measures, as you will perceive, would consist first of an addition of 16 officers and non-commissioned officers, and about 80 gunners to the Coast Brigade of Artillery, with a view to placing small parties of artillerymen in these Provinces to assist and instruct any volunteer artillery corps that may be formed for their defence; and secondly, an addition of two companies to the Newfoundland companies, so as to admit of stationing detachments in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

I shall delay replying to the enquiry addressed to me by Mr. Secretary Herbert,-whether the Provinces would be prepared to pay their respective shares of the expense of these measures, until I receive an answer from you to the present despatch,—but I do not doubt the readiness of the Government of each of Her Majesty's Provinces in North America to contribute to any well considered undertaking which may seem necessary for the security of that portion of the Empire.

ties of Artillerymen should be allotted to Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, and the Coal Mines at Sydney and Pictou, in Nova Scotia, with a view to instruct and assist any Volunteer Artillery Corps that may be formed for the defence of those places. I am directed by Mr. Secretary Herbert to transmit to you, for the information of the Duke of Newcastle, the enclosed copy of a letter received from the Military Secretary to His Royal Highness, from which His Grace will perceive, that the only means by which this object can be accomplished, will be by adding 16 officers and non-commissioned officers, and about 80 gunners to the Coast Brigade of Artillery.

The pay, clothing, and subsistence of these officers and men being calculated to amount to about £5000 per annum, exclusive of arms, barrack accommodation, and other incidental expenditure, Mr. Sidney Herbert will be glad to be informed, before taking any steps in furtherance of His Royal Highness's suggestion,—whether the Duke of Newcastle has reason to believe that the Colonial Governments concerned, will be ready to provide so much of the expense as will devolve on them respectively by a distribution of the force in the manner proposed—that is in the proportion of about 20 men to each station.

Williams, Bart., of the 20th July last, respecting the necessity of a small number of Artillerymen being allotted to Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, and the Coal Mines at Sydney, in Cape Breton, and Pictou, in Nova Scotia, with a view to assist any Volunteer Artillery Corps that may be formed for the defence of those places. I am directed by the General Commanding in Chief to state, that as it would be very inexpedient to detach young soldiers of the Royal Artillery to those stations, and the two Batteries allotted to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick having besides no men to spare for these detachments, His Royal Highness is desirous of recommending to the consideration of Mr. S. Herbert, that an addition be made to the Coast Brigade of Artillery for this service.

His Royal Highness considers that about 20 men at each station would be sufficient, and he would, therefore, recommend that the addition should consist of the following detail, viz:—

1 Captain, 1 Lieutenant, 6 Sergeants, 4 Corporals, 4 Bombardiers, and 80 Gunners.

With reference to my letter of the 12th ultimo, I am directed by the Secretary of State for War to transmit to you the enclosed copy of a letter from the Horse Guards, containing the recommendation of the General Commanding in Chief, that two companies should be added immediately to the Newfoundland companies, so as to admit of detachments being stationed in Prince Edward Island, and in Nova Scotia (for the defence of the Coal Mines at Sydney and Preston (sic.) in the latter.)

With reference to Sir Edward Lugard's letter, of the 12th instant, with its enclosure from the Colonial Office, relative to the defenceless state of the Coal Mines at Sydney, in Cape Breton; and also to the reports of Lieutenant-General Sir Fenwick Williams, of the 19th July last, respecting the defences of Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, which I forwarded for your consideration, on the 12th of August, I am induced to submit to you the expediency of adding immediately two companies to the Royal Newfoundland companies; in conformity with the suggestion of Sir Fenwick Williams, with a view to some protection being afforded from this Corps to the Coal Mines in Cape Breton, and at Pictou, in Nova Scotis, and Prince Edward Island. It is very desirable

that a service of this nature should be provided for by a local Corps like the Newfoundland companies, composed of men of above 10 years' service, who may have re-engaged to complete their 21 years, and are not likely to desert, than by detachments from regiments of the line in Nova Scotia, which should be kept assembled as much as possible. The subject is so fully entered into in Sir Fenwick Williams' report, that I need only state my entire concurrence in the opinion, which he has expressed, and that this addition to the Newfoundland companies is very desirable, whatever may be the determination with regard to any works of defence for these Provinces.

I am anxious, therefore, to recommend the measure to your early consideration, and should Her Majesty's Government be pleased to sanction the augmentation of the Corps in question, I should hope that the appointment of a Lieutenant-Colonel to command it may be sanctioned. It is at present commanded by a Major, but I think it quite reasonable and indeed essentia with a view to the necessary Inspections, that a corps of 4 companies, and employed abroad on detached services, should have a second Field Officer, in which case the senior should be a Lieutenant-Colonel.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Grace's despatch, No. 22, of date 18th November, 1859, enclosing copies of two letters from the Secretary of State for War, explaining the measures which would be requisite to give effect to General Williams' recommendations for the defence of several of the North American Provinces, and enquiring whether these Provinces would be prepared to pay their respective shares of the expense of these measures.

I have laid your Grace's despatch before my Executive Council, with whom I have anxiously conferred on the subject. While my Government do not fail to appreciate your Grace's desire to adopt measures for the effectual defence of the Island, they fear that it will not be possible for them to raize so large a sum of money as that which the Secretary of State for War indicates as necessary to be provided by this Colony for that purpose.

### APPENDIX (A-a.)

The sum in question would be about one-eighth part of the whole revenue of the Island, which, when the balance was struck last year, was considerably less than the expenditure. Without, therefore, an increase of taxation, the amount requisite to defray the expense of troops could not be procured.

Such a proposition my Government feel would find no support in the Legislative Assembly, and, therefore, while they would express to your Grace their acknowledgments for the suggestion of measures calculated for the defence and protection of the Colony, they regret that the smallness of its means, and the limited extent to which its resources have been developed, leave them no alternative, but to decline respectfully an offer which, if accepted, would involve them in much embarrassment.
