Any employer knowing him any salary or wages, will thereby expose himself to the same penalties which the defaulter has incurred through failure to register. Any person, knowing him to be unregis-tered, who gives him hoard or lodg-ing, or who sells him transporta-tion, or any conductor, captain, pur-sent other officer, who, knowing him to be unregistered, permits him to proceed upon a journey, will thereby render himself liable to heavy penalties. Canada's export-able surplus of food products can be greatly increased by greater food production: it can be still further increased by strictly limiting the per capita consumption of meat and wheat products."


### Britain's Birth Rate.

Sir Bernard Mailet, the Registrar-General of Births and Deaths, shows that since the war began the popula-tion of the United Kingdom has in-treased by excess of births over deaths to such an extent as to more than counterbalance the whole of the losses of our armies in the field. On the other hand, the civil population of the Central Empires has steadily, and even rapidly, declined since the war began, and he estimates that this loss, added to the loss by deaths in the field, has reduced the total popu-lation of the Central Empires by at thest four millions.—Family Heraid.

Notices to report will have to be sent to each man, and I am satisfied that that list will contain the names of many who have never registered. Every one of those men will be re-examined, for I am satisfied that many men were placed in lower categories than they should have been. But we will first call on the men known to be medically fit. The only claim for exemption will be medical unfitness. "If we can't get enough reinforce-
