**Cordon of Corpses Left by These Six Fighting Scotties**

London, Sept. 21—Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters this morning features the heroic two day stand at Moureves of a corporal and six men of the Highland Light Infantry, mentioned in today's statement of Field Marshall Haig. The incident, he says, is comparable to the fight at Roche's Drift. The gallant Scotties were rather weak and bear-eyed when rescued but were able to respond lustily to the tumultuous cheering of their comrades.

A regular cordon of corpses around their feet told how fiercely assailed they were. They were practically without shelter and were ceaselessly on the alert to prevent the Germans attaining bombing distance. Although they knew they were right in the midst of the foe, they did not despair, and their only concern was as to whether their ammunition would hold out. At any event they determined not to surrender, but when it became impossible to hold their position to try, by sorties, to reach the British outposts.

There are rumors of weddings in the near future get the horns and guns ready boys.

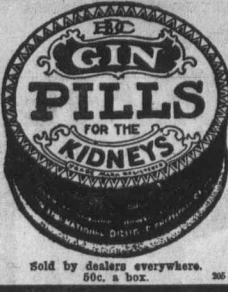

**Water Power Needed for Kentville.**

The purchase by the Town of Kentville of the Electric Light Plant and Franchise of the company operating in Kentville gives to the town a public utility that can be made of supreme importance. A good system of electric lighting is a valuable asset, but if it can be added to that an opportunity for cheap electric power for the running of our industries and an inducement for the establishing of new industries it means prosperity for our town.

The town authorities before taking steps to build a new smoke stack for the present power building carefully inquired into the proposition of making a dam on the Kentville brook about a mile above the Mennie Dam where there is a large flat that would hold sufficient water for town purposes and storage for summer months. The cost of constructing the dam and installing a plant there was considered too high for the town at present to undertake.

Our attention has been called to another site for a dam on the same brook much nearer for distribution of electricity. About thirty rods north or below the present Minnie Dam is a flat the northern mouth of which is the narrowest point between banks. Here the west bank is very steep and at the bottom only about sixty feet wide where it strikes a solid stone bank on the other side. A dam placed there would be very short and could easily be built 45 or 50 feet high holding an immense body of water there and also raising the water the whole length of the Mennie Dam from ten to twenty feet.

This water power proposition is worth a careful inquiry into its feasibility. With the present scarcity and price of coal it behoves any town that has any kind of a proposition for water power that is all feasible to make use of it along with all our other efforts in conservation.

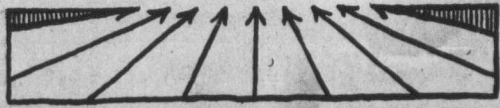

### Glorious News From War Centres.

Bulgaria has made terms of unconditional surrender to the Allies and her territory, railways, coals, ships etc. are at the disposal of the Allies in prosecuting the war. When this great decisive battle on the whole front from Dunkirk to the Swiss border is decided then the end of the war will be well in sight. Those who know of the events that are now transpiring are filled with the hope that even 1918 may see the end of fighting in the present war. The German army though yet strong is being crumbled up before the Allies.

Letter From the Trenches

Kitchener Hospital, Brighton Sussex England. Aug. 30th, 1918

Dear Mother,— As I know you are anxiously waiting for a letter from me, I am taking the pleasure of scribbling a few lines this morning, trusting you are all in the best of health, I am feeling fine myself altho my wounds are not healed yet, but are coming fine. The doctor took me to the operating room day before yesterday got me on the table then took my bandages off, then he says, you just escaped, I rolled off the other side of the table and said "Thank God." My hand will be healed first, but two finger (little and ring finger) will always be a little stiff as one cord is cut, hope I can keep clear of France with it, I believe I can.

I go out to the seaside every afternoon and am getting a little fiesher and getting some color again, I was very pale when I arrived here. I have received no mail from Canada or France since I landed here but there must be a pile some where on the way, I do hope those parcels find me soon as I am longing for a good feed and a good smoke. The last feed I had was on Aug. 8th, when I caught thirteen Germans in a old cellar where their stores were. I took four parcels of their's out of the mail, and you talk of cake, well I had it that day, a lot fresher than what we got from Canada, then I took 150 cigars, I then sent the prisoners back to our lines, and believe me they were glad to go, they were dam well fed up. I didn't kill one that day because they all threw down their arms, but next— and then I got wounded after I was tired shooting. (I fired 145 rounds, and not many misses.) Hoping to hear from you in the near future I will close with love and best of wishes to all, I am as ever your loving son. Billy.

Canada Adopts Allied War Loaf For Household

Ottawa, September 23—Canada, has adopted the Allied war loaf. Twenty per cent of substitutes must be used with wheat flour. Announcing this policy, an official memorandum says;

"The Canada Food Board, after full consideration of the matter, has adopted the policy of the allied food controllers resolution, so far as wheat products are concerned, and will use the allied loaf. This means that twenty per cent of substitutes must be used with wheat flour. The government heartily approves this policy. While the crops in Europe and the United States have been considering everything, excellent, this year and while there is sufficiency of food in sight to meet our requirements for the next twelve months nevertheless there is the greatest need for conservation, particularly in flour and wheat, for the purpose of creating a reserve sufficient against widespread unfavorable harvests or other unfavorable food conditions next year. The government, therefore hopes the people of Canada will heartily and loyally assist to this end by using in their households the amount of substitutes required under the regulations."

Dorien Captured By British

LONDON, September 24—British troops have captured the important town of Dorian, on the southern shore of Lake Doiran, in Macedonia according to dispatches received here today.

American Trawler Sunk Off N. S. Coast

Atlantic Port Sept. 21—The American steam trawler Kingfisher was torpedoed and sunk eighty-five miles off the north Atlantic coast last night. Captain Riley and his crew of twenty-six were rescued and reached shore today.

Her Terrible Deed

Montreal, Sept. 19th.—The disastrous Grey Nursery fire of Feb. 14, last in which sixty five babies were burned to death, was purposely caused by a female orderly of the institution Bertha Courtmanche, who is said to have periodical attacks of fire mania. The woman has been arrested and has confessed to this criminal act.

\$8,182,000,000 War Revenue Bill Passed

Washington, Sept. 20—The house late today passed the War revenue bill, designed to raise by taxation approximately \$8,182,000,000 of the twenty-five or more billion needed by the nation for the current year. The huge measure, the largest of its kind in the history of any nation now goes to the senate.

Passage of the bill was unanimous. A formal roll call, demanded by majority leader Kitchin, recorded 350 yeas and no nays, which announced by Speaker Clark, was greeted by a roar of cheers and applause.

Peace Demonstrations

Amsterdam, Sept 19 Peace demonstrations, organized by the Social Democrats, were held at Essen yesterday and in other towns in Saxony, according to a despatch from Cologne to the Dutch newspapers. Thousands of persons are said to have attended the meeting.

Big Apples

Mr Arthur Marshall, of Clarence, presented the editor Monday with a couple of apples, each measuring 15 inches in circumference. Mr. Marshall has eight barrels of this variety which is known as Wolf Rivers. Monitor.

The equinoctial gale arrived this year on scheduled time throughout the night and morning of the 21st. It did a lot of damage to the apple crop.
