NEW EMPIRE IS OPENEL

N.T.R. IN NEW ONTARIO UNLOCKS THE "CLAY BELT."

Already Busy Little Towns Are In Existence Along the Great Transcontinental Highway Round About Cochrane and For 180 Miles East— The Scenery Is Not Much But the Land Is Real Wheat Soil.

With Government-operated trains on the completed sections of the National Transcontinental Railway east and west of Cochrane, a big slice of the hinterland of Ontario and Que bec will come within the ken of the people of the rest of Canada. The scene-shifters, or in this case the railroad-builders, have long been busy preparing the stage, and now the curtain is about to rise on a new setting in the national drama. On hearing, the annuacement of a through train the announcement of a through train from Winnipeg to Cochrane one is impelled to ask: What of this country beyond the height of land? What of the scenery, the resources, the possibilities of this new empire of the porth?

north?
Roughly speaking, the steel is down for one hundred and eighty miles east of Cochrane, while to the west it is completed to Winnipeg. There are two of them, known re-spectively as the Upper and Lower lakes. Both are comparatively shal-low, with pretty tree-clad shores and numerous islands. Makamik Lake and Robertson Lake, further east, are the only other lakes lying in that dithe only other lakes lying in that direction, while to the west there is practically none at all in the immediate neighborhood of the road.






