TOLSTOI SOFTENED

As the Czar Jollied Him Along About Disarmament

THE COUNT WILL CO-OPERATE.

The Czar's Proposal as Described in a Circular From Count Muraviev Looks Towards the Mitigation of Land and Naval Warfare—The Document Contains Ten Important Points.

London, Jan. 17.—The Daily Mail prints the following despatch from Odessa:

"While journeying north from Livadia, Emperor Nicholas, during a break for luncheon at Toulch (capital of the government of the same name in Southern Russia), sent a messenger to the Count Tolstoy, who was at the railway station.

"Then a conversation commenced, the Czar asking his guest for an opinion upon the Imperial proposal for the limitation of armaments. Count Tolstoy replied that he could only believe in it when His Majesty should see the example to other nations.

"On the Czar mentioning the difficulty of the problem and the necessity for the united aid of the great powers, the Count softened somewhat and expressed the hope that the Emperor would be able to attain some definite results or, at any rate, to formulate some workable plan at the conference.

"The Count, however, said he would be pleased if Tolstoy could be induced to lend his genius to the solution of the question, and the Count rejoined that the Emperor might count upon his cooperation, for he was already engaged upon a work which would soon see the light."

THE EMPEROR'S TEN POINTS

Which He Hopes Will Lead to the Disarmament of the Nations.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 17.—The circular issued by Count Muraviev, Minister of Foreign Affairs regarding the coming meeting of representatives of the European powers, in answer to the Czar's appeal for disarmament, suggests the following points, which would be the basis of the conference:

First—To agree not to increase naval or military forces, and the corresponding budgets for a fixed period.

Second—To endeavor to find means of reducing the forces and budgets in the future.

Third—To interdict the use of any new weapons or explosives more powerful than now made.

Fourth—To restrict the use of the most terrible of existing explosives, and to prohibit the throwing of any projectiles from balloons or similarly.

Fifth—To restrict the employment of submarine torpedoes and similar contrivances.

Sixth—To undertake not to construct vessels with rams.

Seventh—To apply the Geneva Convention in several respects, and to convene a meeting of representatives of the European powers, in answer to the Czar's appeal for disarmament, suggests the following points, which would be the basis of the conference:

Eighth—To neutralize vessels, serving those wrecked in naval battles.

Ninth—To restrict the employment of submarines and other contrivances.
