

No Settlement in Sight in Street Railway Trouble and Strike Likely Friday Morning

Jury Decides That Lloyd Stevens Was Negligent in Case of Little Barrone Girl; Put Under Arrest

He Had Two Girls Driving With Him in the Taxi Cab, Both of Them Being on the Front Seat With Driver—No One in Rear Seat— Witnesses Say Driver Not to Blame.

That said Rosie Baroni came to her death on Monday night about 9.30 p. m., from injuries sustained about 5.50 p. m., on April 26th, 1920, on St. Paul street near Ontario Street in the city of St. Catharines, County of Lincoln, when she was struck by a taxi automobile being driven by Lloyd Stevens. We find that said Stevens did not use sufficient care to avoid the accident.

Coroner Jory's jury composed of P. G. Wilson, foreman, Thomas E. Dudley, Jos. Tracey, Geo. E. Jones, W. H. Dyer, W. H. Drysdale, C. Widdicombe, and A. E. Durham, last night rendered the above verdict.

As a result Stevens was arrested on a charge of criminal negligence and locked up for the night. He appeared in police court this morning and was remanded for further hearing until Friday of next week. He was released on bail of \$2,000 furnished by his employer, Robert Powers and Adam Martin of Thorold, A.

C. Kingstone, appeared for him. The witnesses at the inquest last night were mostly eye witnesses of the sad accident. The little girl was crossing St. Paul street from the south side and ran around a street car right in front of the taxicab driven by Lloyd Stevens.

Two girls, Marion Embury and Roberta Derry were driving with Steven in the taxi, both being in the front seat with him. There was nobody in the rear seat. The girls and others who saw the accident gave it as their opinion that Stevens was not to blame. The taxi was running slowly.

The jury, however, took a different view and rendered the verdict blaming Stevens. Other witnesses examined were Fred Hayes, Frank Peters, Eli Worley, Wesley Austin, Howard Beattie, Samuel Principi, Henry Corney and Oscar Hagar.

When the verdict was rendered Stevens was placed under arrest.

Are Not Opposing Radial Project

Hon. E. C. Drury told the House yesterday that the Government was anxious to co-operate with the province and the Hydro in respect to radials. The matter came up when Z. Mageau, of Sturgeon Falls, drew attention to a despatch to a Toronto paper from Ottawa stating that the Dominion Government would have nothing to do with the Provincial Government or the Hydro in connection with radials.

"It is absolutely wide of the mark," said Mr. Drury after he had looked up the item referred to. "This Government has initiated certain negotiations with the Government at Ottawa in the hope of being able to co-operate upon the radial problem. We have found the Government there not only willing but anxious to enter into negotiations. I believe that before long these negotiations will have beneficial results." (Applause)

M. M. Macbride asked if an opportunity would be given the House to discuss Hydro matters generally and was told that the opportunity would be given when Hydro legislation was brought down.

FIGHT PLAGUE AMONG CATTLE IN CANADA

Tuberculosis among cattle is reported to be greatly on the increase and preparations are being made by stock men for a Dominion-wide educational campaign to help fight the plague. At the conference in Ottawa on May 5 and 6 between representatives of the producers, packers and the Dominion Department of Agriculture, it will likely be recommended that the charge of one-half of one per cent, levied on all animals entering the stockyards be diverted in so far as it affects animals which are not slaughtered, and the proceeds used to combat the tuberculosis among animals.

COMPANY AND MEN HAVE NOT COME TOGETHER AS YET IN CONNECTION WITH GRIEVANCES

PROPOSAL FOR GAS

To the Editor of The Journal:

Sir: Seeing that the city has by the Legislature, been allowed further borrowing power, of which no doubt our rulers will soon avail themselves, it has occurred to me that before they find an outlet for the money, to call attention to the tax payers who eventually must pay the piper, to what appears to me as a prudent outlay.

We are in possession of what should be a valuable asset in the old gas works which I regret to hear is being allowed to go to wreck, with its costly machinery and appliances. Yet disfigure it as we may it is more than within the bounds of possibility that in the near future its product may be found to be our only standby for household fuel. In several reliable papers which I lately read I found it plainly stated that there was every possibility, owing to labor troubles, shortage of supplies, and railway difficulties of coal going to the high price of from \$17.00 to \$20.00 per ton during the ensuing winter, and the likelihood of being hard to get even at that figure.

As a city we may say that the bulk of our cooking is done now by coal or natural gas, for the latter experts have repeatedly warned its users that it may give out at any minute, so that we require little imagination to conceive the dire straits to which even the number depending on it in this small city would find themselves put to if they were suddenly deprived of their supply.

More especially would this be the case if such a calamity occurred during the winter. Yet such is our actual position and to me it appears like madness to ignore it particularly when we have means of avoiding it. I have lately noticed by the papers that many cities are preparing for such an event. In Buffalo I have been informed, a monster new gas works has been constructed, whose supply is largely used for cooking purposes. In Toronto the Consumers Company have made extensive extension in that plant and last week I read from a Hamilton paper that the old artificial gas works there is being enlarged to a capacity which will add about seven million cubic feet daily to its output.

I might also mention other places in Canada and the United States. From the Hamilton report I noticed that they intend to manufacture what is known as water gas which it appears can be supplied cheaper than the old time article made from soft coal. It is now extensively used in the United States giving all the required results for household uses.

It has been stated that our service pipes are worn out. This may be the case in some spots but when repairs were made several years ago although leaks were found the metal in general was sound. At all events leaks should be looked for and the number of dead ends throughout the city carefully examined. In any event if the city undertakes to revive the works let a competent overseer be found, for with our previous experiments I think the consensus of public opinion was that the management was not efficient, thereby allowed the creation of a deficiency.

Superintendent Oliver Offers to Submit Questions at Issue to a Disinterested and Com- petent Board—Claims Men Had No Right to Strike Under Lemieux Act.

The question now is whether the N. S. & T. men will strike or not tomorrow morning and tie-up the system. No settlement has been reached with regards the grievances of the men and according to present arrangement they are to strike at 4 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Today E. W. Oliver, general superintendent of the N. S. & T. handed out the following statement: "In connection with the statement handed to the Press yesterday, the Company's position is that there is a proper procedure for the employees to follow before such drastic action is taken as that proposed by the men, resulting in inconvenience to the travelling public and to the commercial interests of the district. Early in the year a Board of Conciliation was held to fix wages and working conditions and, notwithstanding the fact that a unanimous award was given, the Company did not go beyond the award in an effort to satisfy their employees. The present

dispute is an entirely new one and under the Lemieux Act, the men have no legal right to strike.

Some of the grievances are in regard to wages. A committee have already been informed that if the facts are as stated they are the result of a clerical error and upon confirmation by investigation, will be immediately adjusted. Others relate to certain claims of ex-employees and are being dealt with by our legal department.

The Company is quite willing to submit its case to a disinterested and competent board, feeling as we do that in all fairness, our right to control and maintain proper discipline in our operations will be recognized. The request that the authority of a supervisory officer, recently promoted from the ranks, be removed, is one that cannot be entertained in the absence of evidence of unfair treatment or wrong doing. The men should recognize the benefit of promotion from the ranks and not discourage the practice by these actions."

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., April 29—Members of the national council of women in this city declare they will take steps at their next meeting to fall in line with branches of other cities to pledge themselves from buying potatoes for one month, at an effort to reduce the cost.

Evan E. Fraser, M.P. of this city will be asked to use his influence in the Dominion house of parliament to request the government to prohibit the sale of them in the United States. Thirty-six cars of potatoes which were left in Toronto, it is said were sent over the border for American consumption.

Buyers For U. S. Wholesale Houses Are Buying Up Our Canadian Potatoes Quickly

A potato dealer stated today that buyers for United States wholesale houses were becoming very active in every city where potatoes are to be had. Dealers and wholesalers who have any stocks at all are being approached, and as American interests are said to be willing to pay \$5.50 a bag, in American funds, and by the enclosed lot, there is small prospect of the boycott instituted in various places being very effective.

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TO INVESTIGATE IN RUSSIA

Approval by the Allied Council of the plan gives to the International Labor Mission to Russia a status that will be little less important than that of a diplomatic mission. Britain will send seven delegates, including Miss Margaret Bondfield representing the women workers of the Motherland.

Properly carried out, the tour of the mission ought to settle all doubts and perplexities with regard to the Russian situation. The Allies have not added to their reputation by the methods they have pursued toward Russia, and recent changes of attitude reveal a tendency to make a new start in an effort to resume trade and diplomatic relationships.

Russia may be won to sanity by peaceful intercourse with other nations. She cannot be saved by military or economic wars waged against her people.

NATIONAL PURCHASING BOARD

Appointment by the Dominion Government of a permanent purchasing board—men of proved capacity and unquestioned integrity—ought to save Canada millions of dollars. I would apply to the vast and complicated national buying the same sound, economical, businesslike principle which is part of the policy of every large and successful private business.

There is never greater need for efficient methods than now. The country faces serious financial obligations. The people are experiencing heavy taxation. Their representatives in parliament ought to deem it calculated to save money for the public treasury.

At National Purchasing Board—big enough in every way for its job—inevitably must mean better coordination, increased efficiency, greater economy. Its members will be required to give their whole time to the work. It will purchase only supplies included in departmental estimates and on requisition of the departments.

Against a businesslike policy certain to yield immense return in the saving of public money there can be but one cause for Parliamentary protest. It will result in further curtailment of the party patronage system that still seems to mean so much to those who pride themselves upon being practical politicians.

NEW YORK, April 24—Supreme Court Justice Gavegan today approved articles of incorporation for the "Public Union, Inc." purporting to be "a growing union of middle class people," formed "to benefit in any way those who are not either organized manual laborers or high-salaried executives."

NEGROES SEEN IN THE VICINITY OF MURDER

BUFFALO, April 23—"I had it on my mind and my heart." That was why Tony George, a laborer, could not rest until he had delivered to the proper persons—after four years of silence—the story he told yesterday afternoon on the witness stand; the story that may save John Edward Teiper from the electric chair.

Tells of Meeting Negroes In broken English, earnestly and straightforwardly, this surprise witness for the defense told of meeting in the Orchard Park road on the afternoon of the Teiper tragedy two negroes who looked and acted suspiciously. One of these he described as "big and large."

The most striking thing about this man's testimony, corroborating it it would seem, the defendant's story about the "burly nigger" who committed the murders "he is charged with, is the fact that it was brought voluntarily to the defense only within the past month. And brought because the man's conscience pricked him so much, he said, that he got up out of bed one night to write on a piece of paper the gist of his story.

He had wanted four years ago to tell of seeing two negroes, he said; but did not know how to get his information to the authorities. Besides Tony said, pointing to the defendant, who sat a few feet away from the witness stand, "all the people say he did it," and he thought his story of no consequence for that reason.

Even after his conscience had finally forced him to action nineteen days ago, he told the jury he knew of no other way of making his information public except by paying to have it inserted in a newspaper. Writing the gist of his story on a scrap of paper, he slipped it in the keyhole of a newspaper office, thus starting the information on the way to Roscoe R. Mitchell, associate counsel for the defense, who drew the entire story from the laborer's lips in the court room yesterday.

Scores Heavily Twice Tony George scored twice for the defense—and heavily. That he saw the two negroes who asked him the way to Lackawanna and then ignored his directions and turned toward Orchard Park was point one. The

second was his assertion that he had told Constable William Baker of West Seneca—one of the authorities working on the murder case—of seeing the negroes in the vicinity of the crime. This the defense held up as the most thrilling exhibit in its contention that the authorities ignored all other clues except those pointing to the guilt of the defendant, for no mention has ever been made on the stand by Constable Baker of this incident.

CAILLAUX THE FORMER PREMIER FOUND GUILTY

PARIS, April 23—Joseph Caillaux former premier of France and twice minister of finance, stands convicted of having placed his personal political ambition during the war higher than the interests of the country. Caillaux, while escaping conviction for high treason was found to have been recklessly imprudent and very close to treasonable ambitions for such is the interpretation of the verdict of "guilty of commerce and correspondence with the enemy," which was rendered today against him by the French senate.

Decide to Finish Affair

The senators entered Luxembourg palace this afternoon with the determination to have finished with the affair, which has taken up their time during the past three months. They began the discussion in a vigorous businesslike manner, presenting a strange contrast to their bored attitude during the closing days of the trial. No one, however, took seriously the prediction that the verdict

would be reached this evening. But after the court had disposed of the high treason charge and that of "intelligence with the enemy" and had declared its own sovereignty in less than four hours, word was passed that a decision was impending. The ballots followed one another with great rapidity. The partisans of the former premier were thrilled with joy and hope when the treason charge was so promptly eliminated, and confidently predicted acquittal and began to apportion among themselves the portfolios in the cabinet which Caillaux was expected to form within six months after his release.

REPEATED TRAGEDIES MARK MOTHER'S LIFE

LAUREL, Del., April 23—Mrs. Derrick Morris, whose husband was brutally murdered here and whose son is in jail accused of the crime, has known little except tragedy throughout the fifty-five years of her life. Her oldest son, James, was killed twelve years ago while employed as a railroad brakeman in New York. Charles the next son was drowned while bathing in Lake Erie at Cleveland.

DEER SEASON SHORTENED

Toronto fur dealers, represented by George McNeil, John Hallan, W. R. Sweeney and S. Brazier, protested to the Fish and Game Committee of the Legislature against the present royalty system, because of the extra clerical work entailed. They suggested a new licensing fee graded from the farmer or trapper to the ultimate dealer. They were asked to submit proposals in writing. Despite objections from the C. N. R. and C. P. R. who claimed that shortening of the deer season in the north would injure tourist traffic the committee reduced the open season north of the French and Mattawa Rivers by 15 days, commencing October 15. That the bounty on wolves would be increased from \$20 to \$50 was recommended.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

- 1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

high price will surely turn extra attentions to back-yard gardening this year. Toronto back-yards and vacant lots produced \$100,000 worth of vegetables in the war period. If potatoes were generally grown this season, in the vacant and soil in and about the city, two months' supply might be produced locally. But the gardening fever does not seem to be epidemic, and perhaps the Colorado beetle will find his fodder rather short. During the food shortage back yard gardening was a matter of patriotism but today the food shortage is much greater than it was then. We shall see if back-yard gardening can be made a question of pocket. If potatoes at \$6 a bag are not sufficient motive, then the outlook is hopeless, and the country will have to go on until mounting food prices force partial depopulation of the congested cities and towns, and repopulation of the farms.

POTATO BOYCOTT GAINING GROUND

MANY RECRUITS SWELL RANKS OF THOSE WHO ARE "FASTING"

TORONTO, April 23—The potato situation becomes more interesting each day as more organizations endorse the protest against high prices and agree to restrict their diet for a month, by which time it is hoped, that the familiar tuber will have been reduced to prices more suited to its humble origin and history. Through the enterprise of the Regent, Mrs. W. R. Jackson, the Municipal Chapter of the I.O.D.E., comprising 38 primary chapters with a membership of about 3,000 women, have agreed to the potato fast of one month. The annual meetings of the Women's Liberal Association and the Women's Patriotic League also took favorable action yesterday.

STANDS OR FALLS BY EXCESS PROFITS TAX

LONDON, April 23—Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons today that he intended to stand or fall by his original proposal to increase the excess profits tax to 60 per cent from the present 40 per cent rate. The Chancellor, said, however, that if proposals subsequently were introduced for the taxation of war acquired wealth the extra 20 per cent would be remitted.

NEW YORK, April 23—Five men are under arrest today. Five tons of stolen silk valued at \$218,000 have been recovered and the police believe a band of thieves who have stolen millions of dollars worth of merchandise from freight cars in the last two years has been unearthed. 

WOMEN RIOT TO GET GLIMPSE OF ODELLS ON WAY TO COURT

Confessed Slayer of Wife's Betrayer May Know Fate To-day—Seek Manslaughter Verdict—Tells of Events Preceding Killing.

ROCHESTER, April 23.—James Odell, on trial for the murder of Edward J. Kneip last January at a lonely spot near the Scottsville road to Buffalo, will know his fate probably before another day closes. The prosecution and the defense finished their summing up late yesterday afternoon. This morning Justice Robert F. Thompson will deliver his charge to the jurors and hand them the case for a final decision. Elmer M. Shager and Hampton H. Halsey lawyers for the defense have not waged their fight for the acquittal of the prisoner, but with the idea

that he might be given a verdict of manslaughter, rather than first degree murder. District Attorney Wm. F. Love, however, has insisted that nothing but a verdict of murder in the first degree would be consistent with the evidence as presented.

Interest in the trial of Odell who with his pretty young wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, confessed to the killing of Kneip, reached the apex yesterday, when hundreds of persons the greater number of them women and girls, sought to crush their way into the court house in an effort to catch a glimpse of the prisoners even though they might not gain entrance to the court room. Despite the fact that Justice Thompson cleared the court room of women during the presentation of a portion of the testimony, women spectators were in the majority again today when the prisoners were led into the room.

Father Tells Story
A dramatic scene was enacted when James E. Arnold, stepfather of Odell took the witness stand on behalf of the prisoner, and told of the incident at his home when Odell and his wife brought Kneip there and questioned him regarding Kneip's assault on Pearl Beaver, previous to her marriage to Odell. "I asked Kneip if he had used force on Pearl," said the aged man, who has grown gray and stooped since the beginning of the trouble that has come into his family. "He said he had 'considerable' I got up from the table in the dining room and went out in the kitchen. Jim came out to me a minute later. 'Dad' he said 'What shall I do.' The old man stopped for a mo-

ROCHESTER, April 24—After deliberating for eleven hours and fifty minutes a supreme court jury at 10:25 o'clock last night brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree against James L. Odell, indicted with his wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, for the murder of Edward J. Kneip on the night of January 7. Immediately after the verdict was announced Odell was sentenced by Justice Robert Thompson to die in the week of June 13.

Weighed down by the nervous strain of the trial and her own heroic efforts to save the life of her husband through a sacrifice of her own honor, Mrs. Odell suffered a complete relapse at the Monroe County Jail this morning shortly before the hour set for the opening of the final session of court. A mere slip of a girl physically, her superb carriage through the trying ordeal of the last three days was purely on the strength of her supreme endeavor to do her utmost for the man she loves.

Although the outcome of the present case may have considerable bearing on the trial of Mrs. Odell due to be called for the latter part of May, it is believed that the defense in her case will take such course as will give it a decidedly independent aspect, or present condition is such that an important event is expected before the calling of her case next month, which is expected to have an important bearing on the jury's attitude toward her. In the testimony which she gave in the trial of her husband, she did not go into the details of the actual killing of Kneip, her lawyer asserting his legal right to prevent his client from incriminating herself.

On Monday C. J. Coppen, convicted by Mr. Justice Latchford and a jury of the murder of his wife in North Toronto last fall, will learn his fate. Coppen is under sentence to hang on May 5, and on Monday the First Divisional Court will give judgment on his stated case. Coppen will either hang or will be given a new trial.

Board of Arbitration interested Persons Cause of the Trouble Will Be Abided By

By agreement to submit the question of the grievances of the men to a board of arbitration the N. S. & T. R. strike arranged for this morning was stayed today.

A committee of the men met a committee of the City Council last night by agreement and after the pros and cons had been thoroughly discussed the men's committee agreed to put off the strike until something can be done by an arbitration board.

The City Council met at 7:30 and Mayor Lovelace explained that the meeting had been called to try and avert the threatened strike which would mean tremendous loss and inconvenience to the public.

The aldermen agreed with this and were in a mood to try and settle any trouble before the dramatic action threatened by the men actually occurred.

Ald. Graves, Rose and others thought the council should do everything in reason to prevent the strike.

Score of Officials Death by Red

WASHINGTON, April 30—Plots against the lives of more than a score of federal and state officials have been discovered by the department of justice as part of radical May day demonstrations, Attorney General Palmer announced last night.

The assassinations and assassinations Mr. Palmer said, were included in the May day programme organized by the Communist Labor party and other radical elements and were in addition to strikes and other disturbances intended by the radicals as an effort in behalf of peace with soviet Russia.

State officials marked as victims have been notified by the department the attorney general added, of the information in the hands of the federal government and their co-operation requested repressing radical demonstrations.

The department has information according to the attorney general that the instigators of the May day demonstration here have been working in direct connection and in union with the leader of disturbances so far Europe. As in Europe, attempts are being made to incite strikes in all basic American industries, Mr. Palmer said, although he did not believe they would be successful.

All of the propaganda advocating May-day disturbances repressed, inhuman treatment of the soviet government of Russia by the United States and the Allied Powers, Mr. Palmer continued, in foreign sections of industrial centers, appeals for peace with the main method of stirring up dissatisfaction with the government, Mr. Palmer said. Strife and disorders he added, simply meant to emphasize to American officials, the threats of radicals must be resumed with Russia.

Tons of inflammatory literature have been circulated in the last month by express and freight and are being distributed by local leaders, according to information obtained department agents. The Communist Labor group also has sent numerous personal emissaries into cities where the field was deemed ripe, Mr. Palmer reported.

Some of the literature showed that many radical leaders felt that the conducted against the Communist
