Up to March 1st 757,400 Land Regulations Troops have travelled over Gove

ernment Railways. Thousands arrive each week a Halifax and are sent forward

Since the war began in 1914 up to March 1st, when S.S. Belgic disembarked her returned soldier passengers at Halifax 757, special trains over the Canadian Gosanment Railways.

The first train which carried troops over the Government Railways the year the war was declared was numbered one and all special troop trains to and from Halifax since that time have been numbered consecutively. The last train from the Belgic was on Saturday N
