BOARD OF TRADE.

An Effort to be Made to Establish One in Goderich.

Preliminary Meeting Monday Afternoon and an Adjourned Meeting Wednesday
Evening—A Committee Struck to Draft

Monday last a preliminary meeting, having for its object the establishment of a Board of Trade in Goderich, met in the grand jury room of the court house to take the necessary initiatory steps. There were present, A. McD. Allan, Joseph Williams, John Butler, James Mitchell, R. G. Reynolds, C. A. Nairn, R. S. Williams, D. C. Strachan,

Horton. the objects of the proposed Board, and the appointing of Joseph Williams chairman, and R. G. Reynolds secretary, the meeting adjourned until the follow Wednesday evening in the town hall at 8 o'clock

There was a good attendance of business men at the town hall this evening, Board of Trade for Goderich.

On motion Joseph Williams was called to the chair, and James Mitchell was appointed secretary vice R. G. Reynolds resigned.

The minutes of previous meeting were ead and approved. Mayor Seager concurred in the move-ment, and thought it was a step in the right direction. He believed the citi-zens should aid the council in every way possible, and believed a Board of Trade could take up and deal with many ques-tions that the town council was not at liberty to deal with. Citizens' Committee.

A. McD. Allan favored the establishnent of a regular Board of Trade, with all the strength that the name gave. Its object should be to work unselfishly in

the interest of the town. R. Radcliffe seconded mayor Seager's motion concerning the appointment of Jos. Williams as permanent chairman, Goderich seme ten or twelve years ago, and if the name was right then it surely would be right now. He believed the name Board of Trade would carry more weight than that of Advisory Board.
William Campbell thought the board

should not now be formed, but that an adjournment be had for a week or ten days during which the statute governing the formation of Boards of Trade be examined, and a constitution for the proposed institution be drafted.

Warts on Horses.

A correspondent of an English agricultural journal writes : "Inquiries are made for a cure for warts on horses. nules, or cattle. Many remedies are prescribed-many barbarous and cruel to the animal. I will give you a remedy often tried, and never known to fail. Anoint the wart three times with clean fresh hog's lard, about two days between times. I have had warts on my horses, bleeding warts, of the large size, rattling warts and seed warts, to the number of more than one hundred on one horse's head. I have never been able to find the warts for the third application of the lard. All disappear after the second application. I have sent this prescription to several agricultural papers, hoping they all seem slow to believe myself : but, having a fine young mare with in trying lard on them. When the mare was got up for the third application at once if they are taken immediately there were no warts, and the scars are there now, after more than fifteen years, with very little change. I may say that for cuts, bruises, etc., the application of fresh lard—either for man or beast—is lemon. Put in the sun for five minutes. fresh lard-either for man or beast-is worth more than any patent limit in use. It will remove pain instantly, and does not irritate raw flesh, as all liniments do.

To Bit a Colt.

The true way to bit a colt is not to bit him at all; that is, let him bit himself. When my colts are one year old I begin to teach them to hold the bit in their mouth. 



FEMALE UNDERCLOTHING.

The Latest Foreign Fashions in Chemises, Petticonts, and Nightgowus.

Mme. Julie Swaebe has just returned from Paris with every kind of novelty in the way of dress that the most fastidious bride could desire. Many of the convents here and abroad are working hard to keep the firm supplied, and theresults are perfect chiefs d'æuvres in underlinen, all hand made, of the very best

materials, with exquisite lace, and ar-

ranged in the very latest fashion. The chemises are made with very short sleeves, the necks variously trimmed, some square, some round, with work and lace insertion, through which parrow colored ribbons are ruff, and sufficiently ornamental to serve for dress todieces almost. The drawers are made to match, and are very large in the leg. Valencienness is the leading lace employed, but there is also a new guipure, in which the finest tatting unites the embroidery. Quite the newest idea is alternate squares of lace and work, an inch square. The skill of French fingers is shown by the clever way in which the trimmings on the chemises display the

neck off to the greatest advantage. The nightgowns are no longer simple sarments, but pretty and becoming. One of soft pink, for example, made with a Watteau plait at the back, had a tucked yoke, trimmed with lace, a thick lace frill down the front and round the neck, lace ruffles at the wrist. Some of these Parisian nightgowns have quite shallow yokes, composed entirely of lace insertion, the sleeves to the elbow of stripes of the same, and from elbow to wrist silk tucks alternate with insertion; the lower part on many sleeves are all tucks, while others again have rows of insertion going round the arm. In the white nightgowns much fine veining work is introduced, all made by hand. The oldfashioned frills worn on cur grandfathers' shirts are now adapted to nightgowns, which are a tribute to the skill of modern needlewomen.

The new dress petticoats are made short, a marked improvement, for elaborately trimmed as they are, the trains could hardly be worn many times. They are made often with three-inch wide lace insertion in horizontal rows, and a new kind of lace called point de Paris is employed. Like all the laces used in tingerie, it is of a yellow cream tint, not ecru; it has a wire ground, with large bold flowers. A good deal of imitation and real Mechlin is also used on these petticoats. The trimming on back and front are mostly different; the lace and insertion are placed horizontally in the one and perpendicularly in the other, but frequently divided by narrow tucks. Feather stitching heads most of these tucks, and the edge of the skirt is com-posed of row upon row of lace. Wide ribbon is threaded sometimes through the insertion, and sometimes the petti-coat itself is made of spotted muslin indeed, all and every one of these elab orate skirts would serve as dresses with a fashionable tea jacket or matinee.
