"NOT WITHIN THE MEMORY—"

The stories of climatic hardship in the West during the past season have produced at least one good thing—

the memory of the oldest old-timer, who has been a season of such prolonged and severe cold.

Yet Edmonton and the surrounding district suffered practically not at all.

There was coal in abundance, and fuel in plenty for the cooking.

There was no cessation in the usual round of tea or receptions, and on the coldest nights women in evening dress walked considerable distances with ordinary evening wraps, and frequently without them.

They did not take cold either.

These were no suffering for want of fuel in the poorest homes, such as we know of every winter in the east.

Yet the very exaggerated reports that have gone out from newspaper men (of a sort) have created an impression of severe weather that it will take much explaining and denying to dispel.

That tragic story of frozen settlers at Estevan, has turned out to be the most unfounded canard. The winter has been equally severe in comparison in many parts of America.

There is a well-known rumor a mother and five children being frozen to death in New Brunswick.

And Europe has not been without its tragedies due to cold weather, as Lloyd's Weekly in its "summing-up" writes.

In Berlin last month, at least 32 persons were frozen to death.

The railway car-drivers were relieved of each journey, owing to the demands made on their endurance by driving in the teeth of the bitter east wind. Numbers of people fell dead in the streets of Paris from cold, and at all the hospitals in that city, hot soup was distributed twice a day to all comers. Sentinels have been frozen at their posts in Austria. Schools and theatres were closed at Trieste. Even the Danube was frozen over, and the Bosphorus and the Black sea were practically closed to navigation.

What the British Islands suffered from the annual cold wave the daily despatches this winter showed us. Alderman White of Calgary returned recently from an eastern tour, and in an interview with the Calgary Albertan, the alderman pointed out, the evil of this cold famine, as he gave the press on the other side a grand opportunity to knock. The coal shortage had been general all over. In Guelph, one was lucky to get even five hundred pounds at a time, and in Walkerville the hotels were practically closed to navigation.

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The Land for the Settler

The settlement of the West has been the problem of Canada for a generation.

Since the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway revealed the extent and abundance of the resources of the western land this problem has become the Canadian people's and the Canadian Government's.

For a decade this problem was worse than ignored by a policy which favored the western resources while it strangled the opportunity for western settlement and development.

Ten years ago this policy of "conserving" the land in unoccupied use came to an end and the Federal Government took up with courage and resolution the policy of peopling the west with those who were willing and able to bring the resources into use.

Ordinarily the settlement policy involves the simple question of giving the land to the settler on conditions that he cultivate it, and of persuading the settler to accept the offer.

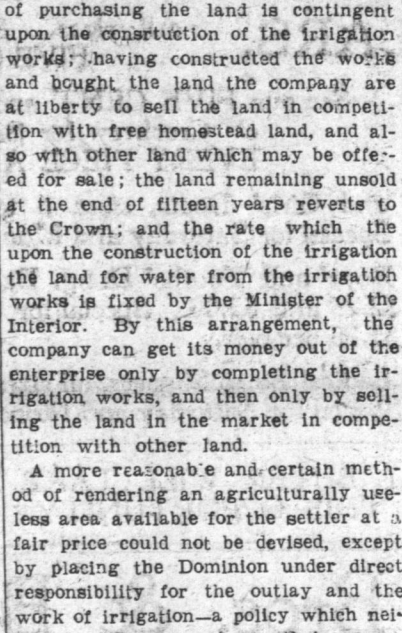
An ever more important exception is the case of semi-arid lands, which are fit for agricultural purposes only when irrigated and upon which in some instances settlers will not locate.

For twenty years it has been traversed by the Crow's Nest line of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

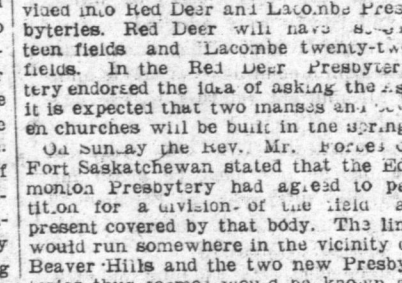

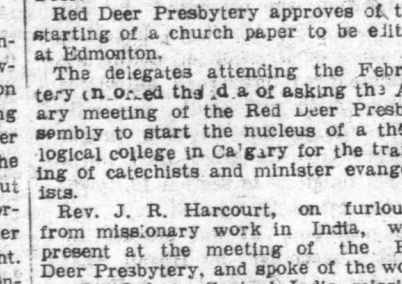

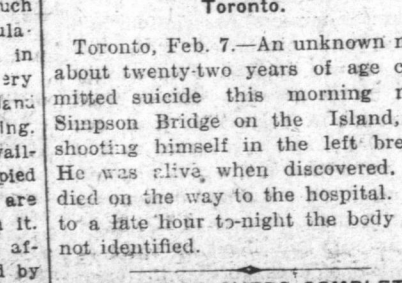

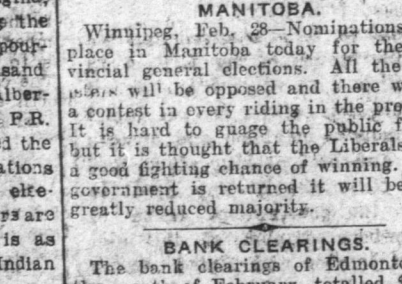
