> Toronto, Feb. 17-A special to the Telegram from Washington, says: The explanation of the Bennet bill, calling for the annexation of Canada, seems to be this, when Champ Clark humorously declared for the reciprocity bill as a means of annexing Canada, he showed the stand-pat Republicans how they could have beaten the Taft agreement. Clark's declaration so scared the reci-procity Republicans from President Taft downward, that the stand-patter awoke to a realization that a powerful weapon had lain ready to their hands. It was too late. But when Taft, Knox and company began to raise their hands, palms outwards, and solemnly assure the world that nothing had been further from their thoughts than annexation, the opportunity came back. Annexation could be made an issue, and Bennet has proceeded to make it one. The bill will in all probability get no further than its present stage.

### RAISES PRICE OF CANADA'S WHEAT

THIS IS EFFECT OF TARIFF AGREEMENT SAYS MASTER OF GRANGE.

Concord, N.H., Feb. 17-In support of his contention that the proposed reciprocity agreement will reduce the price of American wheat and increase the price of Canadian wheat, former Governor Nahum J. Bachelder, master of the National Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, today issued a statement in which he compared the wheat movement in the markets of Chicago and Winnipeg as an answer to recent

Mr. Bachelder's statement says: 'James J. Hill is not satisfied with the \$100,000,000 he has made out of the farmers of the north-west states but is seeking to increase his fortune by having his railroads haul Canadian wheat and flour to the consumers in

"Speaking at Chicago the day before yesterday, Mr. Hill charged that the Opposition to the Canadian reciprocity scheme was dictated by demagogues and was centred on the claim that the free admission of Canadian wheat and barley would reduce the price of these products in this country. That such would be the effect he declared, is not merely improbable but ridiculous and impossible."

Mr. Bachelder declares that there has been a "fall of about eight cents per bushel in the price of wheat sirce the reciprocity bill was introduced in Congress," and continues. "It the mere expectation of reciproof the pending bill?"

"While the price of our wheat has fallen, that of Canadian wheat as shown in Winnipeg, has not fallen to the same extent owing to the expectations of the Canadian wheat growers did.
