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



The conference of leaders of the Government and the Opposition, which had been considering a possible compromise the question of the House of Lords held four sessions this week and has now reached the crux of its deliber ations. Not a word of the proceed ings has been allowed to transpir officially, but it is possible to give the general scope of the great changes contemplated.

It is by no means certain, perhaps not even probable, that an agreement will be reached, but the leaders of both parties have made a genuine ef fort to reach a non-partisan solution of the grave questions involved.

Imperial Federation.

The basis of the sweeping changes inder discussion is Earl Grey's federtion scheme of the Empire, which he outlined during his visit to London This provides for local home rule for reland. Scotland. England and Vales. The Imperial Parliament is consist of a House of Commons of 00 members and a Senate of the ame number. The Commons will omprise approximately twenty-five twenty-five Scotch, twelve Velsh and 138 English members. The enate will include 100 of the presnt Lords.

Leaders Represented.

The colonies will be represented by ix senators on approximate populaon basis. This, of course, is only ie sceheme in the rough, for there re many considerations which would odify it. It may be said in general rms that the scheme is immensely opular in Ireland, Scotland, and lales. This explains Redmond's reent volte face after years spent in ncompromising deunnciation chemes of devolution. There is also rong opposition among certain asses, for example, the property olders of Scotalnd, who argue that local legislature would be intensely adical and that property there ould be in greater danger than ever

- Party Situation Critical.

It is impossible to say what proress has been made by the confer nce, but it has been admitted that ie situation thereanent is now critial. Lloyd George and other members the Government have postponed neir partisan speeches, which were ooked for next week, until a resolu on has been reached.

Failure to agree would be followed the announcement of a rival cheme for the reform of the Lords nd an early election by the country a compromise is reached, the weeping changes involved must in ny event be submitted to the people at the election would be postpone ntil there had been an opportunity or a thorough canvass of the great ssue. It is believed that the confernce will finish its work one way of nother within a week.







Yesterday afternoon and night all kinds of rumors were set affoat as wharf in a boat. A brother of the deceased and their relatives heard it and were proceeding to the pier when met by a Telegram reporter, who assured them of the falsity of the rumor. John Grace, who joined the ship in New York, was a son of Mr. Rd Grace, formerly Road Inspector, who resides on King's Road. He has wife, four brothers and a sister living in New York, and another sister Mrs. Stephen J. White, resides in this city. It was ascertained yesterday that all the crew were Newfoundlanders, as the men Bentley and Hutchings, who joined her in New York, were also natives of St. John's. Last week four residents of Mobile, on the Southern Shore, who were at Bell Island, wrote their friends saying that they had intended leaving there and would go to Sydney in the Regulus. It is feared that these four joined the ill-fated ship and were lost in her. Frederick Cook, who was registered n the ship's articles, took the surname of his stepbrother. His real name was Frederick Conway, and his father, who was a blacksmith by trade, was well and favorably known to the people of the East End, as is also his mother. John Knight, a brother of Ml. Knight, the second engineer of the Regulus, was washed off the jibboom of the Golden Hind while bound from this port to Macieo after she was eight days out. This occurred 5 years ago, and the loss of the other son in the Regulus is a terrible

The Trial of **Ethel Le Neve**

Ethel Clara Le Neve was placed on trial to-day as an accessory after the fact in the murder of Cora Belle Crippen, of whose death her husband, Dr Hawley H. Crippen, has been convict ed and sentenced to death on the gallows on Nov. 8th. As upon the occasion of the physician's trial, the court room was crowded with members of the legal profession and as many others as could secure places by right or influence. If Crippen had any well-wishers they kept in the background during his trial, while there is a noticeable sentiment of sympathy for the girl, who for love of a man twice her age had sacrificed her reputation, deserted home and friends and remained true to him even when their association made her liable as an accessory to a brutal murder. Miss Le Neve was represent ed by counsel who took advantage o every technicality of the law. Accord ing to the prosecution, her relation to the crime as an accessory began very soon after the death of Mrs Crippen, who was murdered on the night of Feb. 1st and her dismember ed body buried in the cellar of the Crippen home on the night of the following day. As Miss Le Neve sat in the prisoner's dock to-day she was a pathetic figure. She is 25 years old. of medium build, light brown hair, grey eyes, and excellent teeth. Her face is pretty and she is trim. She wore good clothes becomingly, was naturally buoyant and affable. day she was attired in the same neat blue suit which she wore at the preliminary hearing in the police court. She entered the dock between two wardens and remained standing during the few minutes occupied by the swearing of the Jury. Miss Le Neve was an object for keen scrutiny on the part of the women who composed the majority of the spectators. In reply to the formal charge of being an accessory after the fact of the murder of Belle Elmore, the girl pleaded not guilty in a voice that was scarcely audible.
