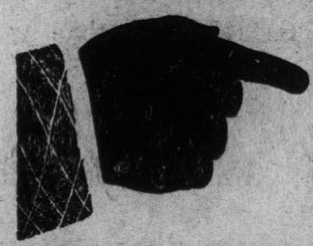

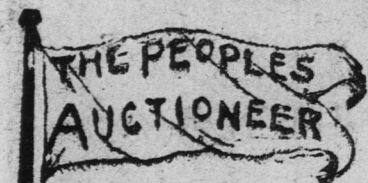

A sense of value and proportion is something a great many people seem to lack. I have a neighbor who is a good woman and a better housekeeper. She is spending the very heart out of herself to eke out her husband's small salary. She has two children. On goodness knows how little a week, she supplies her family of four with good food, decent clothes, and an immaculate home. She is known as the best housekeeper in the neighborhood. Now the oldest of this woman's two children is a boy of 16, an intelligent, energetic, live wire of a boy, the kind who amounts to something if his energy is properly utilized, and makes trouble for everybody concerned if it isn't. This boy recently became deeply interested in photography. Some one gave him a second-hand camera, and he invested some of the money he earned in materials, converted the bathroom into a dark room, and began fusing around with all the paraphernalia of amateur photography.

Now if you ever had an amateur photographer in your bathroom you know what that means—the blankets dragged from the bed and hung over the bathroom window, films and partly dried prints scattered over everything, a pie-plate filled with developer in the bath-tub, a saucer of hypo on the floor, and a batch of films being washed in the bowl. The best housekeeper in the neighborhood stood it twice, then she put her foot down. She said she was working herself to death trying to make a good home

for her family, and she couldn't keep things decent with her son messing round like that. That ended the photography.

The last time I saw that boy he was loitering on a street corner with three very questionable looking companions.

That illustrates what I mean by a lack of a sense of proportion. That woman thought that a house always in order was a beautiful thing. So it is, but there are other things more beautiful and more important. She didn't realize that. I'm afraid she will some time.

Again, a little girl from the country was visiting her city cousin and was asked to a theatre-party. She positively could not afford to buy long gloves, and wore her short ones although her dress had elbow sleeves. She took the gloves off as soon as she entered the theatre and devotedly hoped that no one would notice. But her city cousin spied her and was horrified. "My dear," she protested, "no one takes their gloves off in the theatre." Now that woman knew that it was good thing to conform to social custom. She lost sight of the fact that the higher courtesy which will not hurt another's feelings is infinitely more important.

In a certain summer home a wonderful view is lost to the living room because there is no window in the north corner. I asked the man who built it why that was and he said it would have spoiled the symmetry of the house to put a window there. Think of letting symmetry weigh against the opportunity to look half across the ocean.

I wonder wherein you and I lack a sense of proportion. "Oh wad some power the giffle gie us!"

Homeric Race.

Two Battalions in a Seven Miles Cross Country.—1,200 Competitors.—Colonels and Recruits as Fellow Athletes.

Tiffin Mulvaney will doubtless rejoice to learn that an Irish regiment won a race yesterday in the following remarkable circumstances.

The Munster Fusiliers, who were third in the recent Aldershot cross-country contest, thought they were a better battalion over a distance than the winners, the Hampshire, and the latter promptly challenged them to a race, every man to take part. Consequently, with the exception of the sick, the guards, and the men on duty, both battalions turned out at the Queen's Parade in running kit recently. Over 1,200 from the colonels to the last-jointed recruit took part. The conditions were that all who reached the winning-post within twelve minutes of the first man home should count one point. The distance was seven miles.

A good start was made, and the first man home was private Barry (Munsters). At the end of twelve minutes 297 of the Munsters had passed the post to 194 of the Hampshire, the Munsters thus winning by 103 points. With the exception of about a score, all completed the course. The Hampshire presented the Munsters with a handsome silver cup to

commemorate the event, and the officers are to entertain their victors to a dinner.

Tragedy at Bull Fight.

Wounded Animal Frees Himself From Dart and Kills Spectator.

Valence, France, May 2.—An infuriated fighting bull in the bull ring here yesterday shook its head so violently in trying to rid itself of the steel-tipped darts with which the banderilleros had pierced its shoulders and neck, that one of the darts was torn out of the flesh and hurled among the spectators in the amphitheatre. It penetrated the heart of a young man, who was instantly killed.

A moment later the matador killed the bull, and the body of the young man was carried out at the same time as the carcass of the bull was dragged from the arena.

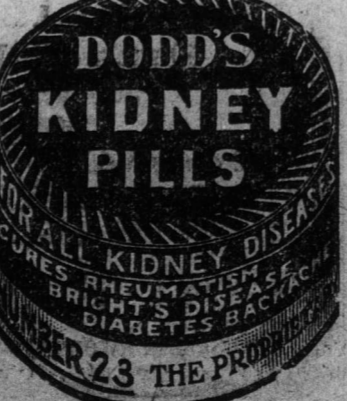

Guysboro, N.S., May 7.—A serious attempt was made to rob the Royal Bank here last night. The front door was forced and the front of the vault blown out with a heavy charge of dynamite, wrecking it, but the robbers failed to force the inside door, and Mr. Howard, the manager, reported the contents of the vault were intact. Efforts are being made to locate any suspicious strangers seen about, but as yet no clue has been obtained. It is stated that for the last three days a report has been circulated that the robbers were expected but the bank reports say that they received no warning.

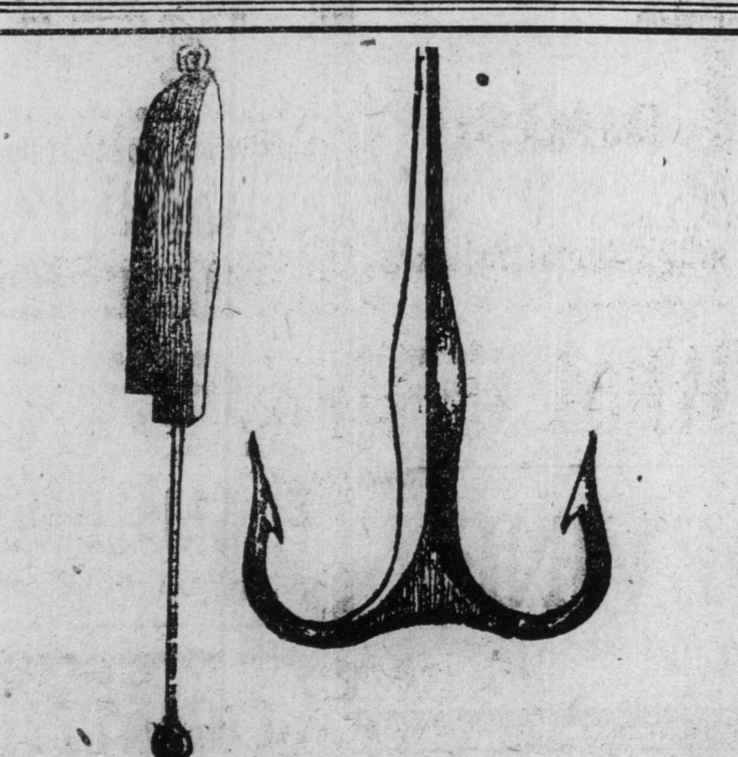

A beautiful gown is fashioned of sapphire blue charmeuse with an over drape of China blue chiffon. The upper part of the bodice and long, close-fitting sleeves are of the chiffon and the lower part of the charmeuse embroidered with silly of a pale tone. Over the swathed underskirt of charmeuse is draped a pannier effect of the chiffon. The fullness is confined to the waist-line with a belt of the charmeuse with embroidered mesh ends. A charmingly picturesque frock for a little girl is made with a Gretchen bicolor jacket of coche-deroche crepe over a guimpe of white voll embroidered with flowers of color to match the bolero, the sleeves of which are finished at the elbow with a frill of lace. A skirt of white voile falls full beneath the bolero.

A very new and attractive trimming for the sleeve is leather; on a half-length sleeve of striped flaked voile in red and white. The cuff carries out the white and red colors. The edges of the cuff are curved and on the outer line is held together by straps and buckles of leather.

A very youthful hat is of the blue straw-trimmed souchet braid. These hats are being worn by tiny Parisiennes for school, the dainty bonnets being reserved for more dressy wear.

A pretty notion in using tulle as a collar to silk and crepon corsages is a turn-down tulle collar of tulle bordered with a narrow piping of the crepon or charmeuse composing the gown.

Beige crepon is very much used for the lingerie blouse. It is effectively embroidered with a large flower design in cerise. Pleatings of black tulle finish the sleeves, collar and front.

A striking hat is of black Napolitan straw, with two American beauty roses with stems thorn-laden attached to the brim, extending upward to the height of ten inches. The newest neckwear is a broad collar fashioned of colored chiffon in brilliant tones of blue, red, or violet, to which are attached revers of lace or embroidered sheer linen.

Notes and Comments.

In one sense, "Clean-Up" day was almost too great a success, citizens with backyards cleared them, and heaped the refuse on the public streets, where it was accumulated in such quantities that the sanitary carts with the little carting help volunteered found the task too great, and as a consequence there are many complaints rife of the heaps of rubbish left on the streets. The shortage in voluntary carting was largely due to the resentment felt by volunteers that persons who could pay for the cartage took advantage of the movement when it was started to get the refuse cleared away on the cheap. It's a pity, but so it is.

The New York Fishing Gazette has the following in its latest issue to hand:

"Commenting on our tariff article last week, a prominent exporter said he didn't anticipate any upsetting of existing export conditions on account of the putting of Nova Scotia fish on the free list, by reason of the difference in cost, as an economical item. But, he said, the free list would likely induce Nova Scotia shippers to undertake to connect up with interior houses in the States, and so defect business from the existing channels. This will be a source of disturbance for a while, until conditions become settled. And more merchants seen this week gave it as their opinion that that is the only effect the new tariff will have—keep the trade unsettled until the new law goes into effect. For this reason all are wishing and hoping to see the new law enacted as speedily as possible, and will heartily applaud all those Congressmen who labor to this end."

Dr. Grenfell, in the letter we publish to-day, declares the most of the men he meets are longing for Confederation, and this meets with his approval. On the other hand most of the men we meet are not longing for Confederation. They dislike, intensely, the idea of becoming a part of the same government as the Dominion, and look upon it as the dreadful result which will likely follow the piling up of the Public Debt on the scale which has been going on the last four years, but only as a last resort after every other expedient has been exhausted.

The New York Fishing Gazette has the following in its last issue:—
"A new method of handling and marketing fish is about to be tried by

the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Co. says the "Wall Street Journal." The steamer Alcona will be equipped with a large cold storage and freezing plant. It will cruise among the ports on the west and south coasts of Newfoundland, where it will secure fish. These are to be frozen on the vessel and shipped from North Sydney. The Newfoundland Government will permit all coal for operating the cold storage to be admitted free of duty while the steamer is in Newfoundland waters. The Alcona is 1,200 tons gross, with 350 horse power. It will have two 26-ton absorption refrigerating machines, with a daily freezing capacity of 40,000 pounds of fish. Over 75,000 pounds of fish can be spread over the freezing coils at one time. Calcium brine will be supplied to 30,000 lineal feet of 1 1/2-inch pipe.

"Too Late to Spare."

"Too late to spare when all is spent" is an old saw, but the Department of the Board of Works seems to disagree with it. The Premier and Government after a 4 years' carnival of squandering have pretty well cleaned out the public chest, and possibly this is what constrained Minister Woodford to refuse to have the bridge in Keen's Valley repaired recently, though Mr. Keen offered to do it for \$6. The Minister's ideas of "economy" are now to be recognized. The bridge being out of repair could not withstand the spring freshets and so was swept completely away. It will take something more than \$6 to replace it, and replaced it must be quickly.

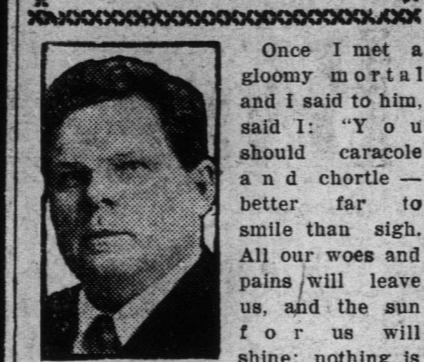

An examination made by Diver Taylor, yesterday, of the s.s. Kastalia, which put into port the previous day, showed that there are a number of plates in the bow of the ship and on the starboard side loosened, caused as the result of contact with ice trying to reach Botwood where she was bound china clay laden. The Kastalia went into dry dock this morning. The extent of damages and the delay to the ship will not be determined until the dock is pumped out and the ship in the stocks about 4 o'clock this afternoon. It is likely the ship will be detained a week.

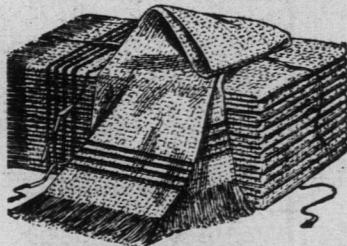

Another Example.

Our exclusive reference to the "carnival of destruction" evident in this city, created much comment and we believe that the resultant consequences will be of benefit to the city and its inhabitants. A Terrible Case.

By the Fogota to-day we get some particulars of the rape case which occurred last week at Musgrave Harbor and which proved fatal to the outraged child, a girl named Laura Abbott, aged 14 years. The man who maltreated the girl, and who is now in jail, is named Baxter Russell, aged 32. On meeting the child in the early night he took her to the house of Benjamin Cull, and after the family had retired remained there with her during the night, and his conduct was of a most revolting and shocking character. The girl tried to hide her condition from her parents, but eventually became so ill that she had to admit all, and expired in less than 24 hours after the awful deed was perpetrated. A post mortem examination was held on the body. Drs. Smythe, Magistrate Cook and the preliminaries and Constable Chafe arrested the perpetrator. Inspector General Sullivan, who came back on the Fogota, has all the necessary information in the case and we hear that Russell will likely be indicted on a charge of wilful murder.

Fogota Back.

The s.s. Fogota, Capt. Baxter Barbour, arrived here after her first trip on the Fogota mail service at 6 a.m. to-day. After leaving here last Thursday night the ship had fog and rain and blustery weather, and met the heavy ice at Cape Fogo Sunday evening last. It was however slack and the ship forced through it, by one not call at Tilton, Joe Batt's Arm or Fogo, these ports being closely packed by a heavy jam. She then went on to Change Islands and on the return forced her way into Fogo. She had a fine run south and sails again at noon to-morrow.

S. S. Norhilda From New York.

The s.s. Norhilda, Captain Cook, arrived this morning from New York, after a passage of five and a half days, bringing a full general cargo to Harvey & Co. This steamer was chartered by the Red Cross Co. to make one trip here to relieve the freight congestion at New York, caused by the Stephano and Florizel being off the route two months. The Norhilda was here last year on a similar mission.

Cable News.

VANCOUVER, To-day.
Within the next few weeks the steamship cruiser Rainbow will commence an active unit on the Pacific Coast between the dates June 12 and 18. It is understood the total ships crew is understood to be 120 active service men will have a vacation in their quarters and the warship will be placed in charge of an officer pending further instructions from the Dominion Government.
HASTINGS, To-day.
A joint demonstration of League Militant Suffragettes held here as a protest against a sale of belongings of those who refuse to pay taxes was broken up by a mob. The women were roughly handled, half smothered with soot and their banners smashed. The police finally succeeded in getting the women into a blacksmith's shop where they held the mob at bay until the arrival of reinforcements. The women were then escorted to the railroad station.

LONDON, To-day.
Militants last evening set fire to the organ of the old parish church of St. Paul, Buckinghamshire, which is because of its association with the founder of Pennsylvania, was of great interest to Americans. Early discovery of flames made it possible to extinguish them before they spread to the church, but the organ was ruined. A paper was found inscribed "Suffragettes." A business like bomb exploded to Henry Curtis, was delivered by a letter carrier at Bow Street Police Court yesterday. The package was marked immediately, but disliking a look of it, the cautious court official took it outside and placed it in a pail of water. When the package was opened it was found to contain a tin tobacco box, bound with wire and filled with gunpowder, shot and cartridge. If it had been struck it would have fired the bomb to explosion contents.

Head Gear Carried Away.

Just before the S. S. Quorilla sailed to-day, with the southerly wind blowing, she fell over amongst a lot of craft moored in the stream near opposite C. F. Bennett & Co.'s and bearing down on the schooner Lakspur carried away her jibboom and bowsprit and did other damage. The schooner's chain got foul of the steamer's propeller and it took some time to clear it.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
CONSTANTINOPLE, May 14.
The British Ambassador to Turkey,
Sir Gerard Augustine Lowther, re-
signed his post to-day, owing to ill-
health.

VIENNA, May 14.
The international force, which is to
occupy Scutari until the new Albanian
Government is established, landed
at Port San Giovanni de Medua
this morning, and were received by
the Albanians.

LONDON, May 14.
The arson squad of militants dur-
ing the night destroyed a large unin-
habited residence near Folkestone
Lighthouse. Post cards, addressed
"Dishonest Prime Minister," etc., were
left lying about. One bore the words
"We hope this is not a poor widow
woman's house."

LONDON, May 14.
Four militants, three women and
Hugh Franklin, who were released
after their hunger strike under the
Cat and Mouse Act, have returned to
prison after the expiration of the
period of grace. Puncturing motor
tires is the latest freak of the mili-
tants. A motorist who was stopped
by a deflated tire, found a nail in it,
and a piece of leather attached, with
the usual inscription.

WASHINGTON, March 14.
Private advices received to-day say
that President Cabrera of Guatemala
has acceded to the demands of the
British Government for the settling of
the outstanding British claims. The
London Foreign Office issued an ul-
timatum to Cabrera giving him until
to-morrow to settle, and a British
warship was on her way to Puerto
Barrios to emphasize the demand.

WHORTON, N.J., May 14.
Dynamite planted in three places
under the tracks of Mount Hope Min-
eral Railroad, exploded in its main
mines yesterday at points less than
a quarter of a mile from the Mount
Hope Mine of the Empire Steel and
Iron Co., where miners have been on
strike for two months. The tracks
were bent and twisted, cross ties were
scattered about and nearly three
hundred feet of railroad blown up.

LONDON, May 14.
Sufragette bombs were found to-
day between the cars of a local train
running between Kingston on the
Thames and London, on the South-
western Railway, making the third
outrage on the same line within three
months. On arrival at Waterloo ter-
minus, the Kingston train was crowd-
ed with passengers on their way to
business. The conductor notices
three parcels in one compartment
which aroused suspicion and inves-
tigating, two were found to contain
two canisters filled with explosive
substances wrapped in suffragette pla-
cards. No explosion occurred. The
bombs were handed over to the po-
lice.

LONDON, May 14.
Owing to the loss of the **Titanic**
and the laying up of the Olympic for
repairs, and because of labor dis-
turbances, the annual dividend of the
Oceanic Steam Navigation Co., own-
ers of the White Star Line, is only
half of that paid last year. In 1911
the dividend was 49 per cent. The
Company paid 30 per cent in March
but owing to the loss of the **Titanic**
and other troubles, no final dividend
was recommended. The Company
wrote off \$540,790 on account of the
Titanic sinking fund, which is de-
scribed as a portion of the loss of the
first cost of the litigation report. The
directors express regret at the re-
tirement of Bruce Lanyon.

LONDON, May 14.
All the Turkish peace delegate
have now arrived, and the Bulgarian
Greek and Serbian representative
will be here within the next two
days. The Montenegrin delegates ar-
rived in Paris. The belief is entertain-
ed that peace will be signed before the
end of the week, though before an-
signatures are appended, it is prob-
able the representatives of the Allies
will meet in conference. The treaty
will not only end the war between
Turkey and the Allies, but will de-
fine the future status of the States in
the near East. Several questions
such as the ultimate disposition to be
made of the Aegean Islands and the
construction of the Albanian fron-
tiers will be left to the Powers to ad-
judicate upon; while internal trou-
bles in the ranks of the Allies, em-
phasized as they are by conflict be-
tween Bulgaria and Greece, will need
straightening out by the parties con-
cerned.

LONDON, May 14.
Striking evidence as to the exten-
sive operations of the suffragette
engaged in the militant campaign
and the bad effect on the women's
cause, through the outrages commit-
ted, were given during to-day's re-
sumed hearing at the Bow Street
Court, of the charges against the
leaders under the Infringement Mal-
icious Damage to Property Act. The
case against General Drummond was
postponed until July, owing to ill-
ness. Testimony was given by the
letter carriers and post office offi-
cials as to damages done the mails by
chemicals and other fluids being
poured into public letter boxes. The
former business manager of the suf-
fragettes gave evidence as to the re-
sponsibility of the various publishers
for different departments of the news-
paper. The witness explained his
services were dispensed with by the
militant society as Mrs. Pankhurst
thought it was better that only wo-
men should conduct the paper. The
witness told of the loss of circula-
tion after their militant acts had been
committed. At first 30,000 were cir-
culated, but the sales were only 17,
000. The circulation then dropped to
7,500, but 3,000 copies were circula-
ted in other ways. Just before last
Christmas he told Mrs. Pankhurst the
circulation was falling off, and that
this was due to the letter box raids.
Mrs. Pankhurst said it was impos-
sible, because when women were most
militant they were most successful.

Beethoven.

Ludwig van Beethoven was a well-known musician who specialized on the piano-forte and could play just as well with one hand as with the other. He was of foreign descent, but most of his music has been translated into the English language and is intelligible to anybody who knows a diminished seventh from a sidewalk.

Beethoven came from a musical family. His father was born with a tenor voice, for which he was not responsible, and which annoyed all who heard it. The elder Beethoven was addicted to liquor and singing of the key, and he never broke himself of either so that the music critics needed it.

Mr. Beethoven kept a piano in his home which he used to pit his voice against several times a day, between drinks, and at the age of four years young Ludwig began to toy with the victrolite scale and coax melody out of the bass clef. At nine years he could play a tune with his right hand and keep time with his left foot, and by the time he was able to reach both pedals at the same time he began to compose that series of masterly sketches which are now sold to the piano-player public at \$5 per roll. He also got up a number of songs which are still sung by vocalists who regret on inserting the Swede into the German language.

The later years of Beethoven's life were saddened by a great calamity. One day, while engaged in drawing plans and specifications for a new opera by lost his hearing. He looked around his studio for it, as it was the only one he had, but he never was able to find it. However, this relieved him from the necessity of listening to pulls who played everything in waltz time and were not handicapped by a sense of rhythm.

Beethoven never composed any rag time music, as it had not broken out in its present eruptive form. What he did write, however, is very durable and can be heard over and over again without causing people to edge uneasily to the rear.

London May 8.—The latest militant suffragette outrage in placing a powerful bomb close to the high altar of St. Paul's Cathedral has so aroused the Church and State that a suggestion to exile all the militant leaders to St. Helena is being discussed seriously. Only by sending them to this isolated island, where Napoleon and the Boer leaders were kept out of harm's way, do prominent members of Parliament believe it possible to prevent untold vandalism and loss of life.

The Bishop of London, speaking in St. Paul's Cathedral last night, invited the congregation to sing the Doxology in thanksgiving that "the Devil's work had miscarried and this had perhaps prevented the sacrifice of many lives." The Doxology was heartily sung.

Lack of Labor During Winter Leaves Many People in Labrador in Chronic State of Destitution --- Additional Source of Income Necessary.

Special to Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—
During the twenty odd years which I have spent in Newfoundland and Labrador, I have become more and more convinced of two facts: First, that for all these northern sections, some additional source of income is necessary to give labor during the winter. The fisheries, even in the best years, and at the high prices ruling this year, leave quite a large number of people in chronic destitution. There can be no use in anonymous letter writers or irresponsible editors denying this fact. People are leaving every year, forced out by their inability to get remunerative work in winter. I have on my list now many names of families clamoring for a chance to get out of British Columbia, or any other place where the fear of the wolf of hunger at the door in the long winters will no longer necessarily overshadow them. We have on our register of medical cases, year after year, records of scurvy, beri-beri, tuberculosis, and marasmus troubles of every kind due to no other reason than poverty of diet. Here add there are richer men. Quite a number of our Treaty Shore people have money invested in Western Canada as well as here—money which they are afraid to invest far off, and yet have no safe local investment in which to put it.

A people's co-operative store, like the Flower's Cove co-operative store, Ltd., which has some thousands of dollars capital, every cent of which is owned by the people themselves, has conferred perhaps its greatest boon on these shareholders by giving them a safe investment, which for many years now has paid ten per cent. regularly. Its success is due to its management, I might truthfully say to its manager. But all I wish to emphasize with regard to it is that it has afforded, as has Red Bay co-operative store to the people on the other side of the Straits, a safe investment, as the trade is on a cash basis. In spite of all this success there remains, however, a large proportion, for whom each year we are asked to create work, or provide charity, as the fishery alone has failed to support them. Moreover the call for an old age pension for all fishermen over a certain age, suggests very strongly that it is not possible for the majority to provide for their own old age—or for their children to support them. I for one, am most absolutely convinced that this is the case, and I draw my conclusions from most carefully kept records, so far as our coast is concerned.

Grants of road money and special grants for wharves are still eagerly sought for and sent without any reference to the most economic way of getting good work, or often any work at all. I have signed many petitions during these twenty years for just such roads and wharves, actuated chiefly by the desire that a paltry few hundred dollars might be distributed in the district, though perfectly conscious how inefficient such a use of money is.

The one essential thing we need now is a good high road connecting our villages. This shall never get unless some intelligent Civil Service methods are adopted.

The second fact of which I am convinced by sad experience is that no ordinary agriculture will ever form the alternate source of income in which the future population of this

coast can depend to provide for them the furnishings of life which "even the labouring classes" are rightly learning to demand. Mere tea, loaf, molasses and tub butter, even if fortified with some salt pork and beef and a cheap ham or two, certainly not a desirable maximum to look forward to for life; and unless sensible, skilled effort, fearless of voters, can be found to put for, in order to develop the resources which I am equally convinced Newfoundland has in her possessions, unpatriotic as it may seem to some, the kindest thing by far to the present generation is to send many of these families to British Columbia and the West where those very capacities with which they are so abundantly endowed, are so greatly needed, and where so many have gone previously, have enormously improved their condition in very short time. As I travelled all through the West last year, I speak from personal acquaintance with uncontrovertible facts.

The answer of many Newfoundlanders will be that there is plenty of work in the mines, at logging, etc. Some men, however, do not like that work, and some men cannot do it. Anyhow it would mean giving up living on this coast, and as our people hear now from Newfoundland and Labrador friends who have already gone West what possibilities there are for them to rise, if once they do move, it will certainly be West. The "patriotic" argument will not and should not keep men who have growing children, and who realize the difference in opportunities, from taking this step to what is only another section of the Empire in any case.

Moreover, most men whom I meet are longing for Confederation, and rightly I think, believing that Canada and Newfoundland should be really part of the same section of the Empire.

We need down here development fostered by capital and specially skilled men. It is ridiculous to resent sending to Timbuctoo if it is necessary, to get the right man. The better fostering of the resources which we have will amply justify the higher pay to a specialist from outside if that is necessary.

Then there must be men to enforce the laws. There are any quantity of good laws, but an utter lack of efficiency in their enforcement and what is more lamentable still, very little fairness. They deter only the weak and the good; the former because he is always the first to be punished, and the latter because he has too much self respect to break them anyhow.

The method of appointing wardens, etc., by political favor and not by an efficient Civil Service has made me blush many times, when outsiders, discovering the farcial work done, have led to think that a matter so serious to our general welfare was simply a joke to make merry at.

Truth is the only real road to progress, and yet experience has taught me that many of our people shrink from publicly expressing opinions which they confess privately that they hold, because of the violence of personal criticism which is so lamentably common in our newspapers; and also they fear the local petty persecution when political favors are being distributed.

No real progress can be made where the man who does the work, whether it be by his hands or his head, does not get a square deal. Efforts to improve his conditions of life are of the utmost importance, but progress cannot be made unless the work is done, and in reality it is as important to the laborer as to the capitalist that it should be accomplished by the most efficient methods, so as to get the best results with the least proportional expenditure.

Thus why have not one single main road down here? Such a thing is often a matter of life and death. Perhaps it is better to be concrete. Ireland's Bight, Lock's Cove, Cape Norman, Griquet, St. Leonard's, Brabant, Goose Cove are all within an hour's drive of St. Anthony. If we had a good main road, properly kept up, Conche, Englee, Canada Head, Rod-

dicton, St. Julien's, and all the Straits Shore to Flower's Cove, could be reached within a few hours if there were a highway connecting them. Men and women suffer and die—and now that we have a telegraph we cannot help knowing it—just for the lack of this main road. This loss will mean ultimate expense to the country in relief.

What is the reason we have no proper road? Not because there has not been enough money given for the purpose, but because of the inefficiency of the Civil Department. Surely it is better economy to pay a qualified road maker to make a road than to divide an annual grant among all hands at one dollar a day, people who have no knowledge of how to go about the work, no pride of results, and not even the tools with which to start.

It is cheaper far to have efficient civil servants make the bridges, wharves and public necessities, than to put upon political representatives the onus of refusing their support to that which an evil heritage has taught them to expect of them. Only yesterday we debated with one of our best friends here his own statement that he showed the depth of ignorance in his neighbourhood, that after the member for our coast gave him forty dollars to rebuild his house which had been burned down, he should go and vote for the candidate on the other side, whom he thought was the better man.

It is of prime importance, both for progress and economy that in a country of such a small population, where the vote of the individual counts for so much more than in a large country, that there should be a strong Civil Service for all Government employees, entrance into which body is gained only by some competition showing the particular merits and qualifications of the men appointed in each special branch. The tenure of office in this body would depend entirely upon merit and efficiency, and as independent of political partisanship as green cheese.

A perusal of our Newfoundland public newspapers would show how the irresponsible position to which the present system leads. I have heard well known Newfoundlanders reel off lists of incompetent political hacks plucked into office; and I have been forced by the facts of my own experience to endorse their criticisms. Our representatives should not be exposed to this. A strong Civil Service would protect them.

My article is too long to add to it now. But apropos of new industries and conservation of resources, the eye of the world is now largely turned to the domestication of wild animals which are of no value to man, and the adaptation of these animals to the environment which exists. Thus, here is a barren headland called St. Anthony Cape. Wild hay sufficient to feed a cow might, with quite unjustifiable expenditure of labour be gathered upon it. Yet on this one thousand reindeer fenced in, and worth anywhere from twenty to fifty dollars a piece, grazed and thrived. This year the same headland can support as many more quite easily.

Over ten years ago we established here a small fox farm, convinced that the domestication of wild animals was no longer an experiment. But through continued discouragements we abandoned the scheme altogether.

We expect this present year to sell \$10,000 of furs. We have already sold over \$3,000, and are expending between two and three thousand dollars on the experiment annually on this coast.

Last spring we were instrumental in inducing a company from the United States to start fox farming in this country on a large scale, and this winter small farms have been established both on the Labrador and one on the French Shore as well. In this respect also my experiences of many years as a Magistrate down here have convinced me that while we have laws made with every good intention, there is no efficient method of enforcing them. General knowledge is not sufficient; expert and well experienced specialists can expect to give us an adequate code and method for dealing with these problems, which, however, are of vital importance. Game laws designed for Avion are really cruel when adapted at once for the Treaty Shore and Labrador; nor are they enforced.

Only last week I met no less than six men going into the country to fetch out deer which they had killed in the fall. But all carried rifles or guns or both. No one can realize the possibilities of three developments without studying such works as the Blue Book of 1913 of the Alaskan Reindeer Department, or the Quebec Government monograph by E. D. Chambers on fur bearing animals, or the account of what the United States Bureau of Fisheries is doing in Alaska in enhancing the fur and fish wealth.

The rapidly diminishing number of seals all along the coast owing to the destruction of young seals in the ice fields is perhaps the most serious menace to progress this coast is experiencing. There is no defence in the whole realm of science which can justify as economically sound the wholesale destruction of mammals at their breeding time—especially such animals as have only one young. Without any question our children will not rise up to bless us for depopulating these seal herds.

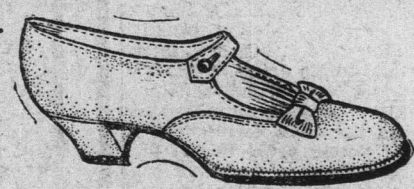
