## The Cinema in Religion and Science.

A series of moving pictures entitled "Creation, from Star Nebula to Perfection" have been shown twice daily at a London theatre. There was no charge for admission, and there was no collection. The film is in four parts, so that it took two days or four attendances to see it in its entirety. It has been compiled by the International Bible Students' Association, and has taken many years to complete; the Holy Land has been visited by cinematograph experts, and many events familiar to Bible readers have been cinematographed on the spot which Scripture authority indicates as the place where they actually occurred. To the Help of the Church. This is one of the latest illustrations of the use of the cinema in religion. The Church has not been slow to realize the powerful and durable teaching properties of the cinema, though in this instance there is a justifiable apprehension that the subject may not be treated with due reverence. The average member of the community fails to comprehend the significance of the new and powerful agency in education," says Carl Holiday in "World's Work." "By means of this silent teacher young and old have learned more about the physical, industrial, and social geography of the world during the past five years than during any previous quarter of a century. "Far more important, however, is

its mission in teaching how to combat disease and death. The animated photograph is an unrivalled vehicle for demonstrating the right way to live. Films are being shown to illustrate the ravages of consumption and the methods by which they can be arrested. A Cambridge investigator has prepared a lengthy ribbon emphasizing the relation of sound teeth to general health and how the teeth may be preserved. "Institutions and organizations have been established to wage campaigns upon subjects of infinite variety by the aid of the cinema. One brings home the diseases propagated and disseminated by the common house fly; another explains the menace of the unhygienic methods attending the distribution of milk; a third illustrates the proper way to rear the baby. "The medical profession is awake to the possibilities of this new means of instruction and illustration. At a recent medical congress the processes of digestion and bone-grafting were thrown upon the screen. Serial radiographs of the stomach showing all the stages of digestion were revealed to another gathering of surgeons. "One neurological professor uses twenty-five thousand feet of cinema film in teaching and illustrating nervous and mental diseases. By means of the Elnthoven galvanometer a photographic record of the pulsation and sounds of the heart may be obtained, so that the doctor has a continuous record of the fluctuations in every progress of his patient. War News

Messages Received Before Noon To-Day.

BRITISH TROOPS FOUGHT SPLENDIDLY.

LONDON, To-day. The Premier announced in the House of Commons, that Sir John French had reported that he was yesterday engaged against superior German forces. The British troops fought splendidly and French considered prospects in the impending battle satisfactory.

LARGE FORCE OF BRITISH MARINES AT OSTEND.

NEW YORK, To-day. A cable from London, published in the Sun, says England has stripped the reserve ships of the North Sea fleet of marines to aid in fighting in Belgium, because of alarm over the danger of airship raids to which England would be exposed should Germany establish a permanent base in Ostend.

GENERAL JOFFRE'S TRIBUTE TO BRITISH VALOR.

LONDON, To-day. General Joffre in a telegram to Sir John French says the British army did not hesitate but threw its whole strength against the forces which had a great numerical superiority.

BRITISH MARINES IN CHARGE.

LONDON, This Afternoon. British marines in force are now in control of Ostend, says a despatch from there to the Times. They continued landing all day yesterday.

SUNK AUSTRIAN DESTROYER.

LONDON, This Afternoon. A British destroyer sank an Austrian destroyer off Corfu after a ten minutes' fight.

THE BRITISH HOLD ON PREMIER'S STATEMENT.

LONDON, This Afternoon. The Premier's announcement is as follows: "We have heard from Sir

John French that in the fighting which took place between this army and the enemy, and which appears from the French official reports to have been in the neighbourhood of Cambrai and Leateau, our troops were exposed to the attack of five German army corps and two divisions of cavalry reserve corps and a second cavalry division.

STORIES OF THE FIGHT.

LONDON, This Afternoon. The Rouen correspondent of the Daily Mail describes the arrival of wounded there and gives their stories of the fight. He says the appearance of the wounded was terrible but not harrowing.

LOSSES GREAT.

LONDON, this afternoon. The Premier announced in the Commons today, that British troops in Wednesday's fighting were exposed to the attack of five German army corps. The losses on both sides were great.

Olinda From Bahia.

The barq. Olinda, Capt. Courthney, arrived in port at 8 p.m. yesterday after a run of 38 days from Bahia. Boisterous weather was experienced all the way over and on Saturday last when leaving the Gulf stream a severe electrical storm raged for several hours, and caused damage to the ship's canvas.

Yet far from justifying himself he had proved himself to my mind a coward, for it is only a coward that is ready to snatch at any weapon rather than stand up and acknowledge a defeat, who will use a sneer for an argument.

### Household Notes

It is a good idea to keep a piece of sand paper over the sink to clean pots and pans with.

# NATIONAL TRIBUTE TO the BELGIANS FROM THE HOME OF LIBERTY.

## Warm Commendations by Prime Minister Asquith, Mr. Bonar Law, and Mr. John Redmond.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, To-day.

In the House of Commons this afternoon, Mr. Asquith, Prime Minister, rose amid cheers and moved the following resolution: "That a humble address be presented to His Majesty praying him to convey to His Majesty the King of the Belgians the sympathy and admiration with which this House regards the heroic resistance offered by his army and people to the wanton invasion of his territory and the assurance of the determination of this country to support in every way the efforts of Belgium to vindicate his own independence by the public law of Europe." Continuing, Asquith said, "Very few words are needed to commend to the House the terms of this address. The war which is now shaking its foundations the whole European system originated in a quarrel with which this country had no direct concern. We strove with all our might, as every one now knows, (cheers) to prevent its outbreak, and when that was no longer possible to limit its area. It is important that it should be clearly understood when it was and why it was we intervened. It was only when we were confronted with the choice between keeping our solemn obligations in discharge of a binding trust, or shameless subservience to naked force that we threw away the scabbard. We do not regret our decision. The issue was one which, no great self-respecting nation, certainly none bred and nurtured like ourselves in this ancient home of liberty, could without undying shame have declined. We were bound by obligations plain and paramount to assert and maintain the threatened independence of the small and useful state. Belgium had no interest of her own to serve, (cheers), except the one supreme and overriding interest, every state great or little, which is worthy of the name, the preservation of her integrity and her national life. History tells us that the duty of asserting and maintaining that great principle which is after all the well-spring of civilization has again and again at most critical periods in the past fallen

upon States of relatively small area and population, but of great courage and resource as Athens, Sparta and the Swiss cantons, and not less gloriously three centuries ago on the Netherlands. Never I venture to say has the duty been more clearly and bravely acknowledged and heroically discharged than during the last two weeks by the Belgian King and the Belgian people. They have faced without flinching, almost incalculable odds, the horrors of European devastation and outrage. They have stubbornly withstood and successfully arrested an inrush, wave after wave, of gigantic and overwhelming force in defence of Liege (loud cheers). In the annals of liberty, the Belgians have won for themselves immortal glory which belongs to people who prefer freedom to ease, security and even life itself. We are all proud of their alliance and of their friendship. We salute them with respect and honor. We are with them, heart and soul, because by their side and in their company we are defending at the same time two great causes, the independence of small States and the sanctity of international obligations. We assure them to-day in the name of this United Kingdom and of the whole Empire that they can count on our whole-hearted and unflinching support. Law, seconding Premier Asquith's motion said: "His motion will command the warmest approval not only of the Commons but of the nations engaged in this struggle which was not sought by them and which neither their wisdom nor their forbearance could have averted. The Belgian army has offered resistance against overwhelming odds which has been as conspicuous as heroic and which has moved the admiration of the whole world." John Redmond, on behalf of the Nationalists, said he associated himself with all that had been said by Prime Minister and Mr. Law. Continuing, he declared: "In no quarter of the world has the heroism of the Belgian people excited more genuine enthusiasm and admiration than it has within the borders of Ireland." The resolution was agreed to unanimously amid cheering.

War News.

Messages Received During the Night.

FRENCH CONFIDENT. Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, Aug. 27. No official communication concerning the progress of the war has been issued this morning.

BRITISH SOLDIERS STAND. LONDON, Aug. 27. British soldiers in the battle in Belgium were unbeaten, when the general situation necessitated General Joffre's order of retirement all along the line.

GERMAN CRUISER LOST. BERLIN, via Amsterdam and London, Aug. 27. The German Admiralty have issued the following: "The light cruiser Magdeburg ran ashore in a fog on the island of Odensburg, in the Gulf of Finland. Owing to thick weather, the other German warships were not able to render assistance, and all efforts to float the vessel having failed, the captain decided to sacrifice his ship as a superior Russian naval force was preparing to attack. Under heavy fire from the Russian fleet the majority of the cruiser's crew were saved by the German torpedo boats. Seventeen men were killed and 25 wounded; 85, including the captain, are missing. The Magdeburg was blown up. The survivors reached Germany to-day."

RUSSIAN VICTORIES. PARIS, Aug. 27. An official statement by the War Office, this afternoon, says: "The German troops have retired to the region of Marnes. The Russian Government announces victory after victory. The Russian advance is unretarded in that country, which presents difficulties, and the outlet of which was occupied yesterday. It is confirmed that 100 cannon were taken from the enemy."

GERMAN PALATIAL LINER SUNK BY BRITISH CRUISER. LONDON, Aug. 27. The Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse has been sunk off the West Coast of Africa by the British cruiser High Flyer.

The German cruiser Magdeburg, which was lost in the Gulf of Finland, is a sister ship of the Breslau, which escaped into the Dardanelles. She was built in 1911. Her tonnage is 4,500 and she carries twelve 4.1 guns.
