New York Post: A careful reading of Sir Eric Geddes' speech of a fortnight ago on the submarine and shipping problem will supply more than one hint as to the measures which have contributed to the notable velopment of the convoy system to an extent hitherto unsuspected. In September no less than 90 per cent. of all essels sailing in the Atlantic trade were convoyed. Since the establishment of the convoy system the loss or vessels so guarded through the war zone has been one-half of one per cent., or one ship lost out of 200 on the water under naval protection. On this point the British First Lord acknowledged "the valuable contribution made by the United States Nay since their destroyers joined us under the command of Vice-Admiral Sims." Theoretically, the convoy system was open to two objections. In the first place, a convoy of ships offered a rich target to any daring U-boat

ers. And, as a matter of fact, such April. feats by German submarines have been reported, but obviously not with sufficient frequency to count in the total. 


