Parcels for Mld. Forces Overseas.

(1) Parcels must not exceed 11 lbs. in weight.

(2) Parcels addressed to members of the Newfoundland Forces Overseas should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcels may be delivered or forwarded if it should prove impossible to deliver the first. The original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and Customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the BACK of the parcel.

(3) If a second address is not furnished at the time of posting, and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for distribution.

(4) Parcels containing articles of a personal nature or of special value will be returned, if a request for their return in case of non-delivery is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.

(5) This plan is being adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, which states that the present procedure of holding undeliverable parcels at the Dead Letter Office until instructions are received as to their disposal is resulting in the waste of a large quantity of perishable foodstuffs, which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels addressed to soldiers.

Her happiness before everything, even before his life itself. If that

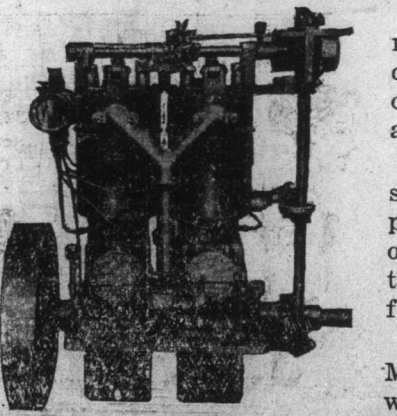

GERMAN ATTACK REPULSED.
LONDON, Nov. 30.
Strong forces of Germans attacked the British on a wide front in Cambrai sector this morning but were repulsed after heavy fighting in which the attackers sustained great losses according to an official statement tonight. Fighting continued.

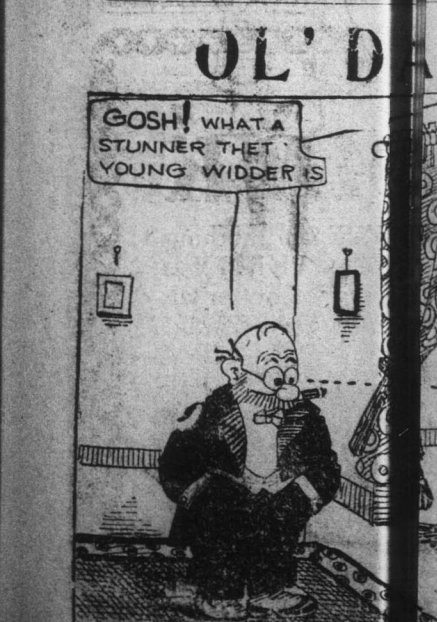

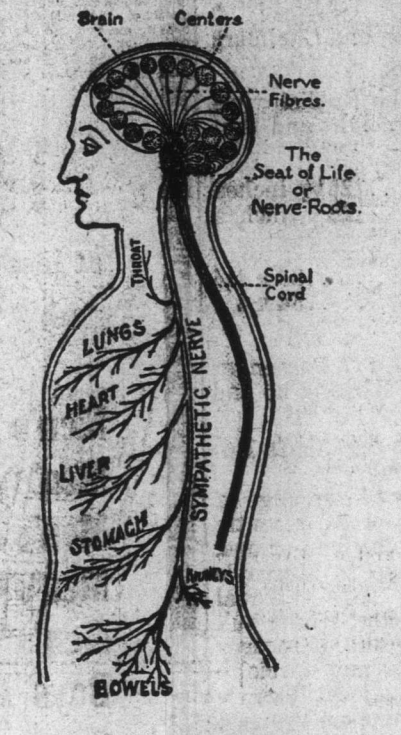

world, semi-official despatches from Rome to-day say are now being practised by the Austro-German invaders of Italy. Near Zenson, despatches say, the invaders placed Italian women and children before the troops as they advanced, and Italian soldiers were compelled to sacrifice their innocent countrymen. In the Friuli region war taxes were requisitioned and conscription of labor is being practised as in Belgium and Northern France. Austro-German prisoners tell of Italian non-combatants massacred by troops, and loot from Italian homes and shops has been found on the bodies of dead troops. Soldiers of the Plave say they hear screams of women and children from the opposite side of the river. The invading armies have taken away cattle and other property, and burn household furniture for their bivouac fires at night. Besian troops, the despatches say, have committed unnamable atrocities.

AFTER LANDSDOWNE.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—At a representative meeting of the Conservative and Unionist party, attended by Sir Edward Carson, Hon. Walter Hume Long and delegates from every part of the country, Right Hon. A. Bonar Law strongly repudiated the Marquis of Lansdowne's letter, which he is stated to have described as a "disaster." He pointed out that Lord Lansdowne only spoke for himself. This pronouncement was received with approval and was regarded as constituting the party's definite disapproval of the letter.

NEWSPAPER CRITICISM.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
The Marquis of Lansdowne's letter giving peace suggestions, holds first place in the editorial columns of the London morning newspapers, but with the exception of the radical Daily News, which approves it, and the moderate Daily Telegraph, which endorses it in part, it is denounced. Lansdowne's great reputation and

past services to the country are recognized by hostile critics, who, however, fear these add to the mischief which they believe the letter will cause by misleading foreign opinion into the belief that the views expressed represent an important section of the nation. Such belief, they declare would utterly be mistaken, and some of them insist that Lord Lansdowne is speaking solely for himself, while others assert that he has placed the prestige of a great name at the services of the pacifists. Insistence is general that he could not have chosen a worse time to launch the letter than when Germany is dickering a peace with the Leninites, the Allied Conference in Paris, and enemy agents trying to induce the Italian army to abandon the fight. Appeals to American ideals contained in the speeches of President Wilson occur in virtually all editorials. The Daily News draws encouragement from the President's words, while the Times, an opponent of Lord Lansdowne, which says it had been offered and refused to print the letter because it did not believe it represented any responsible phase of British opinion fears that it will have a deplorable effect abroad. The Times declares that Lansdowne could not have taken a step better calculated to hearten Germany or to prolong the war. It says his arguments are weak and illogical and that the whole letter is extraordinarily foolish and mischievous. The Daily Mail heads its editorial with the words, "The White Flag," and concludes it with a denunciatory comment, declaring Lansdowne is alone in his surrender.

SECRET TREATY PUBLISHED.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
A secret treaty between Great Britain, France, Russia and Italy has been given out by the Bolshevik Government, according to a Petrograd despatch to the Daily Mail. It comprises the terms on which Italy entered the war. Great Britain, France and Russia, according to the published text, agree to Italy annexing the

Trentino, the Southern Tyrol, Istria, Dalmatia, certain islands of the Grecian Archipelago and territory in Asia Minor and Africa. Article 15 of the treaty is reported to read as follows: France, Great Britain and Russia take upon themselves to support Italy in her disallowing of representatives of the Holy See to take any diplomatic steps for the conclusion of peace or regarding matters pertaining to the present war.

TAKEN QUIETLY.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.
The Marquis of Lansdowne's remarkable peace programme published in this morning's news despatches from London has attracted the widest attention among officials and diplomats but brought out no expressions of any sort for publication. The attitude of the Government was not indicated at all and among the diplomats there was great reticence as to which of them might take the lead in speaking. The impression seemed to prevail that somebody probably in London or Paris might make an answer.

BRITISH CASUALTIES.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
British casualties reported during the month of November totalled 120,089, divided as follows: Officers killed or died of wounds, 1,152; men, 24,292. Officers wounded or missing, 3,537; men, 91,108.

WILL MEET TO-MORROW.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
The Russian envoys sent to treat with the Germans, according to a despatch from Petrograd, have telegraphed the Bolshevik leaders that the Russo-German plenipotentiaries

will meet on Sunday at noon at the crossing on the Dvinsk-Vitna railroad, west of the village of the Kukharshky, between the opposing military lines. Thence they will travel by special train to the German headquarters at Brest Litovsk.

WILL TREAT WITH RUSSIA.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 30.
The Austro-Hungarian Government, according to a despatch from Vienna, has sent an official reply, accepting the Russian Government's wireless proposals to enter negotiations for an armistice and general peace treaty.

LENINE'S GOVERNMENT FALLEN.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
The Government of Nikolai Lenine has fallen, according to a Petrograd despatch to the Daily Chronicle, dated Wednesday. It has, however, been succeeded by a coalition cabinet of advanced socialists, in which, however, the Bolsheviks are represented.

GIVING THE ENEMY NO REST.

LONDON, Nov. 30.
(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—Reuter's correspondent at British Headquarters in France wires: "We are improving the strength of our new gains and giving the enemy no rest. There is evidence that enemy troops have been hurried from Russia and even from Italy to try to restore the situation around Cambrai. The weather continues favorable for the troops and transport is able to move fairly easily."

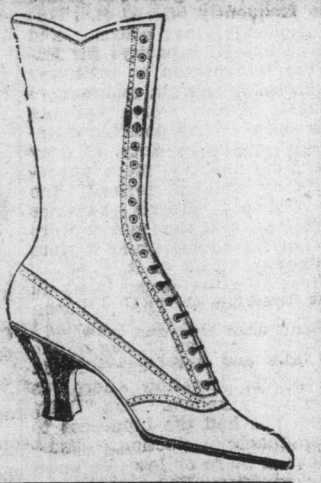

TWO MEN.

If the Lanadown letter had not occupied our entire attention yesterday, we should certainly have devoted part of it to some notice of Sir Edward Morris before the Empire Parliamentary Association, which monopolised the Reuter message. It is plain that the fulness of his heart in his love of dear old England has yet left a little room for remembrance of his native country, for its name is mentioned at least once in the report of the speech. The least we can do, as unworthily representing some small part of that country, is to acknowledge and return the compliment.

Indeed, there is small chance of our forgetting our Premier, even should we be unkindly disposed to do so. It is strange, or perhaps we should say gratifying, to observe how often, when Newfoundland comes in for notice on the other side, Sir Edward Morris is opportunely there to acknowledge it and to receive, in his country's behalf, the generous praise that is so frequently offered it. This is done modestly, of course, and purely in an official capacity: Sir Edward is the last person to take any credit to himself for what others have done. But it is also worth noticing that when there is any possible question of Newfoundland's duty, of duty yet to be done and not mere appreciation of duty well performed, the same Sir Edward Morris becomes strangely silent, as if that matter were somehow not his concern and it were not his place to speak of it.

This latest occasion seems to us an instance of the sort. The luncheon was given, we may say, to Canada and Newfoundland. Now the feeling of the whole of England towards Canada and the present situation there is pretty accurately known. The "Daily Mail" alone has had the business to call the approaching election a disaster, but that is more or less the opinion of the country. But it is recognised that it is a disaster for which Canada is hardly to be blamed, and the wholehearted sympathy of England is with her in the crisis. The Lord Chancellor touched appropriately on the two topics that dominate all others in Canada, military service

and the election. If Mr. Blondin made any reply, it is not reported, but we could wish that Sir Edward Morris had been in the honours to discuss that exactly the same issues hang over this country; that if the Regiment suffers such another blow as that which this audience is being told daily in our papers it must leave its proud and splendid place, and Newfoundland, except for its contribution to the Navy, be out of the war; that the pusillanimous Government, of which he himself scarcely disguises his contempt, sees the disaster approaching and cares nothing for it nor will lift a finger to avert it; that its whole energies are bent on distracting the country throughout its length and breadth by an election for which there is not even the excuse that justifies that in Canada. Was there a word in the whole of his rodomontade about these things? Not one. It was his first duty to speak of them, to tell his audience what Newfoundland is doing, and instead of accepting in silence perfunctory compliments from the country, to show how far she deserved them. What have we instead? A string of dull and clumsy platitudes, time-worn and sickening from the mere effect of repetition, fulsome adulation of Great Britain, like flattery slobbered on a jury by an advocate with a poor cause. It is the language of a sycophant, not a man; of a political Pecksniff, not a statesman. If Newfoundland has the burning love for the motherland which the Premier asserts, he might have explained why Newfoundland does not give better proof of it in going to her assistance. It is sincere enough in one case. There is one Newfoundland at least who makes no secret of his preference for the old country. Sir Edward, out of the profundity of his wisdom, informs his audience that he has been two years longer. During the whole of which time, we presume, he will continue to reside, at this country's expense, in the homeland, sort of ambassador who does not need to be accredited. We wonder how many among his hearers on this occasion were tempted to inquire in their minds how it comes that, at a time which he says is so critical, he himself finds so much leisure away from the post which would seem to need him so desperately.

It is time for an end of this burlesque. If Sir Edward Morris is through with this country, let him say so openly. The country can support the shock of the revelation; the sky will not fall upon it. His mere absence grossly misrepresents the feeling as it does that the country has no serious concern in these grave times, while his utterances make it a laughing-stock. If the people of this country, looking within and seeing the misgovernment and corruption that disgrace it and the worst things that immediately threaten it, have reason to regret their treatment of Sir Robert Bond, the only true leader they ever had, they have even more cause for that feeling on occasions such as this, when they see how they are represented abroad. When Sir Robert Bond pleaded Newfoundland's cause in London or Washington, or stood as a type of its citizens, Newfoundland had no cause to be ashamed. It had then a man who was not afraid to demand its rights nor ashamed to acknowledge its faults. If he had occupied Sir Edward Morris' place on Thursday we should have had an orator of another sort. He would not have given England flattery when she asked for men. But he would have been in St. John's engaged in his manifold duties, not in London attending banquets. But we will not pursue a comparison which is endless.

Rev. T. B. Darby Makes Appeal and Heads List.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Mr. Editor,—Permit me to congratulate you on the fact that amid all the demands upon your time and space for local interests and those of the Empire, you can find a place for such an eloquent plea as yours of Monday last for the suffering peoples living in the birthplace of our Common Christianity.

"The most tragic story in Human History" is the verdict of those who know the woes which these ancient people have suffered during recent months at the hands of the brutal Turk, aided and abetted by the equally brutal Prussian officer. As you point out millions must perish during the winter if help does not come. Four thousand orphan children alone appeal to us to save them. Help can only come from this side the Atlantic. In Canada and the United States an effort is being made to send them help before it is too late. President Wilson has issued an appeal and the American Government has placed one of its huge navy colliers at the disposal of a committee composed of such men as ex-President

Taft, Bishop Green, Cardinal Ireland and others. This committee propose to load this ship with foodstuffs and send her to Belgium at which port they hope she will arrive before their Christmas which is 19 days later than ours. Meanwhile a preliminary subscription for immediate needs is being taken up throughout the United States. Although this collection amounted to \$2,000,000 on the 12th of this month, it will only feed these starving people for 3 or 4 weeks.

As the Allied Governments have decided to supply the needs of Belgium and Serbia, etc., we will not be called upon again for these peoples. No other help can come to these starving people in the Near East save that which comes from the United States, Canada and Newfoundland.

Surely out of our abundance we ought to do something substantial. (I enclose herewith my cheque for \$10.00 as a small beginning and I am authorized by Principal Harrington to say that the Methodist College pupils will be good for at least \$100.00.) I am yours faithfully,

Has F. C. taken these three offices off the hands of his friend Mr. W. J. Ellis? If so I respectfully ask the Government to immediately appoint a Grant Control Board.

THE THERMOSTAT.
The thermostat is something which is attached to a hot-air furnace to prevent it from choking to death at three o'clock in the morning. It is one of humanity's most precious boons when it is not in a low state of health.

For years before the thermostat was invented there was no way of keeping a basement furnace alive during the winter except by sitting up with it at night. Thousands of property owners have tried to escape this ordeal by slipping down into the cellar at midnight with frobbotten ankles and throwing in twelve or fifteen bushels of \$11 coal, only to awaken in the morning with icicles on their mustache and discover that a large, determined climber had throttled the fire pot until it was black in the face. For this reason, most people preferred the coal stove, which had to be filled from the upper deck of a stepladder and was located at the foot of the bed, where it could shed asphyxiating gas upon the inmates.

The thermostat is guaranteed to maintain a temperature of 70 degrees whether there is any coal in the furnace or not, but it works better when fed washed egg at regular intervals. Some thermostats are equipped with a time clock, which can be set for half past six in the morning and will then open the draft with a long, supple, grunt which prevents anybody from going to sleep again until night. When properly regulated, the thermostat will emit this grunt ten or twelve times during the night and slam the furnace door in violent terms, causing everybody in the house to flop over on the pillow with great rapidity. Nothing is thought of this, however, so long as the thermometer is able to sit up and take nourishment.

The thermostat is kept alive by a dry battery which never plays out except in the middle of the night, when every plumber in town is wrapped in slumber and a canton flannel night-

gown. In spite of this defect the thermostat is worth more to the average household than the family medicine chest, for it staves off grip, pneumonia and kindred ailments without presenting a bill for professional services. It is a priceless asset to the man who would rather lie in bed all day than arise and dress in a room which is plastered with hoar frost to the depth of several inches.

WAR NEWS.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

A CALL TO COLONIALS.
LONDON, Nov. 30. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The Globe, dwelling upon the likelihood of the release of large forces from the Russian front for the Western front, and also of the necessity of keeping Italy reinforced, says that if the Dominions understood the extent of the peril, it is not likely that Borden or Hughes would have such trouble about reinforcements from their respective countries. An inconclusive peace, the paper says, means for South Africa the retrocession of conquered territories and renewed intrigues with the natives; for Canada, resumption of the German penetration with ruin or capture of Canadian trade, and for Australia the renewed threat of German stations at New Guinea and Samoa.

A SANE POLICY.
NEW YORK, Nov. 30. An Associated Press despatch from Washington this afternoon says the American Government is shaping what is described as a tolerant policy in dealing with Russia in her present straits, so as to show hope and faith in the ultimate triumph of democracy. It was declared to-day that even should the Bolsheviki conclude an armistice with Germany, there is no present intention to broadly list Russia as an enemy, and that the American Government is at pains to have all the people of Russia know of its attitude. Contracts for the supply of material for Russia, it is said, would go forward as usual in the hope that they would be applied to the cause of world democracy. It was pointed out again, however, that these are under control at all times and can be prevented from falling into hostile hands. In view of the attitude expressed here, it appears that should the Inter-Allied Council at Paris decide to send what has been described as a threatening communication to Russia, the American delegates might not subscribe to it. Of course their action might be finally determined by the nature of the communication, which may be sent. Officials here base their opposition on the promise that while the Bolsheviki faction is working for a separate peace without regard for the opinion of the remainder of the Russians, the great part of the country is not in accord with their aims, and the success of the Bolsheviki is by no means wholly assured. Hope that the Conservative element Bolsheviki, has not been abandoned, and in case of the restoration of Russia, the United States would not wish to be in the position of having taken an attitude against her. The question of the control of shipments, the Government it was announced, would be guided largely by Ambassador Bekkmetoff, who already has disavowed the Bolsheviki, and officials are confident would not recommend the shipping of supplies if they fell into the hands of hostile troops.

ARTILLERY ACTIVE.
Armies of the East.—The artillery was rather active. Towards Doiran in the Cerna bend and to the north of Monastir the French and British batteries successfully carried out destructive firing and caused the explosion of an ammunition depot. In the direction of Monte a strong enemy patrol was repulsed.

CHAMBERLAIN ALSO.
LONDON, To-Day. The letter of Lansdowne continues to be deprecated or frankly denounced in all governmental circles. J. Austen Chamberlain, Secretary for India, in a speech at Northampton last night said that he and his colleagues both in and out of office viewed the letter with unfavourable regard. It was unfortunate and inopportune because at the present moment, when Italy and Roumania were invaded and Russia was waging a revolutionary war, nothing ought to be said or written throwing a doubt on the loyalty of Great Britain to her Allies. Chamberlain also declared that there must be no restrictions of the rights of the belligerents at sea, such as Great Britain had exercised and the United States now was exercising. An interesting point of view of some of the political discussions bearing on the letter is that it points to a possible alternative Government and policy to that of the existing Government.

WIDENING THE BREACH.
PETROGRAD, To-Day. M. Maklakoff, Russian Ambassador to the Saxon Diet, according to a despatch to the Times from Amsterdam, said that Germany must demand a large indemnity without bothering which of her adversaries should pay it, adding "Let them only think of America."

BRAZILIAN AVIATORS FOR THE FRONT.
RIO JANEIRO, To-Day. Brazil is soon to make her first contribution to the fighting forces of the Allies. In response to an invitation from the British Government that Brazilian aviators complete their course of instruction in England, 12 naval aviators will leave here shortly for Europe.

THE PETROGRAD ELECTIONS.
LONDON, To-Day. A despatch from Petrograd to the Daily Mail says that as a result of the elections to the constituent assembly in Petrograd, the Leninists won six seats, the constitutional democrats four, the Social revolutionary extremists two, and the other parties were not represented owing to the smallness of three polls. The correspondence adds that the Social revolutionary extremists are almost indistinguishable from the Leninists. He thinks that the result throughout the country probably will reveal a proportion similar to that in the capital. The despatch says that Siberia is about to declare its independence. Ministers ready have been appointed and are holding sessions in the Governor's Palace at Omsk. Considerable popular sympathy is displayed for the Government and the Siberian flag is flying in many places.

BONAR LAW SQUASHES LANS-DOWNE.

LONDON, To-day. An unauthorized report concerning the Unionist meeting of to-day says: It was attended by 1,500 representatives of Unionist bodies through the country, and resolutions were unanimously carried deploring the publishing of the letter of Lansdowne and declaring firm adherence to the war aims of the Allies as defined by Premier Bonar Law and Asquith. It was decided that the resolutions should be wired to the Premier and Balfour at Paris. A scene of great enthusiasm ensued, the delegates rising and singing the National Anthem. Bonar Law delivered a speech in which he admitted that he never had met anyone more patriotic or disinterested than the Marquis of Lansdowne. "Nevertheless," Bonar Law said, "I disagree absolutely, not only with the arguments but with the whole tone of the letter. I think it is nothing less than a national misfortune that it should have been published now of all times. It is not a desire for peace. It is horrible to look forward to a continuance of the War, but it is a strange assumption that because the Germans declare their readiness for a pact of nations and talk of disarmament, peace is therefore possible. Before the War our Government did not do anything to disarm Germany. They often went near it but the Germans regarded it almost as a casus belli, and before the war would be recommended to Germany. They were prohibited in Germany and I believe they are prohibited to this day. You heard nothing of this kind of thing in the first and in the second years of the war, when things were going well in Germany. If a conclusion of peace were conceivable to-day, it would mean that the very men who in my judgment committed the greatest crimes in history, who plunged the world into anguish and misery, would be left again in power with the same machinery ready to repeat the same thing when the opportunity arose in the future. How can they be bound by a party of nations? Nobody will pretend that they will be bound because they signed a treaty, and what force is to bind them? The whole world is against them to-day, armed and organized in a way that it is not likely they will again be, and if we cannot insist on our rights now, how will we insist on them in a few years hence? No, gentlemen, it is horrible to think of but it is true in my judgment, that we have got to show the Germans that in the only way they can be made to realize it, that war and that military machine cannot get the desired results. It is only by showing the Germans that the war can be ended. Let the Germans realize that we can go on longer than they and the change of feeling in Germany will be stimulated. Much will grow daily and will itself perhaps bring the results we all long to see." Bonar Law intimated that should Lansdowne's letter stimulate the pacifist movement to the point of the Government losing support for the needs of war measures, there would be only one alternative for the Government. He declared that peace on this basis would really be a defeat for Great Britain. "Does anyone really believe that unity in the British Empire could continue the same after such a defeat?" the Chancellor added in conclusion.

ALONE I DID IT!
LONDON, To-Day. Lansdowne was interviewed by the Daily Express concerning his letter, and said: "I should like it known positively that the letter was entirely my own. I consulted nobody about it. An absurd idea has been spread that the suggestion was made by other people. I wish to deny that." Lansdowne declined to discuss the opportunity of the letter or of the possible effect in discouraging the people concerning the purpose and prospects of the war, and added: "I have really nothing to add or to retract and can hardly allow myself to be catibated about it; the subject is necessarily too controversial."

PROTEST BY RUSSIAN EMBASSY.
AMSTERDAM, To-Day. A memorandum expressing indignation at the publication in Petrograd of the letter of Lansdowne was presented to the Dutch Foreign Office on Friday by the Russian Charge d'Affaires here. The memorandum says that the action of the Bolsheviki Government "amounts to a shameful violation of those responsible for the obligations entered into." It adds, "News of the attempt by the Maximilians to conclude a separate armistice with the enemy has been received at the Russian legation here with a feeling of indignation and protest which the healthy elements of all Russia undoubtedly share."
