

Insurgents Surrender Last Stronghold.

One Leader Taken Prisoner by Nationals—
 Post, Telegraph and Telephone Offices
 Destroyed—Steamers Collide in St. Lawrence River.

SACKVILLE ST. AREA CLEANED UP.

DUBLIN, July 5. The remainder of the Irish Republican Insurgents in Sackville Street area surrendered to the National Army force at eight o'clock this evening, the Press Association says. It is learned that Charles Burgess, one of the chief insurgent leaders, was taken prisoner.

LAST STRONGHOLD SURRENDERS.

WASHINGTON, July 5. The last stronghold of the Irish Insurgents in Dublin, surrendered to Free State troops this afternoon, according to a cablegram received by the Irish Diplomatic Mission here.

SIERGE ENDED.

DUBLIN, July 4. The siege of the strongholds of the Insurgent Irish forces virtually ended to-night with the surrender of small groups who had been fighting for the past week being barricaded and the capture of one of the principal leaders, Charles Burgess, former Minister of Defence. But the success of the National cause has been purchased at the cost of blazing buildings and terrible destruction in O'Connell Street, to say nothing of the loss of life and many seriously injured. In the late afternoon, when ten buildings, including three hotels, were aflame, the remainder of the Insurgents driven into Granville Hotel with fires on all sides, still maintained a desperate resistance with automatics and rifles. The final attack by Free State troops commenced

AT MIDDAY WHEN THE REGULARS ADOPTED THE DESPERATE PLAN OF BOMBING THE INSURGENTS OUT. A BOMB WAS HURLED INTO HAMMAN'S HOTEL AND FAINT WHISPERS OF SMOKE CREEPT THROUGH THE SHATTERED WINDOWS AND SUDDENLY A BURST OF FLAME WAS FOLLOWED BY DENSE COLUMNS OF SMOKE. THE FLAMES SPREAD WITH INCREDIBLE SWIFTHOOD. THREE BUILDINGS WERE COMPLETELY DESTROYED, THE RUIN BEING HASTENED THROUGH SIMULTANEOUS EXPLOSIONS OF BOMBS AND AMMUNITION. STILL THE BATTLE RAGED, THE INSURGENTS FIRING GADGETS FROM WINDOWS OF BOTH GRESHAM AND GRANVILLE HOTELS, WHILE NATIONAL RIFEMEN REPLIED VIGOROUSLY FROM POSITIONS OPPOSITE AND FROM ARMOURD CARS. SHORTLY AFTER ONE O'CLOCK AN ARMOURD CAR TOOK POSITION OPPOSITE THE GRESHAM, AND POURED A HURRICANE OF MACHINE GUN FIRE INTO THE HOTEL WINDOWS. SMOKE BELCHED FORTH QUICKLY FOLLOWED BY A MUFFLED EXPLOSION AND TONGUES OF FLAME FROM WINDOWS, AND WITHIN HALF AN HOUR THE FRONT OF THE BUILDING WAS A BURNING FURNACE. EVEN WHILE THE LOWER FLOORS WERE BURNING THE INSURGENTS CONTINUED TO FIRE FROM THE UPPER WINDOWS, BUT AT THREE O'CLOCK THE REMNANT OF THE GARRISON, FIVE MEN, WEARY EYED AND BLACKENED-EMERGED FROM THE BACK OF THE BUILDING UNDER A WHITE FLAG AND SURRENDERED. OTHER INSURGENTS WERE DRIVEN FROM PLACE TO PLACE BY THE FLAMES TOOK UP POSITION IN THE GRANVILLE AND DIRECTED A BRISK FIRE AGAINST THE NATIONALS. in the other. Behind him walked a curious and pitiful procession, between twenty and thirty persons, mostly women. It was explained that they had been living in the Edinburgh a whole week, chiefly taking refuge in the cellars.

ISSUING A CALL TO ARMS.

DUBLIN, July 5. During the past week, the Free State Government received hundreds of applications from young men anxious to assist in the campaign against the Irregulars. However the operations have been conducted entirely by the Regulars, and Volunteers already enrolled with the Irish Republican Army. The statement made to-day, that the Provisional Government had decided to issue a national call to arms tomorrow has been welcomed by citizens who have been seeking to enroll in its force.

REPORTED DE VALERA WOUNDED.

LONDON, July 5. The Daily Mail says it was reported early this evening that Eamon De Valera had been wounded and captured by Irish Free State forces. The paper says the report could not be confirmed.

REPUBLICAN ACTIVITIES IN SLIGO BELFAST, July 5.

Latest reports in Belfast to-day from Sligo said the Republican Insurgents had destroyed all telegraph and telephone instruments in the Post Office and had burned the police and military barracks and coastguard station. At Collooney, in the same county, the Post Office, Public Market, and Court House had been burned, reports said. Two Free State Soldiers were killed there yesterday in a fight with Republicans.

IRREGULARS' STRONGHOLD A-FIRE.

DUBLIN, July 5. Fire which started before noon in the Hammon Hotel, part of the Irregulars' stronghold, soon destroyed the Hibernian Bible Society Building and Tramway offices.

THE CIVIL WAR IN IRELAND.

CORK, July 5. South Ireland is generally quiet though Republicans in some parts, and Govt. garrisons at Broadford and Patrickville have capitulated to the Insurgents after short engagements.

THE INSURGENTS' STORY.

CORK, July 5. A statement issued by Republican headquarters here, says the Republican troops in Dublin are holding vital strategic points and that the positions captured by the National forces in various places in Ireland, had been previously evacuated. It adds that Republicans captured the National Barracks, at Abbey-Leix, Queen's County, yesterday.

HOPE FOR STRIKE SETTLEMENT.

CHICAGO, July 5. Hope for the speedy settlement of the country wide strike of four hundred thousand railway shopmen was seen tonight in statements issued by Ben W. Hooper, Chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board, and D. M. Jewell, leader of the shop crafts, who ordered the walkout. In reply to a letter from Mr. Hooper, which was regarded as conciliatory, Mr. Jewell declared the strikers were willing to consider any negotiations, with anyone in authority for a settlement of the strike.

RAINS HELP CROPS.

WINNIPEG, July 5. Heavy rains in Saskatchewan and Manitoba yesterday helped crop prospects.

REPUBLICAN GERMANY.

BERLIN, July 5. Radical and Socialist Germany joined in public demonstrations yesterday in an effort to impress the Government with the strength of the workers, while the government is adopting its programme for defence of the Republic. Simultaneously with processions and assemblies there was several suspension of work during the afternoon.

COLLISION IN ST. LAWRENCE.

QUEBEC, July 5. The Donaldson Line freighter Orithia, inward bound, is reported sinking in the St. Lawrence, near Fetherpoint, as a result of a collision with the steamer Alredale about midnight. Later—the Orithia's crew all escaped, boarding the Alredale. While in a bad condition, the Orithia has a chance to keep afloat.

VANCOUVER SALMON CATCH.

VICTORIA, July 5. The catch of spring salmon off the West Coast of Vancouver Island will be exceeded only by the 1919 record it is said.

THE DESTRUCTIVE CATERPILLAR.

REGINA, July 5. Fifty square miles of Moose Mountain Reserve have been stripped bare of leaves by caterpillars.

Adverse conditions in the forenoon changed to rather ideal ones later in the day for the various sporting events yesterday which really opened up the track and road events for the season.

had the biggest card on their second annual meet and it was a very creditable program indeed.

The 100 yards had seven competitors of which Tom Butler (A.A.A. champion) struck the tape first in 11.1, being a fifth short of last year's meet.

In the mercantile relay race only two firms entered—Bairds and the White Clothing. It was won by Quick, McNeil and Pike for the former by a comfortable margin.

The football semi-finals were between the Guards' playing the three Quicks, Thistle and Gushue, and the C.L.E.'s five, Snow, Chafe, Rendell, Hennesbury and Burridge. The first period resulted in no score but the Guards' scored a corner of Hennesbury in the second. In this game Referee Hunt enforced the new English rule to the effect that a penalty be awarded should the goalkeeper handle the ball outside of his goal area.

The whip-it race was highly diverting, each competitor being provided with a wheelbarrow carrying a passenger, with a tippy bridge in mid-field to be surmounted. "We always knew that LeDrews express was noted for its promptness and despatch and 'was no surprise to see Bill LeDrew carry off the honors," with Arthur Jenkins a close second.

Grant Burnell had things all his own way in the 3 mile-walk against Moore, Kennedy and O'Neill. At a mile and a half he had lapped his opponents. Moore finished second. Burnell was in great form and romped off the two miles in 16.56% of Steele's A.A.A. time last year for the one mile was 3.28%, and another meet between the two is anxiously looked forward to.

The pole vault saw the defeat of Dick Fraser the A.A.A. champion, by Gordon Haller with a height of 8 ft. 3 ins. Fraser's won the championship last year with 8 ft. 3 ins. and finished second yesterday.

Another A.A.A. title holder was put aside when F. Colfield was defeated by his brother Bill who threw the hammer 84 ft 1 1/2 ins., being 19 ft 1/2 inch more than last year's distance. Tom Morrissey was second, with F. Colfield (A.A.A.C.) third.

Tommy Morrissey (A.A.A.C.) successfully defended his title in the shot put against a large entry list. Although he was 1 ft 2 ins. short of his last year's record of 36 ft 6 in. W. Colfield got second place.

The quarter-mile was the best event on the card and a spectacular

finish brought the crowd to their feet. The two A.A.A. favorites, Fred Phelan (last year's winner) and Tommy Butler were in it and it was conceded it was to be up and back. Gerry Halley threw a fit to their camp however when he got away at the smoke and led the other two a merry chase to the corner flag. For half the distance he maintained his lead when suddenly they both flashed past him. The finish was spectacular. At the last corner Phelan was feeling his oats with Butler two feet behind him. About 5 yards from the tape Butler collapsed but Phelan managed to cross the line with difficulty thus retaining his laurels. 'Twas a pretty race and Halley was a great surprise. The time was 57 secs.

The Cadets (Canning, Flynn, Morris, Madden and Tommy Noseworthy) and Highlanders (Pike, Butler, Hopkins, Duckworth and Sawyer) clashed in the second bout of the semi-finals. The Cadets completely out-matched the Kilites beating them by 2 goals and a corner to 0.

Spurrell, G. Eagan, Kent and Ron Taylor, the Boston A.W. runner, lined up for the half-mile. Starting at an easy clip Eagan led, with Taylor, Kent and Spurrell trailing. At the third round Eagan spurred and won easily by a quarter of a lap with Spurrell second. Time 2.21 1/2 which was 1/4 sec. short of Ray Halley's 2.30 in the A.A.A. meet last year.

SUGAR PRICE ADVANCED.

MONTREAL, July 6. Refined sugar has advanced here another twenty-five cents, to \$7.25 per hundred pounds, making a total advance of \$1.35 since June 1st.

SANGUINARY RIOTING.

BERLIN, July 6. Several disturbances occurred on Tuesday during anti-monarchist demonstrations throughout the Republic. One estate manager was killed. Police were disarmed and three rioters killed. At Madenburg, some castles were looted. At Zwickau, Saxony, a mob gathered outside the police station, and ordered the police to surrender their arms. When the police refused the mob attacked the station. One workman and one policeman were killed and ten workmen and eight policemen were wounded.

DEFENDED POINCARÉ.

PARIS, July 6. M. Viviani, former Premier, stamped the Chamber of Deputies into a wild outburst of approval of Premier Poincaré, when in a debate on the responsibility for the war, he interrupted the reading of newspaper clippings and diplomatic messages, designed to show that Poincaré was responsible, and explained, "If any one was responsible for the war it was I. I was head of the government. I took whatever action was taken, and acted in perfect accord with Poincaré, who was then President."

WANT WHEAT BOARD.

WINNIPEG, Man., July 6. A majority of farmer candidates in the present Manitoba elections favor calling an emergency session of the legislature, without sessional indemnity, which would enable Manitoba to work with Saskatchewan and Alberta in the creation of a wheat board to handle the 1922 crop. President Burnell of the United Farmers, Manitoba announced to-day after a canvass of candidates. Action by provincial legislators is necessary to make the Dominion Act providing for the creation of a wheat board.

Salt Responsible.

We offer no apology for returning to-day to the subject of reddening of codfish. Nothing can conduce more to the improvement in the cure of our staple product than that the opinions of experts and scientists should be carefully considered. It is not enough that the rules of thumb formerly thought quite good enough, should be continued. The foreigner who purchases our fish to-day is different altogether from his ancestor of a hundred or more years ago, who was not over particular in his purchase of food stuffs, whether of the sea or field. Science and hygiene, in the preparation of ailments have made remarkable strides, and where bacteriology was practically unknown to those who lived in past centuries, it is now a common subject upon which juveniles can discourse. With the season's codfishery just opening, as it were, the time is now ripe for the education of all those who are interested and employed in this industry. Old methods must give way to modern ideas and demands. Newfoundland's future depends mainly on her production of codfish. None can deny that from the ocean we derive our wealth. Therefore we must cater to the demands of our customers. If they want good, hard dried, clean and white codfish, we must be prepared to supply it. If we cannot do so, our competitors cut in and take the cream of our trade. It would be supremely foolish to refuse to listen to the advice of science, even in the curing and making of our chief product. And if the quality of salt heretofore used causes discoloration by reddening of fish in salt bulk, then that quality must be abandoned and new supplies sought.

Dr. Browne, of the United States Bureau of Fisheries, who has been conducting exhaustive experiments on the saline cure of fish, makes a report in which he says that all the causative agents of this troublesome and costly coloration of salted fish have been discovered, and that their original source is the solar evaporated sea salt with which the fish are cured. Mined or domestic salt seem to be free of their (bacteriological) presence. Any method devised for eliminating reddening must be based either upon the proper disinfection of the sea salt before it is used, or the substitution of mined or domestic salt, which is free from infection. But in either case a thorough disinfection of salt fish plants and equipment is essential, since at the present time all are highly infected. Dr. Browne here speaks of American plants, but from personal observation of Labrador and Shore fishings stages, we cannot but agree with the premises set forth, for there is no doubt that bacteriological infection is rife in numerous

plants at all the fishing stations. That, however, by the way. Dr. Browne continues by making the statement that it would be useless to dump sterilised salt or even mined salt into a highly infected plant, for it follows that infection must necessarily take place and the result of the use of the mined salt would not be greatly different under such conditions as the employment of sea salt. In the cleansing of stages and fish plants the recommendations of Inspector Biting of the American Bureau of Chemistry made in the year 1910, could be adopted without excessive labor or undue hardship to fishing stage operators: "Floors, splitting tables, washing butts and all apparatus and implements in use should be frequently washed by streams of water under high pressure. Butts should be thoroughly cleaned inside and out, as also should be racks and walls, posts and floors, not less than twice a week in summer, with a spray solution of sulphuric acid in addition to the sluicing. According to these recommendations old methods must give place to new ones, but if in the transition all assists in the improvement of our make and cure, the little extra labor and care will not have been in vain.

Harbor Grace Dock Wrecked.

LOADED VESSEL FELL FROM STOCKS. The Lunenburg schooner Shepherd King, met with an accident on the dock at Harbor Grace yesterday, and as a result damage to the extent of hundreds of dollars has been done and the plant put out of commission for some time. As far as can be learned the vessel fell down whilst on the stocks, stove in her planking and wrecked the dock. The John Grey is being dispatched to the scene to-day to save the vessel.

ST. JOHN'S WEST GETTING ITS SHARE. Everywhere in St. John's West District work is being given by the Government with a lavish hand, possibly with a view to a election. A large number of men are employed on the Waterford Bridge Road. Amongst other work a number of men were engaged draining a piece of bog land just west of Littledale. For this purpose a drain was dug across the road and pipes laid, one-half the work being done at a time in order not to impede traffic. C. C. C. and Boat Club.





And then I came to realize that while I smiled at things, inside, I had kind of got out of the habit of smiling as much as I used to. And since then I have tried to let the smiles come through.

MESSAGE TO BOSTON GLOBE.

The following despatch was sent by the local correspondent of the Associated Press and was printed in the Boston Evening Globe:

ST. JOHN'S, N.F., June 10. — Government and press of Newfoundland express alarm at the heavy emigration of young men from the colony to New England and Canada. This summer, transportation lines report the rush of emigrants is unprecedented.

Practically every settlement in Newfoundland has lost its quota of young men this season, reports received here say. On some occasions, special trains on the Newfoundland Railway have been necessary to accommodate the outbound passenger traffic. Many of the men were bound for Boston.

Newspapers, commenting on the exodus, point to the recent census of Newfoundland, which showed that the population of the colony had remained virtually stationary for a decade.

EASY MARK IN WARFARE.


