Despatches to the Evening Mercury.

BY ATLINTIC CABLE.

London, Dec. 4—A second instalment of the correspondence between the British and American governments, in regard to the Alabama claims, has been laid before the House of Commons by the foreign office. Lord Stanley, in a despatch to Mr Ford, the present Charge D'Affairs at Washington, says that Ecgland will never consent to submit to the arbitration of a foreign power claims involving her right to recognize belligerents. This right, he insists is purely a question of English law. He repeats his offer to submit to arbitration the Alabama claims, and to refer all other demands for indemnity to the decision of a mixed commission.

Paris, Dec. 4th—The Etcadard asserts that all the European powers have now agreed to the general conference proposed by France, except Holland and Belgium. Florence, Dec. 4—The Italian war office has ordered 300,000 Chassepot Riffes. Many arrests for political reasons have recently been made by order of the government in different parts of the kingdom. Vienna, Dec. 4—Count Crive-li, the envoy of Austria to Rome, has notified the Pope that the legislation of the Reichsrath must proceed in its course, even in antagonism to the concordat, should the Holy Father refuse to release the Emperor Francis Joseph from the obligations of a treaty made before he became a constitutional monarch. Baron Yon Beust, in a recent despatch, urges the meeting of the European Conference without a programme, so that each power may be free to act.

London, Dec. 4—A telegram from Bombay gives a rumor that the King of Abyssinia had ordered the English prisoners in his custody to be executed. Rumour needs confirmation.

Paris, Dec. 4th, evening—In the Corps Legislatif to-day the Marquis De Moustler said that the meeting of the general conference, which France had invited, was uncertain. Should the not take place, the government of France would be compelled to exact of Italy a literal observance of the obligations of the September Convention.

New York, Dec. 4—The Tribune says candidates for the Austrian mission may be interested in knowing that Mr Greeley has received official notice of his appointment thereto, and has given due notice that he unconditionally declines the post.

New York, Dec. 4—The Herad's correspondence from Rome, 19th ult., says: What the victorious ecclesiastics and legitimist party aim at just now is nothing more nor less than a dismemberment of Italy, as a scheme openly advocated by their journals both in France and Rome, Upper Italy, from the Alps to the Adriatic, would be assigned to Prince Hubert after the abdication of Victor Emmanuel. Central Italy would revert to the Pope, and Naples, with Sidily, resume their allegiance to Francis II. It remains to be seen whether the Menebrea ministry will be able to detend Italy from this impending stroke.

The Commercial Bank bill was then read a third time, and the House adjourned.

Colonization Roads—The documents laid on the table of the House in relation to the Hudson's Bay question comprise, along with other papers, port from Mr. J. W. Mr. Bridgeland states that on the 4th October, four miles had been completed, and that by the end of October, six miles of the road would be constructed and well turnpiked. The amount of money being \$55,900. A letter from Sir John Michel is included in the corresponence in which he expresses the opinion that the communications to be opened with Red River were necessary from the highest military considerations.
