Reciprocity with the States. It seems that the Dominion Gov-ernment have some hope of being able to make arrangements for the renewal of reciprocal trade between this country and the United States, as the Hon, George Brown leaves today for Washington to take part in negotiations having this end in view. Mr. Brown visited Washington a few weeks ago, and broached the question, and he now returns to enter on more formal negotiations

If we mistake not, the Reciprocity Treaty formerly in force between Canada and the United States termi nated in 1864. An attempt was made the following year to obtain a re-newal of it, but the scheme failed. The Coalition Government formed to bring about Confederation was at that time in office, and through the influence of Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir A. T. Galt, the then Finance Minister, the latter with Mr. Howland were sent to Washington to arrange the terms of reciprocal trade, which would be subject to legislative enactment, and therefore liable to be changed at the will of Congress. The Hon. Mr. Brown, who was then in the Cabrnet, objected to any arrangement on such terms, as it would tend to keep trade in an unsettled state, and render it liable to any changes which the dominant majority in the Legislature might wish to make. So strongly did Mr. Brown feel on the question that he left the Cabinet. Nothing, however, came of the scheme, and the question of reciprocity lay dormant for years, until such time as the Americans would see it to be to their interest to favor a new Treaty. It may be that they now regard the matter in this light; at all events it is worth making an effort to obtain reciprocal trade, if such can be secured on a sound and liberal basis, and without doing injustice to Canada. We are satisfied that the present Government will entertain no scheme which in any way would be unfair to this country, and we are equally sure Mr. Brown will recommend none which Brown will recommend none which in the slightest degree would be hurtful to its interests. He is in every way well qualified to discharge the important duties of his mission. Fully conversant with the terms of the Treaty ratified in the time of Lord Elgin, and also with every phase of the question since that time; equally well informed, too, with regard to all matters affecting our trade and industrial pursuits; he will be fully a match for the American statesmen. We trust that he will have every success in his mission.
