Ontario Legislature.

Nov. 30.

Mr. Clarke presented several petitions in favour of the erection of the new county of Dufferin.

The following Bills were introduced:—
By Mr. Bethune—Respecting compulsory voting.
By Mr. Morat—Respecting the Central Prison.
Mr. Rykert moved for a return of all the fines and fees collected by Mr. A. G. Hill, Police Magistrate at Clinton; together with the names of all persons upon whom fines have been imposed. Carried.

Mr. Crooks moved the concurrence of the House in the item of \$121,000 to defray the expenses of the criminal administration of justice.

Mr. Rykert moved in amendment, "That while the House concurs in the amount asked by the Government for the criminal administration of justice, it takes this opportunity of expressing its regret that the Government has not seen proper to bring in a measure for the payment of criminal witnesses for attendance in Court."

Mr. Bethune moved in amendment to the amendment "That all the words in the amendment after the word 'that' be struck out, and the following substituted:—'This House considers the difficulties surrounding the question of paying criminal witnesses for their attendance at Court a sufficient reason why it has not been made the subject of legislation by the present Government.'"

The House divided, and the amendment to the amendment was carried—Yeas, 32; Nays, 16.

The resolution as amended was then carried.

On the resolution appropriating \$40,340 for Central Prison maintenance, Mr. Boutlee moved an amendment censuring the Government for spending more money than was voted by the Legislature.

Mr. Hodgins moved in amendment to the same line that this House is of opinion that the sum expended by the Government during the present year, beyond the sum voted during last session has been properly applied out of the proper appropriations for that purpose, viz., from the amount appropriated under the head of a loan, and approved.

After a long discussion a division was taken, and the amendment to the amendment was carried—Yeas, 36; Nays, 19.

Mr. Cameron then moved "That the resolution as amended be amended by adding thereto, after the word 'unprovided,' the following:—'But this House regrets that the Government departed from the letter and spirit of the Act relating to public works in not having put the works of the Central Prison up to public competition by public advertisement.'" Lost Yeas, 16; Nays, 35.

The original motion, as amended, was then put and carried.

On the item \$121,810 for immigration, Mr. Cameron moved the amendment censuring the Government for the large expenditure in proportion to the number of immigrants added to our population.

Mr. Hardy moved an amendment to this expressing confidence in the policy of the Government in this matter it was carried—Yeas, 40; Nays, 12.

On the item of \$2,000 for expenses attending the settlement of the Municipal Loan Fund Debt and surplus scheme, two amendments were proposed by the Opposition censuring the Government for the alleged loss to the Province in disposing of the debentures. Both were lost—Yeas 13; Nays 38.

Mr. Cameron, before the motion for concurrence carried, moved an amendment censuring the Government for the way in which some issuers of marriage licenses had been dismissed.

Mr. Hodgins moved in amendment "That in the opinion of this House the appointment by the Lieut.-Governor of issuers of marriage licenses under the Act of last session has been in accordance with constitutional practice, and in the interests of the public service." This was carried. Yeas 34; Nays 11.

In answer to Mr. Cameron, Mr. McKellar said the returns in re-

to the Agricultural College would be given in a day or two.

Mr. Cameron not being in his place when the notice paper was gone over, his notice or motion in regard to the Agricultural College was allowed to stand.

Goldwin Smith.

It is not likely that many of our constituents ever saw Prof. Goldwin Smith face to face, or heard him speak. (He is not a man that impresses one with a sense of his greatness, either seen or heard. He is a good master of English, however, and along with having a most extensive knowledge of contemporaneous and probably a large portion of bygone history, with being also a pronounced liberal in politics, and a Wesleyan Methodist by profession, he is becoming a power in the body politic, as witness his elevation to the presidency of the new-formed National party. Prof. Smith is a man about five feet ten inches in height; of spare build, with a long neck and as many corners in his frame as were in Hawthorn's House of the Seven Gables. He has dark hair, cut close, a dark beard and dark moustache, with clean shaved chin. His features are good, but 't'ne eyes are so hollow or far back that he makes one think he is unhappy, which some sort of historians doubtless are, for there is in the study of our race a very great deal that is not of a cheerful character, or fitted to give one a profound respect for the great man, particularly those that have served to illuminate the high ways of human destiny. Then in his discourse, while Prof. Smith is familiar in his style as a lecturer,—not brilliant but formalistic, and an excellent teacher of what he has for the moment in hand—there seems to be a want of human interest about the man that prevents his carrying you with him. There is too much intellect for the show of every human, or animal element, and by so much a want of consciousness to the argument that he would deduce from historical records. He is a man of fine cultivation, and fair upright character, but with scarcely enough of mere low instinctive selfishness to harmonize sufficiently with the mass, for him ever to become a leader among the active spirits of the age.—Toronto cor. Cornwall Gazette.

EUROPEAN ARMY.—If complete readiness for war is the best means of ensuring the continuance of peace, the tranquility of Europe, remarks the *Pall Mall Gazette*, must have been effectually secured this year, in which large additions have been made to the forces of every European power. The proposed legislation in reference to the German Landsturm will increase the military of Germany to an extent hardly yet realized, though the *Spectator Gazette* estimates the increased force arising from a first call of the Landsturm at 300,000 men. The French army will, beginning from this year, be increased within twelve years to 1,800,000 men, a force supplemented by a Landsturm organization not less extensive than that of Germany. Russia will in the same period master a standing army of 750,000 men, and a reserve of 1,740,000. Austria has made so much progress in the development of her military resources that she could take the field with 500,000 to 600,000 men. Italy could follow with 400,000 men, and Turkey with 200,000 men; while we have 500,000 men to defend our coast, and could contribute from 70,000 to 80,000 men toward the prosecution of a European war.

SUDDEN DEATH IN WINNIPEG.—Mr. James Farquharson died suddenly at the residence of his son-in-law, Dr. Schultz, on Sunday night, 8th ult. It will be remembered that after Dr. Schultz's escape from prison in 1869, Mr. Farquharson was arrested and placed with Wm. Hallett, who was heavily ironed in the room from which Dr. Schultz had escaped. The weather was intensely cold, and the fastenings out through by Dr. Schultz had not been replaced, so that Hallett's arms froze into the desk, creating the cramps which afterwards caused his death, and caused the paralytic strokes, the repetition of which have just caused Mr. Farquharson's death. Deceased was born in Glasgow, Scotland, and lived in Demerara until his going to that Province.

A ROCK DISCOVERED IN MID-OCEAN.
A most singular discovery is reported to have been made by Captain Picoas of the Italian bark *Teressa*, which arrived at Queens-town, Oct. 2, from New York. He claims to have found a rock, rising from fifteen to twenty-five feet above the water in latitude forty degrees north and longitude sixty-two degrees eighteen minutes. It is within a few seconds of the same degree as New York, lies about 550 miles from the coast, and is nearly in the track of the ocean steamer, in which is called the southern passage. The rock is of a reddish brown colour, and about 800 feet long by 40 broad. Captain Picoas thinks this discovery offers a solution of the mysterious loss of the City of Boston, *President*, *Pacific*, *United Kingdom*, and other vessels that have never been heard from after leaving port.
