

Judging from an interview with Mr. Kelley, held in the editorial office of Rod and Gun and Motor Sports in Canada there is no fear of any falling off of interest in work of the society while under the charge of Mr. Kelley. Like most busy men Mr Kelly always finds time to do a little more work. Before he undertook the Provincia l Sccretaryship he was already Secretary for the Yarmouth branch of the organization and Secretary for the Guides' Association of the Province.
