

Typhoid's Source

Wolfville, April 26-The typhoid cases at Acadia seminary are progressing favorably. The source of the infection is still a mystery, as samples of the milk used and water from dairymen's wells, having been tested by the provincial bacteriologist of Halifax, have not revealed the typhoid bacillus. The town water is above suspicion, as it stands the most rigid tests. The acting health officer and board of health, are doing their utmost and more wells outside the town, used by milk dealers, are to be examined and a thorough inspection will be made of all possible sources of contamination.



THE GUERNSEY POPULAR.

Breed Has Won Public Favor by High Class of Product.

The foundation of the Guernsey breed of dairy cattle was laid amid the surroundings of the economical dairy conditions prevalent on the island of Guernsey. The introduction of the Guernsey into this country was induced by a realization of the nigh class of her dairy products, writes W. M. Caldwell in the Breeder's Gazette. First she came into the hands of the private estate owners, who were desirous of the rich and highly natural colored products for their own use. Gradually as this desirable characteristic of the Guernsey was better known she was more sought for. The first real public introduction of

the Guernsey was at the World's fair

in 1803. This and the Pan-American model breed test at Buffalo in 1901 are possibly the best instances of public rating which the products of the dairy breeds have ever had. In the Buffalo tests the Guernsey cows were awarded the prize for net profits in butter fat butter. They not only showed the greatest profit, but also made butter at the least cost per pound and returned the greatest profit for every dollar invested in feed.

To the American Guernsey Cattle club belongs the credit of establishing the first measure of utility of the breed of eattle upon the basis of actual production of butter fat and that for one year's time or a period that shall test the true worth of a dairy cow. During the last six years 1.112 records have been made. These show an average of 8,051.20 pounds of milk, 409.75 pounds of butter fat and 5.121 per cent of butter fat.

Besides the dairy breed test which has been referred to, the latest one in which the public has been interested is that of the great Iowa state dairy cow contest. In this the Guernseys have led. The three cor producing the greatest amount of er fat dur-ing the year were during users. This is but another corrobora on of the ster-ling qualities of the breed.

How to Feed Oilmeal. Oilmeal may be fed to all classes of farm stock. Fattening steers will use to great advantage from two to three pounds of oilmeal daily in connection with other feeds. Feeding oilmeal in the form of nut sized cakes is considered preferable to the loose meat by most of our steer feeders. Dairy cows will consume one or two pounds of oilmeal daily with their grain rations, and during the winter feeding period more or less oilmeal is almost indispensable in order to keep the cows in the best condition for producing milk and butter fat. For growing calves, sheep and hogs oilmeal can constitute about one-tenth of the grain ration fed and prove very beneficial. Horses may be fed small quantities, although its general use for horses is not recommended .- Professor Hum- if he is to top the market. phreys in Wisconsin Bulletin.

Moldy Com Produces Staggers. The Kansas experiment station has just issued a bulletin giving results of experiments to determine the cause of blind staggers in horses. It is not certain which micro-organism present in moldy corn produces the trouble, but it comes from that kind of corn. No matter which one is responsible. we can avoid it by feeding only sound grain to horses and using moldy stuff for less sensitive animals if it is used

Keep Cattle Comfortable. There are many farmers who always shelter their cattle from storm, but there are raw, cold. windy days which harm them as much as storms. Don't let them cringe in pasture corners, clustered together for warmth on such days. Put them in the shed or barn.

****** VALUE OF COW TESTING.

One dairyman produced \$2,000 worth of milk from twenty cows. or \$100 per cow, while a neighbor bestowed twice as much labor on forty cows and sold only \$ \$1.800 worth of milk, or \$45 per cow. barely paying expenses, while the first man made a profit of over \$1,000. Yet the second man said he had no time to spend a few minutes each day weighing and testing the milk from each cow. Instead he spent if four long, weary years in raising and harvesting the crops on a 160 acre farm and feeding and milking forty cows to make as much profit as his neighbor did In one year with half the cows, half the land and half the labor. PROFIT IN BREEDING **GOOD BIG HORSES**

In breeding horses sound parents are necessary for the production of sound offspring. Soundness in one parent should not be trusted to eliminate unsoundness in the other, says the Kansas Farmer. One or both may have beauty of form, and the resultant progeny may likewise be beautiful, but mere beauty is of little value unless associated with soundness and good wearing qualities. That "like produces like" is the well known law in breeding. The use of unsound stal lions and mares in breeding opera tions, whether for the market or fo: farm stock, will produce unsound horses to offer on the market for the small, discriminating prices paid for such animals or with the equally un satisfactory result of raising horses that are hardly worth their keep.

An unsound stallion, no matter how handsome in conformation, how we: he may be bred or how many prizes he may have won, should be overlooked positively by the owner of a good mare. Transmissible diseases in a stailion will develop in the offspring. The stud requisites in the main are sound eyes, hearing and wind. Spavins, sidebones, ringbones, stringhalt, St. Vitus dance (chorea) and contagious diseases must be religiously guarded against. A certificate of soundness signed by a qualified and reputable veterinarian would not be more than a reasonable demand from the breeder. This, however, is but one side of the matter. sound. Among other things, a woruout, maimed, blind, halt or otherwise unsound mare, no matter how good she has been, is not fit for breeding purposes, on the basis that "she is good for nothing else." This policy is

not only absurd, but costly. The draft horse is par excellence the horse for the farmer to raise. Only the blood of the best draft breeds and the heaviest and best boned stallions are suitable. Even then the demand for extreme weights necessitates the use of large mares that are good milkers. In no other way can colts be produced with sufficient bone and feeding quality to attain the size and finish demanded by the markets. Even then, as before stated, the youngsters must be supplied with the best of feed in large amounts from the very first. Only the best blood must be used, and then every effort must be made to keep the horse gaining from the first

Origin of Polled Jerseys. It is said that the first Polled Jersey, Daisy I., was taken as a calf from Lebanon, N. H., to Newark, O. She was the granddaughter of a polled cow, said to have been imported from the island of Jersey by Professor Haddock. United with a horned bull, this cow produced a daughter named Jose, an animal with small horns, which. from a horned Jersey bull, brought forth Daisy. This variety first attracted attention in 1901, when a Polled Jersey. Nubbin Ridge Queen XXXVII. proved at the Pan-American to be the richest milker of the fifty cows of the ten breeds represented .- Country Gen-

Sore Mouth of Cow. Swab the sore mouth and tongue once or twice daily with a solution of half an ounce each of powdered alum and borax in a quart of water. If the tongue is enlarged, hard and showing denuded or stripped places it is actinomycosis of the tongue (wooden tongue), and this is best treated by painting sores with tincture of iodine every other day and giving a dram of lodide of potash in water night and morning for periods of ten days with two weeks' intermission.

Treatment For Cowpox. Wash affected udder twice daily with a solution of half an ounce of hyposulphite soda in a quart of water and apply balsam of Peru to sores as found necessary. Isolate the cow. The disease spreads by means of the milker's hands.

Pasture Makes Cheap Pork. The Iowa experiment station was able to make 750 pounds of gain on hogs from one acre of clover, and it was estimated by the station that by the use of plenty of pasture gains could be made for a little over 3 cents.
