APPOINTMENTS AND TRANSFERS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

New Appointments:

Harry A. Scott, now Commercial Counsellor of the Canadian Embassy at Washington, has been appointed Consul General of Canada at San Francisco. He entered the Trade Commissioner Service of Canada in 1924 and served successively in Liverpool, London, Buenos Aires, Shanghai and in Washington, where he has been Commercial Counsellor from 1941 to the present date. He attended the Imperial Economic Conference, Ottawa, 1932, as adviser to the Tariff Committee, the United Maritime Consultative Conference, Washington, October, 1946, and the International Whaling Conference, Washington, December, 1946, as a member of the Canadian delegation. In 1942 he served as secretary to the Supervisory Board of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, Ottawa, and the R.C.A.F. Council. Mr. Scott was born at Toronto in 1899. During the First World War he served with the Royal Naval Air Service in the United Kingdom in 1917 and with the Royal Canadian Navy in 1918. He graduated in 1922 from Queen's University with the degree of B.A. and a gold medal in economics.

William Garthorne Stark, a former member of the Foreign Trade Service, Department of Trade and Commerce, has been appointed First Secretary of the Canadian Embassy in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. He has been Commercial Secretary at the Canadian Embassy in Lima, Peru, since 1944, joining the Department of Trade and Commerce in 1931. He served in Brussels, London and Rotterdam, and with the opening of the Canadian Legation in The Hague in 1938 was appointed Assistant Commercial Attaché there. Mr. Stark was born in Toronto in 1908 and graduated from the University of Toronto with a Bachelor of Commerce degree in 1929. Before entering government service he worked with several financial houses, including brokerage firms in Toronto and London, England.

Yvon Beaulne has been appointed to the Department of External Affairs as an Information Officer. Formerly he was with the Bureau of Translation, Secretary of State Department. He served overseas during the war as a captain in Les Fusiliers Mont-Royal and in Canadian Army Public Relations as a war correspondent for French-language newspapers in Canada. He was born in Ottawa and holds B.A. and L.Ph. degrees from Ottawa University.

Herb A. Scott, now Commercial Counsellor of the Canadian Embassy at Washington, has been appointed Counsellor General of Canada at San Francisco. He succeeded the late Counsellor Settler in 1934 and served successively in Montreal, London, Paris and Stockholm from 1941 to the present date. He succeeded the late Embassy Counsellor of Ottawa, 1925, as adviser to the Joint Committee, the United Nations Commission on International Trade, 1946, and the International Monetary Conference, 1947, as a member of the Canadian delegation. In 1948 he served as Secretary to the Canadian Delegation to the Paris Conference, and the R.C.A.F. Congress. Mr. Scott was born in 1902. During the later World War he served with the Royal Navy in the United Kingdom in 1917 and with the Royal Canadian Navy in 1918. He graduated from Queen's University with the degree of B.A. and a gold medal in Economics.

William Griffith Stask, a former member of the Toronto Trade Service, Department of Trade and Commerce, has been appointed Vice-President of the Canadian Embassy in Rio de Janeiro. He has been Commercial Secretary at the Canadian Embassy in Lima, Peru, since 1944, joining the Department of Trade and Commerce in 1931. He served in Brazil, London and Rotterdam, and with the Canadian Legation in The Hague in 1938 was appointed Acting Commercial Attaché. Mr. Stask was born in Toronto in 1908 and graduated from the University of Toronto with a Bachelor of Commerce degree in 1933. Before entering Government service he worked with several firms, including the Provincial Film and London, England.
