ECLIPSES OF 1843.

There will be *three* Eclipses this year, two of the Sun, and one of the Moon, in the manner following:—

I. The first will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun, Tuesday, 27th day, conjunction at 2h. 39m. mean time, in the evening or afternoon; invisible here by reason of Moon's south latitude; ☉'s lat. at that time being 17m. 11s. S. descending, or increasing in her south latitude. Central Eclipse on the Meridian, in the North Pacific Ocean, about 17° almost directly south of Cape St. Lucas, at 2h. 42m. of our time.

II. The second will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, Wednesday, Dec. 6th day, and visible here as follows:—

III. The third will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, Thursday, Dec. 21st day, conjunction at 0h. 28m. 46s. mean time, in the morning; therefore invisible here; ☉'s lat. at that time 31m. 18s. N. ascending, or increasing in her north latitude.—Central Eclipse on the Meridian, a little north of *Pulo Lozin*, in the peninsula of Malaya, or Malacca, at 0h. 29m. of our time.

Morning and Evening Stars of 1843.

The Planet *Venus* (♀) will be Morning Star till October 4th; then Evening Star to the end of the year.—*Jupiter* (♃) will be Evening Star till January 25th; then Morning Star till August 15th; then Evening Star to the end of the year.—*Mars* (♂) will be Morning Star till June 6th, then Evening Star to the end of the year.—*Saturn* (♄) will be Evening Star till January 7th; then Morning Star till July 15th; then Evening Star till the end of the year.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Commissioners for Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—John Ward, senr., Robert W. Crookshank, Thomas Barlow, John Ward, junior, Lauchlan Donaldson, W. F. W. Owen, and I. Woodward, Esquires.

Commissioners for Partridge Island and the Beacon Light Houses.—John Ward, senr., and Lauchlan Donaldson, Esquires.

L. Donaldson, Esq., Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick; and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia, which are partly supported by New Brunswick.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about 2 miles S. S. W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed side of the Digby Gut—from Brier Island N. Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. The Lamps and Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 1835, and reflectors furnished, so that this Light is in high order—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles.

Bearings from the Gannet Rock Light House—

- To the Old Proprietor, which dries at $\frac{1}{2}$ ebb; (very dangerous), E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. 7 miles,
- " Black Rock, (always above water 25 feet) off White Head, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
 - " South West Head of Grand Manan, N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.
 - " Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at two thirds ebb), N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
 - " Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water), S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
 - " Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

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NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker called the Roaring Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.—The red glass having been removed from the Lantern, there is now a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute.—The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Two fixed white lights upon the Muchias Seal Islands, were put into operation in 1832—they were elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American)—the following are the bearings from them, viz:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light. E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan. N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing into the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan, and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, and distant 28 feet.—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. In consequence of orders from the Home Government, this Light was, in 1840, painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally, in order that it may be seen more distinctly at a distance.

Partridge Island Light.—This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it en-

ables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Cape Forchu Light.—The Light House on Cape Forchu, on the W. side of the entrance to Yarmouth, (Nova-Scotia,) in lat. 43, 39, N. long. 66 8, West, was put in operation on the 15th January, 1840, and exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage.—A new Light House, nearly opposite to Apple River Harbour. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and about 120 feet above tide mark.

The half of the expense of the Cape Sable and Brier Island Lights is paid by New Brunswick, as they are so highly useful to vessels trading with this Province.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport; a new light house has lately been erected here, and the light much improved.

Light Houses in Nova Scotia—in addition to those previously noticed.

Sambro—Sambro Island, mouth of Halifax Harbour—a fixed Light.

Roseway—M'Nutt's Island, mouth of Shelbourne Harbour—two Lights, one above the other.

Liverpool—Coffin's Island, mouth of Liverpool Harbour—one revolving Light.

Canso—Island, Gut of Canso, two Lights, one above the other.

Halifax—Meagher's Beach, Halifax—one Light.

Pictou—Entrance to Pictou Harbour—one fixed Light, for eight months in the year.

Cross Island—Cross Island, near Lunenburg.

Low Point—Entrance to Sydney Harbour—one fixed Light.

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John:

One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel.

One ball half hoisted for two ditto.

Two Balls close, for three Vessels.

Two Balls separated, for four ditto.

A Pendant of any colour, for five ditto.

A ditto under a Ball, for six ditto.

A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, for seven ditto.

A ditto under two Balls close, for eight ditto.

A ditto under two Balls separate, for nine ditto.

A Flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their rise can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order:

A Union Jack, with a white Pendant over, for a small armed vessel.

A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship.

A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig.

A white and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel.

A white ditto, (without a ball,) for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

A red Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews and Eastport.

A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress.

[] Should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In foggy weather a gun will be fired from Partridge island, in return for each heard at sea. Should a vessel require a Pilot her descriptive Pendant will be displayed at a yard arm in the place of a Ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS: (near St. John).

The Falls are level (or still water), at about $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours on the flood, and about $2\frac{1}{2}$ on the ebb, which makes them passable four times in twenty four hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time.—No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

RATES OE PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed July, 1835.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British or Foreign Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point LePreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

VALUABLE RECIPES.

To remove spots of grease from paper.—Take equal parts of roch alum burnt, and flour of sulphur finely powdered together; moisten the paper with cold water; lay a small quantity of powder on the spot; rub gently with the finger, and the grease will disappear.

To preserve cheese from mites.—Paste over it coarse brown paper in every part.

To preserve feathers.—When poultry is picked, the feathers should be carefully preserved from damp and dirt, and all hard bits of quill cut out; then put them in paper bags, a few in each,

and hang them about a kitchen or dry laundry, to season; when enough are collected to be of use, they had better be also dried in a cool oven. Fresh feathers must not be put in a bag with those that are partly dried.

To destroy rats.—Equal parts of ox-gall and oil of amber made into a paste with oatmeal; make it up into little balls; lay them about; and set plenty of vessels of water close at hand. The rats will eagerly eat the balls, which will make them very thirsty, and then they will drink till they kill themselves.

To get rid of beetles or cockroaches.—Lay about the floor, and stuff into the chinks and holes, unslacked lime, or common red wafers made of red lead, *not vermillion*.

To get rid of bed and other bugs.—Gather a handful of the weed called assmart: boil in a pint of water. and when cold rub the liquid where they frequent, and they will disappear.

To cure ring worms.—Get the coomb of a church bell, that is, the grease which is applied to make it work easy, and which with the metal forms a kind of verdigris; mix it with unsalted lard, and apply a fresh plaster twice a day. It is not superstition that dictates the use of a church bell above any other, but the peculiar combination of metal employed for that purpose, produces a different kind of verdigris. This remedy was long kept a profound secret, and many cures effected at an enormous charge. It has been equally as efficacious as freely and openly communicated.

For a burn or scald.—If on the hand, tie it up in a bag of flour, or on the face or neck, shake flour from a dredge, and continue to do so till all the heat is drawn out. By this method the fire may be extracted without breaking the skin, and the sore will be quite healed, and the skin drop off dry.

For a wasp sting.—Bind on the place a thick plaster of common salt, just moistened; it will soon extract the venom. In case of swallowing a wasp, which is a most dangerous accident, it should be instantly attempted to get down a spoonful or more of salt with just water enough to make it liquid. This is a remedy always at hand. Salt and water would be very useful in such a case, or salt, oil, honey, and vinegar, but there is not a moment to be lost in fetching or mixing what is not close at hand.

Sick Head-ache.—It is said that three or four drops of nitric acid dissolved in cold water, and drank, is a sure remedy for sick head ache, when it arises from a want of acid in the stomach.

Varnish for boots and shoes by which they are rendered impervious to water.—Take a pint of linseed oil, with half a pound of mutton suet, six or eight ounces of bees' wax, and a small piece of rosin: boil all these in a pipkin, and let the liquid cool till milk-warm. Then with a hair brush lay it on new boots and shoes. If old boots or shoes are to be varnished, the mixture is to be laid on when the leather is perfectly dry.

Gapes in chickens.—It is said that if you keep iron standing in vinegar, or what is the same thing, we suppose, vinegar standing in an iron vessel, and put a little of the liquid in the food every few days, it will cure or prevent the gapes in chickens. So simple a remedy for a fatal disease may be worth trying.

Cure for corns.—Corns may be cured by binding on them at night a piece of sponge, moistened in a weak solution of pearl ash. The skin may be brushed off in the morning, having been dissolved by the action of the caustic.

To cure the bots in horses.—Pour down the horse a quarter of a pound of alum dissolved in a pint of water (milk warm;) in five or ten minutes after pour down him a pint of linseed oil or other mild active purgative; in ten minutes the horse will rise and eat.

Insects taken into the stomach may generally be destroyed by a small quantity of vinegar, to which salt may be added. For insects that may get into the ear, use a little salad oil.

Frost bitten.—Spirits of turpentine applied at once is a cure for freezing.

To take spots out of silk.—Rub the spots with spirits of turpentine; this spirit exhaling, carries off with it the oil that causes the spot.

Expedition method of taking out stains from scarlet, or velvet of any other colour.—Take soap wort, bruise it, strain out its juices, and add to it a small quantity of black soap. Wash the stain with this liquid, suffering it to dry between whites, and by this method the spots will in a day or two entirely disappear.

Substitute for salt of sorrel for removing ink spots or iron mould.—Take six parts of crystals of tartar, in powder, three parts of alum, likewise pulverized, and use them in the same manner as salt of sorrel.

To take iron moulds out of linen.—Hold the iron mould on the cover of a tankard of boiling water, and rub on the spot a little juice of sorrel and a little salt, and when the cloth has thoroughly imbibed the juice, wash it in lee.

To clean cotton gowns.—Make a solution of soap, put in the articles, and wash them in the usual way. If greens, reds, &c., run, add lemon juice, vinegar, or oil of vitriol, to the rinsing water.

To clean black veils.—Pass them through a warm liquor of bullock's gall and water; rinse in cold water; then take a small piece of glue, pour boiling water on it, and pass the veil through it; clap it, and frame it to dry.

Clothes' Ball.—Mix two pounds of pipe clay, four ounces of potter's clay, four ounces of whiting, and a quarter of a pint of ox gall.

Chapped hands.—After washing, drop a few drops of honey, and rub the hands together till the stickiness is entirely removed.

Slugs may be prevented from getting into fruit trees, by tightly tying a bit of hair cloth round the stem of the tree. They never can get over it.

Preserved Peaches.—Take ripe free-stone peaches; pare, stone, and quarter them. To six pounds of the cut peaches allow three pounds of the best brown sugar. Strew the sugar among the peaches, and set them away in a covered vessel. Next morning put the whole into a preserving kettle, and boil it slowly about an hour and three quarters or two hours, skimming it well.

Preserved Quinces.—Pare and core your quince, put them into a kettle, cover them with the parings and cores, fill up with spring water, and let them boil until they are a pink color; take out the

quinoes, strain the liquor through a bag, and set it away for quince jelly ; make a syrup of loaf sugar, pound for pound, boil the quinoes in it two hours, slowly, frequently putting them under the liquor ; after taking them out, let the liquor boil until it is reduced to a syrup.

Preserved Pears.—Take six pounds of pears to four pounds of sugar, boil the parings in as much water as will cover them, strain it through a cullender, lay some pears in the bottom of your kettle, put in some sugar, and so on, alternately ; then pour the liquor off the pear skins over, boil them until they begin to look transparent, then take them out, let the juice cool, and clarify it, put the pears in again, with a great deal of brace ginger chopped fine ; boil till done ; let the liquor boil after taking them out until it is reduced to a syrup.

Preserved Pumpkins.—Cut the pumpkin into leaves, &c., according to taste ; sprinkle them with white sugar grated ; let them lay all night ; make a syrup pound for pound, cut some lemons in thin slices, add a little race ginger, and bail slowly until done

Ice Cream......Pare, stone, and scald twelve ripe apricots, beat them fine in a marble mortar, put to them six ounces of double refined sugar, a pint of scalding cream ; work it through a hair sieve, put it into a tin that has a close cover, set it in a tub of ice broken small, and a large quantity of salt put amongst it ; when you see the cream grow thick round the edge of your tin, stir it, and set it in again till it grows quite thick, when your cream is all froze up, take it out of your tin, and put it into the mould you intend it to be turned out of, then put on the lid, and have ready another tub with ice and salt in as before ; put your mould in the middle, and lay your ice under and over it, let it stand four or five hours, dip your tin in warm water when you turn it out ; if it be summer you must not turn it out till the moment you want it ; you may use any sort of fruit if you have not apricots, only observe to work it in fine.

Currant Jelly....Put the currants into a pitcher, cover it close, and set the pitcher in warm water, this will extract the juice ; squeeze them through a flannel bag, and to one quart of juice add two pounds of loaf sugar ; boil it twenty minutes, but no longer.

POISON ANTIDOTES.

For oil of vitriol or aqua fortis, give large doses of magnesia and water, or equal parts of soft soap and water.

For oxalic acid, give magnesia, or chalk and water.

For tartar emetic, give Peruvian bark and water, or a strong decoction of tea, until the bark can be had.

For saltpetre, give an emetic of mustard and water ; afterwards mucilages and small doses of laudanum.

For opium or laudanum, give an emetic of mustard, and use constant motion, and if possible the stomach pump.

For lunar caustic give common salt.

For corrosive sublimate, give the white of eggs mixed with water, until free vomiting takes place.

For arsenic, doses of magnesia are good, but freshly prepared hydrated per oxide of iron is better.

An Agricultural Market, is held on the King Square, in the City of Saint John, on the last Thursday of every month.

To remove ink spots:—Wet the place immediately with sorted or lemon juice, and rub it hard, white soap. Ink or iron mould may be removed by holding over a silver or pewter vessel of boiling water, and squeezing on the spot juice of sorrel, then rubbing with dry salt.

To remove grease from woollen or silk:—Potter's earth is never injurious. It should be moistened with boiling water, and when cold laid on the spot damp; it will draw out oil, and when brushed off will leave the garment uninjured: for solid greases, as tallow, it will be necessary to pass a hot iron over without touching.
