





"GOLDEN RULE" POLICE POLICY. Chief of Police Fred Kohler of Cleveland, who has been responsible for the "common sense or so-called golden rule policy" of police department work, has just made his annual report. In the five years since 1908 the arrests made in Cleveland have been 10,085, 6018, 7185, 9516 and 7774 respectively, as against 31,736 in 1906 and 30,418 in

1907 under the old system. But there were during the five years a total of 91,059 persons, in addition brought to the station house, given a warping and released without the stigma of arrest being placed upon them. The police department has not been less busy under the new method, but

the chief thinks it has been more use-

ful and its work more beneficial. Chief Kohler recognizes the existence of a class that are almost beyond reclamation and who "really require permanent custodial care." A novel decorative scheme is being worked out in Paris by Montford Coolidge, the New York artist, who recently it returned to the French capital after a long stay in Italy. According to a Paris correspondent of The New York Times, h. #### WORD COMES FROM **FIVE LANGUAGES**

The most hybrid word in the English language, according to Prof. A. F. Chamberlain of the Clark University, is "macadamizing." He points out is "macadamizing." He points out that this word is derived from five languages—Latin, Gaelic, Hebrew, Greek and English—and he revolves into five factors, says The Popular Science Monthly, as follows:

"Re"—a Latin prefix, signifying a repetition or doing over again;
"Mac," a Gaelic word for son, in common use as a prefix for genealogical purposes;
"Adam," the representative in many European languages for the Hebrew name of the first man, according to

the Mosaic account of the creation, as given in the book of Genesis; "Iz" (or ize), the modern English representative, thru the French, iser, of the Greek verbal terminal izein; "Ing," the English suffix of the participle present, verbal noun, etc.
The root of this word "macadam" illustrates in another way the vitality of our English speech and its ability to draw new words into its vocabulary whenever the need arises. The term "macadam" is really the family name of the man, John Macadam, who early in the last century devised the now common method of paving roads with small broken stones, etc.
Celtic and Semitic had already com-

bined to produce Macadam, meaning "son of Adam," which the English language then took up and further molded to suit its genius. There are many such hybrids, but this is pro bly the worst.



VOLCANIC DUST IN ATMOSPHERE

From many points in America and From many points in America and Europe come reports of an unusual turbidity of the atmosphere, which began early last summer and still continues. This is manifested in a marked diminution of the intensity of solar radiation, as measured with the pyrheliometer, abnormal displacement of the neutral points of atmospheric polarization. a hazy appearance of the sky, and the presence of Bishop's ring around the sun. Observers in Russia, Switzerland, Sweden and Germany, as well as America, report an un-usual lack of blueness in the sky. usual lack of blueness in the sky. There seems to be every reason to attribute these phenomena to the presence in the upper atmosphere of an immense pall of dust arising from the explosive eruption of Katmai volcano, in Alaska, last June. 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
