This loan, Mr. Morton's report sets forth, was carried in 1834 by the Western National Bank, which was controlled by the Equitable Life. The collateral for the loans was objected to by a bank examiner and Henry B. Hyde then agreed to transfer the loan and collateral to the Mercantile Trust Company. At that time, apparently, the loan amounted to \$66,491.

George V. Turner, in whose name the loan stood, was secretary to Louis Fitzgerald, then president of the Mercantile Trust Company, and a close business associate of Henry B. Hyde. The loan was guaranteed by Marcellus Hartley, John E. Searles, Louis Fitzgerald, W. N. Cofer, jr., and H. B. Hyde. On March 1, 1895, the same guarantors renewed their guaranty, the loan having grown to \$1,276,478, the increase being due to attempts to develop the property on which the collateral for the loan was made.

THE LAURIER-COX (LIMITED)-COERCION AND CORPORATIONS. Gradually but surely all the facts are coming to the surface which establish the alliance between Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Senator George A. Cox (representing himself and certain corporation interests) for the goverament of Canada to the imminent disadvantage of her people. It is a hard thing to make clear, and even if made clear, it is hard to make people who are Liberals accept the facts by reason of their party leanings; but even under these circumstances the truth is gradually coming out and it is settling down in the mind of the great mass of the peovie. We must speak in the most general terms, and we must premise by saying that because The World has now and in times past had to attack corporations it is not because they are corporations, but because of the improper things they do as corporations. We have no war with capital, or associated capital. In the evolution that is going on, capital is being forced into great masses. But what we say is this, that the corporations and the trusts must not do things that individuals must not do, and that they must not have privileges that the individual citizen has not and does not claim. It is for the wrongs they do, the interference they attempt in government, the special claims, concessions, protections they secure and which they deny to individuals, that corporations are vuinerable.

Now as to the Laurier-Cox alliance. The World asks its readers to accept the following general facts:

That Sir Wilfrid Laurier, prime minister of Canada, has and had before the late election an almost solid Quebec behind him-also the Lib-

That Senator George A. Cox stands for a great many corporations and corporation interests, among them the following: The Grand Trunk Pacific.

The Electrical Development Co. of Ontario, the last power company given a franchise by the Ross Government. This great company has for directors Col. Pellatt. Fred Nicholls, George A. Cox, William Mackenzie, James Ross of Montreal. Associated more or less intimately with this big concern are a dozen other electric energy organizations in Toronto and Ontario. All the street railways are in it.

The Globe newspaper, the majority control of which is absolutely in the hands of Robert Jaffray for himself and Senator Cox. The Star newspaper, controlled by E. T. Malone, one of Mr. Cox's so-

licitors, for the power interests above set out. Col. J. M. Gibson, one time attorney-general in the Ross government,

and now head of the electric combine in Hamilton, known as the Cataract Fower Co. This company is entrenched by special water privileges in connection with the Welland Canal, got largely from the Laurier govern-

Hon. Clifford Sifton, one time minister in the Laurier government, now a millionaire twice over, a man with a record in regard to the school question in Manitoba and the same question in Alberta and Saskatchewan. Mr. Sifton is the chief owner and has the actual control of The Winnipeg

The late Ontario government, headed by G. W. Ross, that contained J. M. Gibson as attorney-general and that handed out the power franchises at the Falls. This Col. Gibson, while attorney-general, assisted in the passage thru the legislature of the Conmee bill, which has successfully stifled anything like municipal competition with the electric and gas franchises. Mr. Zeb. Lash is one of the able lawyers in the service of the electric combine.

These are some of the main factors in the Canadian political situation at a time when the public are being robbed of great franchises, when great corporations are given extraordinary powers that individuals never got and are factors in the situation at a time when the gravest apprehension is in the public mind concerning our insurance companies and other stitutions by reason of the revelation now being disclosed in the United States, where a set of conditions exists which seem to have been marvel-ously imitated and established in this country.

The conditions here are the same, but worse as far as public criticism of them is concerned; whether the evils that are being disclosed are also Now let us connect up all these interests and politicians as they are

fact connected up, notwithstanding the denials they make and the snarling references to anyone who dares to connect them up: There is, was and has been right along an improper connection between Laurier and Cox:

1. To carry the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme and to protect and advance by legislation, by concessions, by the denial of legislation, the interests of the Cox and allied corporations at the expense of great timenored public rights.

2 To carry autonomy bills, that created two new provinces, but de-

nied the usual constitutional rights in regard to education.

The first of these (the Grand Trunk) was made public in bills carried in the last session of the late parliament and the session preceding and

was the great cry in the late election. The second of these was never made public, was carefully concealed from the public in the late election, but was secretly made known by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to the Roman Catholic bishops of Canada in a treaty with

them. On this understanding he got a solid Quebec. Senator Cox and friends got all their corporation requests from

Laurier and Ross, and in return they helped them as they were able to help them wherever they could. Senator Cox knew, if no one else knew, that coercion was coming, and he and his associates repaid Laurier by assisting at every point to carry coercion. So did Sifton, who is associated with Senator Cox and Senator Cox's railway and electric allies. Senator Cox controlled The Globe and Mr. Sifton controlled The Manitoba Free Press, The Globe of the west. Senator Cox and George W. Ross appointed a clever but unscrupulous Presbyterian clergyman, the Rev. J. A. Macdonald, who had as editor of the denominational organ got the strings of the church in his hands, to be editor of The Globe, and Mr Sifton had on the staff of his Free Press as an occasional but well-paid contributor, Rev. Dr. Bryce. These are the men that thru the columns of Senator Cox's Globe and Sifton's Free Press and elsewhere did the chloroforming of the Presbyterian revolt against coercion. Macdonald pretended to fight coercion in The Globe, but eventually swallowed it in full, eventually acclaimed Laurier who perpetrated it as the maker and saviour of Canada, is still doing it to-day, and so did Dr. Bryce. The general assembly was steered into passing a harmless resolution. The knowledge that the bishops had in amplitude was denied to all the Protestants of Canada and the organs of the electric ring, of Senator Cox and of his friends were put absclutely at the service of defending Laurier's treachery to the west and to the people of Canada—the Protestant element that he had carefully kept in the dark. It was The Globe (and again we say it is the paper of Senator Cox over which he has the same absolute control as he has over the Canada Life) and The Star (the absolute property of the electric combine, so absolute that the owners hide behind a mask) and The Winnipeg Free Press that have been the continuous champions of coercio and, here comes in the significant thing, the champions of the Grand Trunk Pacific and all the electrical conspiracies against the people of Ontario now under way in connection with Niagara and other power propositions. Coercion and corporations is their motto.

It is, in a word, Cox and Laurier, and the Cox and electric ring newspapers against the educational liberties of the two new provinces, and Coz and Laurier and the Cox and electric ring newspapers against the public and municipal rights of the people of Canada. Sir Wilfrid Laurier never yet in his life has said a word for public rights; he has been the everready friend of corporations, even if he had to invade the rights of provinces, as he did for Ahearn and Soper (the electric combine) at Ottawa. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has coerced the west in obedience to a solid Quebec and he did it by the aid and assistance of a lot of great corporations, whose only god is money, whose only idea of public rights is to make the people tributary to themselves, and worst of all by men who were willing to desert a high calling and to become the tools of the corporations in serving the ends of Sir Wilfrad Laurier as long as he advanced at Ottawa, and at Toronto by way of Ross, their special and far-reaching aims at

And corporation graft is the keynote of the situation here in Canada as it is in New York and in the States, only it is worse here than in the States, because sacred constitutional liberties are sold as well as public rights.

And in conclusion for to-day read the leader in yesterday's Globe about "finances and corruption" in the States and contrast it with its awful blindness toward what it must know is going on at home! It is the rankest hypocrisy that ever appeared in the life of Canada.

P.S.: Perhaps our readers will say: Why are you pointing this out now? Why did you not point it out at the time? Our answer is this: Why did not some one point it out at the time that Hyde and Alexander, Harriman, Depew and Gould were exploiting the Equitable, and that another gang were exploiting the New York Life, giving \$100,000 as a single item to the Republican campaign fund? It was not pointed out then because in plots of this kind they are covered up when being perpetrated, and are masked by unscrupulous and hypocritical newspapers. But the truth is coming out in Canada as it is coming out in New Yorkafter the crime. But The World is bringing it out, trying to bring it out in spite of the most vigorous cursing and the most barefaced hypocrisy that was ever known in the history of Canada. The truth is coming out in New York, and it is coming out here. We invite the attention of Mr. J. W. Flavelle and Mr. John S. Willison. No men ought to know it as they ought to know it. Do they see it, or are they ready to apologize for it and to defend it? They have the floor.



George Andrews Reeve, M.D., was born in Toronto in 1842. He was educated at the University of Toronto, where he secured his B.A., and the silver medal in natural sciences in 1862. He graduated in medicine from Queen's in 1865, and became fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons in Kingston in 1866. In the same year he was appointed assistant surgeon of the Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary, a position which held until 1872. As a specialist in eye and ear diseases, he went into partnership with Dr. A. M. Rosebrugh. He received an honorary M.D. degree from the University of Toronto in 1889, and was appointed lecturer in Ophthalmology and Otology in the medical faculty of the university council, and has been president of the Ontario Medical Aste university council, and has been president of the Ontario Medical Aste ophthalmological Society of the United Kingdom, and of the American Ophthalmological Society of the United Kingdom, and of the American Ophthalmological Society. Dean Reeve has for years been perhaps the best known member of the medical faculty, and is the idol of the generation of students who have passed under his hands.






