### FRENCH CANADA'S WANTS

At 11:30 street cars were ordered to stop on the street. They were armed with little "chairs" and the choicest of bouquets advanced and tossed them to the procession. The marchers were stopped to thank them.

### "CANADA FOR CANADIANS."

If Government Adopts That Policy It Will Have Conservative Support.

On J. D. Edgar's Course in regard to the Seasonal Clerks and Messengers Generally Commended—There Was a Good Point, However, in Mr. Foster's Contention—Prospect of a Large Increase in the Estimates—Another Order Cancelled—Other Ottawa News.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—(Special.)—It is clearly apparent that The Globe's editorial of Friday on the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway is inspired. Last session, it will be remembered, Mr. Haggart placed on the table a resolution to loan five million dollars to the company to enable them to construct this line. If The Globe's editorial is intended as an aid in the construction of the road, indeed, it would not be a matter of surprise if the Government next session came down with a proposal to Parliament to loan the company a sum larger than that proposed by the Conservatives four or five months ago. The immediate construction of this road must command itself to the attention of the Government.

There is general commendation at the many and straightforward manner in which Mr. Speaker Edgar explained to the House his action in regard to the dismissal of the seasonal clerks and messengers. Five of the former were dismissed for taking part in the riotous demonstration in Mr. Foster's contention that inasmuch as these men are only engaged in their own during the recess, when they are not under the Government's control, it is not the Government's business to exercise their rights of citizenship. Mr. Edgar has made his point by his criticism on his rank and file that it could be proved that Cloutier, the newly-appointed Conservative member of the House, had made his campaign as his predecessor, Becharof, had made his. The only regrettable feature about the discussion on Friday evening was the United States part of a few Liberals like Messrs. McMillan and Somerville to endeavor to turn a party point into a national issue.

ESTIMATES PILING UP.

Sir Philip Currie is the first ambassador to have had an audience with the Sultan since the recent riots in Constantinople. Baron Calceoli, the Russian Ambassador, are away on leaves of absence which will expire until the end of the month, and Sir Philip Currie in the meantime is in command of the diplomatic corps in Constantinople.







TO SEEK THE SOUTH POLE. Explorer Nansen's Expedition Expected to Start for Antarctica in the Spring.

How the Journey Will be Made. The Morgenbladet, a newspaper of Christiania, Norway, announces that the Arctic explorer, Fridtjof Nansen, will soon undertake an expedition to the Antarctic regions...

When the exploring party arrives at Antarctica, it will divide into two or three detachments, which will make their way inland from different points on the coast, after that has been thoroughly explored. The ships will winter in Ross Harbor, at Erebus and Terror.

Nansen's remarkable success on his recent Arctic expedition has aroused intense enthusiasm in Norway, and he has been elected and named as the explorer ever was. His achievement in reaching a point 200 miles nearer the confidence of Norwegian scientists. They believe that in the unexplored continent around the South Pole even more priceless scientific data are to be obtained. Recent explorations, they say, have revealed enough to make a new expedition extremely desirable.

Scientific bodies in various parts of Europe have been exceedingly anxious to have some explorer of renown undertake such a journey, and one has already been started by private subscription to leave England this month under the leadership of Bjorchgrevink.

GOVERNMENT MAY HELP. It is expected that the Government will furnish a handsome portion of the fund for this expedition. This method was adopted with success when Nansen declared his intention of making a try for the North Pole. About \$100,000 will be necessary. There will be no dash for the Pole, such as Nansen and Johansen made when they abandoned the Fram in northern ice.

SCIENTISTS NOT THERE. The additions made to natural science by the expedition were extremely meagre because no one of adequate scientific attainments was in the party. A large number of well-known scientists will accompany Nansen.

At the sixth Geographical Congress, which assembled in London last year, resolutions regarding Antarctic exploration were adopted. The congress speaking of such explorations as "the greatest piece of geographical exploration still to be undertaken" and "in view of the addition to knowledge in almost every branch of science" every scientific society of importance was recommended to urge that a new expedition be undertaken.

Dr. John Murray of Edinburgh applied to the Government for \$250,000 for the purpose, but met with refusal.


