

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

#### VHY IS ALL THIS SECRECY?

American Journals Are Slating This Country on Question of the Alaskan Boundary.

AND THEIR PREMISES ARE FALSE.

Sir Wilfrid Agrees With Sir Charles That Daylight Should Shine on

Ottawa, June 2.—(Spécial.)—Sir Charles Tupper in the House to-day said that with the permission of the House he would read a telegram which had just been received from London on a very important question which he was sure would interest the

which he was sure would interest the House:

London, June 2, 1800.—The Times and other New York and Washington telegrams continue to abuse Canada for daring to reject the agreement between Lord Salisbury and Mr. Choate regarding the Alaskan boundary, after the rising of the Joint High Commission in February. What the British public would much like to know is whether Canada was fully consulted in the negotiations of this agreement. If not, Canada will receive much sympathy here. As the Outlook says to-day: "The British public feel that the day has gone by when any self-governing British colony can be dragooned into a settlement in which it has no say. Canada is no serf; is not even a child. She is a junior partner and has a junior partner's rights, the last word being always with the senior partner."

Sir Charles: I am not quite sure of that. Mr. Smalley and his Washington friends would ignore this if they could but it remains a central fact in the administration of our Empire, the British Empire. A full official Canadian statement is greatly needed to meet the allegations with which the Washington telegrams are prejudicing opinion again Canada.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier: I am happy to say, and, indeed, I will surprise nobody in this House by stating that the British authorities, the Foreign Office, through the Colonial Office, has kept us fully informed of the negotiations between the Foreign Office and the American Ambassador at the court of St. James'. Nothing would give me greater pleasure than to be in a position to place before the House and the Canadian public the whole of the negotiations and the views we have expressed upon the questions referred to us. But, as my hon. friend knows, I am not in a position to state anything at this moment. I noticed particularly, the ending words of the quotations from The Star, which has just been read by my hon. friend, that a full official statement coming from the Canadian side of this question would be much appreciated in England.

"I can fully reciprocate that sentiment, and wish we were in a position to make such a statement, and I believe if we were, a good deal of the anxiety which prevails in some quarters would be relieved at the same time. I believe, also, that a good deal of the clouds which apparently surround this question, and the sentiment more or less unfriendly which has been elicited in some quarters, would also be removed. But, so long as the negotiations continue it is quite certain I will not be in a position to give out anything to the public. I may say, however, that, as the question of the Yukon boundary has been removed by the conference itself from the question with which it had to deal, and referred to the respective Governments. question with which it had to deal, and referred to the respective Governments, British and American, and that, therefore, so far as the Commission is concerned, that matter is no longer pending before the Cemmission, I am not without hope, before the session is over, that the last protocol on the conference may be laid on the table.

Other Questions Pending.

"Of course, I need not remind the House that all the other questions are pending before the conference at this moment. It would not be possible to give in publicity what took place, but this one particular question, as it is no longer among the subjects to be treated by the conference, and, therefore, so far as it goes, the negotiations are closed, that is so far as the conference is concerned, I may say, for my part, I see no objection. On the contrary, I see a good deal to be said in favor of having the true position placed before the public as it was when we adjourned the conference."

Mrs. Boultbee gave an impressive address on the working of the Maternity bill and that for the protection of infant life. No thing but good was said of the operation of these Acts. In describing the need there was for this legislation, Mrs. Boultbee told a heartrending tale of the large amount of illegifimacy and the ease with which the babes were boarded out and to a large extent murdered. The provisions of these measures were explained. It was much easier to trace these illegitimate infantsince the passing of these Acts. Still the death rate in maternity homes was very excessive. It was to be regretted that only Toronto had adopted the Maternity Act seeing that so many of the unmarried mothers came from the country. Sympathy for the mother was greater than for the off spring of unmarried women, and this led to a great sacrifice of life, which Mrs. Bouit-






