HAMILTON NEWS

GOVERNORS OF CITY OF DEAD MUCH COMPLAINED AGAINST

Superintendent Told to Put on More Workmen—No One Seems to Answer the Phone—Grass Is Not Properly Cut—Other Hamilton News.

Hamilton, May 14.—(Special).—All kinds of complaints were made at the meeting of the city council this afternoon, showing that the management of the city of the dead is not any more satisfactory this year than last.

The Middleton-Marble Marble Company would not do any more work on the city property, but was told to get on with the work that is to be done in two or three days.

Blackford & Company, undertakers, complained that they had not been paid for work done on the city property for four months to a meeting to be held next Monday.

The board decided to accept \$41 in full settlement of an account of \$82 against the late firm of Furness & Scott, but the superintendent was instructed to demand prompt payment for putting in foundations. The claim was for work done last summer. There also is still outstanding for the same kind of work done some ago.

Chester Fearman was elected chairman of the board, J. J. Mason, lieutenant, and on account of ill-health he would not accept office.

The Wesley Church orchestra gave a concert in the lecture room, and was well attended. The soloists were Miss Boswell, contralto, London; Ernest Taylor, tenor; Miss Marie L. Letford, soprano, Hamilton, etc.

Improvement Society.
The annual meeting of the Hamilton Improvement Society was held this evening in the Board of Trade rooms, and was well attended. The president, R. D. Slovo, occupied the chair. The financial statement showed the year's receipts were \$10,340 and the expenditure was \$7,660. The following officers were elected: R. T. Steele, president; Adam Brown, W. A. Robinson, vice-presidents; N. D. Garrison, secretary; treasurer. A general discussion followed on various matters of interest to the city, and others concerned the tram roadways. Mayor Hendrie defended them as the best and most obtainable for the money paid. Other speakers warmly condemned the juvenile habit of tramping over lawns and flower beds. The Board of Education will be asked to instruct the Public School teachers to facilitate a better report on other people's property.

HE IS STILL UNIDENTIFIED.

Inquest on the Remains of the Young Man Who Was Killed on the C.P.R. Track

Nobody turned up at the Emergency Hospital yesterday, who could throw light on the identity of the unknown young man now lying dead there, although many viewed the remains.

The inquest was held at the hospital last night by Coroner Powell, and the jury rendered a verdict of accidental death. Gen. Butcher, section foreman of C.P.R., who lives at Lambton, testified to the facts leading up to the finding of the young man on Monday morning at the side of the railway tracks, about a mile and a half west of Lambton. The north rail was covered with blood for a distance of about 10 feet from where the body was found, and it was apparent that the train which struck the young man was going east at the time the accident occurred. Mr. Butcher also testified that the young man was killed by falling down between the rails of a train upon which he was standing.

The young man was unconscious when found, although he subsequently revived, and he had no apparent wounds, but his face and head were injured. He was taken to the hospital at Lambton, and he died there on Tuesday.

Dr. Peplow, who was called in to examine the young man after his admission to the hospital, was satisfied death had been caused by the medical superintendent, Dr. McCall, described the treatment administered to the young man from the time he was brought to the hospital up till the hour of his death. This was the evidence offered.

The jurors were of the opinion that every effort should be put forth by the authorities to identify the deceased. The remains are to be buried in a private burial place, and it was stated that the body has been placed in a coffin and will be taken to the funeral home of J. W. Dunnington for the C.P.R.

A new company was to be formed by the existing Franco-Canadian Steamship Company, in which Canadian interests were to be represented and controlled. The directors were to be Robert Mackay, Henry Jones, A. A. Ayer, George A. Drummond, J. Bloomfield, H. E. E. Galt, J. E. Galt, J. R. Booth and F. H. Clergue.

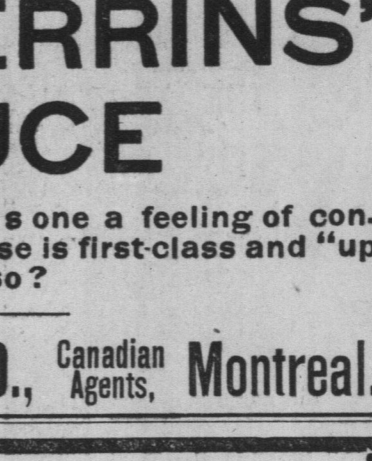

GAMBLING WRECKO BANKS Defalcation of Seven Officials Has Been Discovered Since Stock Boom Began. MORE DISASTERS ARE EXPECTED. Washington, May 14.—Seven officials of many national banks have gone wrong and have been found out since the present speculative boom began.

Case No. 1—Niles, Mich. The First National Bank of Niles, Mich., was forced to suspend its operations on Wednesday last.

Case No. 2—Lemars, Iowa. The Lemars National Bank of Lemars, Iowa, was forced to close its doors as a result of the defalcations of its vice-president, and lost it all.

Case No. 3—Vergennes, Vt. In the case of the Farmers' National Bank of Vergennes, Vt., Cashier Lewis, was first estimated at \$50,000, but subsequently it was found that his total shortage, due to speculation, would probably reach \$100,000, completely wrecking the bank.

Case No. 4—Vancouver, Wash. Most tragic of the recent defalcations was that of Cashier Chubb of the First National Bank of Vancouver. He was found to be short \$750,000, the largest shortage in the list.

Case No. 5—Pittsburgh, Pa. In the First National Bank of Pittsburgh, Pa., Cashier J. Schrohr, who was in charge of the bank's operations, was found to be short \$800,000.

Case No. 6—Pittsburgh, Pa. In the Third National Bank of Pittsburgh, Pa., Cashier Stewart was found to be short \$300,000. Both these banks are strong institutions and their weakness seriously by the loss.
