## LOUIS BLERIOT FLIES OVER CHANNEL WINS PRIZE AND OUTWITS HIS RIVALS

Flight From Calais to Dover Consumes Less Than Half an Hour, and Landing is Attended By No Serious Result-Will Be Feted by Council of English City.

pover, July 25.—This sleepy old seaport town experienced the keenest tirill known in a generation when a white-winged, bird-like machine with loudy humming motor swept out from the haze obscuring the sea toward the distant French coast, and, circling twice above the high chalky cliffs of Dover, alighted on English soil.

A calm Frenchman, Louis Bleriot, a portly and red-moustached man of 37 descended from the saddle, limping on a bandaged foot, which had been burned on his previous overland flight. a bandaged foot, which had been burned on his previous overland flight. Immediately two compatriots, who had been waving a big tri-color flag as a signal for the landing place, fell upon him enthusiastically, embracing him, shouting and pounding him on the back. They with a few soldiers and others who happened by chance to be on the scene, were the only persons to witness the finish of a most remarkwitness the finish of a most remarkable feat.

Crossed in Thirty Minutes. Bleriot left Les Baraques, three illes from Calais, about 4.30 a.m. On one of the smallest monoplanes ever used he crossed the channel in a little less than half an hour, twice as swiftless than half an hour, twice as swittly as the fastest mail boat. His speed
averaged more than 45 miles an
hour, sometimes it approached 60 miles.
He kept about 250 feet above the sea
level and for ten minutes, while about
mid-channel, was out of sight of both
coasts and the French torpedo boat
destroyers, which followed him, with
his wife and frends aboard.

By his achievement to-day Bleriot won the prize of \$500 offered by The London Daily Mail for the first flight across the English Channel ,and stole a march on his rivals, Hubert Latham and Count de Lambert, both of whom had hoped to make the attempt to-day.

She embraced him weeping, but they were soon sitting at breakfast, the centre of a proud gathering of French people. The mayor and other Dover officials called early and welcomed M. Bleriot, in the name of the city and nation, as the pioneer of international flight.

The townspeople of Dover, who for three weeks have been on the alert for the signal announcing that one of the flying men had started, were caught napping. A gale was blowing last night and the weather forecasts promised a strong wind and squalls in the morning. Hence the operators of their posts. M. Lafontaine, a friend of the aviator, arrived at the Lord Warden Hotel from Calais at midnight. He declined a bedroom, with the remark that he had an appointment to meet M. Bleriot at 5 o'clock.

M. Lafontaine came to the signal landing, the spot which the newspapers under whose auspices the flight was made, had chosen, on the high ground back of the city, but M. Lafontaine selected a cupshaped depression, called the North Fall meadow, two miles east of Dover, where the airship would be sheltered from the wind in settling. There he planted the French flag.

CALAIS, France, July 25.—At 3 o'clock Bleriot proceeded to the shed at Sangatte. To the handful of people who had gathered there the spectacle of this man, hobbling on crutches, dreaming of a flight to England, had something awe-inspiring in it. Bleriot was the coolest of all. He cast aside his crutches and took his place in the monoplane. Smiling and ready to give the signal, he said: "If I can't walk I will show the world that I can fly."

At 4.36 the aeroplane arose and sped seaward. Fourteen minutes later it was lost in the mists overhanging the channel. The destroyer had steamed swiftly in pursuit, but the flying man soon left it far behind.

Bleriot's feat has aroused the most intense enthusiasm in aeronautical circles. The French Aero Club and the parliamentary aviation commission telegraphed their congratulations, the latter adding: "Hosanna, for the peace of the world."

## PASTOR RUSSELL'S SERMON.

Thieves in Paradise-Text: "Verily I Say Unto Thee To-day, Thou Shalt Be With Me in Paradise." (Luke xxiii, 43).



It sought to secure that the people should obtain a fair share of the advantages coming directly from a vast natural resources which certain rings of high financiers were striving to monopolize for their own private profit. If ever precautionary and protective legislation was justified it was in the case of the hydro-electric acts of the provincial legislature.

Not once, but repeatedly the people of the municipalities concerned in Niagara power declared themselves in favor of the Whitney-Beck policy, They did so knowing exactly that the stituted to act, not independently of them, but as trustee for them. They had faith that the representations made were based on conservative estimates and that the price charged for Niagara white coal would cover only the legitimate charges of the enterprise. The opponents of the power policy sought to upset the municipal bylaws on a pure technicality and now that it is plain the commission's estimates were well within the mark, the wisdom and propriety of the government's action is sufficiently manifest. The validation of the bylaws passed by the municipalities, in full knowledge of the circumstances and of the was perfectly right and justifiable.

It is significant that the parties who denounce the hydro-electric policy never challenge or protest against the methods of public service corporations in dealing with the franchises entrusted to them. The lawyers who hold the government up to execration consider it legitimate and allowable to devise schemes for circumventing gal obligations. That of course is permissible since it is the people that are being fleeced and plundered. Canada Enters Agreement to Deal With Serious and Growing Class of Crimes.

OTTAWA, July 24.—(Special).—The Canada Gazette to-day announces the terms of an intenational agreement for the controlling of the white slave

The agreement is for the purpose of providing for women of age, deceived or under restraint, as also for women and girls under age, an adequate protection against the criminal traffic known as the white slave traffic. Thirteen governments have signed the agreement, each naming a representative to act as a plenipotentiary to see to its enforcement.

There are several clauses to the agreement, the most important of which are: Each of the contracting governments undertakes to appoint or to designate an authority, whose duty will be to gather all the information will be to gather all the information concerning the hiring of women and girls for immoral purposes in foreign places; this authority to have power to communicate directly with the similar service established in each of the contracting states.

Will Keep Close Watch. Each of the governments undertakes to have a strict watch kept for the purpose of seeking, espeially at the railway station, ports of departure and during voyage, the conductors of women and girls intended for debauchment instructions will be sent to the ery. Instructions will be sent to the officers and all other competent persons to obtain within legal limits all
