CONSTITUTION.

HIS congregation shall be known by the name of the First Presbyterian Church, Park Avenue.

The Board of Managers shall be chosen by ballot by the congregation, from among the members of the church in full communion, at the annual meeting of the congregation, or at a meeting duly called for that purpose.

The Board of Managers shall consist of twelve members, one-half of whom shall retire annually by rotation; and their places, as also the places of any who may die or vacate their office during the year, shall be filled at the annual meeting of the congregation. The retiring Managers may be re-elected.

If any Manager be cut off from church privileges by process of discipline, or leave the congregation, he shall forthwith cease to act as Manager, and another shall, as soon as convenient, be appointed in his place.

The duty of the Managers shall be to attend to the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. More particularly it shall be their duty to obtain from the people contributions for the sustentation of the ministry; to take care of the property of the congregation; to provide for the payment of the minister's and other sa'aries; and generally to administer all matters committed to their charge, as the congregation may from time to time direct.

Meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Wednesday of each month for the transaction of business; but a meeting may be held at any time on the call of the chairman, by notice from the pulpit, or addressed personally to the members of the Board.

Seven members present shall constitute a quorum. Every meeting should be opened and closed with prayer.

The Treasurer shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the congregation from the members of the Board of Managers. His duties shall be to keep the accounts of the congregation and to receive and disburse all moneys, subject to the direction and control of the Board of Managers.

The Chairman and Secretary shall be appointed by the Board of Managers at the first meeting of the Board held after the annual meeting of the congregation.

The Chairman's duties shall be to preside at the meetings of the Board of Managers, and to sign all accounts which have passed the Board. In his absence any member may be chosen to act as chairman *pro tem*. The chairman has only a casting vote.

The Secretary's duties shall be to keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and to act as clerk of the congregation at congregational meetings.

All cases not herein provided for shall be governed by the rules and forms of procedure laid down by the church courts of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

SESSION STATEMENT.

Notwithstanding the large number of removals by certificate and death, the membership is practically the same as last year; and the attendance at Sabbath services and weekly meetings during the year has been good.

There have been ten persons removed by death who were more or less intimately connected with the congregation, seven of whom were members in full communion; and the large number of thirty-two have been disjoined by certificate, while with regret five have been dropped from the roll without certificate. There have been seventeen infants and one adult baptized during the year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS.

Your Board of Managers, in presenting with pleasure their report for the year 1896, desire unfeignedly to give thanks to the great Head of the Church who has so abundantly rewarded our labors with blessings, both spiritual and temporal.

In reviewing the past year it must be admitted that it has been an important one in the history of our church, a year marked by many changes, and we desire to rejoice with the congregation upon the spirit of harmony and loyalty with which they have been animated through these various changes, as is manifestly shown by such abundance of good works and the large measure of happiness and prosperity we, as a congregation, enjoy.

We are pleased to report that notwithstanding the extra outlay of moneys which we have been called upon to expend during the year, we have been able to meet all liabilities, pay \$1,500.00 of the church debt, \$250.00 of the organ debt, and have a balance of \$38.86 in the treasurer's hands.

The amounts realized are as follows: From envelopes, \$4,803.15; open collections, \$724.39; anniversary services, \$1,056.94; Building Fund account, \$404.70; Ladies' Aid Society, \$250.00; concert, \$109.30; interest, \$4.68; balance from 1895, \$97.01. Collectively these sums amount to \$7,450.17, and have been disbursed as per financial statement hereto attached. Among the disbursements are several sums aggregating about \$600.00 that were voted by the congregation for

various purposes, but these expenditures will, in our opinion, be found amply compensated for by the increased interest and pleasure imparted by such contributions, and will far more than commensurate the nominal outlay.

Your Board of Managers, while congratulating you on such pleasing results, desire to acknowledge their great obligations to the large number of the congregation who so heartily respond by contributing liberally of their means for carrying on the temporal affairs of the church on all occasions.

To the Ladies' Aid Society they are particularly indebted for their valuable assistance in contributing so liberally toward the organ debt, also to Mr. Barron and choir for concert given in aid of the Building Fund from which the net sum of \$82.66 was realized.

But while there are such a large number of the congregation who respond most nobly to what they consider their duty, always interested in and mindful of the financial affairs of the church, yet there are also those, both members and adherents, whom we consider are able to give whose names do not appear on the contribution roll, and many who do contribute, do so very irregularly. We earnestly impress upon all such that we desire their compliance with the absolute requirements of the church, adopting the authorized envelope system and contributing regularly, thereby fulfilling their obligations as members and adherents, resting assured that they alone are responsible for their conduct in this important matter.

The thanks of the congregation are due to the choir, the ushers, and the auditors, for services faithfully and gratuitously rendered.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. We recommend the following resolution, passed at a joint meeting of the Boards of Session and Managers on the 13th inst.:

Moved by John Cameron, seconded by A. Greenlees, and adopted, that the joint meeting of the Boards of Session and Managers have had before them the subject of the Waterloo Street Mission, conducted under the auspices of this congregation and the congregation of Knox Church. They naturally would not desire to see the Mission go down, yet there are financial considerations involved that cannot be ignored. The people of the neighborhood seem desirous of continuing the services, and have expressed their willingness to make such subscriptions as they are able. Under these circumstances we recommend that the whole subject of the Waterloo Street Mission, so far as our own congregation's voice in it is concerned, be remitted by this annual meeting to the joint Session and Managers' Committee for action at any time through the year, with power.

2. We recommend that \$150 be voted to the Sabbath School of the church for the current year. The extra amount asked for is to enable the School Board to replenish the library and to meet other obligations.

3. We also recommend that four ushers be appointed, in addition to those now acting.

4. That two Pew Stewards be appointed, instead of one, as is now in order.

The six retiring managers are Messrs. Wm. Craig, R. Reid, T. Bryan, J. C. Crombie, R. Henderson, A. Mc-Pherson, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

MUSIC COMMITTEE.

The expenses of the concerts, amounting to \$26.64, were paid out of the general revenue. At the close of the year, Mrs. John Cooper having resigned her position, Miss Katherine Moore kindly consented to assist the choir for a short time at the same salary. Since then no money has been expended for a leader, and the especial thanks of the Committee, on behalf of the congregation, are hereby tendered to Miss Nellie Higgins, who has so kindly and acceptably filled the position of choir leader. Some music has been purchased for the choir, but no account of it will appear at present as it is the intention of Mr. Barron and the choir to give, at an early date, a sacred concert, from which we hope sufficient will be realized to meet any such expense.

In conclusion, the Committee think that the hearty and unqualified thanks of the congregation are due to the individual members of the choir for the excellent support they have given in the musical services, and for their devotion and self-sacrifice in their work. In these days, when so many churches find it necessary to pay not only a leader but many other members of the choir, it is gratifying to have a well-trained choir of good voices whose only motive is to render the praise service of the church in as acceptable a manner as possible. We trust that the congregation will continue, during the coming year, to heartily support the choir in their endeavor to secure good congregational singing, and, in every way possible, help to make the musical service a

beneficial worship. We would also invite any persons who have suggestions to offer to send them to the Committee, who will give them all due consideration. Mr. H. Bapty has been elected on the Committee in place of Mr. McClement.

SABBATH SCHOOL.

The teachers and officers have much pleasure in presenting the following report, which, though not so good as that of the previous year is still encouraging, especially the report of the Treasurer.

Since January, 1896, the names of five teachers and officers were removed from the roll, while the number added was two Of scholars, the large number of fortyeight names were removed, while only twelve were added; net loss, thirty-six.

In view of the foregoing large decrease of names a committee of two teachers was formed, who went over the list of removals, when it was found that the cause of such removals was satisfactory—some had entered Mr. Clark's Bible Class, others gone to nearer schools, or had left this district.

At the beginning of the year there were twenty-five classes in the school, including the Infant Class, but during the course of the year they have been consolidated into twenty-two good average-sized classes.

The contributions for Missions (including \$6.40 collected by the Infant Class) amounted to \$285.38, an increase of \$10.74 over last year. This is a very creditable showing, considering the decrease of names on the roll.

MISSION COMMITTEE.

In coming before the congregation at the close of another year, which has been marked by even greater stringency than some of those which preceded it, your Committee is happy to be able to report that the contributions for missionary purposes have been maintained. Including a donation of \$25.00 for Home Missions from the Society for Bible Study, the amount raised this year has been \$772.60 as against \$776.00 in 1895. It should be stated, however, that included in last year's collections was a sum of \$39.10, being a surplus remaining in the hands of the Billeting Committee of the General Assembly which was thus applied, so that the amount actually contributed this year was greater than last.

The number of individual contributors is 131, an increase of 11 over last year, though the fact that 17 of these contributed sums of less than \$1.00 each has tended to reduce the average contribution, which this year is \$5.90 as against \$6.14 in 1895.

While cheerfully acknowledging the liberality of the congregation as a whole, and aware that many of our people are doing their full duty in regard to the missionary and benevolent work of the Church, it is nevertheless a matter of regret that a considerable number, even of those who contribute freely towards the maintenance of our own congregation, seem to be indifferent to what is really one of the great objects for which the Church was established, viz., furnishing to others, who are not so highly favored as we are, the Gospel which has done so much for us. Our own Church is endeavoring to carry on this noble work, both in

foreign lands and in the outlying and sparsely peopled districts of our own great Dominion, and when we think how much we are indebted to the self-denying labors of the pioneer missionaries, we surely ought to be willing to do the same service for our own countrymen who are going out in such numbers to the Northwest. These numbers are likely to be greatly increased during the The demands will be ever increasing, coming season. while the means at the disposal of those who have the work in charge are totally inadequate to meet present requirements or even to carry out engagements already The same state of affairs prevails in all departmade. ments of the Church's work, and unless substantial aid is furnished, its operations in all directions will have to be curtailed when extension is so urgently demanded.

When the Church at large recognizes, as it is beginning to do, not only its duty but its privilege in this matter, there will not be such a difference as is generally found between the amount spent by congregations for their own purposes, and that available for carrying out the command of the Master, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

For the information of those who have recently joined our congregation, and others who may not be conversant with the work carried on by the Church as a whole, a brief summary of the different schemes is given. They are as follows:

1. *Home Missions*—In the newer and smaller settlements from Quebec to the Pacific coast. Service at present at one thousand and seven points and in seven different languages. Since 1875 eighteen mission stations a year started on the road to self-support.

2. Augmentations of Stipends—Of ministers settled over congregations which have grown out of the stage of mission stations, but are not yet strong enough to stand alone. Since 1883 two hundred and fifty congregations have been thus helped to the self-sustaining point.

3 French Evangelization—Which includes the school at Pointe Aux Trembles. There are 1,415,090 people of French origin in Canada, mostly Roman Catholics. ' ur Church has ninety-three preaching stations among these, twenty-five ordained missionaries, ten student missionaries, seven colporteurs and twenty-three teachers. The aim is not controversy, but more light through the Bible.

4. Foreign Missions-Very wide spread, embracing New Hebrides, Coolies of Trinidad, Northwest Indians, Formosa, Honan, Central India, and Chinese in Canada.

5. *Colleges*—We have usually contributed to Knox and Manitoba. The colleges secure us an educated ministry, and are themselves centres of active missionary work.

6. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund-Supported in part by ministers' rates. A minister must be seventy years of age or wholly incapacitated for work to get any benefit from the fund.

7. Widows' and Orphans' Fund-Ministers pay rates also to this fund, in addition to what is given by congregations.

8. General Assembly Fund--To pay the necessary running expenses of the General Assembly.

One of the largest items of expenditure is for lesson helps, of which we endeavor to supply the best procurable, and while we note with pleasure the manifest interest taken in their studies by some, we regret its lack in others. We would urge on parents their duty in this matter—to see their children prepare the allotted lessons; catechism, golden text, memory verses and the lesson points. The teachers are at considerable pains in their preparation, and the scholars should be equally faithful.

We cannot close without expressing the help received by the presence with us of Mr. Scott and his successor, Rev. Walter Moffat; both gentlemen attending regularly and taking part faithfully in teaching. Much of our success is due to them.

Our thanks are again due to the First Presbyterian Sabbath School for their kind donation of \$50.00. May connection
