Hindus Admit Act, But Claim They Obeyed Orders of Ascetic.

LONDON, Sept. 24—The Evening News correspondent at Allshabad, British India, chronicled a peculiar case in which two Hindus were charged with aiding a Hindu ascetic to commit suicide by refilling a grave into which he had voluntarily descended. The accused men admitted their part in the affair, but said they were disciples of the ascetic and were bound to obey his instructions. It was also pleaded in their defence that the Holy Man had not committed suicide, but merely performed the religious rite of "Samadhi," that of being buried alive, while in a state of suspended animation.

Large Canadian Shipments Pass Through U. S. Ports

BY A. M. BELDING

MONTREAL, Sept. 23—I am still on the trail of that \$269,000,000 of Canadian trade which passed through American ports last year. Of this \$257, 359,567 represented exports, and \$11,615,674 imports. Of the exports, wheat and flour, barley, oats and rye account, for \$177,814,712, leaving \$79,544,855 resented by other products. What these are I am as yet unable to learn, in all, exclusive of grains and flour, passing through American ports.

From the printed report for 1904, however, I learn that in that year exports through United States ports to Argentina, Belgium, Brazil, China, Cuba, Denmark, Finland, France, St. Pierre and Miguelon, Germany, Greece, Hayti, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Netherlands Dutch East Indies, Norway, Poland and Dantzig, Sweden, Spain and Venezuela were valued at over \$45,000,000; while imports from some of the same countries and from Jamaica, New Zealand, Vessel Law Colombia, British India, Ceylon, Straits Settlements and Turkey accounted for nearly \$11,000,000, or over \$56,000,000.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Conservative Party of Canada, addressed an audience of more than 2,600, in the Imperial Theatre last evening.

He asserted his belief that money could not be spent to greater advantage than in the improvements and developments of the port of Saint John and declared that this had been the policy of his Government when in power.

MARITIME PROBLEM SEEN.

He declared that the great problem of the Maritime Provinces was one of transportation and repeated his promise to reduce rates from the Maritimes and from the West by paying part of the charge out of the treasury of the country. This was not a dole, he contended, but was a means of equalizing the advantages of Confederation.



He had got his figures from the report of R. G. Dun and Company. He did not contend that all failed because the tariff had been reduced, but did think that the threat held over business was the main factor. Did any fail here, he asked. He advised his hearers to look about the city. They had looked in Moncton, Halifax, Sydney, Amherst and others places and hed found many.

HALIFAX PLANT CITED.

One glaring instance was the feritizer factory in Halifax, he said. The Government had taken off the tariff on the grounds that it would assist agriculture, and the plant had been forced to close. No farmer had bought his fertilizer one cent cheaper, he contended. What had happened was that the American manufacturer, with the Canadian competition gone, had boosted his prices and was now charging the farmer more than previously. He quoted many figures to show a drop in the steel business. Were the Maritimes better off because less money had been paid steel workers, he went on. Could agriculture bear the burden of taxation now carried by industry? No, he answered.

He had been told he was making too much of the depression and that Canada was better off than other nations. "If I produced no figures at all, would any one in the audience believe this?" he queried.

POPULATION SHOULD GAIN.

HOME POLICY BLAMED.

All this occurred, the speaker said, because Canada adopted a different policy from the others. This failure also was the underlying cause of the transportation trouble he felt. Also the cause of increasing the burden of debt and the present unsatisfactory conditions throughout the country.

If Canada could double her population the transportation problems of the 40,000 miles of railways would be solved, according to Sir Henry Thornton. How with a decreasing population under present conditions could this be brought about the speaker asked? Prior to the war 400,000 immigrants a year were entering Canada and now under the present government's policy 110,000 were brought to Canada last year at a cost of \$4,000,000 and a large portion of these could not speak our language. During the same time 140,000 Canadian-born were emigrating to the United States. In other words, the speaker pointed out, Canada was paying this huge amount for the pleasure of interchanging 110,000 foreigners for 140,000 native Canadians. WHAT RAILWAYS MEAN.

Four years ago a member of the King Government remarked that it would be better to get rid of the railways if they had to be sold for one dollar. The systems represented an investment of \$1,474,000,000, and of this Canada was responsible for \$1,212,000,000 and if the rialways were disposed of in this way the burden of their debt would still rest on the people's shoulders, he declared.

When the wrecks of railways were taken over in 1917 they had to be gathered together under one system, he said. An effort was made to operate them as economically as possible and as a result the traffic was increasing yearly until in 1921 at a rate of about \$16,000,000 each year.
