

CALDWELL IS NAMED; TO BE INDEPENDENT

Member for Carleton-Victoria in Last Parliament Will Contest Constituency as Independent Liberal-Progressive

ANDOVER, N. B., Sept. 23.—"If successful in the coming election I shall go to Ottawa as your representative with an independent attitude and with the firm intention of supporting all legislation conducive to the best interests of the Dominion at large and this constituency, regardless of the party by whom it is sponsored."

So declared T. W. Caldwell amidst an enthusiastic reception as he arose to accept the Independent Liberal-Progressive nomination which was tendered him at the Liberal-Progressive convention for Carleton-Victoria held here this afternoon.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Details of the scheme to build a "goods" tube railway under London, has just been announced.

The scheme is an Anglo-American one, involving a capital of \$23,000,000, and throughout each of the three years during which the railway will be under construction it is estimated that 20,000 men will be employed.

VENIOT TELLS HOW N. B. PAYS FOR GOOD ROADS

Automobile Fees Funded and Money Borrowed Against It

HON. W. R. CLUBB NEW HEAD OF ASSOCIATION

Hon. Mr. Veniot Honorary Pres.; Hon. D. A. Stewart on Directorate

QUEBEC, Sept. 23.—"It is within the province of the people to tell their elected representatives what taxes they shall pay. We are the public owners of a great transportation railway system and yet we spend millions of money to build highways so that automobile business may compete unfairly with these railways."

The statements quoted were uttered today by Controller Cameron, of Toronto, during the course of a discussion on taxation at today's session of the Canadian Good Roads Association convention. Mr. Cameron believed that so long as public ownership was a part of Canadian policy, just so long should the people support the railways and not permit unfair competition to divert their revenues to other places.

VENIOT REPLIES. Ex-Premier Veniot, of New Brunswick, who is past president of the association, replied to Mr. Cameron's remarks. On the question of taxation he stated that every province seemed to have a different system, and he reviewed the systems in use in Ontario and Nova Scotia. Turning to the matter in which the problem was handled in New Brunswick, he stated that there was no municipal taxation for road building purposes there. They had the best gravelled roads in the Dominion, simply because a few years ago they earmarked the automobile fees paid in, funded them, borrowed money against this fund, and paid both principal and sinking fund from it.

RARE VOLUME IS FOUND BY CHANCE

Medical Book Published in 1659 is Presented to London Hospital

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Another instance of the way in which valuable books remain hidden for years and then are discovered only by chance is revealed by the presentation to St. Bartholomew's Hospital of a folio copy of Remmelin's "Catontrum Microscopicum," one of the earliest anatomical atlases.

The book was found among a collection of papers left by the late Dr. F. V. Elkington, of Fenny Compton, a well-known medical man in South Warwickshire.

The covers were gone and many pages were tattered, but the flaps, which lifted to show the various portions of the human body, were intact.

The discoverer of the estate had no idea of the value of the book. It was sent to St. Bartholomew's because the owner had been a student there.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—An unknown man who, for some months past, had been living in a hole in Southend cliff, was the subject of an inquest recently. The attendant on the cliff said that he had seen the man, who could hardly

walk, come from a hole which was formed by the base of the cliff, and pick up scraps of foods that visitors threw away. Thousands of people, he added, passed the place daily.

Medical evidence showed that the man, whose age was about 40, was in an advanced stage of consumption, accelerated by exposure, and also severe heart trouble.

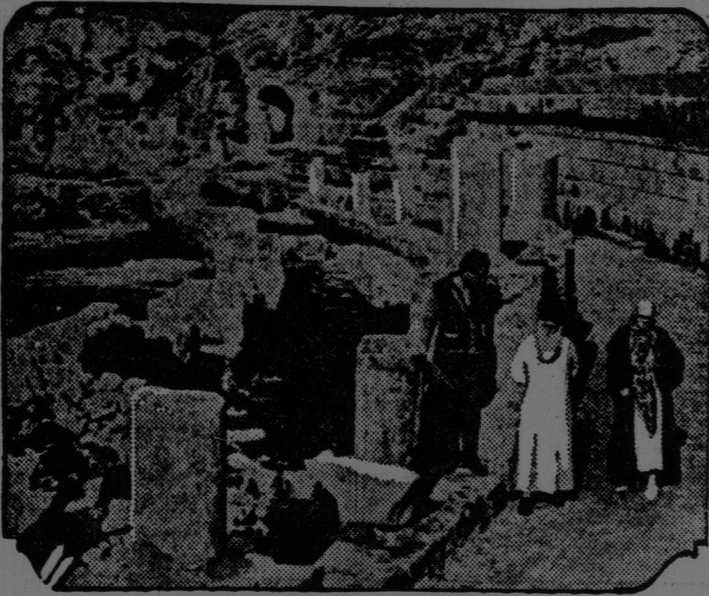

HISTORY OF RACE BEING UNEARTHED IN HILL



THE RUINS OF THE AMPHITHEATER AT CARTHAGE

Atop a great precipice of blood-red rocks upon the northern coast of Africa, looking down upon the azure Gulf of Tunis, a group of pioneers of the last frontier—scientific research workers—are at work. They are using powerful streams of water to wash away the sandy rock. Then they are passing the debris through sand sieves. Their hose is washing away centuries of time. Their sieves are sorting out the records of past civilizations. For the scientists, under the direction of Count Byron De Prorok, are bringing to light the ancient city of Carthage. Count Prorok is carrying on, with intensified methods, the work in which Father Delattre, known as the dean of European archaeologists, has been engaged for 50 years. Legend has it, as all high school students of Latin know, that the Phoenicians under Queen Dido founded Carthage. The date is usually set at 823 B. C. Carthage figures prominently in the history of the ancient world. In the sixth century, B. C., she dominated the Mediterranean. Then came the great wars with the Greeks. Centuries later the great wars between Carthage and Rome were fought, ending with the destruction of Carthage by the Romans in 146 B. C. The Romans rebuilt Carthage in 122 B. C. and eventually it became one of the great centres of Christianity. But in 698 A. D., the city was destroyed by the Arabs, never to be rebuilt. Count Prorok's excavations are revealing the successive layers of civilization in Carthage. The first excavations revealed Arab tombs. Below them, a Christian chapel was found. Then Roman citizens' and still deeper, Phoenician tombs that are thought to date back to 700 B. C. Running the sand through sieves has yielded hundreds of coins, beads and other small objects. The streams of water have uncovered many monuments. Among them are the

400 WILL ATTEND OTTAWA SESSIONS

Drug Suppression and Minority Rights in Inter-parliamentary Programme.

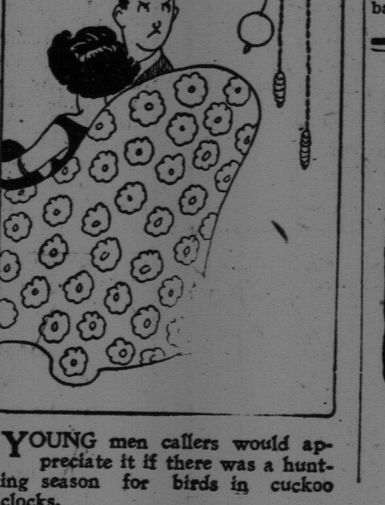
OTTAWA, Sept. 23.—The meeting here October 13 of the Inter-Parliamentary Union will bring to Canada a most distinguished body. There will be coming here from Europe and Asia 400 delegates representing 39 nations. Among the members there will be the most prominent statesmen of Europe. The Union is to meet for five or six days in Washington and conclude with a plenary meeting of one day in Ottawa. Two objects have been reserved for discussion here—the rights of minorities and the suppression of narcotic drugs. The Inter-Parliamentary Union was founded 23 years ago for the purpose of promoting world peace and closer international relations. Since the formation of the League of Nations it has worked in close co-operation with that body.

The subjects to be discussed at Washington and Ottawa will be made the basis of recommendations to the League of Nations and also to the governments of the countries represented in the union. The Canadian group extended an invitation to the Union to hold a couple of sessions here and towards defraying the expenses an initial vote of \$10,000 has been made.

WOULD SETTLE DIFFERENCES

Salvation Army Officers Reported in New York on Mission.

Said to Be Emissaries of General for Adjustment With Commander Eva Booth.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—An attempt to reconcile the differences between Commander Evangelist Booth, head of the Salvation Army in the United States, and General Bramwell Booth, her brother, who at his London headquarters directs all the affairs of the Army, is being made by two emissaries of General Booth, who arrived in this country a week ago. Just what progress has been made in the negotiations is not learned.

The representatives of General Booth are Commissioner Edward J. Higgins, chief of staff of the Salvation Army, and Commissioner Lamb, also attached to the London headquarters. They have been staying at the Hotel Algonquin, and Miss Booth has also been staying there. They selected this hotel, popular with theatrical folk, for their negotiations instead of the army headquarters here so that their mission might be kept secret.

Miss Booth's friends have feared that she would be removed in about a year when her extension of three years as head of the army here will have been completed. She was removed three years ago, but so many protests were made by members of the Salvation Army here and others interested in her work, that after about a year she was given orders to remain here until next spring. It was General Booth's intention when he announced her removal not to appoint anyone to succeed her as director of all the army posts in the United States, but to leave the work in charge of three commissioners in the three chief districts into which this country is divided.

General Booth has continually alighted his sister's work, her friends say. Commissioner Higgins denied that his mission had anything to do with Miss Booth's tenure of office, although

THE ELIXIR OF LIFE.

(Chicago Journal of Commerce.)

In the belief of the alchemists of the middle ages there existed not only a substance that would transmute base metals into gold, but there also existed a substance that would make a man immortal. This substance, always sought but never found, was called "the elixir of life."

In time the belief sprang that this elixir of life consisted of water to be drunk at a magical fountain. In the fourteenth century there lived a wanderer who contributed to the spread of this belief. There is doubt as to what his real name was, but he wrote under the name of Sir John Mandeville. In his celebrated book, "The Voyage and Travel of Sir J. Mandeville," he asserted that he himself had drunk three times at this fountain of youth and had felt marvellously refreshed. But perhaps the taste palled on him, for he did not return to the fountain often enough to survive to this day.

Other statements authenticating the existence of the fountain of youth were attributed to Prester John (or Priest John), the legendary Christian prince of Central Asia. In the twelfth and thirteenth centuries a story was circulated to the effect that Prester John had touched for the existence of the fountain of youth.

The belief in this fountain lasted during the entire middle ages and even later. In the year 1518, Prince de Leon, the Spanish explorer, set out at the age of 33 to find the fountain of youth. His place of departure was Porto Rico. His goal was a large island said to lie to the northwest. By that journey he discovered Florida, landing at a place somewhat north of the site of the present St. Augustine.

Fourteen days after his death Ponce de Leon did not realize he had landed on a large island. He knew only he had found the fountain of youth. Nobody has found it since. Not in a fountain nor in anything else has anyone discovered the elixir of life.

SAINT JOHN TEAM WINS GREAT VICTORY AT SPRINGHILL, 5-3

CORRIGAN AND HANNAH STAR AS NEW BRUNSWICK BOYS GET EDGE IN SERIES WITH N.S.

Adverse Weather Conditions and Playing Away From Home Fail to Check Spirit of Watermen. Players Tendered Banquet

UNDER grey skies and a wind that carried the chill of January snows, Saint John Watermen, champions of New Brunswick, won a great victory at Springhill yesterday, 5 to 3, and thereby advanced to within one game of the Maritime finals, the first to be decided in many years.

That it was a great victory, none can deny. The prowess of the Springhill Miners had shown to every corner of the Maritimes by their tremendous hitting and fine fielding ability as they steadily ploughed their way through to the Nova Scotia semi-finals, the fifth they have reached in succession. In the series with Westville, they won two games decisively on their home grounds and then lost two and tied another, making a third game necessary at Truro last Saturday.

It is no secret that the local boys were prepared for defeat at Springhill in view of the Miners' wonderful string of victories on their home grounds, but they also went bravely determined to give the Miners a taste of the never-say-die spirit that carried them to the City League title here after all hope seemed lost and caused them to sweep triumphantly to the New Brunswick title over Sussex, Moncton and Bathurst.

The chief posts of honor in this fine win go to Ira Hannah and Johnny Corrigan, third baseman for the locals. Manager Snodgrass had plenty of batting Lloyd Stirling at Springhill, but at the last moment decided to rely on the experience and iron-hearted Hannah—the boy who won the New Brunswick title last year for the Portlands and whose strong right arm had given them many a victory this year.

Sharing honors with Hannah was Johnny Corrigan, whose hitting and fielding in the championship series has stamped him as a mighty valuable ball player. In the game against Bathurst here, Corrigan got four out of five and he repeated the trick at Springhill against Albion. In his first time up, Corrigan singled safely and on the second occasion, slashed out a long double that sent over a run. In the third time, he opened the fifth with a single and scored on Bartlett's single.

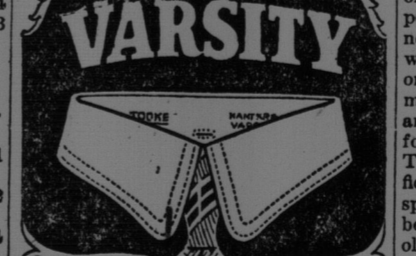
TRACK MEET FOR GIRLS IN OCTOBER. Y. W. C. A. Physical Instructors Outline Preliminary Plans.

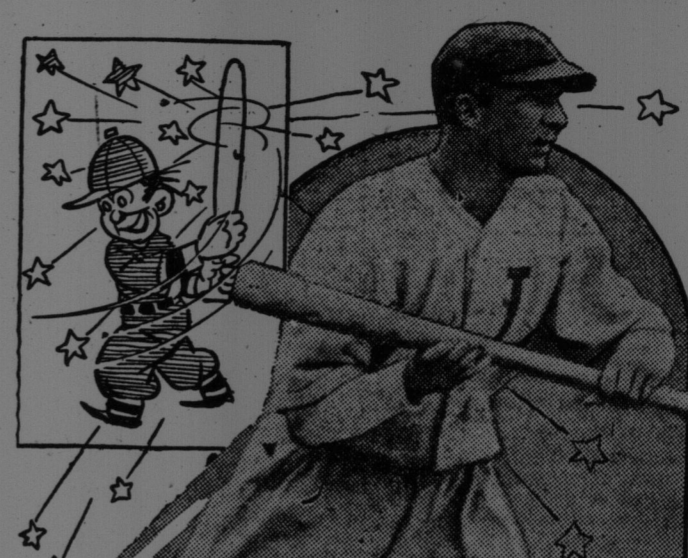
