Rev. John McNeill, D. D., is just completing his fifteenth year as pastor of the Walmer Road church, Toronto.



## MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Murray, Premier of Nova Scotia for nearly twenty-five years, now in a sanatorium in Battle Creek, Mich., received several of the most remarkable tributes which have ever been accorded a public man anywhere, last evening in the house of assembly, when political friends and foe alike united in eulogizing the veteran Liberal leader of his province, hoping that he would be spared to lead the forces of Government again in the pro-

**IN PARLIAMENT**

Ottawa, May 25. — (By Canadian Press.)—The Senate held two sessions yesterday. The motion to withdraw the amendment to the act amending the Judges' Act, which had been refused by the House of Commons, was defeated by twenty-nine to thirty.

The bill to create a national research commission met with considerable opposition and discussion was deferred until today. Sir James Loughheed moved the second reading of the Lake of the Woods Control Bill, made necessary by the failure of the Ontario government to pass legislation agreed to by Manitoba, Ontario and the dominion. The bill received second reading.

There was no session of the House of Commons. Today, in the Commons, the remaining bills on the order paper will be dealt with, including the bill amending the criminal code. The estimates of the departments of public works, finance and customs and inland revenue will be taken up. The estimates of other departments will be considered if time permits.

In the Senate, the bill creating a national research institute will be taken up.

**PROTESTS AGAINST  
ST. JOHN AS CENTRE**

Halifax, May 24.—A unanimous protest was made by the house of assembly

### SUGGESTS THAT ALL THE LETTERS BE MADE PUBLIC

Ion. Mr. Veniot Makes Very Effective Reply to Mr. Lawlor's Letter — Invites St. John Man to Publish Further Correspondence.

To the Editor of The Times: Sir—I see by the Globe that the person who made overtures to me writes a letter in which he claims I did not keep private what took place between him and me last December re federal cabinet position. My friend is in error. I mentioned the matter only to those whom he suggested I should talk it over with—three in all. He admits that I was to have done this. Further than that I did not go. I never had any communication with Lemieux, Murphy or any one else. I never revealed the cor-

respondence that took place between him and me, although this correspondence was not marked "private." I kept the secret until the Conservative press tried to make the public believe that I had sought the position. It was then time for me to defend myself. An attempt to draw a red herring across the trail is being made by the statement that I saw no letter from Premier Meighen containing an offer of

a cabinet position. I never stated that such a letter contained such an offer. What I did say was that "the person who made overtures to me presented to me a letter signed by Premier Meighen. This letter could not have been a forgery. This letter showed that the premier was in close touch with the situation. That is what I stated and the publication of the premier's letter proves that I told the truth, since he therein states he would discuss the matter with Mr. Wignone and also that he "had no intimation whatever from the party to whom you refer as to his attitude towards the government or toward the paramount issues of the day." This certainly looks as if the premier was willing to have the proposition discussed. He certainly did not turn it down.

From this letter had not Mr. Lawlor every reason to conclude that if my attitude towards the government was all right there would be little trouble for me to reach the Meighen cabinet? And this is exactly the task that Mr. Lawlor had set himself following out the suggestion contained in that very letter, the existence of which Mr. Meighen denied in parliament on the 19th inst., but which he had to admit on the 20th, after I had wired to the press that I was prepared to appear before a parliamentary committee and prove as correct what I had stated in my interview with the press a few days before. Mr. Lawlor refers to letters of mine. Why does he not publish them? He has published some of them. He publishes his letter to me at the same time. The public will then be able to judge if he was

If he had no reason to believe that the premier meant business why did he want me to "meet the premier or his representative at Montreal or Ottawa" or "board his train and go with him on his visit to Sydney" which visits on the programme just about that time? Having forced the production of the now famous and oft denied letter, and the public having been able to read it, I feel that I have substantially proved what I stated in my interview, and I

am prepared to let an impartial public decide whether or not Mr. Lawlor and Premier Meighen understood one another in their endeavor to ascertain my "attitude towards the government" at paving the way to a more direct invitation to enter the federal cabinet.

### YARMOUTH HAS NEW MYSTERY

Yarmouth, N. S., May 24—Yarmouth is faced with another mystery through the disappearance of Harry Stephenson (Coe), a well-known figure to Yarmouth citizens. Coe was last seen on Saturday morning at about eleven o'clock, at the home of an acquaintance, Mrs. Sheelae, Main street, when he said it was his intention to go up to Yarmouth North. The first that was really known of his disappearance was on Sunday morning, when church-goers began to arrive at Zion United Baptist church for the eleven o'clock service and found the church unopened, owing to the non-appearance of Coe, who is the caretaker. Inquiries were made at his rooming house, when it was ascertained that he had not returned there on Saturday night, and

search of his room disclosed the fact that everything was in good order. Coe, who was a man between forty and fifty years of age, was about five feet, six or seven inches tall, clean shaven, ruddy complexioned, blue eyes and walked very straight, with a soldierly carriage.

The missing man was formerly a native of Number 14, Holy Mount, Alexander Road, South Fort, Lancashire, England, but since the war, in which he served in the English forces, came to Canada and after living a while in Halifax located in Yarmouth. No reason

whatever can be found for his sudden and mysterious disappearance and when seen on Saturday he seemed to be in his usual good health and happy humor. It is understood that Coe recently came into some property in England through the death of an aunt there.

**NEW CAR ROUTING FOR WEST SIDE**  
 Suggestion Made by Power Company Manager at Conference Regarding Queen Square Tracks—Delegation at City Hall.  
 A conference attended by the city commissioners, a delegation from West St. John, and Percy W. Thomson, manager of the New Brunswick Power Company, was held in the mayor's office this morning regarding removal of the street car tracks from Queen square, West St. John. Mr. Thomson, after the delegation was heard, asked for a few days before giving a definite reply as he expressed the desire to take the matter up further with the directors of the company.  
 The delegation, which was led by W. E. Scully, M.P.A., presented practically the same case as last week.  
 Mr. Thomson said that in his opinion the tracks should be laid in any other street. He suggested, however, that the company might consider a change in the route of the whole west side system which would practically do away with the southern half of the Queen square loop. The plan would be for a ten minute service from the ferry up Rodney street, along Ludlow, Tower and Lancaster streets to Dufferin row or Clifton street and then along Lancaster avenue to the bridge. This would put the whole of the west side into one circuit instead of two as at present.

**THE FALLS BRIDGE MATTER REVIVED**  
 The Provincial Government to Meet Mayor and Shipping People Here June 2.  
 Hon. C. W. Robinson, acting premier, has notified Mayor Schofield that the government will be in St. John on June 2 and will meet the mayor and representatives of the shipping interests here regarding the matter of the height of the C. P. R. bridge across the falls.  
 It is understood that the shipping people of the city have asked the provincial government to intervene in the matter and the proposed meeting is the result.  
 It was announced today that the provincial government would hold its regular meeting in Fredericton on Tuesday evening, May 31.

**ULTIMATUM AND REFUSAL**  
 Another Step Taken This Morning in Matter of Street Railway and Men.  
 A delegation from the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway and Electric Workers called on the manager of the N. B. Power Company this morning and served an ultimatum mandating last year's wages and working conditions and full recognition of the union. The company refused to consider this and announced that their new wage schedule would be bulletined in a few days.

**PERMISSION TO DECREASE RATES**

**Utilities Commission Allows Bathurst Company to Cut Electric Rate from 12 to 11 Cents—To St. Stephen Tomorrow.**  
 The New Brunswick Public Utilities Commission, in session here today, issued an order granting the Bathurst Electric Light Co. permission to decrease their rates from twelve to eleven cents a kilowatt hour. The board made further order requiring the company to set aside three per cent of its gross earnings for a depreciation fund. H. C. Ramsay of Bathurst appeared for the company.  
 The board also dealt with routine business, including the reports from the public utilities throughout the province regarding the amount of revenue paid in the preceding year.  
 E. S. Carter officiated as secretary for the first time since his appointment. The board adjourned to meet tomorrow in St. Stephen, when two cases regarding electric light and water rates will be taken up.

**COUNTY COURT**

**One Matter for Grand Jury—Speedy Trials Case is Begun.**

The May sitting of the St. John County Court, scheduled to open yesterday, was begun this morning. His Honor Judge Armstrong presiding. There were one criminal matter and several civil non-jury cases. The case of W. L. Denson, Louise Robichaud and Lottie Jackson, charged in connection with breaking and entering some summer houses at Millerville, was taken up under Speedy Trials.  
 The grand jury adjourned until Friday morning and the petit jury until tomorrow at 10.30, when the court will resume.

**A CASE OVER STRENGTH OF BEER**  
 William J. Lahey, charged with having sold, stronger than the law allows, for sale in his licensed beer shop, pleaded not guilty in the police court this morning. Sub-inspector Barrett testified that he visited the defendant's place of business in Brussels street yesterday and that there were ten or eight men in the front store. He said he picked up three bottles of beer in the front shop and tasted one and going into the back shop took a bottle of beer from a case there. He took two of the bottles to M. Y. Paddock, provincial analyst, to be analyzed.  
 M. Y. Paddock, told of the analysis, that he found one bottle contained 2.5 per cent proof spirit and the other 3.1. Cross-examined by the counsel for the defence, J. A. Barry, he said he was not sure which of the two bottles produced in evidence contained the stronger spirit as he had not marked them. Mr. Barry asked that an application be made to the health department at Ottawa to have the beer analyzed there, as it was so near the two per cent a mistake might easily have been made. This was granted and the case was postponed until Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock, the defendant putting up a deposit for his appearance.  
 One man charged with drunkenness was remanded.

**R. K. Y. C. SEASON OPENED ON MAY 24**  
 The Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club was officially opened for the season yesterday morning by Vice-Commodore Walter Logan. In the evening they will have a grand reception for members and friends and close the programme with a reception and entertainment. The club members are looking forward for a banner year. Some new boats have joined and others have changed owners. Throughout the year a series of races will be held and valuable trophies presented to the winners.
