He was opposed to joint guarantee of deposits. "Many banks," he said, "would go out of business rather than guarantee the deposits of other banks."

To Major Sharpe Mr. MacLeod said that an efficient system of external inspection would protect the depositors. The time might come when segregation of deposits would be very desirable.

Duncan Ross wanted to know what were the specific objections for a joint fund guaranteeing all deposits.

"It would limit conservation. It would encourage banks to be very reckless knowing that the others would guarantee them, and it would be ruinous," was the witness' reply.

To Relax Rules for New Banks

Gordon Waldron, barrister and one of the owners of the Farmers' Sun, Toronto gave his views on banking, at the night session. He said he had become convince of the necessity of relaxing the rules for forming new banks and permitting bank with capital as small as \$100,000. The latter might not be allowed to have branches Experienced managers, he believed, could be found for them, for banking, after all was not necessarily confined to experts.

"Why do you favor smaller banks?" asked Mr. Ames.
