Wood led for the first mile, which was run in 4.42. Queal set the pace for the second mile, time 9.33, and kept up the terrific grind until the third mile. Time, 14.40. Stockholm, June 23—The number of entries for the Olympic games is greater than on any previous occasion. Seventeen heats and two qualifying rounds will be necessary to reduce the field of ninety-five entered for the 100 metre dash to the six men entitled to compete in the final.

One hundred men are entered for the 200 metre dash; 28 will contest in the 400 metre event, and 72 in the 800 metres.


