Mr. Flem-ming, the provincial secretary, had receiv-ed a grant from the government of \$1,000 to repair a road in or near the Blue Bell tract of land, for carrying on lumbering operations for his own use. Mr. Robinson said he had not heard of it before.

(Prolonged applause). Turning to the record of the Liberal party in Canada generally, Mr. Robinson pointed out some of the great achieve-ments of the party during the years they have been in power. He closed by point-ing out to the electors present that their appreciation of such a record is another reason for returning the Liberal party to power in the province of New Brunswick. 


