Manila, Sept. 15—A rice famine threatens the Philippines. The price of the staple is already above all previous records, and advancing by leaps. The supply on hand in the islands is very limited, and the general scarcity of the cereal throughout the orient makes unlikely any substantial relief from importation.

The likelihood of an extended famine has led India, China and Siam to prohibit the exportation of rice and a similar measure of self-protection is expected from Kangoon. It is suggested that it may be possible in the Philippines to substantied edict, as soon as prices become prohibitive. Public relief of some kind will probably prove necessary, and the governor general has appointed a commission to investigate.







He said he made the motion at the request of a ver large number of working men of ST. JOHN CITY. It was represented to him that the settlement made by the banks, the street railwar and civic servants when the bill was before the house a few day are did not meet with the approval of the men who earn a small income. The poll tax of five dollars have heavily upon such men. Last year out of 3,300 working men who were assessed on income of less than three huntred dollars in St. John, only four hundred were able to pay their taxes. In the lest fifteen years not more than forty of fifty per cent. of the taxes of the small wage earners have been collected. Every year, the per centage of non-payers seems to increase. Assuming the average tax of persons a sessed or at income of \$3 0 and less, last year as six dollars, this would give the city a revenue of twenty-fir hundred dollars from the four hundred who paid.

It would seem that the poorer the man was the less regard they had for him in making up the assessments. Three hundred dollars meant a great deal to a poor man as he ((Mr. Lowell) knew from experience because he had worked for three hundred dollars a year, and found it attremely difficult to keep body and soul together, let alone pay a joll tax of \$5.00.

Last year the man who was assessed on \$100, paid with his poll tax a total of three dollars and seventy cents, which was increased under the ill now before the house to five dollars. On three hundred dollars income last year the total tax was \$4.40, this year if the bill went through, it would be \$5.00.

The smaller the man's income the heavier the new assessment law bore pon him. He thought on all incomes from \$200 to \$300 the poll tax might be left at three dollars. In the county where he resided the poll tax was only a dollar and a half. This motion was seconded by Mr. McKeown.


