

NOTICES.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE will meet on the second Tuesday of February, May, August and November, at 4 o'clock, in the Synod office, University street.

ANNUAL SERMONS are appointed to be preached and collections taken up as follows:

In January, on the first Sunday after the Epiphany, *for Foreign Missions.*

In February, *for the Mission Fund of this Diocese*, by Envelopes which are distributed in the churches on the first Sunday in the month and handed in with the Offertory collection on the second Sunday in the month.

In March, *for the Widows and Orphans Fund.*

In May, *for Theological Training*, in aid of the Theological College at Montreal, or Bishop's College at Lennoxville.

In September, *for the Mission Fund.*

In November, *for the Superannuation Fund.*

An assessment is made *towards the Bishopric of Algoma.*

An Assessment is made *towards Expenses of Synod.* (See page 787, Journal XVII.)

All Parochial Missionary collections should be made in each Parish or Mission, and forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer with lists, *by the 31st December, on which day the Synod Accounts for the year are closed. Sums received after this date cannot be printed in the Treasurer's report of the previous year.*

It is not safe to send money through the post offices, except in the form of post office order, or by cheque or bank draft made payable to order.

The Secretary of the Executive Committee desires to call special attention to the fact that he acknowledges the receipt of all sums sent to him *on the days on which they come to hand.* If at any time such acknowledgment be not received in due course, the person who made the remittance is requested to notify him without delay, in order that inquiry may be made.

THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY.

15TH JANUARY, 1895.

The Thirty-Sixth Annual Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, the 15th day of January, 1895.

There was a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Cathedral at half past ten o'clock by the Lord Bishop of Montreal, assisted by the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Moosonee, Ven. Archdeacons Lindsey and Naylor, and the Rev. W. E. Kaneen.

The Bishop read his charge to the Synod as follows:

"DEAR BRETHREN IN CHRIST:—A sower went forth to sow his seed, and when he sowed, some fell by the wayside: some fell upon stony places: some fell among thorns: and other fell into good ground. In the exposition of the parable we are told that the seed is the 'Word of the Kingdom.' In another place it is called 'the Word,' and in yet another 'The Word of God.' There is no fault to be found with the seed. The seed in each case is to be considered vital and sound. It is able to spring up (with due opportunity) and bring forth abundantly the good fruit which nourishes to eternal life.

"We (who are met here together to-day, avowedly to promote the work of the Church) are the sowers of the Word of God. The perfect and living seed, beloved, is entrusted to our weak human hands. We are required to sow broadcast, as did the sower of the seed in our Lord's parable. Our office is ancient, dignified and responsible, and our duty simple and clear. We are to preach the Word, in season and out of season, by which, I understand, without cessation, no rest allowed in this honorable labor. In our lives, as well as by our words, we are to be continually mindful of our high and holy calling, not only in the public services of the Church, but in private visits, and in the home life, we are to be at all times ready to make known the mysteries of the Kingdom of God. I have spoken of our duty as sowers of the Word of God as simple and clear, but I must qualify those words. I speak to men who know that human infirmity often renders that difficult which in itself is

simple and perfect. The ministry of the Word is not accomplished without effort; it supposes knowledge; it supposes experience; it supposes personal devotion, self-sacrifice, and, above all, faith in God and in the power of the Word. Broadcast sowers as we are, we are not invited to cast the seed to the birds of the air; on the contrary, it is right to use judgment in the selection of the ground. In the nature of things some seed must, in our eyes, be lost, but the good ground is what is to be desired, and when found is to be appreciated and worked. In this duty of sowing I wish to be understood as including all the active duties of the ministry, preaching, teaching, public services, and private ministrations, and it is to this last I now call your attention, and shall detain you for a short time. There are few duties of the pastorate more difficult to perform satisfactorily than house to house ministrations, especially in this age of what is called advanced thought. A clergyman wishes to be true to himself and true to his sacred calling, but does not desire to intrude uninvited into the personal peculiarities of thought and opinion of his parishioner. It often happens that where he is supposed to be the teacher, he finds it necessary to accept the attitude of the learner, and he does learn patience, if nothing more. On his part (whatever the diversity of religious habit and taste between him and his people) he must be ready at all times to sympathize with their joys and sorrows. He must strive to overcome his own prejudices and ignorances as well as theirs, in order that he may be to them in all humility and in all exigencies, the minister of Christ. Now (not for a moment forgetting the presence and teaching and power of the Spirit of God) so hard is it to bring oneself into due subordination of mind and spirit, that the best and strongest of us cannot but break from time to time into that human cry, 'Who is sufficient for these things?' The difficulties, indeed, are so many and so varied, that often he finds it hard, for example, to lead or join in prayer as he would wish, when engaged in the duty of family visitations. Many a young clergyman (and some old ones, also) is greatly perplexed how to act for the best, accustomed, perhaps, himself to go to God in private prayer, as a child to a father, with a few spontaneous, simple words of praise and petition—a clergyman in such circumstances dares not trust himself to extemporize. He knows he is before an audience, and will be criticized; and whether that criticism be friendly or unfriendly, he is conscious that his mental frame will not be that of devotion. He becomes afraid of himself, lest he should unconsciously sow broadcast some of his own immature aspirations and substitute his own weak imaginings for the strong vitality of the Word of God.

"Doubtful of their own sufficiency, some men solve the difficulty (or think they solve it) by having recourse to manuals of devotion prepared expressly for the pastoral use of priests and deacons; but in most cases these forms are found to be meagre and artificial, and (after trial) are abandoned as unsatisfactory and unprofitable. But the Church of England minister has not to look abroad for the formal help he so often needs. He has under his hand a manual of devo-

In the Church of England Prayer-book he will find suitable forms for all general occasions; and a study of the actual words used will prove the truth of my assertion, that the language has been chosen in strict accordance with that used in the Bible itself, and therefore words most suitable to be addressed to the Most High by His humble and dependent creatures. I can but permit myself one or two illustrations to point these remarks. The office of 'Holy Communion' with its collects and exhortations is a mine of religious wealth, containing such variety of subjects as to enrich the pastor's thoughts and fill his mouth with words sure to establish most profitable relations between the visitor and visited. It is, of course, quite necessary that the minister should be entirely familiar with the subjects of his office, that his memory should be well stored with the intention and words of the office, so that the words may come at once to his memory in case of need, and be rightly and intelligently applied. I will only add that, used as a mere formality, unassimilated and half understood, these prayers and exhortations, notwithstanding their beauty and spirituality and living power, would be brought into a contempt which I will not contemplate. The special services have special value; each special service fills its place in the education of the soul. And, again, I say, make yourselves closely familiar with them in all their parts, and you will never lack words wherewith to teach the young, to greet the happy, encourage the sick, strengthen the dying, or console the mourner. And then you have the psalms in full: and selected portions of Scripture, and (whilst I would carefully guard myself against the thought in any mind that I would set aside the Bible) I suggest that these may be used to assist you in family visiting. As a rule, these selected Scriptures are of about the right length, and will afford you the most desirable opportunity for exposition and exhortation. The fact that these Scriptures recur in the public services secure that your readings and your remarks will come back to the memory of your people, will be a holy bond of union between you and them, and stir up an affectionate and fresh interest in the public services.

I now proceed to notice the business of the Synod. The report of the committee appointed to consider the mutual rights and duties of bishop and rectors in this diocese, which is printed in the last report of the Synod, though full and instructive, cannot be received as conclusive. I thought it necessary therefore to confer privately with the rectors of the city churches, that we might arrive at something practical. I pointed out that for want of mutual understanding opportunities were lost, which would, if the occasion were improved, lead to the extension and increased usefulness of the Church. The result of our conference is embodied in a resolution which will be submitted to this Synod, as a basis for full discussion, and I trust that both clergy and laity will give the subject their earnest and deliberate consideration, so that (whether modified or not) the present obstructive circumstances may be removed, and the welfare and religious influences of the Church be confirmed and expanded. The executors

of the late Mr. E. E. Shelton have notified the Executive Committee that they are prepared to pay over a certain portion of the property appertaining to this estate to the Synod for the use of the Mission Fund; at the same time informing them that the said property requires immediate outlay before it can be in a condition to bear revenue. Whatever income may be derived from rents or other sources will be quite exhausted on the property itself, or even may possibly be for a time an actual charge on the Executive Committee. Unhappily the Mission Fund itself has no surplus,—on the contrary, is largely overdrawn; and your judgment and energy will be required to advise concerning this property, which, if it receive wise treatment, will doubtless be ultimately a very valuable possession; though in the immediate present it may cause some painstaking and anxiety. The Executive Committee have expended much time and careful thought in the endeavor to bring the stipends of the missionary clergy up to the requirement of the canon. They have been in a degree frustrated in their laudable effort, chiefly (I might say entirely) by the lack of honest meeting of their responsibilities by some of the people of the parishes thus failing in their duty. I hope the Synod will see its way to taking action for the remedy of this wrong, seeing that in several instances the neglect (not to use a stronger word) is very marked.

"In the course of the year the Bishop has received a bequest from the late Mr. Henry Ogden Andrews, for charitable uses in the diocese, the determination of these uses being left (the trustees consenting) solely to the Bishop. I have thought it right, first, partially to endow the only charitable institution which by its constitution can be considered diocesan, thereby putting the Church Home on a safer footing for the future, and securing for it (by a promise of permanence) the assurance and dignity which its object requires, and which the patience and zeal of two generations of loyal Church workers amply deserve. This endowment, when the property of the Church Home is free from debt and in good working order, will give an income of not more than \$1,400, leaving abundant room for the exercise of benevolence on the part of members of the corporation of the Church Home and members of the Church generally. The residue of the Andrews estate has been devoted to the formation of a new institution for the benefit chiefly of immigrants and strangers, an institute which it is proposed shall bear the name of the "Andrews Home" in memory of the benefactor. The corporation of the Andrews Home, consisting primarily of the Bishop and trustees, has its work as yet more or less undefined, but a most suitable property has been secured, and I confidently expect to have it in working order by the opening of the navigation next May. The institution is by the words of its charter expressly appropriated, amongst other things, to the charitable work of the Synod. I therefore ask for it a favorable reception amongst our works of mercy, and a personal interest on the part of all members of the Diocesan Synod.

"I continue to find great support and satisfaction in the work of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College, under the management of its Rev. Princip

Canon Henderson. For the first time in the history of the diocese, all the mis-
sions are effectively supplied with church ministrations, and the clergy them-
selves, going out from the college, now numbering thirty-eight, show the true
missionary spirit of devotion and energy, which, with God's blessing on their
labors, will, in due time, bear the good fruit of peace and righteousness. I am
pleased to record the missionary spirit of the college. Its Missionary Society
conducts the mission at Outremont; supports a native agent in the diocese of
Madras; contributes to the support of a clergyman in Moosonee; and sends an
annual donation of \$50 to McKenzie River.

"The Prisoners' Aid Association has done during the past year a most Chris-
tian like work. It meets the prisoners, who wish assistance, on their release
from prison, and aids afterwards, by advice and in other ways, those who
will receive its agents. The report shows hard and useful work.

"I have pursued my usual course of parochial visitation through the year
with much personal satisfaction and, I trust, profit. Since the cold weather set
in I have been assisted by my friend and son in the faith, the Right Rev. the
Bishop of Moosonee, whose Episcopal ministrations on my behalf have been
most acceptable to those parishes and missions which he has visited, and especi-
ally (as he was able to inform the people concerning his particular work) to
the quickening and encouragement of their own religious life. I have, myself,
thus been enabled to give full attention to the Church work here in the city,
which this year, in a peculiar manner, has demanded a constant attendance, on
meetings and conferences, chiefly concerned about matters of business, but
quite important to the building up of the Church on its material and external
side. Within the year, 77 confirmations have been held, and 1073 persons have
received that holy rite—486 males and 587 females. The Rev. Rural Dean
Naylor, one of our most efficient missionaries, has been appointed Archdeacon
of Clarendon, and the Rev. Frank Smith, who approved himself in the mission
field before he became Rector of Hull, has been appointed Rural Dean of Cla-
rendon. St. Stephen's church and burying-ground at Thorne West, by God's
blessing upon the efforts of the Rev. J. L. Flanagan, have been consecrated.
The new church at Clarke's, in the mission of Portage du Fort, has been opened
and the burying-ground consecrated, the result of the faithfulness of Rev. H.
Paisted, following up work well begun by former pastors.

"A new church has also been opened at Thorne Centre for Rev. J. M. Coffin,
and another (St. Stephen's) at Kazubazua, by the energy of Rev. W. E. Kaneen.
The Rev. W. P. Chambers has been enabled to erect a new church at Glen
Bolton, St. Michael's, which I trust will be consecrated at my next visitation;
and the Rev. Charles G. Rollit has nearly completed a new church in his parish
at Stanbridge. It has been opened for Divine service, and reflects great credit
upon the energy of the rector. A few lines serve to record this expansion of
the Church work, but it would take pages to tell of the toil and self-denial
expended by faithful laymen and women, as well as by the clergy, in bringing
these works to a successful issue.

“ At the last meeting of the Executive Committee, attention was drawn to the condition of the ‘ Widows and Orphans Fund ’ of the diocese, and I was requested to speak thereof in my charge. I need not refer to the history of the fund, that is well known, especially the care by which, through the blessing of God, it has been so greatly prospered. And surely I need not urge the claims of the widow and the orphan of the clergy upon those who are ministered to by God’s own servants. I would simply beseech each clergyman, in reading this charge to the people, honestly to tell the people the amount given last year to this fund (or, in some instances, that the collection has been altogether neglected) by the parish in which he ministers, and make an appeal to conscience, asking, ‘ Will not God visit with His displeasure those who are so unmindful of God’s claim on behalf of the fatherless and widow? ’ You will observe how generously some of the congregations have contributed to this fund ; but you will remember, that unless this liberality is general, the grants to future annuitants may have to be diminished, seeing that an addition of only one would nearly absorb the remainder of the fund.

“ A society always active in well doing is the Montreal Diocesan Woman’s Auxiliary Society. Its works find their way wherever there is a church to be helped or Church people to be comforted.

“ I commend their report of work accomplished to your notice, and I strongly advise the formation of ‘ branches ’ in all our parishes.

“ May the blessing of God rest upon their wise and unselfish usefulness.

“ The Girls’ Friendly Society increases year by year in its usefulness. It is by such gentle influence for good that human beings (especially young girls) thrown on their own resources for a maintenance, with little in their surroundings to make them happy or hopeful, are lifted out of themselves and taught to look outward and upward for strength and sympathy. I would encourage the formation of such societies in all parishes where they do not already exist, and urge you to value and foster them wherever they are already planted.

“ The Dunham Ladies’ College is now at work in most favorable circumstances, the Rev. N. A. F. Bourne being the Principal,—a guarantee of faithful supervision. The number of pupils is increasing, and everything promises permanence and success. As a means of Church education of a high order we cannot hope too much from such a church school for girls. The influence must be salutary and effectual. We look with confidence to the close of the year’s work to show good fruit, in return for labor and prayer bestowed on this special work. I claim your hearty co-operation in making Dunham Ladies’ College a blessing to the diocese.

“ Another institution for-beneficent Christian purposes was opened with a service of prayer and praise on 7th December, 1894, in close connection with the Church of England. The ‘ Robert Jones Convalescent Home ’ is designed specially to benefit the children of our Church of England families recovering from long or severe illness, and is erected by Mr. R. A. A. Jones as a memorial to his father and mother, the late Hon. Robert Jones and Mrs. Jones. The

The Synod ass was opened with

'Home' stands in a charming situation, on the Lower Lachine road. The land and building cost \$20,000; and towards its maintenance Mr. Jones, the founder, promises \$1,000 per annum during his life, and certain permanent endowments at his death, while our ever generous friend, Mr. A. F. Gault, promises \$1,000 per annum for four years. The deed of gift was presented at the opening by Mr. Wm. Ryder (on behalf of Mr. R. A. A. Jones), to whom in an address the Dean of Montreal made suitable reply.

"As you know, this diocese has for many years been faithful in its devotion to the cause of 'temperance.' This year the 9th December was set apart as 'temperance Sunday.' By request I issued a pastoral on some practical points, which, it was felt, required immediate attention. The pastoral was very generally acted upon, and I have good reason to believe that the effect was very beneficial.

"The Provincial Synod will meet in September of this year, and there will be the usual election of delegates.

"The General Synod will meet in September, 1896; but it is necessary that you should elect your delegates each year. As I dwelt at some length in my last charge on the work of the General Synod, I do not now advert, further, to its proceedings. I may, however, remark with gratification, in which I am sure you will share, that the presiding officer in both Synods was chosen from this diocese, in the person of our beloved Dean, the Very Rev. James Carmichael.

"God grant that we may have grace in this behalf, to execute our important duties in the spirit of wisdom, to God's glory and the edification of His Church.

"Beloved, I now dismiss you to the work of the Session, earnestly praying that you may receive the fullness of God's blessing upon your important functions. I trust that the time and thought, devoutly given to the interests of the Church, may be repaid you a hundredfold in the increase of religious knowledge and spiritual peace in your own souls. Consecration to the good of others will surely be followed by rich spiritual blessings to yourselves. The promise of Christ to His Church in all ages is, 'Lo I am with you always.' Believe in Him; long for Him; look for Him, and surely He will reveal Himself to your souls. Follow after peace and holiness; they are the living active virtues nourished by the spirit of truth and purity. Submit your spiritual life to the influences of His Holy Spirit, that your own souls may ripen and mature, and in the maturity of your spiritual life, the life of the Church at large shall increase and strengthen. Each one of us is the centre of a circle of influences ever widening for good or evil, ever crossing and being crossed by the influence of fellow-man, sometimes helping, sometimes hindering. Let us each pass through our work and the world as one at war with every form of evil, but diligently seeking truth, purity and peace."

The Synod assembled at two o'clock in the Synod Hall, when the session was opened with prayer by the Lord Bishop.

The Bishop named the Standing Committee of Synod.

Committees on Foreign Missions, Sunday Schools, Church of England Temperance Society, and to act with Immigration Chaplain, were held over.

Committees on General Diocesan Sunday School Association, and on Admission of Women as Members of Vestry Meetings were not re-appointed.

The Clerical Secretary read the following communication from the Diocese of Huron :—

“That, as one of the objects of the Provincial Synod of Canada was, from its formation, declared to be to promote the further consolidation and united action of the whole of the Dioceses of British North America ;

And as a General Synod has now been formed, with jurisdiction extending over the whole Dominion of Canada upon the following fundamental principles :

‘ We declare that the General Synod, when formed, does not intend to, and shall not take away from or interfere with any rights, powers or jurisdiction of any Diocesan Synod within its own territorial limits as now held or exercised by such Diocesan Synod.

“ We declare that the constitution of a General Synod involves no change in the existing system of Provincial Synods, but the retention or abolition of the Provincial Synods is left to be dealt with according to the requirements of the various Provinces as to such Provinces and the Dioceses therein may seem proper.’

And, as such General Synod may exercise jurisdiction over almost (if not quite) all the subjects and matters which might come under the consideration of and lead to action on the part of the Provincial Synod of Canada ;

And, as all the Dioceses represented in the Provincial Synod of Canada are and will be represented in the General Synod of the Dominion ; and, as in matters affecting the general welfare of the Church, it is desirable to secure full representation, free deliberation and united action, without the burden of over-legislation ;

And, as provision is now made by the Constitutions for the holding of the Provincial Synod of Canada, in September in every third year, or oftener, and for the holding of the General Synod in September, 1896 ;

And, as no alteration of the Constitution or Canons of the Provincial Synod shall come into operation until it has been confirmed at a second session of the Provincial Synod ;

And, as the cost of a Session of a General Synod (which is borne by the various Dioceses in the whole Dominion) amounts to about \$3,000, and the cost of a Session of a Provincial Synod (which is borne, as an additional expense, by the Dioceses in the Province only) amounts to over \$3,000 ;

an as, in addition thereto, considerable incidental expenses are necessarily borne by individual members of the Church in connection with such Sessions.

(a) Be it therefore resolved that in the opinion of this Synod it is desirable that, so far as practicable, the General Synod should supersede the Provincial Synod of Canada, and the latter should meet (if at all) only when the necessity of any particular case may require a session thereof, and that the Constitution of the Provincial Synod should be amended at the two next concurrent sessions thereof;

(b) That the various Diocesan Synods in this Province be respectfully requested to unite in the endeavor to procure such amendments to the Constitution and By-laws of the Provincial Synod as will abolish or materially reduce the number of sessions and expense of the Provincial Synod, and as will conduce to the strength, usefulness and efficiency of the General Synod."

The Clerical Secretary read the following communication:—

"That, whereas, the following resolution will be introduced at the present session of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto by the Provost of Trinity College, that this Synod (Toronto) reaffirms the conviction expressed at the sessions of 1888 and 1889 that "the Dioceses existing within any civil Province should have power to organize themselves into an 'Ecclesiastical Province,' and is of opinion that, for the due and efficient discharge of Provincial business, it is expedient that the present Ecclesiastical Province of Canada should be divided, and that the Dioceses comprised in this Civil Province of Ontario should be formed into a separate Ecclesiastical Province, and that this Synod do memorialize the Provincial Synod to take such action at its next session as may be desirable to bring this matter before the next session of the General Synod for decisive action thereon.

That the Lord Bishop be requested to name a Committee to act with the Hon. Secretaries in preparing a suitable memorial to the Provincial Synod upon this matter, and that it be an instruction to the representatives of this Diocese at the next Provincial Synod to support the prayer of such memorial.

That a copy of the memorial, and of this resolution, be transmitted to the Bishops of the other Dioceses in Ontario, and to the Secretaries of their respective Synods, with a view to bring this matter under their notice, and soliciting their co-operation in the same.

Be it, therefore, resolved that this Synod do also appoint a Committee, with the view of co-operating with the Committee of the Synod of Toronto in the furtherance of this important movement in the interest of the Church in the Civil Province of Ontario, and to report at the next meeting of the Synod."

The Chancellor submitted the report of the Executive Committee, in which the Treasurer's reports of the several funds of Synod are printed.

It was ordered that it be taken up for consideration after the routine work is finished.

The Diocese of Montreal being entitled to be represented in the General Synod of the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada, by four Clerical and four Lay Delegates, this Synod shall elect by ballot, at each Annual Session thereof, eight Clerical and eight Lay Delegates (the clergy alone voting for the Clerical Delegates, and the laity alone for the Lay Delegates), and the four Delegates of each order receiving the highest number of votes shall be the Delegates to said General Synod, and the next four highest of each order, following in order, shall be the substitutes of such of the said Delegates as shall, from any cause, decline, neglect, or be unable to attend said General Synod.—*Carried.*

Archdeacon LINDSAY moved, seconded by Rev. W. J. M. WAT ERSON:—

That the grant to Rougemont be re-considered, and that a delegation from the parish be heard in its behalf.—*Carried.*

The CHANCELLOR then moved, seconded by the TREASURER:—

That the grants on pages 1 and 2 be confirmed subject to the action of the Executive Committee on the resolutions just adopted.—*Carried.*

The Chancellor read the report on the "Mission Fund Plan," and the "copy of the proposed agreement" on pages 3 and 4 of printed report of the Executive Committee.

Mr. RICHARD WHITE moved, seconded by Rev. Canon EMPSON:—

That the Mission Fund plan, as proposed, be tried for a period of three years, in order that it may be fully tested, and the Executive Committee be requested to take such steps as they may deem necessary for the carrying out of the plan.

SECOND DAY, 16TH JANUARY, 1895.

The Synod was opened with prayer by the Bishop, at ten o'clock.

The minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and approved, and signed by the Bishop.

The minutes of last year's Synod were considered as read, and were confirmed as printed in the 35th Report.

Major Bond, at the request of the Bishop, explained the details of the plan for voting as recommended by the Executive Committee.

It was decided that the ballots should be taken at two o'clock and the voting close at three. The Bishop will announce when the hour of closing arrives.

The Bishop announced the names of the Committee on Better Observance of the Lord's Day.

Rev. N. A. F. Bourne read a report of the Committee on Dunham Ladies' College, and Archdeacon Lindsay gave notice that he would move its adoption.

Archdeacon Naylor read the report of the Committee on Church of England Temperance Society, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. Rural Dean Nye gave notice in connection with Dunham Ladies' College.

Rev. J. A. Elliott gave notice of motion on the subject of caring for the spiritual wants of young men.

Discussion of Mr. Richard White's motion on the subject of the Mission Fund plan was resumed.

On motion by Rev. E. McManus, seconded by the Dean, the Rev. Professor Watkins of Bishop's College was invited to the floor of the Synod.

Mr. JUDGE moved, seconded by Mr. DRAKE :—

That all the words in the original motion after the word "that" be struck out, and the following inserted instead thereof: the "Quebec Plan be adopted by this Synod and put on trial for three years."

The Bishop of Moosonee took his place on the platform by invitation.

At 11.45 the Governor General arrived, attended by Capt. Urquhart, A.D.C., and his private secretary, and was introduced to the Synod by the Very Rev. the Dean and the Committee, and conducted to the platform.

His Lordship then read the following address :

THE ADDRESS TO HIS EXCELLENCY.

*To His Excellency Sir John Campbell Hamilton Gordon, Earl of Aberdeen,
Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada :*

May it please Your Excellency,—We, the Lord Bishop, clergy and laity of the Church of England in the Diocese of Montreal, in annual Synod assembled, approach Your Excellency with sincere respect, not only as the

representative of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, but as one whose connection with Canada, both officially and privately, has done much to strengthen the indissoluble ties that bind this country to the mother land, and to develop that principle of Canadian loyalty which sees its noblest destiny and highest duty in perpetuating within this vast Dominion the time-honored institutions and traditions which have aided so materially in making Great Britain the power that it is. No representative of royalty could be called to rule over a more loyal and faithful country, nor could a loyal country ask for a more earnest-minded representative of royalty than Canada has already found in Your Excellency, faithful to the duties which devolve upon you officially, and ever foremost to identify yourself with all movements calculated to benefit the country at large. In the light of these happy conditions of reciprocal life, we need scarcely assure Your Excellency how gratefully we recognize the value of your presence in this country as the representative of our beloved Queen.

We would ask Your Excellency to convey to the Countess of Aberdeen the sincere hope of this Synod that her Canadian life may bring her much happiness, not alone in its more private aspects, but in association with those many works of philanthropy and kindness with which her life is so usefully connected.

In conclusion, we tender to Your Excellency, as the representative of Her Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, the loving loyalty of this assembled Synod, coupled with a hope that your vice-royalty in Canada may hereafter be regarded by Your Excellency as amongst the happiest years of your long and active official life.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod re-assembled at half-past two o'clock.

Discussion of Mr. E. Judge's amendment was resumed.

Amendment withdrawn by permission of the House.

Mr. Richard White's motion was then put to the House and—*Carried*.

On motion of the Chancellor the resolution of the Executive Committee, as printed on page 4 of its report, of thanks to Mr. H. M. Belcher and Mr. A. F. Gault, in connection with the presentation of the portrait of Bishop Fulford, was concurred in.

The CHANCELLOR moved the adoption of the resolution in reference to the estate of late E. E. Shelton, printed in the report of the Executive Committee, pp. 7-9.—*Carried*.

The CHANCELLOR moved, seconded by the TREASURER, the adoption of the report of the Executive Committee as amended.—*Carried*.

Rev. J. H. DIXON moved, seconded by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON:—

That this Synod acknowledges the ability, unselfishness, and painstaking way in which Messrs. Walter Drake and H. S. Mussen have managed the Shelton Estate up to the present, as well in the interest of the Synod of this Diocese as of the beneficiaries thereunder, and expresses to them its thanks.—*Carried*.

The Rev. Canon NORTON moved, seconded by the DEAN of Montreal:—

That the Canon on the "DIVISION OF PARISHES (UNDER ROYAL LETTERS PATENT)" be amended to read as follows (see *Constitution*, p. 20):

"1. When any of the parishioners residing in any parish constituted under Royal Letters Patent, or in any adjoining divisions or subdivisions thereof, shall desire to have a new and distinct parish or parishes erected, or the boundaries of existing parishes altered, the said parishioners shall present a memorial to the Lord Bishop, stating fully the reasons moving them thereto; also the proposed boundaries of the contemplated new parish or parishes, or the proposed changes in the boundaries of existing parishes. The Bishop, on receipt of such memorial, shall refer the same to the rector or rectors of the parish or parishes the boundaries of which are proposed to be altered, and if he or they object to the proposed changes, then he or they shall state his or their reasons in writing to the Lord Bishop within one month.

"Should the Bishop then deem the creation of such new parish or parishes, or the alteration of the boundaries of the said parish or parishes to be advisable, or should he, without receiving such memorial, deem the erection of a new parish or parishes, or the alteration of existing boundaries of any parish or parishes to be advisable, he shall proceed as follows:

"2. Any parish now constituted under Royal Letters Patent, or any subdivision or subdivisions thereof, whensoever made, may be divided into two or more parishes by the Bishop of the Diocese, by decree signed by him

and registered by Secretary of Synod, in a register to be kept for that purpose; and in such decree the limits of each parish so newly constituted shall be designated, provided always that the issue of the said decree shall be with the consent of a Standing Committee. For the division or subdivision of Patent Rectories within the Deanery of Montreal, the said Standing Committee shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese and of all the rectors of parish churches in the said Deanery, together with the People's Churchwarden from each such parish church. And for the division or subdivision of Patent Rectories, or subdivisions thereof, not situated within the Deanery of Montreal, the said Standing Committee shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese and of all the rectors, incumbents and missionaries and people's Churchwardens, of the rectories, parishes and duly constituted missions, respectively, within the Rural Deanery wherein the rectory to be divided is situated. And every such consent shall be obtained by a resolution passed by a majority of those present at a meeting of the said Standing Committee (the Bishop, if present, being Chairman), duly convened for the purpose by a notice issued by the Bishop at least four weeks before the day of meeting; and every such notice shall specify the object of the meeting, and shall be accompanied by a copy of the said decree proposed to be issued. A quorum of the said Standing Committee shall be seven members, of whom three shall be laymen."

[Section 2 of the old Canon to remain unaltered, and to come in as section 3 of the amended Canon.]

"4. The decree to be made by the Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal in the division of any parish constituted under Letters Patent, or any subdivision thereof, shall take effect only from the time of its sanction by the Synod, by a resolution adopted for that purpose, which resolution shall not require any further confirmation, and every such resolution, together with copies of the Bishop's proposed decree and of the resolution of the said Standing Committee consenting thereto, shall be printed in full in the circular convening the meeting of Synod at which the aforesaid resolution is to be adopted."

Moved in amendment by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. Canon ELLEGOOD:—

Whereas it is expedient to make better provision for the division and subdivision of the parishes constituted under Royal Letters Patent, or of any division or subdivision thereof as originally formed, in the interests of the Church at large, it is hereby enacted:

1. Any parish constituted under Royal Letters Patent as originally formed, or any new parish created by subdivision of such original parish, may be subdivided, and a new and distinct parish or parishes erected, or the boundaries of existing parishes may be altered by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, either acting personally as such Lord Bishop, or upon memorial of the

2. Should the Lord Bishop of the Diocese at any time consider it to be in the interests of the Church at large that any such parish or parishes or subdivision thereof shall be further subdivided, or the boundaries thereof altered, he may submit a decree setting forth his intention to so divide or alter, and fixing the boundaries of the new parish or parishes created or altered as aforesaid, to the rector and vestry or rectors and vestries of the parishes concerned, for their consideration, and said rector or rectors, vestry or vestries shall consider the same; and if they consent thereto, the said Lord Bishop of the Diocese may, upon their written consent, expressed in a resolution signed by said rector or rectors for himself or themselves and in behalf of the vestry, issue his decree dividing said parish or parishes or altering the boundaries thereof accordingly, which decree if made by consent shall take effect forthwith from its date, and shall be duly enregistered by the Secretary of Synod in a Register to be kept for that purpose, and shall be communicated to the Synod of the Diocese at its session next following the issue of such decree.

Should the said rector or rectors and vestry or vestries disapprove of the said proposed division or alteration, they shall communicate their reasons in writing to the said Lord Bishop of the Diocese within one month from the receipt of the proposed decree, and if his Lordship still considers such division or alteration necessary, he shall confer with the rector or rectors of said parish or parishes, and if, after such conference, he still considers such division or alteration necessary, his Lordship may proceed to make such division or alterations in the manner hereinafter provided.

3. When the majority of any of the parishioners of two or more adjoining parishes in the Deanery of Montreal consider it to be in the interests of the Church at large, that a new and distinct parish or parishes should be erected or the boundaries of existing parishes be altered, the said parishioners may present a memorial to the Lord Bishop, stating fully the reasons moving them thereto, and setting forth the proposed boundaries of the contemplated new parish or parishes, or the change desired in the boundaries of existing parishes. The Bishop on receipt of such memorial shall forthwith refer the same to the rector and vestry or rectors and vestries of the parish or parishes concerned for their consideration, and if they all assent thereto, the Bishop may, by decree to be by him issued, forthwith make the division or alterations referred to in said memorial, and the same, being enregistered by the Secretary of Synod in a Register to be kept for that purpose, shall forthwith come into force and effect, but shall be communicated to the Synod of the Diocese at the session immediately following such decree. Should the said rector and vestry or rectors and vestries or any of them object to the proposed changes, they shall state their reasons in writing to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese within one month from the receipt of the

memorial above mentioned, and should his Lordship still consider such division desirable, he shall proceed in the manner hereinafter provided.

4. The decree constituting a new parish or parishes, or altering the boundaries of any existing ones made by the said Lord Bishop against the wishes of the rector or rectors and vestries of said parishes—any or all of them—shall be submitted to a Standing Committee, consisting, for the Deanery of Montreal, of the Bishop of the Diocese, and of all the rectors within the City of Montreal, together with the Church Wardens from each such parish church, which committee shall be convened for the purpose of considering such decree by a notice issued by the Bishop, and addressed to each member thereof at least four weeks before the date of the meeting, which notice shall specify the object and shall be accompanied by a copy of the decree proposed to be issued. Should a majority of the whole of said Standing Committee approve of said decree, they shall express their consent and approval by a resolution which shall be annexed to the said decree, and the same shall then be submitted to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal at its session next following after said meeting, and if approved thereat and sanctioned by a resolution adopted by said Synod, said decree shall forthwith come into effect and be enregistered in the Register to be kept for that purpose as aforesaid.

5. In the case of division or sub-division of Patent Rectories or sub-division thereof, not situated within the Deanery of Montreal, the Standing Committee shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, of the Rector and Church Wardens of the parish or parishes concerned, and of the Incumbent and Church Wardens of said duly organized parish, other than missions, within the said Deanery.

Always providing, however, that no such new parish shall be created in the City of Montreal, nor alterations in existing boundaries be made which will permit of the erection of a new parish church within a distance of one-half mile of any existing parish church, unless with the written consent of the rector and vestry thereof, nor in the country parts of the Diocese within a distance of three miles of such previously existing parish church, without such consent.

When any of the parishioners residing in any parish constituted under Royal Letters Patent, or in any adjoining divisions or subdivisions thereof, shall desire to have a new and distinct parish or parishes erected, or the boundaries of existing parishes altered, the said parishioners shall present a memorial to the Lord Bishop, stating fully the reasons moving them thereto; also the proposed boundaries of the contemplated new parish or parishes, or the proposed changes in the boundaries of existing parishes. The Bishop, on receipt of such memorial, shall refer the same to the rector or rectors of the parish or parishes the boundaries of which are proposed to be altered, and if he or they object to the proposed changes, then he or they shall state his or their reasons in writing to the Lord Bishop within one month.

Should the Bishop then deem the creation of such new parish or parishes, or the alteration of the boundaries of the said parish or parishes to be advisable, or should he, without receiving such memorial, deem the erection of a new parish or parishes, or the alteration of existing boundaries of any parish or parishes to be advisable, he shall proceed as follows
Carried.

Rev. Canon NORTON moved, seconded by the DEAN :—

2. Any parish now constituted under Royal Letters Patent, or any subdivision or subdivisions thereof, whensoever made, may be divided into two or more parishes by the Bishop of the Diocese, by decree signed by him and registered by Secretary of Synod, in a register to be kept for that purpose and in such decree the limits of each parish so newly constituted shall be designated, provided always that the issue of the said decree shall be with the consent of a Standing Committee. For the division or subdivision of

Patent Rectories within the Deanery of Montreal, the said Standing Committee shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese and of all the rectors of Parish churches in the said Deanery, together with the people's churchwarden from each such parish church. And for the division or subdivision of Patent Rectories, or subdivisions thereof, not situated within the Deanery of Montreal, the said Standing Committee shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese and of all the rectors, incumbents and missionaries and people's churchwardens, of the rectories, parishes and duly constituted missions, respectively, within the Rural Deanery wherein the rectory to be divided is situated. And every such consent shall be obtained by a resolution passed by a majority of those present at a meeting of the said Standing Committee (the Bishop, if present, being Chairman), duly convened for the purpose by a notice issued by the Bishop at least four weeks before the day of meeting and every such notice shall specify the object of the meeting, and shall be accompanied by a copy of the said decree proposed to be issued. A quorum of the said Standing Committee shall be seven members, of whom three shall be laymen."

Moved in amendment by Rev. J. H. DIXON, seconded by Major BOND:—

That in clause 2, all the words after "such parish church" in line 11 to the words "wherein the rectory to be divided is situated," inclusive, be omitted.—*Lost*.

Clause 2 was then put to the House and *adopted*.

Moved by Rev. Canon NORTON, seconded by the DEAN, and resolved:—

That clause 2 of the old canon be not re-enacted.—*Carried*.

Rev. Canon NORTON moved, seconded by the DEAN:—

3. The decree to be made by the Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal in the division of any parish constituted under Letters Patent, or any subdivision thereof, shall take effect only from the time of its sanction by the Synod, by a resolution adopted for that purpose, which resolution shall not require any further confirmation, and every such resolution, together with copies of the Bishop's proposed decree and of the resolution of the said Standing Committee consenting thereto, shall be printed in full in the circular convening the meeting of Synod at which the aforesaid resolution is to be adopted.—*Carried*.

Archdeacon EVANS moved, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean ROBINSON:—
That clause 2 be reconsidered.—*Carried*.

Archdeacon EVANS then moved, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON:—

That in clause 2 all the words after "such parish church" in line 11 to the words, "wherein the rectory to be divided is situated," inclusive, be omitted, and that as amended the clause be adopted.—*Carried*.

FOURTH DAY, FRIDAY, 18TH JANUARY, 1895.

The Synod re-assembled at ten o'clock on Friday morning.

Prayer by the Lord Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and confirmed, and were signed by the Bishop.

The officers of the Sunday School Association were named by the Bishop.

The Committee on Immigration was appointed.

Rev. J. F. Renaud read report of Committee on Foreign Missions, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. Canon Davidson read a minority report of the same Committee, and gave notice that he would move its adoption.

Archdeacon Lindsay presented a report of Rural Deanery of Brome.

Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst moved, that opportunity be given to Rev. E. I. Rexford to address this Synod at half-past twelve o'clock on the subject of Education.

Rev. D. Larivière gave three notices of motion.

The Lord Bishop drew attention to the good work done by Rev. Principal Larivière in connection with Sabrevois College, and expressed regret that notice thereof had not been taken in his Charge to the Synod.

Notices of motion were received from Rev. Canon Mussen, Rev. F. H. Clayton, Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst, Rev. F. Pratt.

Rev. D. Larivière resumed the discussion on French work.

Rev. A. French raised a point of order that the report of the Committee on French Work could not be discussed, under third paragraph of the Declaration, as referring to another Communion.

The Bishop ruled that the discussion was in order.

The Report on the subject of French work presented two years ago, after being amended by consent, was adopted.

Archdeacon EVANS moved the adoption of the report of the Committee on Superannuation Fund.—*Carried.*

The rules of order were suspended on motion by Rev. JAS. H. DIXON to allow him to introduce the following: That Rev. Principal Adams of Lennoxville be invited to a seat in the House.—*Carried.*

Principal Adams was welcomed by the Bishop in the name of the Synod.

Mr. Edgar Judge gave notice of motion.

Rev. Canon MUSSEN moved, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon LINDSAY :—

That the report of the Committee on Statistics be adopted with a respectful recommendation to the Lord Bishop to include its suggestions among the directions appended to the paper of questions annually sent to the Parishes of the Diocese.—*Carried.*

Rev. G. Abbott Smith requested a suspension of the rules of order to

enable the Rev. Principal Adams to make a verbal report of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, as the report for last year has not been received by the Synod.—*Carried.*

Rev. Principal Adams addressed the Synod, giving a brief statement of the working of the University for last year, and referring to the approaching Jubilee of the College.

Rev. J. A. ELLIOTT, by consent of the House, moved :—

That a summary of statistics, as contained in Rural Deans' reports, be printed after said reports in the "Proceedings of Synod."—*Carried.*

Rev. A. B. GIVEN moved, seconded by Rev. R. F. HUTCHINGS :—

That the Rural Deans' reports be read upon the floor of the House.

The debate was adjourned at half-past twelve o'clock, and the Rev. E. I. Rexford addressed the Synod on the subject of the Education law of the Province of Quebec in reference to religious instruction and the rights of the clergy.

The House adjourned at one o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House met at half-past two, and discussion on Rev. A. B. Given's motion was resumed.

Rev. E. P. JUDGE moved in amendment, seconded by Rev. W. E. KANEEN :—

That the Rural Deanery reports be not read in full, but that recommendations to the Synod contained therein be read to the Synod.

Rev. Canon MUSSEN moved, in amendment to the amendment, seconded by Rev. J. F. RENAUD :—

That the Rural Deans' reports be taken as read, when certified as having been submitted to the chapters of the respective Deaneries, and be included in the Journal of Synod.—*Lost.*

Rev. E. P. Judge's motion was then put, and—*Lost.*

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean SANDERS in amendment, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean ROBINSON :—

That in the matter of the Rural Deans' reports the question be referred to the Committee on Statistics.—*Lost.*

The main motion (Rev. A. B. Given's) was then put and—*Lost.*

By permission of the House, moved by Canon DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. N. A. F. BOURNE :—

That in view of the Semi-Centenary and Jubilee of the Church of England University at Lennoxville, which under announcement of the Principal has been made to this Synod, the Lord Bishop of this Diocese be requested to nominate a particular representation of three to appear and participate in the formal exercises incident to the auspicious close of fifty years of Educational Church work. Rev. W. A. Fyles' motion in reference to change in the mode of election of delegates to the Provincial Synod was withdrawn by permission.

Moved by Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON, Q. C., seconded by the Very Rev. the DEAN of Montreal :—

That this Synod, having had submitted to it the resolutions of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron as to superseding the Provincial Synod of Canada owing to the formation of the General Synod, whilst adhering to the views already expressed as to the Provincial Synod System in case a General Synod should be formed, is of opinion that it is undesirable to take action in the matter at the approaching Session of the Provincial Synod, the General Synod organization being as yet incomplete; and also that this resolution be communicated to the Lord Bishop of Huron and to the Synod thereof through the Secretary, and also to both Houses of the Provincial Synod.

Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON, Q. C., moved, seconded by the DEAN :—

That this Synod, having had submitted to it the resolutions adopted by the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto as to the division of the present Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, and the Dioceses comprised within the civil Province of Ontario, is of opinion that such extension of the Provincial System is not expedient under the existing circumstances of the Church of England in Canada, and would only lead to undue and unnecessary expense; and, further, that until the General Synod shall have been fully developed and established, it would be unwise to engage the attention of churchmen with the question of further increasing the number of Ecclesiastical Provinces; that this Synod adheres to the opinion expressed by it upon the subject, prior to the formation of the General Synod, and opposes, for the present at least, the extension of the Provincial Synod System.

That this resolution be communicated to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto and to the Synod thereof through the Secretary, and also to both Houses of the Provincial Synod.

Archdeacon LINDSAY moved, seconded by Rev. N. A. F. BOURNE, the adoption of the report of the Committee on Dunham Ladies' College.—*Carried.*

Rev. Rural Dean NYE moved, seconded by Major BOND :—

That this Synod has heard with great satisfaction of the successful re-opening of Dunham Ladies' College, and earnestly recommends it, as the Church School for Girls, to the sympathy and practical support of the Church.—*Carried.*

The Very Rev. the DEAN moved, seconded by Rev. Dr. KER, the adoption of the report on Church of England Temperance Society.—*Carried.*

The Clerical Secretary by permission of the House read a communication from the Dominion Alliance, Toronto.

Moved by Dr. DAVIDSON, Q.C., seconded by Very Rev. the DEAN of Montreal :—

That this Synod do again petition the Council of the City of Montreal to enforce within its bounds the provisions of law for restraining the sale of intoxicating liquors, as well by grocers as by saloons, and to resist all attempts at securing special privileges, such as were asked for by Sohmer Park.—*Carried.*

Rev. Canon MUSSEN moved, seconded by Rev. Dr. KER :—

That this Synod desires to express its great satisfaction in the Lord Bishop's having appointed a Temperance Sunday, whereon this important moral and religious subject should be brought under the earnest consideration of the members of the several congregations.—*Carried.*

Major E. L. BOND moved, seconded by Dr. DAVIDSON :—

That this Synod acknowledges the kindly greetings of the Executive of the Council of the Dominion Alliance, and that the matter of appointing delegates be referred to the Church of England Temperance Society with power to act.—*Carried.*

In the absence of Rev. J. A. Elliott, Rev. J. H. DIXON moved, seconded by Rev. G. ABBOTT SMITH :—

That a committee be appointed to consider the best means of caring for the spiritual wants of the large number of young people coming up from the country who belong to the Church, including those who intend to pursue courses of study in the various faculties of the Universities and Colleges in this city ; and to take such steps as it may deem wise to give effect to the same.

The Bishop named as a Committee Revs. E. I. Rexford, G. Abbott Smith, C. J. James, Rural Dean SANDERS, C. C. Waller, W. A. Mervyn, J. H. Dixon (Convener) and J. A. Elliott.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean SANDERS, seconded by Rev. J. H. DIXON :—

That this Diocese do renew its pledge to contribute for the stipend of the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Algoma to the same amount as before, namely \$500 for the present year.—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. W. P. CHAMBERS, seconded by Rev. Canon DAVIDSON :—

That the Bishop be requested to name a committee to act in connection with any committee which may be appointed by the General or Provincial Synod or the Synods of other Dioceses, if it shall in their opinion be considered well to take steps to hold either a Diocesan, Provincial or Canadian Clerical conference or congress.

The Bishop named the following committee : Revs. W. P. Chambers, G. Osborne Troop, Canon Davidson, Canon Norton (Convener), the Dean, Arch-deacon Evans, Dr. L. H. Davidson, Mr. Richard White.

Moved by the DEAN, seconded by Rev. D. LARIVIÈRE :—

That negotiations be entered into with the Colonial and Continental Church Society, with a view to handing over the organized French churches in this Diocese to the Synod, and a report be made at next session.—*Carried.*

The following were named by the Bishop as a committee to act in this matter : Dr. L. H. Davidson, Major E. L. Bond, Rev. Canon Norton, Rev. Dr. Ker (Convener).

Moved by Rev. D. LARIVIÈRE, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon LINDSAY :—

That this Synod is strongly of opinion that the clergy of this Diocese should be able to speak both French and English in order to properly and fully carry on the Church's work in the Diocese, and would respectfully ask his Lordship to use his influence with the authorities of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College that its students may be thoroughly trained in the French tongue.—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. D. LARIVIÈRE, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean SANDERS :—

That an effort should be made to establish a French Summer School for our theological students, and any of the clergy who might desire to attend the same. Allowed to stand over to next session.

Moved by Canon MUSSEN, seconded by Rev. J. F. RENAUD :—

1. That conveners of special committees be requested to avoid as far as possible the calling of their respective committees on Mondays, and to use such time as can be procured on the Tuesdays, when meetings of the Executive Committee are held, or on the following day. 2. That all notices of such special committee meetings be transmitted by the Clerical Secretary of Synod.—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean LONGHURST, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon LINDSAY :—

That a committee be appointed to report to this Synod in what way the following changes can be brought about, viz :—

That Parochial accounts for the year be closed on 31st Dec., thus to facilitate the collection of statistics for the Rural Deanery reports and harmonize with the January meeting of Synod ; and also that all other business heretofore done at Easter time be transacted at a meeting called early in the New Year.

Ordered to stand over to next session.

Moved by Rev. F. PRATT, seconded by Ven. Archdeacon LINDSAY :—

That the Lord Bishop of the Diocese be requested by this Synod to cause to be issued a synopsis of the law regarding the rights and privileges of the Clergy to visit district schools; and, further, to draw up a syllabus of such instruction or suggestions as may serve as a uniform guide to the Clergy in visiting district schools of the Diocese. And that the Bishop be respectfully requested by this Synod to cause the same to be published for distribution among the clergy.

Referred to the Committee on Education.

Moved by Mr. E. JUDGE, seconded by Mr. W. DRAKE :—

That the Clergy and Laity of all Parishes in which the collections ordered by Synod have not been taken up, shall be deprived of representation in the Synod at the Session following.

Held over to next session.

Moved by Dr. DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. J. F. RENAUD, the adoption of report of Committee on Foreign Missions; also that the minority report be printed; and that the committee be re-appointed, the clause recommending the discontinuance of the committee being eliminated.—*Carried.*

Moved by Dr. DAVIDSON, Q.C., seconded by the Very Rev. the DEAN of Montreal :—

That this Synod would again express its appreciation of the work done by the Woman's Auxiliary (Branch of the Diocese of Montreal), and by the Girls' Auxiliary, on behalf not alone of this particular Diocese, but on behalf of the Church of England in Canada as a whole; and would express the hope that the number of Branches of their invaluable Association in the Diocese of Montreal may be rapidly increased, and that the blessing of God may be upon their faithful and, we fain believe, oft-times self-denying labours.

And that this resolution be communicated to the President of the Association.—*Carried.*

Moved by the DEAN, seconded by Rev. Canon MUSSEN :—

That the Synod hereby recognizes with much satisfaction the kindness of the proprietors of the *Gazette*, *Montreal Daily Witness* and *Church Guardian* in supplying a large number of their publications during its session.

Moved by Rev. F. H. CLAYTON, seconded by Archdeacon NAYLOR :—

That a hearty vote of thanks be accorded to the ladies of Montreal for hospitality to the clergy.—*Carried.*

Dr. L. H. DAVIDSON moved, seconded by the DEAN of Montreal :—

That a warm vote of thanks be given to Mrs. Frank Bond for her assistance in decorating the Synod Hall on the occasion of the visit of His Excellency the Governor General.—*Carried.*

Rev. Canon NORTON moved, seconded by the DEAN, a vote of thanks to the Secretaries for their efficient services.—*Carried.*

The above scale of grants was adopted, with the understanding that the following recommendation be carried out, and that the several missions hereafter referred to should be urged by circular to contribute the amounts placed opposite their respective names.

RECOMMENDATION.

That Adamsville, Eardly and South Stukely should raise more for the Stipends than they do; and that Arundel, Bolton, Boscobel, Bristol, North Shefford and Warden, and North Wakefield be urged to contribute an additional \$50 each.

That River Desert, which for the past ten years has received a grant of \$500, latterly increased to \$600 a year, should be strongly urged to contribute something towards the stipend of the missionary; that Rougemont should raise \$400 (including the interest on its endowment fund), and in any case the grant should remain at \$200.

Resolved also: That a committee be named by the Bishop, for each Rural Deanery, to visit all missions whose incumbents receive less than the canonical stipends, and to urge the people so to increase their contributions that the canon may be complied with.

This Committee, to whom was referred the resolution of last Synod in connection with what is known as the Quebec Plan, recommend to the Synod the trial of the following plan for three years, in order that its results may be fully tested; after which time, if found to work satisfactorily, it may be enacted as a regular canon of the Synod.

MISSION FUND PLAN.

1. That on or before the 1st of December in each year, that is, one month prior to the commencement of the fiscal year of the Diocese, a return be made to the Secretary of the Synod of the amount promised by each parish or mission to the general Mission Fund of the Diocese for the support of the clergymen, to be in the form of a promise by the Church Wardens on behalf of the vestry; such sum to be remitted to the Secretary of the Synod during the year, in instalments, on the first days of February, May, August and November.

2. That these promises be considered by the Executive Committee, and where found insufficient or inadequate, an effort be made by a deputation or otherwise, as may be decided by the Bishop, to have the amount brought up to such sum as the people in the locality may be fairly expected to contribute.

3. That these sums being fixed, the Executive Committee proceed to vote the several amounts from the Mission Fund to bring them up to the sum called for by the Canon, *i.e.*, for Deacons, \$500 per annum; for Priests under ten years' standing, \$600; for Priests over ten years' standing, \$700.

4. That these amounts be remitted by cheque to the several clergymen, quarterly, by the Secretary of the Diocese.

5. Should the amounts so promised, and the amounts available from the Mission Fund for division among the clergy, be insufficient to pay these amounts, a reduction should be made upon a general pro rata plan, keeping in view the principle that no injustice be done to parishes that have faithfully fulfilled their obligations.

6. That in the event of failure by any parish or mission to pay the sum so promised, punctually, or that the arrears accumulate for a period of, say, three months, the Church Wardens of said parish or mission shall be dealt with as the Bishop may order, and he may withdraw the incumbent should he consider it in the interest of the whole Diocese to do so.

BISHOP OF ALGOMA.

The Provincial Synod at its last meeting, having recommended that, in view of the state of the Bishop's health, there should be an annual grant "of \$800 to enable the Bishop of Algoma to secure the services of some one "in Holy Orders who could act as his secretary, and assist the Bishop in "various other ways in the work of his Diocese," it was resolved that Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., as Secretary of the Provincial Synod, be informed that this Diocese is prepared to pay a proportionate part of \$800, along with the other Dioceses, toward carrying out the resolution of the Provincial Synod in regard to securing to the Bishop an assistant in his Diocesan work.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate this resolution to Dr. Davidson, and to suggest his advising the other Dioceses of the Province of the action of the Diocese of Montreal.

BURIAL GROUND AT POINT ST. CHARLES.

The Committee have pleasure in reporting that through the exertions of Mr. E. P. Hannaford, the burial ground in which were interred so many of the victims of the ship fever in 1846-1847 has been fenced and put in decent order. The lot is deeded to the Lord Bishop and his successors, and is marked by a large boulder bearing the following inscription: "To preserve from desecration the remains of 6,000 emigrants who died of ship-fever in 1846 and 1847 this stone is erected."

A photographic view of the ceremony of erecting the memorial stone was presented to the Committee by Mr. Walter Drake, and it was resolved to publish a copy thereof in the next Synod Report.

GENERAL SYNOD.

The Treasurer of the General Synod of the Church, which was held in 1893, reported that the expenses amounted to \$2,845.13, and that the proportion which this Diocese was called upon to contribute was \$278.10. The Treasurer paid the account.

CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES.

A beautiful copy of the Standard Prayer Book of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States was presented to the Diocesan Library in accordance with resolutions adopted by the two Houses of the General Convention of the Church in the United States; and a resolution of thanks therefor was adopted by this Committee and forwarded to the Committee on the Standard Prayer Book.

FRENCH WORK.

The Committee on French Work made the following report to the Executive Committee in accordance with the resolution of Synod, page 29 of the 35th Annual Report. The questions submitted to the Committee are found on page 34 of the 34th Synod Report, and the answers thereto are as follows:—

Question No. 1. At time referred in the question, 1892-3, there was none; but in 1893-4 there has been, viz., in the district of Bedford, Mr. Groulx has been employed as lay missionary.

Question No. 2. The number of parishes in which distinct French work was carried on at the time referred to in the question was four, viz., Montreal, Sabrevois, St. Francis, River Desert; and there are now five, viz., the same four and one in the district of Bedford.

Question No. 3. The Committee through the Bishop had, at the time referred to, applications for distinct French work, viz., in Hull, Ste. Marie, Montreal, district of Bedford, and in many other places.

Question No. 4. Of the 97 scholars referred to in the question (a) 53 French Canadians, with one Indian R.C.; (b) 23 French Canadian and Romanists; (c) 43 English Canadian by birth; (d) 38 English Canadian Protestants, and 5 English Canadian Roman Catholics, (e) 12 of the French Canadian Romanists were received into the Church during the period referred to in the question.

Question No. 5. The answer is "yes."

and other expenses provided for by the will for his widow's benefit and sustenance, and that they were desirous of delivering to the Synod the residue of said estate, the Executive Committee deputed the Committee on Investments to investigate the matter, and report the result to the Executive Committee. And by the report of said Committee it appears that the portion of the Estate still in the hands of the Trustees and Executors, and to be retained by them to meet the payment of Mrs. Shelton's annuity and the said other expenses provided for by said will, consists of mortgages, bonds and uninvested moneys, and represents a total value of \$120,484.55, of which \$118,003.12 represents capital, and the balance, rents and interest, and that the portion of said Estate proposed to be delivered over to the Synod consists of all the immoveable property still unsold, with the exception of the homestead on Mountain street in this city, the usufruct of which belongs under the will to Mrs. Shelton during her lifetime. And it also appears from said report that the said homestead is valued at the sum of \$22,000, and the remainder of said immoveable property at the sum of \$62,100, and that the net revenue expected to be derived from the portion of said immoveable property to be delivered to the Synod, for the year 1895, is estimated at \$1,691; a sum slightly in excess of the annuities to be paid by the Synod under said will. And Mr. Drake, one of the Trustees and Executors, stated to said Executive Committee, that the Trustees and Executors hoped to be able to pay the Synod after the year 1895, out of the annual surplus revenues of the portion of the estate to be retained by them, a sum of about \$400 or \$500.

It will thus be seen that the gross amount of capital eventually coming to the Synod under said will will be somewhat in excess of the sum of \$200,000, but that little or no revenue can be expected from said estate for some years.

The following resolution was adopted: That in view of the report of the Committee on Investments just presented, on the subject of the letter addressed to the Executive Committee by the Trustees and Executors under the will of the late Elijah E. Shelton, Esq., dated 31st October, 1894, the Committee on Investments be and they are hereby authorized to take delivery from said Trustees and Executors, of the immoveable properties specified in the report of Messrs. Garth and Hannaford attached to said report, and to take possession of, manage and administer the same (employing for that purpose the services of a real estate agent), and to that end to lease and sell the same or such portion thereof as they may deem advisable, for such considerations, and on such terms and conditions generally as they may deem expedient and sufficient. KNOWLTON—

We are paying up our new parish church debt regularly at the rate of (at least) \$500 per annum. There is in the hands of one of the societies here, \$100 towards rebuilding the rectory kitchen.

A new mission church was built last summer at Bolton Glen of good churchly design, capable of seating 100 people. This was ready for consecration at the Bishop's visit last September. It is at present seated with chairs, has a good altar, an organ, and a bell. It is to be consecrated under the title of St. Michael and All Angels, and is quite out of debt. It may be valued at \$1,000.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE "BETTER OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY."

In presenting their Annual Report to Synod, your Committee desire, as the key-note of their remarks, to emphasize the fact, that among all nations inhabiting this earth, the Sacred Calendar of the Septade, as a measure of time, seems to have been largely, if not exclusively, peculiar to the Jews alone, and thence, as Christians, to ourselves, with the change recognized throughout Christendom, from the seventh to the first day of the week, now the Christian's Sabbath.

Your Committee therefore claim for the "Lord's Day" a pre-eminence in origin, in excellence, in design, similar to that which the Most Reverend Dr. Benson, the present Archbishop of Canterbury, claimed for Christ and for Christianity, in his reply to the Chicago invitation to the English Episcopate, to be present at the so-called "Parliament of Religions." With a loftiness of sentiment which has commended itself to right-thinking men in every land, His Grace courteously but firmly declined to sanction by their presence the impression that the Lord Jesus Christ, Jehovah incarnate, "Very God of Very God," "the only true God and our Saviour," could, for an instant, be placed upon a par, in such a modern Dagon temple, with Bramah and Buddha, and Confucius, and Mahommed, and fire-worshippers, and devil-worshippers, and theosophists, and the whole motley herd of man-made and degrading deities.

In like lofty position your Committee would place the "Lord's Day," the very pearl of days, blessing humanity from its origin, wherever observed, alike in the individual, the community, the nation, the world, and as "the bright and morning star," heralding in our own day that the night, the long, long "night" of nearly six thousand years of this world's sorrowful career, "is now far spent," and that "the day" is at hand.

But whilst your Committee thus claim for the "Lord's Day" its true and rightful position, both among ourselves and in the world at large, they must at the same time chronicle a very different and a very checkered record of its manner of observance, as well in our own Diocese as throughout the Dominion.

The echoes of the last Synod had scarcely died away before, in the self-same Synod month of January, the stillness of the Lord's Day was broken, the inviolable sanctity of the Sabbath was violated by the entrance, over one of our own Sabbath-breaking railroads, of a locomotive palatial car, freighted from the neighbouring Republic, by millionaire wealth, with its accompanying circle of fashion, careering onwards in the after-hours of the self-same holy day to the Carnival in a neighbouring city.

The genial spring had no sooner unlocked the icy fetters of the St. Lawrence than "a lake and river" influential company publicly announced its intention to start and to run its steamers from Montreal on the "Lord's

Day," as it did throughout the season, thus defiantly robbing their own employees of their God-given rest, and luring the public to a complicity in their guilt.

But surely in a christian land, where the First and Fourth Commandments still form part of the world's great moral code, no body of men ought to take the position that they are prior to and above their Creator; that as a 'corporation,' entrenched though they may be behind wealth and social standing, they may practically repeat the defiant cry of Egypt's erstwhile proud oppressor:—"Who is the Lord, that we should obey His voice? We know not the Lord, neither will we let His people go."

In the name of the Diocese to which we belong, and of its governing Synod now in its Annual Session assembled, we again record our most solemn protest against all such wanton desecration of the Lord's own holy day. We again invoke the aid of our Parliament to throw the powerful ægis of its protection, by much-needed legislation, over the toiling masses who are powerless to protect themselves.

The Montreal of Maisonneuve is very different from the Montreal of Campbell, of Aberdeen; centuries span the interval, and progress, wonderful in its ever-increasing development, crowns the result. And with that progress it is most gratifying to your Committee to record this one little incident marking the closing month of the by-gone year, taken from a city paper: "The Vice-Regal party journeying to Montreal from the far West, and reaching Biscotassing, a remote station, on a Saturday night, the three special cars, at Lord Aberdeen's request, were run on a side track, as His Excellency strongly objected to travelling on Sunday."

God bless His Excellency for this his deed, and for the praiseworthy example he has thus set to the Dominion at large! His own ancestral halls will be adorned with no more memorable record than that, pre-eminent in his now high office as Governor General of the Dominion of Canada, the brightest gem in the Imperial Crown,—he and his—thus "feared God whilst honouring the Queen."

With like mingled feelings, your Committee record the fact, that Mr. John Charlton, the hon. member for North Norfolk, Ont., after bravely fighting for years the battle of his God in the Dominion Legislature, at length carried for the first time his "Sunday Observance Bill" through the Lower House, at its last session, supported, it is most pleasing to add, through all its stages, both by the late lamented Premier, Sir John Thompson (a chaplet, this, to his memory, more enduring than a queen's wreath), and also by the Hon. Mr. Laurier, leader of the Opposition,—opposed to each other on political subjects, yet standing shoulder to shoulder in this Sunday question, and in their joint recognition that all God's large human family, from sea to sea, are equally entitled to the rest and religious privileges of God's own holy day.

But alas! after all this promising beginning, the Bill was defeated, and

from a most unexpected quarter. The Senate—a body to which we have all hitherto attached the idea of matured wisdom—rejected the Bill, having themselves apparently to learn (at least some of them), on the highest of all authority, that the hoary head is a crown of glory, if it is found in the way of righteousness. Your Committee have also noted with pleasure the decided stand taken by the Hon. Mr. Taillon, the Premier of this Province, in resisting the petition of the proprietors of Sohmer Park to sell intoxicating drinks in that public place of resort on the Lord's Day.

In conclusion, your Committee would now repeat their recommendation of last year, that the Lord Bishop of the Diocese be requested, in the name of this Synod, again to memorialize the different branches of the Dominion Legislature at its approaching session, to inaugurate, or to support, a Sunday Observance Bill, designed to secure to all Her Majesty's subjects of every creed, position and nationality the weekly rest which nature craves, and the freedom to worship God which He Himself has given them.

Your Committee further urge upon the Clergy in town and country, to make the Sunday question, in all its many aspects, the theme of their frequent pulpit addresses and private admonitions.

And very particularly, would they solicit the different Women's Aid Societies, whether King's Daughters or Christian Endeavourers, or whatever their distinctive name or badge may be, to make the "Better Observance of the Lord's Day" one chief plank in their own noble platform effort for Temperance, for Purity, for everything that is lovely and of good report among men. Their own sex, last at the cross and first at the grave, of their Divine Master, surely none more than they should now be foremost in united efforts to secure for their less favored sisters that weekly rest, that reunion of the bread winners of the family, the husbands, the fathers, the brothers, the sons, of the household which ever make Home—"Sweet sweet home, be it never so humble," the dearest spot on earth, and which the good God and Father of us all has given to his whole family, from the Queen on her throne to the humblest beggar in her dominions. ❧

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF THE DIOCESAN CHURCH OF
ENGLAND TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

The Church of England Temperance Society Council of the Diocese report that the Secretary has communicated with the clergy, and has ascertained that it is most difficult in this Diocese to establish the Church of England Temperance Society in our parishes, not from any lack of interest in our Society, but simply because the field is in most cases already occupied by Total Abstinence Organization. The Council would call attention to the fact that under the Church of England Temperance Society, Total Abstinence Associations may be formed.

Some clergymen have promised to organize juvenile branches during the year.

The appointment of a Temperance Sunday, together with a circular issued by the Bishop, has, we believe, been productive of much good in bringing the subject of temperance before our people and in calling forth their united action in connection with legislation then before the Quebec Parliament.

We are grateful for the spread of temperance sentiment throughout the Dominion, and especially so for the determined and successful effort made in our Provincial Parliament against the legislation sought for by Sohmer Park for permission to sell alcohol on Sunday.

The Council would suggest to the Synod the desirability of again petitioning the Council of the City of Montreal to enforce the provisions of law for restraining the sale of intoxicating liquors as well by groceries as by saloons, and to resist all attempts at special privileges such as were asked for by Sohmer Park.

The excessive use of strong drink is one of the greatest hindrances to the growth of the Church of Christ. It is a terrible temptation to many, destructive alike to body and soul. Let us then do all in our power to remove the evil.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROVISION FOR
THE LUMBER DISTRICTS.

Two districts of the lumber region have been reached by this work during the past year, the Coulonge River District which extends northward from the Mission of Leslie for a distance of about 150 miles and the River Desert district extending from the head of the Mission at River Desert East, North, and West for various distances of from 50 to 100 miles.

The Coulonge River District was visited in February, 1894, by the Revs. J. M. Coffin and J. L. Flanagan, who went in company and spent three weeks visiting the lumber camps of Messrs. Gillies Bros. of Arnprior, and of Messrs. Mason & Co. of Ottawa.

They held services in 9 camps, 4 stopping places and 1 depot. They travelled about 350 miles and spoke to 400 men, about half of whom were Protestants.

Some idea of the difficulties of this work may be gathered from the fact that upon one occasion their horses broke through the crust of snow into a bog, and our missionaries had to work in the water up to their waist in order to get them extricated, and then drive six miles in the frosty night before they could get warm or dry.

On their homeward journey when they would be constantly meeting loaded teams if they drove by daylight, they resolved to travel by night so as to avoid turning out, which Mr. Coffin says "the almost incredible depth of the snow made very difficult."

The River Desert Mission is carried on by the Rev. R. C. Brewer. His winters are spent almost entirely in the shanties. From his report made at the meeting of the Rural Deanery of Clarendon, it is learned that he held 5 services at Castor Farm, 22 miles from River Desert; 5 at Baskatong Bridge, 37 miles; also at Island Farm, 47 miles; and Sturgeon Depot, 57 miles, where Indians were met with and spoken to through an interpreter; in addition to these services the shanties in the Baskatong, River Desert and Tomatine regions were visited in February and March. About 300 men were met, and Bibles and Tracts distributed.

The importance of this Mission from a church and religious point of view can hardly be overestimated.

Kind friends in Montreal have supplied literature for this work, for which the Missionaries express their thanks.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GENERAL DIOCESAN
SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

Your Committee have held three meetings. One was a joint meeting with the Diocesan Committee on Sunday Schools and representatives of the Montreal Diocesan Sunday School Association.

The draft of Constitution agreed upon at this meeting has been approved by a meeting of the existing Association, and it has expressed its readiness to become a Branch Association of the proposed Diocesan Association.

Your Committee recommend :—

1. That a General Diocesan Association be formed, to consist of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, together with the Clergy, S.S. teachers and office-bearers of the Sunday Schools of the Diocese subscribing to the Constitution, with the view of securing the greatest possible efficiency in Sunday School teaching, and the employment of a Sunday School agent who shall be under the direction of the Bishop and of the Association.

2. That the affairs of the Association be managed by a General Committee composed of the Lord Bishop as chairman, and clerical and lay members, three of each order named by the Bishop in Synod; two of each order elected by the Deanery of Montreal; one of each order elected by each Rural Deanery in the Diocese; and one of each order elected by each Ruri-Decanal Branch Association.

3. That with the approval of the Bishop, a Sunday of Intercession for Sunday Schools be observed, and that collections be made for the purposes of the Association.

4. That the General Committee hold quarterly meetings, and the Association an annual meeting.

Your Committee submit herewith the draft of a Canon embodying these principles for the consideration of the Synod, and for its adoption if it see fit.

CANON.

Inasmuch as it is expedient to provide for the greatest possible efficiency in the teaching of the truths of our most holy religion, and the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England in Canada, in all the Sunday Schools of this Diocese, be it enacted :—

That the Clergy and the Sunday School teachers and office-bearers of the Sunday Schools throughout this Diocese be united under a Diocesan Sunday School Association with the following Constitution :—

CONSTITUTION.

ART. I. The name of this Association shall be "The Montreal Diocesan Sunday School Association."

ART. II. *Membership.*—The members of the Association shall be the

SESSION.]

Lord Bishop, the Clergy, and the Teachers of the Sunday Schools in the Diocese.

ART. III. *Object.*—The object of this Association shall be to improve the Clergy, teachers and office-bearers of the Sunday Schools of the Diocese.

1. Of communicating the principles of the Christian religion to the children of the poor.

2. Assisting teachers and office-bearers of the Sunday Schools.

3. And for such other purposes as may be deemed expedient by the Bishop and the Association, including the employment of teachers and office-bearers, when practicable, as fixed by the Bishop and the Association.

ART. IV. *General Committee.*—The General Committee shall be composed of :

(1) Of the Lord Bishop.

(2) Three clerical members, one of each order, elected by the Bishop at each Synod.

(3) Two clerical members, one of each order, elected by the Deanery of Montreal.

(4) One clerical member, elected by the Deanery of the Diocese.

(5) One clerical member, elected by each Deanery.

ART. V. *Meeting.*—The General Committee shall meet of the day on which the Synod meets, and shall consist of seven members shall be present.

ART. VI. *Business.*—The business of the Association shall be otherwise ordered, and the last year shall be the year of the other business transactions.

ART. VII. *Branches.*—A Branch Association shall be formed in each Deanery of the Diocese, and the Branch Association shall have the same powers as the General Committee.

ART. VIII. *Observance.*—The observance of the Sunday School Association shall be observed as Sunday Schools.

Lord Bishop, the Clergy, office-bearers and teachers of all the Sunday Schools in the Diocese of Montreal, subscribing to the Constitution.

ART. III. *Objects.*—The objects of the Association are to bring together the Clergy, teachers and office-bearers of the various Church Sunday Schools of the Diocese for the purpose:—

1. Of communicating information as to the best methods of conducting Sunday Schools.

2. Assisting teachers in the instruction, training and government of their scholars.

3. And for such other purposes connected with Sunday School work as may be deemed necessary and be authorized by the General Committee, including the employment of a travelling Sunday School agent for the Diocese, when practicable, and under such rules, and for such duties as may be fixed by the Bishop of the Diocese, upon the request of the General Committee.

ART. IV. *General Committee.*—The General Committee shall be composed:

(1) Of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

(2) Three clergymen and three laymen members of the Synod, named by the Bishop at each annual Synod of the Diocese.

(3) Two clerical and two lay members elected annually by the Deanery of Montreal.

(4) One clerical and one lay member elected annually by each Rural Deanery of the Diocese, together with

(5) One clerical and one lay member elected by the Branch Association in each Deanery.

ART. V. Meetings of the General Committee shall be held on the evening of the day on which the Executive Committee of the Diocese meets, and seven members shall form a quorum.

ART. VI. The annual meeting of the Association shall be held, unless otherwise ordered, on Thursday evening of Synod week, when the Report of the last year shall be read, the accounts passed, the officers elected, and such other business transacted as may be submitted.

ART. VII. A Branch of the Association may be formed in each Rural Deanery of the Diocese, upon accepting the Constitution; and each such branch shall have power to appoint its own officers, and shall report to the General Committee before each annual meeting.

ART. VIII. The Bishop authorizing it, one Sunday in the year shall be observed as Sunday School Intercession Sunday, on which day a special

offertory shall be taken up in churches and Sunday Schools for the purpose of the Association.

ART. IX. The General Committee shall have power to frame all rules and regulations necessary for the management and control of the Association.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DUNHAM LADIES' COLLEGE.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:—

The report of the Principal shows that :

1. The property is held by a corporation constituted by Act of Parliament, and consists of: The Bishop of the Diocese, President, and all the clergy in the old district of Bedford, and one layman elected from each parish in the said district.

2. From this body there is an Executive Committee, to which is "committed the entire control of all matters financial and educational," and which reports to the Corporation at its annual meeting. For the immediate management of matters connected with the running of the college there is a House Committee consisting of the Chairman (at present), of the Executive Committee, the Principal and the Bursar. This Committee works under the direction of the Executive Committee.

3. The Staff.—During the past term (ending Dec. 4th) there have been the Principal and three lady assistants teaching in the class-rooms the subjects laid down by the Council of Public Instruction, Quebec. In the department of extras, one lady has taught the violin and German; another, the piano, drawing and painting. The nurse taught calisthenics. Besides these seven teachers there is the Matron, whose duty it is to give informal instruction in the management and care of the rooms, etc.

4. The Pupils.—There have been thirty-seven pupils receiving instruction during the last (our first) term: 19 boarders, 14 day pupils and 4 occasional (painting and drawing). The prospects of more pupils after Christmas are fair.

5. The course of study followed is that laid down by the Council of Public Instruction, Quebec. We are striving to conform to the regulations of this Council, with a view to receiving a grant from the government such as is given to Academies in this Province. The Bishop has already made application for the grant to be renewed.

The religious instruction is along the lines of the Prayer Book. In teaching the Holy Scriptures, frequent reference is made to our Church's interpretation and application of them.

6. The following is an epitome of the financial statement of the House Committee for the term Sept. 12th to Dec. 4th, 1894:—

8. It will be seen from the above statement of current expenses for the first term that there is a deficit of \$120.91. It is probable that the Educational Council at Quebec will give the usual Academy grant of \$200.00. There is also a guarantee fund subscribed, to be paid if needed. So that the House Committee does not anticipate any deficit, all things being equal, for current expenses.

9. There has been expended in opening the school, the sum of \$783.24. Of this amount the sum of \$295.33 has been paid, leaving \$487.91 to be provided for. Other repairs absolutely necessary will have to be made in the near future, in order that the building may be thoroughly equipped for its important work.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee addressed cards of enquiry to the following institutions, which comprise, as far as they know, the distinctively Church institutions in the Diocese, viz., St. Johns School, Berthier Grammar, Sabrevois College, Dunham Ladies' College, Frelighsburg School, Montreal Diocesan Theological College.

They have received answers from St. Johns school, Berthier, Sabrevois and Dunham. As Sabrevois and Dunham have committees reporting to this Synod the reports from these institutions have been given to those committees, which they will no doubt fully present :—

ST. JOHN'S SCHOOL.

1. The property is owned by the corporation of the church of St. John the Evangelist, and is leased to the Rev. E. Wood and Rev. A. French for the purpose of a Church school.

2. It is managed by the Rector and Headmaster.

3. The staff of teachers is : (1) The Rector ; (2) the Headmaster ; (3) Mr. Percy Davies, 7 years assistant at Mackenzie Park, Slough, England ; (4) Mr. H. J. Campbell, M.A. Trin., Toronto ; (5) Mr. Ethelbert Browne ; (6) Mr. H. A. Collins, Prefect ; (7) Mr. Reed, music ; (8) Mr. Williams, drawing ; (9) Major Atkinson, drilling. The school is absolutely full. In actual attendance there are 27 resident and 43 day pupils.

4. The educational course is primarily : Preparative for the Universities, —there are at least two preparing for Oxford ; secondarily, preparation for business.

The " distinctive religious teaching " is Holy Scripture, Catechism and Scripture History ; 56 receive instruction in catechism and 63 in Scripture History.

BERTHIER.

1. The property valued at \$5,000 is held by church wardens of St. James church, Berthier.

2. The school is now under direct control of the Trustees of the municipality, who are churchmen,—in fact, church wardens and vestry clerk with Rector.

3. There are at present 4 teachers engaged always, and one partial.

4. The course of studies covers Provincial High School curriculum, and exceeds doing 1st year university work.

5. There are at present 43 pupils, 35 boarders. Distinctly scriptural and religious instruction is given daily by myself, with Sunday School on Lord's Day.

Boys are looked after carefully by Mrs. Mills, myself and staff, and lads are prepared for confirmation when parents and lads desire it. Last year 12 of our lads were confirmed, and have since continued to regularly communicate; several will be confirmed next time.

Our lads read daily in French Bibles, and we try to impress details of our Lord's life and teaching on all.

MONTREAL DIOCESAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

1. Property—The property consists of one lot at the corner of Dorchester and Stanley streets, with the buildings thereon.

2. By whom held—By corporation under Act of Parliament.

3. Management—Managed by a corporation, a Board of Governors, and an Educational Council.

4. Course of Instruction—First Secular, viz., preparation for that pursued at McGill University for the B.A. degree; second, Theological, viz., the course for the Theological Testamur, the course for ordination in this Diocese, the course for Canadian Divinity Degrees, and the course for the Cambridge Preliminary Examination in England.

5. Number of students, 30. The number would be greater if I had a greater number of studentships for those in need. Seven men who applied for admission last term could not be received because they had no means to pay expenses.

No report from Frelighsburg.

Your Committee would again repeat their advice, that the clergy should interest themselves in the welfare of the schools under the control of the Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction, and with the view of making that course of education better known, your Committee propose that the Reverend E. I. Rexford be invited by the Bishop to address the Synod on that subject at the earliest possible opportunity.

IMMIGRATION CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

MY LORD,—

Although immigration has not increased during the past year, the work of your Chaplain's office has gone steadily on. Owing to lack of employment and the consequent distress among laboring classes both incoming and resident, details have much increased as to correspondence, visiting, efforts to find employment, and in granting assistance. The statistics below contrasted with last year's report will emphasize this. The Report of the Committee on Immigration Home explains the year's work, and leaves me only reverently to acknowledge the Guiding Power which has placed within your reach the establishment of a Home for at least those of our own communion. Knowing this need, as not many do, I predict a return of good exceeding that expected by some, and possibly surpassing the desire to do good of the generous donor, the late Mr. Ogden Andrews. Your Lordship's clear-sightedness in the distribution of his gift will be long recognized. It is impossible to refer at length to the many charitable institutions whose aid we have necessarily sought in providing for our people. We trust the new Home will largely supply the need, but I desire here gratefully to acknowledge the almost uniform courtesy, the general willingness to assist in a good cause, and as a rule to the good management displayed by such institutions.

The St. George's Home, the House of Industry, the Y.W.C.A., the Girls' Friendly Association, and the Sheltering Home have conferred much benefit upon us in connection with the care of immigrants. And to the General Hospital, the Royal Victoria, the Maternity, the Western and other hospitals, we owe a deep debt of gratitude for their unwearied care of our sick.

My experience as to careful supervision in placing women and girls has grown with another year. For example, of the 180 of this class of immigrants received at the Women's Protective Immigration Society, Osborne st., no less than 139 were Church of England, leaving the balance of 41 distributed among all other denominations, and I regret being unable to alter my previously expressed opinion of the management of this institution in so far as it affects our Church of England women and girls. With our Immigrants Home the Church will be enabled to supervise and care for her own members arriving in this country, especially as the greater number of these bring letters of commendation to me as chaplain.

All English parties of whose expected arrival I had been notified were duly met, information and advice were given, short services held, and an invitation extended to seek the Chaplain's counsel and aid at any time when required.

It is gratifying to state that some of the most important Societies at Home have thankfully acknowledged our services and the good already done, and are looking forward with pleasure to the opening of the Ogden Andrews' Home.

My receipts and expenditures for the year have already been placed before your Lordship. The increased item for office assistance is due to a promise made when in England that my office should remain open all day during the busy season. This has been done, and the extra expense provided by other than Diocesan funds.

Those who have lightened my work are far too many to individualize, but they have my sincerest thanks,—Clerical and Lay. The *Gazette* has kindly furnished its daily issue; Mr. Lovell generously presented us with his invaluable Directory; and the English press of the city have as ever given me their aid; while the "Department of the Interior," represented by A. M. Burgess, Esq., has given most valuable assistance.

Messrs. Hoolahan and Marquette, Dominion and Provincial immigration agents, have proved themselves the courteous gentlemen they are known to be.

A notable feature of this autumn's work was the return of 30 families to their old homes on the other side. The greater number of them were enabled to do this through the generous aid of the St. George's Society, the agents of the several shipping companies granting a special rate and materially assisting in this charitable work.

Gratifying reports have been made to me of the efficient manner in which the Dominion, Beaver and Allan lines have provided and cared for those entrusted to them. Personally I owe a debt of gratitude for their kindness in permitting me to procure tickets for poor returning immigrants at a reduced rate.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee on Foreign Missions met at the Synod office on the 14th of January, 1895.

After some discussion it was decided by the four gentlemen present to ask the Synod to discharge this Committee.*

It was considered that its work was now covered by the several appeals issued through the medium of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society acting under the authority of the Provincial Synod, and augmented by the noble and efficient work done by the several branches of the Woman's Auxiliary through the Diocese.

In the amounts furnished this Committee by the Secretary Treasurer, we notice with sorrow a decrease of \$111 during the year. But in looking at the total sum recorded, viz., \$1,457.62, we feel confident that there must be considerable sums raised by our Sunday Schools, Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, Kings' Daughters, St. Andrew's Brotherhood, for Foreign Mission purposes that are never forwarded to the Synod office or the Secretary-Treasurer notified of, thus the Diocese receiving no credit for said amounts.

It is felt that all moneys subscribed and offertories made for such purposes should be sent to Canon Empson, or at least that he be notified of the designation and sum sent elsewhere, so that some more accurate report may be made of all sums raised by the Diocese at large, for Foreign Missions.

Minority Report read by Rev. CANON DAVIDSON.

A trenchant writer not long since put it: "Without the Missionary Spirit, the Church is a lie. Falsehood is stamped upon every feature of it, upon its gate-posts, its outer and inner walls, its pew-doors, its pulpits, its baptismal fonts and even its communion tables; without this spirit its priests are deceivers and its people hypocrites. It holds in trust for the heathen nations the light of life, but it imparts it not to them. It professes the religion of Jesus of Nazareth, but exhibits none of His spirit. To the command 'Go ye into all the world to preach the Gospel to every creature' it responds 'I go,' but goes not." The admission of such an indictment leads a minority of your Committee to dissent entirely from the recommendation of the report presented. The spirit of the Gospel of Jesus, it is respectfully urged, forbids us to assent to any plea for relaxing for a moment the energies to any degree hitherto turned towards the evangelization of the world, or to withdraw even a formal hand of co-operation in the paramount duty of Christians whose access to the throne of grace is either barred or opened by the petition "Thy Kingdom Come." This report would desire to put upon the pages of our Synod report its devout acknowledgment to the Omnipresent Master that in this century in particular, He—through the blessed Spirit vouchsafed, and the signal labours of the army of missionary co-workers—has caused His name to be made more glorious amongst the nations of the earth. It would inscribe from the Epiphany Missionary Appeal, issued to every congregation of our Ecclesiastical Province by the House of Bishops, the list of that noble army of martyrs most of them in *will and deed*: "Reginald Heber, Henry Martyn, Livingstone, Mackenzie, Selwyn, Pattison, Hannington, Crowther, Bompas," whose example affords to the present and coming generations an illustration of the spirit and devotion pointing to the ultimate conquest of the Cross. It would bless God for the rays which beam from that Cross *to the world's end* in the blissful amelioration of human conditions, and would pass on before the wavering phalanxes of christian hosts the marvellous record of 80,000 christianized heathens since 1868 in Japan, and of 300,000 converts from idolatry during the last 50 years in that contiguous Empire, which it is the duty of christians to make more than "celestial" in name. The possibilities open to christian energies and enterprise, through "costly ointment" and heroic service, expand like a vision coming down from heaven, and like the transfer of the shadows of the Apocalypse to the visible aspects of the conquering reign of Jesus. This report would urge this Synod, to give itself afresh to this wondrous cause, to rouse from the defects of the past, to devise liberal things for the future, and by means of the dissemination of missionary literature, the collection of missing statistics, the enlisting of practical effort to secure a place in the van of the army going or sending far out among the heathens. 6. Work in the city of Quebec by Rev. L. V. Larivière, recommended by His Lordship the Bishop of Quebec.

We quote the following from the Principal of the Sabrevois College's report: The school re-opened on the 11th of last September. One hundred and six pupils registered in our book. Of these, sixty-six were boarders and forty day pupils. Our work, from the beginning of the term to the end, was uninterrupted. Those who helped me in the school were: Mr. G. W. M. Barnes, Mr. A. Dougados, Mr. G. W. Hollis, Mrs. Larivière, Miss D. Brunet, Miss E. Bulman, and Miss Duval.

With reference to the final examinations, James Boyd and Willie Clark were examined by Rev. Dr. Adams, Principal of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and were successful in passing the examinations for the matriculation for the study of medicine.

Our representatives at McGill Normal School, at McGill University and Bishop's College Medical Faculty were a credit to our school.

Miss Laila Vézina, at McGill Normal School, came out third of her class.

Mr. Chandler Hart, in the Third Year Science at McGill University, took a very high standing in all the subjects of that year.

Mr. Fortin of the First Year, Mr. James Benny and Mr. Oscar Stephens, of the Second Year, and Mr. Léandre Brunet, of the Fourth Year of the Medical Faculty of Bishop's College, passed all their examinations very satisfactorily, Mr. Brunet graduating M.D., with honors in several subjects.

Financially, our school is better now than it has been for the past ten years.

The work of the Church has been continued as in the past. The services have been comparatively well attended, and we have met, as usual, all the expenses incurred.

I am pleased, my Lord, to present to you this evening eleven candidates for confirmation.

Rev. Mr. Roy, missionary at Sabrevois village, reports satisfactorily. The services are held regularly with a good attendance. The attendance at the day school is larger than it has been for some years.

The parsonage, church and school house, etc., are all in good repair, and the annual subscription of the congregation towards the missionary's stipend has been good and promptly paid.

Rev. H. O. Loisselle was sent last spring, as a resident missionary at St. Francis village. He writes encouragingly concerning the work.

A few months ago The Right Rev Bishop of Moosonee visited St. Francis behalf of our Bishop, and six persons were confirmed.

Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay speaks very favorably of the work of Mr. A. Groulx, who is employed as a travelling missionary in the Rural Deanery of on Shefford.

Rev. R. C. Brewer, missionary at River Desert, writes: There are many French Canadians in River Desert and Maniwaki, the adjoining village. The Church of England Mission at River Desert has, through her missionary, been able to reach the French Canadians and brought the light of God's word to them. This has been done quietly, in visitation, without giving offence, because of tact and consideration of feelings. Results that show inquiry is on the increase, light is shedding abroad in divine rays the Gospel simplicity of salvation through our Lord and Saviour Jesus-Christ. The thoughtful are becoming still more thoughtful, while some are looking higher than a human aspect of priesthood. At the close of his letter Rev. Mr. Brewer says: French work is progressing, slowly perhaps, yet surely. The impulse given to-day will lead to greater things, as possibilities show probabilities to encourage.

Rev. L. V. Larivière, on his return from Florida, resumed his work in the city of Quebec, and has succeeded in renting a hall for worshipping in. Mr. Larivière's work in the capital of our Province is highly spoken of by the Bishop of Quebec.

Your Committee regard with the greatest thankfulness the labour of the Sabrevois Committee; quietly, unobtrusively the Sabrevois Committee has done and is doing a work which deserves the gratitude of the Church. It has educated and trained a large number of earnest, talented men, who are to-day in their respective fields of labour doing a great work for the Church of God.

Whilst recognizing fully the good work done, your Committee are of opinion that more should be done. This is said, not as a reproach, nor to suggest defects, in the working of the Sabrevois Committee. No doubt, defects could be found, if they were anxiously looked for, but it is not the object of your Committee. The object of your Committee, as we understand it, is to find out and to indicate to the Synod the best way of doing French work. This, of course, takes for granted that the work ought to be done. To abandon it would mean to abandon a large and important field of labour; to close our doors against many weak brethren, who have a strong claim upon us. It would mean to give up a work, which has already received, in a signal manner, the mark of God's approval and blessing, and even to abandon what many believe to be the special mission of the Church in this Province.

That such a work should be encouraged and promoted is, we think, the wish and purpose of every member of this Synod.

We wish the Society, which is mainly carrying on that work, even greater success in the future than it has had in the past; however, your Committee are of opinion that the work is of such an extension and importance, that it ought not to be left entirely in the hands of a Society; therefore, we would recommend that the organized French churches, viz., L'Eglise du Rédempteur in Montreal and the Church of the Messiah at Sabrevois be handed over to the Synod.

We see no reason why the Sabrevois Committee would not hand them over to the Synod, and no reason why the Synod should not take them up and place them on the Mission Fund on the same footing as the other English Missions of the Diocese. Certainly, there should be no distinction of nationality in the Church. From an ecclesiastical point of view, these two churches are on precisely the same footing now as the English churches. The clergymen of those churches are licensed by the Bishop to sit in the Synod, and are eligible for all positions in the Diocese.

The French congregations receive the Bishop's oversight, send delegates to the Synod, bear their quota of Synod assessments, and generally share in the whole of the Church's life of the Diocese.

Why should they not, like any English church, be cared for by the Synod, and supported, if need be, by the Mission Fund?

This would place them in line with all the churches of the Diocese, and put them, to say the least, on a more Church-like basis.

Your Committee again respectfully suggest that a strong influence be brought to bear on the young men now preparing for the ministry in our Diocese, to induce them to learn the French language, because we are of opinion that French work will never be adequately done until we have a bilingual ministry.

We would also recommend that a French summer school be established in some part of the country, where our Students, and perhaps some of our Clergy, could learn French during the summer holidays.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRENCH WORK OF 1893.

(As amended in 1895, and adopted.)

Your Committee beg to submit, in the first place, a few extracts from the reports of the various agents now employed in French work.

For the Sabrevois Mission, School and Church in the city of Montreal, Rev. Principal D. Larivière reports as follows: Ninety-seven pupils have been under instruction during the greater part of the term. Of these, fifty were boarders, and the rest day-pupils. We are very thankful to say that while the angel of sickness has, during the winter, visited so many homes in the city, our pupils have been spared. Our doctor's bill has been nothing, but our butcher and baker have reaped a rich harvest, and to-day our pupils are leaving us in the best of health. The attendance at the church was, on an average, better than it has been for the last three years.

We were pleased to be visited now and then by some of our English-speak-

ing Church people. Among the clergy, I may mention Rev. Mr. King and Rev. Mr. Everett, who occasionally took part in the services.

Our School was represented in the M. D. T. C. by two students; at McGill by three,—one in Arts, one in Science and one in the Veterinary department; and at Bishop's Medical College by five, one of whom graduated this year.

The report of the work at the village of Sabrevois, as well as that at the village of St. Francis and the city of Quebec, is very satisfactory.

Your Committee are of opinion that the Executive Committee should recognize the mission churches doing French Work, as they do other mission churches in the diocese, and assist their ministrations with a grant from its funds.

Your Committee beg also to recommend to your Lordship and the members of the Synod, to use their influence to induce the young men now preparing themselves at the M. D. T. C. for mission work in this Province, to study French, so as to be able, when they leave the College, to minister in both English and French.

Your Committee are pleased to notice that Sabrevois Mission has better prospects now than it has had for the last five years, and it has spent, during last summer, over \$1200 for repairs and improvements of their School on Chatham street. The building is now in a fair condition, and effective work is being carried on. We rejoice at these prospects, for now, more than ever, should the French work be vigorously pursued. For various reasons, the Church of Rome in this Province is beginning to lose her hold upon her people.

We are convinced that a rich harvest is now ripening for whatever religious body has faith enough and self-denial enough to put in the sickle. And the Church of England is the religious body that should gather this harvest into the garner of the Lord. For she should be foremost in the Master's Work, and she has special qualifications for this special work. She is the historical Church of the English nation. She has a glorious history, traceable back to Apostolic times. Her episcopal form of Church government, her liturgical worship, her deeply scriptural and evangelical spirit, all her special features, in fact, appeal most strongly to the feelings and imagination of the French Canadians, and mark her out as the Church round which they would naturally rally. Should we close our eyes to this splendid field of labor, and our hearts to the splendid opportunities that lie before us here; and should we practically compel such people, who would fain become the loyal sons and daughters of our Church, to find a spiritual home amongst the Methodists, Baptists and Presbyterians, because the Church of England is unwilling to make the efforts and the sacrifices necessary to open her doors to receive them? We hope not.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WORKS OF MERCY.

MY LORD,—

Acknowledging as we do the goodness of Him who is the God of all comfort, and thankful for the manifestation among us of the Spirit of Him who came to heal the broken in heart,

Your Committee beg to present the following summarized Report of work done by the various agencies of which it is their privilege to take cognizance

REPORT OF CITY MISSIONARY, REV. E. MCMANUS.

I have visited the House of Refuge on Dorchester st. forty-one times, to assist the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society and the Out-Door Board of Relief in dispensing provisions and fuel to poor and destitute families. The Protestant House of Industry at Longue Point I have visited fifty-two times. My usual custom here is to hold a short service of prayer, with a reading from Scripture and exhortation, on the flat occupied by the women. This is followed immediately by a similar service on the flat above occupied by the men. The average attendance at these services is about thirty. At

regular intervals the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is administered ; the number who have communicated during the year being thirty-six. After these services, the sick and infirm, of whom there are always several, are visited in their rooms and ministered to at the bedside.

Since the opening of the " George Moore Memorial Convalescent Home " I have visited and ministered to the inmates therein whenever I have gone to Longue-Pointe, and on one occasion I held a service of Holy Communion and administered the Sacrament to five individuals. There is great need for a suitable set of Communion plate, and I would be very thankful if some benevolent friend would supply one. I have visited the Women's Protective Immigration Society's Home fourteen times, and the Working Girls' Home thirty-six times. I here obtain the names of girls placed at service in the city, and as soon as possible I visit them for the purpose of bringing them under the notice of the clergyman whose church they wish to attend. I have visited the Protestant Infants Home thirty-one times, and the Montreal Foundling and Infant Nursery eighty-two times for Divine Service, baptisms and burials. I have visited and held Divine Service at the Ladies' Benevolent Institution seven times, and at the Sheltering Home thirty-one times. I have visited the Hervey Institute nine times, the Protestant Hospital for the Insane once, and the St. Margaret's Home once. I have attended eleven meetings of the Society for the Protection of Women and Children, and also eleven meetings of the Prisoners' Aid Association. I have attended twenty-nine meetings of the Fresh Air Fund Committee, visited the Home at Chambly eleven times, and assisted at three picnic excursions. I have made forty-eight visits to the Notre Dame Hospital and ninety-four to patients therein. I wish here to acknowledge with thanks the courtesy shown to me by the officers and nurses of this hospital, and to express my entire satisfaction as to the fairness and impartiality with which the Protestant patients are treated. I have made fifty-eight visits to the Hotel Dieu Hospital and one hundred and fifty-three to patients therein. I have made nine hundred and forty-five visits to families or individuals in the city.

St. Jude's and St. George's Branches are both increasing steadily, and the large attendance at the meetings shows that the members appreciate what is done for them.

The work is a quiet one, but it extends to *individuals* in all directions, and is, we trust, a means of bringing many a girl under wholesome influences, teaching them that duty comes before pleasure, and that the motto of the Society,

“Bear ye one another's burdens,”

should be the motto of their lives.

REPORT OF THE M. D. W. A., 1893-94.

The members of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese number about 1,000. There are twelve life members. Since our last report to the Synod, branches have been formed in Knowlton, Lakefield, St. Johns East, Grenville and Sorel, senior and junior Branches. There are in all 46 branches, of which 14 are junior.

The Treasurer reports the receipts of the year as \$1,851.23.

The Dorcas Secretary reports a large number of bales sent out at Christmas, some to our Diocesan Missions and many to the Northwest.

The sum of \$200.00 per annum is still contributed towards the support of a teacher in the Washakada Home. It is gratifying to the supporters of that

Institution, that the Canadian flag offered by the Indian Commissioner to the best-conducted Indian School was awarded to that Institution which is under the control and supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Wilson. \$150.00 is the amount now contributed by the M.D.W.A. towards the salary of our lady medical missionary, Miss Jennie Smith, in Japan.

Eight monthly, eight preliminary and four special meetings have been held during the year. The special meetings were called for Mrs. Sillitoe of New Westminster, Bishop Bickersteth of Japan, Miss Brown of Piegan Reserve, and Bishop Young of Athabasca.

THE HOSPITAL CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Divine Service has been held regularly on Sunday afternoons at the General Hospital, and the members of St. George's Y.M.C.A. have been unceasing in their work, both in encouraging convalescent patients to attend, in assisting at the music, and in other ways in making the services hearty and attractive. A great help also in the work is the regular attendance through the wards and at the Service, of a band of ladies from All Saints', St. Martin's, St. George's and other churches. The Hospital Chaplain has divided his visitations about equally between the General and Royal Victoria Hospitals. There were in all 177 visits to the Hospitals in 564 wards. There were 859 visits with religious exercises, and 1182 visits of friendly inquiry,—in all, 1932 visits to patients. There were also administrations of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, when opportunity presented, and also funerals conducted from time to time.

The circulating library at both hospitals is under the management of the St. George's Y.M.C.A.

The Rev. Thos. Everett, who has for a number of years (without remuneration) regularly visited the Western Hospital, says: "I am visiting twice a week, namely, on Sunday and Wednesday mornings. The upper flat of the hospital being now fitted up for a men's ward, should more visiting become necessary, (D.V.) I shall do my best to perform the duty."

PRISONERS' AID.

As the admirable report of the Prisoners' Aid Association is being circulated among members of the Synod and among Montreal churchmen generally, we here give it in an abbreviated form:

assisted by friends, clothes were given to 25, rooms were obtained for 6 men and their families, railway fare paid for 10 men and 1 woman, 327 meals and 147 night's lodgings were given. Of the \$65.60 given for rooms, tools, railway fare, etc., \$46.12 were returned. There were 474 visits made to or on behalf of the men after release.

Your Committee in presenting this Report feel that we cannot close without noticing the fact that 1894 will be ever memorable for the advance made in Montreal and vicinity in Institutions for the sick and afflicted and the stranger within our gates.

The beginning of the year witnessed the opening of the wards of that splendidly equipped and managed Institution, the Royal Victoria Hospital, where now 173 patients are being cared for; and progressive stages of the year witnessed the completion and opening of the George Moore Memorial Home at Longue Point. The commencement and partial completion, at an enormous outlay, of improvements in the Montreal General Hospital; the placing on a firm financial basis of the Church Home on Guy street; the purchase of a fine property in that central and accessible locality, Belmont Park, to be called the Andrews' Home, for those immigrants and strangers who need the sheltering care of the Church,—these two being the maturing of confidence in your Lordship's good judgment on the part of an earnest churchman now some years deceased; the formal dedication of the St. Margaret's Home for Incurables on Sherbrooke Street; and the purchase and endowment of the Robert Jones Memorial Convalescents Hospital for Children on the Lower Lachine Road, these two last-named Institutions owing their existence to the munificence of earnest churchmen, who, we are thankful to say, still live to see God's blessing on their work.

DEANERY OF MONTREAL, 1894.

MY LORD,—

The annual meeting of the Deanery of Montreal was held on the 14th day of January, 1895, when the accompanying report of Statistics, connected with the different Parishes and Missions, was presented and approved of.

As your Lordship called for no "special statistics" during the year, and as no question relating to the boundaries of parishes, or the erection of new ones was referred to the Deanery, we have nothing to bring before you, save a few matters arising out of the year's statistics.

1. The following salaries reported to the Deanery seem in every way inadequate, and we would ask your Lordship to bring the facts before the Executive Committee.

The missionary of Kildare, a priest, reports \$589 as total stipend, inclusive of \$400 from Mission Fund. The missionary at Coteau du Lac, a priest, reports \$109; no grant from Mission Fund. The missionary at New Glasgow, a priest, reports \$541, inclusive of \$400 from Mission Fund.

2. The Deanery would also call your Lordship's attention to the decrease in the amount received from the annual offering to the Widows and Orphans Fund, within the Deanery. Comparing the years 1883 and 1884 with 1893 and 1894, the decrease is apparent, especially when we remember that, during the intermediate years, six churches have been added to the list of churches reporting to the Deanery. The figures are as follows:—

1883.....	\$538	1893.....	\$448

The Deanery passed the following resolution on the subject:

Proposed by Rev. Dr. KER, seconded by Mr. WALTER DRAKE:

That in order to place the Widows and Orphans Fund in a condition in which it will be in a position to bear the claims that may reasonably be expected to fall upon it, it is necessary to raise a further capital sum of not less than \$10,000.

That the collection of this amount may be extended over a period of ten years, \$1,000 being collected by assessment from the parishes each year.

3. The Deanery would notice, with gratitude, the increase to the total of reported endowment of churches within the Deanery during the last ten years, 1884 returning \$36,492, and 1894 \$70,566.

4. A like comparison with reference to the Mission Fund is encouraging, the total subscribed during the year 1884 being \$6,246, the total for 1894 being \$8,913.

All the churches reporting are insured, with the exception of St. Simon's. The Deanery has called the attention of the Archdeacon of Montreal to this fact.

RURAL DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

MY LORD,—

The 32nd Annual Meeting of the Rural Deanery of Bedford was held at the Ladies' College, Dunham, on Monday, January 7th, 1895, being prefaced by celebration of the Holy Communion in All Saints Church.

Reports were received from all the parishes but two, the incumbent of one of these being absent from the country by your Lordship's permission.

I am thankful to be able to submit the following facts, indicative of health and progress in this part of your Lordship's Diocese:—

1. A new church has been erected at Stanbury, in the rectory of Stanbridge East. This is a point which has been for many years the subject of solicitude to the members of this Deanery, and it is a matter of rejoicing that it has at length been occupied by the Church, with every indication of acceptance and prospect of prosperity. The church, which was opened for Divine Service on the Sunday after Christmas, is a very neat little edifice, seating 120 persons, and is well adapted in every respect to the wants of the neighborhood. Its estimated value is \$1,200, but, owing to the fact that most of the labour was contributed gratuitously, the actual cost was only about \$700. The energetic young Rector, by whose exertions mainly this work has been accomplished, deserves to be heartily congratulated on his success. Among other improvements in the same parish, it may be mentioned that a new furnace has been placed in the Rectory and a new shed built for the accommodation of the congregation.

2. A rural tablet of polished brass and two sanctuary chairs of oak have been placed in St. Paul's Church, Abbotsford, in loving memory of the Rev. Canon Frederick Robinson, M.A. The roof of the shed attached to the church has been renewed at a cost of \$70.

3. Repairs and improvements have been made to the Church property at Rougemont at a cost of \$35.74.

4. The Ladies' Aid Society of Dunham has raised \$100 for the purpose of putting a slate roof on the parish church.

5. The erection of a Church Hall at Cowansville is projected, and will no doubt be accomplished, as it is much needed, and the people are quite able to build it.

I have no doubt that many other improvements have been made during the year, which have not been officially reported.

It is a matter for great satisfaction and gratitude that the Ladies' College at Dunham is once more in good working order. Since its re-opening last September under the charge of Rev. N. A. F. Bourne, B.A., it has abundantly vindicated its right to existence by the number of pupils who have availed themselves of its opportunities of giving a first-class education at a moderate cost, and it is confidently expected that as its merits become better known, its popularity and usefulness will be proportionately increased. The Principal is unremitting in his efforts to make the College worthy of its position as the Diocesan Church School for girls, and he is well supported by a thoroughly efficient staff of assistant teachers. All that is needed to make the school a complete success is the practical sympathy and hearty support of the Church people of the Diocese.

RURAL DEANERY OF BROME.

MY LORD,—

The required Statistical Report from the several parishes comprising this Deanery was submitted for discussion and review to the Annual Chapter convened in Knowlton, on the 8th January last.

The attendance on the part of the Clergy was fair,—five out of eight being present. But of laymen, only one church-warden was present. The absence of others being reasonably accounted for.

In the reviewing of the statistics from the parish of Brome, the attention of the Chapter was reasonably drawn to the large increase in the number of families identified with the Church, being fifty-three over last year, the total being given as one hundred. This increase is partly accounted for by the temporary acquisition of North Sutton, the Rector of Sutton, for the present, relinquishing his pastoral care there over. This identification of families with the Church was made on the assumption, that all families or persons attending the ministrations, or more or less contributing to the sustentation of the clergyman, might be so classed, irrespective of the question whether they were baptized or not. This method of identifying was not, in the opinion of the Chapter, satisfactory,—at least, it was not the method used by others of the clerical brethren. Aside from this point, however, the work of the Rev. J. Lackey is conscientiously and sedulously carried out. The contributions to the Mission Fund from this parish surpassed expectation.

ADAMSVILLE.—This parish came in for a share of commendation for its contribution to the Mission Fund. This parish has lost a good “mother in Israel,” by the death of Mrs. Adams, widow of Mr. Adams who built and gave over the present house of worship to the Church of England. Ever hospitable, ever kind, regular in attendance in the house of God, cordial in the support of the same, we may rightly bless the Lord for this His servant “departed this life in His faith and fear,” beseeching Him that others may be raised up who shall receive grace to follow her good example.

BOLTON.—This Mission, now under the charge of the Rev. A. C. Wilson, ordained Deacon last Trinity Sunday, has been considerably weakened in point of numbers of church goers and supporters, by the closing of mills, the cessation of certain lines of labour, and the removal of paying and praying members to other sections of the country.

There are among the supporters of the Church very few, if indeed there are any (which I doubt) who could be fairly classed among the so-called “well-to-do.” But however this may be, it is clearly seen that to expect increased support from the people for the minister, or the Mission Fund, is out of the question, *i.e.*, judging by what is the ordinary (not the scriptural)

standard of giving. The Incumbent feels, as did his predecessors, that it is next to impossible to exercise the pastoral work that East Bolton might furnish, and that if it could be worked as part of a new mission, having Eastman as its centre, the work might be developed.

The Bishop of Moosonee visited this Mission as your Lordship's deputy, and administered the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation.

GLEN SUTTON and WEST POTTON.—The Parsonage standing in need of repair, sheathing and clap-boarding, the Incumbent set to work to have it done, and it was done before winter set in, the minister himself doing a large share of the manual labour. The current work of the Church has had its once undisturbed stream rippled by the advent of Adventist Preachers. In West Potton that class of Christians have always had a strong following, and the work of the Church, her ways and her worship are regarded adversely and unfavorably. The work of the missionary of the Church becomes, under these circumstances, one wanting patient sowing in faith, leaving the results to the Great Husbandman; but in the meanwhile, the maintenance of the clergyman and family requires the prayers, the sympathy and consideration of all those who have to do with the financial support of Mission work.

IRON HILL and WEST BROME.—This parish has become somewhat shrunk in area, by taking in from the West Brome section the place called "Scottsmore," and adding it to Sweetsburgh Parish, to which indeed it territorially belongs. But this lessening of the number of families lessens of course the subscriptions to the Clergyman's Stipend, which in consequence, from the forecasting and calculation of the Vestry, will come far short of even the minimum allowed by the Canon, this year, except the Executive Committee comes to its aid.

KNOWLTON.—This live parish, always known for its good works for its own wants, while not forgetting others less privileged, has seen a new church go up in a remarkably short time, and furnished and finished even to the Font at the door and the bell in the turret. This is in Bolton Glen, but in the bounds of Knowlton parish. The building cost about \$1200. No debt remains. The building has been painted, and stands ready for Consecration. It would have been consecrated had your Lordship been permitted to reach the spot when you were in the parish. The average attendance for the five months past has been 31, communicants 19, and the Rector, the church-building rector (and in a spiritual as well as a material sense), is preparing to build another. Particulars are given elsewhere under "Trusts and Endowments." The Congregation of St. Paul's Church, the mother church of the parish, has reduced the indebtedness on the new church by \$956. It (the debt) now stands at \$2,800. Considering what has been done thus in the past, the Church people of this parish, with their indefatigable Rector, can thank God and take courage.

POTTON.—The parsonage barn after some untoward delays has at last been lifted up out of the mud, and placed on a good stone foundation, and

otherwise put into a state of repair. The revived attempt to enthuse a spirit for a new church has again proved abortive. "The time is not come, the time that the Lord's House should be built," say they. The outlook, it is true, of this Mission is not just now of the brightest. Eleven communicants, some of them heads of families, have gone away; and no one, hardly, is replaced by others.

SUTTON.—The Vestry of this parish has had, during the past summer, under deliberation the serious question as to whether they should build a new church or repair the old one. At one time the question was considered as settled towards repair; but it is to be again opened after next Easter. In the meantime, the faithful work of the Rector is meeting with the promised reward and the building up of the spiritual temple wherein the Holy Ghost rules.

The Chapter of the Deanery authorized me to write a personal letter to your Lordship, urging the formation of the suggested Mission of Eastman. This duty has been discharged.

A feature of the Statistical Report that tells its own silent but emphatically pathetic tale to any reflecting mind is the fact that in all the missions receiving grants, the already meagre stipends of the clergy have not been met: arrearages ranging from \$25 to \$100 being reported. Let us hope that the new mission plan may draw out a better response from those who enjoy Church privileges, so that they who minister in holy things may go in and out among their people with a freedom from the corroding and depressing thoughts that arise from being in debt for the things of the past, and in doubt as to the means obtainable for to-morrow.

REPORT OF THE RURAL DEANERY OF CLARENDON, 1894.

MY LORD,—

There have been two meetings of the Deanery during the past year: one held at Shawville on May 23rd, attended by seven clergymen and eleven laymen, and another held at Hull on Oct. 2nd, attended by ten clergymen. I am glad to report that there are no vacancies, and that there have been no clerical changes during the past year.

I. Reports of Church progress.

3. Rev. A. A. Allen of Chelsea reports repairs made on parsonage and outbuildings, with other improvements, costing \$100.

4. Ven. Archdeacon Naylor of Shawville reports that the parish of C'arendon hopes to become self-supporting on January 1st, 1895.

5. Rev. F. R. Smith of Hull reports that the Sunday School room has been enlarged and a new furnace has been placed in the church, costing in all about \$440.

6. Ven. Archdeacon Naylor reports that the congregation of St. James' Church, Leslie, have acquired eighty acres of glebe land, at a cost of \$400.

7. Rev. J. L. Flanagan reports, on behalf of the Incumbent of Thorne Centre, the building of a stone church, in which service is now being held.

8. Rev. W. A. Fyles reports a number of improvements in connection with the parsonage, a gift of cedar posts by Mr. McAdam towards a new fence, and a promise of heavy timbers towards a new church at N. Onslow, with the consent of your Lordship towards the erection of the same. He also reports that, by the decision of all concerned, the material of St. Mark's Church, Bristol, is to be given towards the erection of a new church at Bristol Mines, and the proceeds of the sale of land to be given towards the erection of a new church at S. Onslow.

9. Rev. H. Plaisted of Portage du Fort reports the re-shingling of St. George's Church and repairs to the church tower, a new church bell and belfry at Bryson, and the building of a new church at Clarke's Station.

10. Rev. R. C. Brewer of River Desert reports the acquisition of an acre of land from the Indians in a favorable situation, as the future site for a new church, which the growing requirements of the Mission may soon call for. An encouraging feature in the matter is the willingness with which the Indians surrendered the land. Hope is held out by the acting church-warden of a good supply of materials towards the erection of a new church, when such a good work is really set on foot.

11. The Rev. J. L. Flanagan of Thorne reports the consecration of St. Stephen's Church.

12. Rev. Dr. Boyd of Wakefield reports the building of a church shed at Wakefield, and the re-shingling of the parsonage at N. Wakefield.

In connection with the reports given from the above missions and parishes, having lately visited the Mission of River Desert, I would like to emphasize the fact that it is eminently *the* mission of the Diocese. It is the pioneer work of the Church, in that it is the most northern of our missionary outposts. The missionary, in his ministrations to the men at the shanties and scattered settlers on both sides of the Gatineau, covers a distance of seventy miles. From the position of the Desert, it is destined at no remote future date to beame a railway terminus, intersected perhaps by one of the main lines, which will in all probability make it an important place, and so ought to be held for the Church.

II. Missionary work.

Missionary meetings have been held in the different missions and parishes of the Deanery during the past year, which have been fairly attended. The lumber shanties were visited by the Rev. R. C. Brewer, the Rev. J. M. Coffin, and the Rev. J. L. Flanagan.

The thanks of the Deanery were extended to them for their work of love and danger during winter of 1894, of which a more full report will be made by the "Committee on Provision for the Lumber Districts." Special mission services have been conducted in the parishes of Onslow, Thorne and Bristol. The Deanery expressed its strong approval of the work, and wished the missionaries God-speed. It is believed that these services have led to a deepening of spiritual life.

III. Church Literature.

The Deanery, realizing the utility and power of Church literature, has localized the *Church Monthly* as a deanery magazine. There are now 240 subscribers, with the hope of an increased circulation. The thanks of the Deanery were tendered to the Rev. J. L. Flanagan and Rev. W. A. Fyles as co-editors, expressing the pleasure felt in the success which has attended their endeavors.

In connection with Christian literature, feeling the debt we owe to the S.P.C.K. as the Bible, Prayer Book and Church Literature Society, six of our parishes have given a special offertory during the past year, amounting in all to \$22.08.

IV. Sunday Schools.

There have been two meetings of our Deanery Sunday School Institute during the past year: one held in the parish of Hull on October 3rd, and a second held at Shawville on the 8th of November. Both of these meetings were well attended, and the earnest discussions following the many instructive addresses manifested an increasing interest in the work of Sunday Schools. At a meeting of the Deanery held in Shawville, May 23rd, it was resolved, that owing to the existence of various independent S.S. Associations, and the advisability of greater centralization, "in the opinion of this Deanery, the formation of a Diocesan S. S. Association, on the basis of motion presented to the Synod by Rev. W. T. Chambers, is thought desirable."

V. Resolutions of Deanery.

1. That this Deanery approves the modified form of the Quebec Plan, as proposed at the last meeting of Synod by the Rev. J. H. Dixon.

2. That this Deanery would approve of the closing of parish accounts on March 31st, each year, and the reporting of parochial statistics (for the year ending on that date) to the Rural Dean upon May 1st, to be considered at the following Rural Deanery meeting, and reported upon by the Rural Dean at the ensuing meeting of Synod.

3. This Deanery would again express its approval of the principle of Representation in Provincial Synod, embodied in the motion presented at the meeting of Synod 1894, by the Rev. W. A. Fyles.

4. In connection with the papers read by the Deanery, the discussion was approved as scriptural and recommended.

5. The Deanery expressed its approval of the character of their work. The Deanery extends its thanks to the Rural Dean on his recent appointment to the jurisdiction over the Deanery. It may prove of great benefit to the part of the Diocese.

VI. Church Society.

We are glad to report the progress of the Brotherhood of St. John's in their good work in the Deanery.

In conclusion, we report that there were 191 candidates who were opened, and that this is not only a sign of the work of God's people are being

After some conversation, the place and time of the next meeting was determined.

4. In connection with the subject of Almsgiving, as an [outcome of the papers read by the Rev. W. E. Kaneen and the Rev. W. A. Fyles, and of the discussion which followed, the Deanery adopted this resolution: "We approve as scriptural the principle of direct giving for Church purposes, and recommend its adoption by all the parishes of the Deanery."

5. The Deanery also, as a testimony of their appreciation of the worth and character of their late Rural Dean, passed the following resolution: "This Deanery extends its heartiest congratulations to the Incumbent of Shawville on his recent appointment by the Bishop as Archdeacon of Clarendon, with jurisdiction over the Deanery of St. Andrew's; and expresses the hope that it may prove of great benefit in advancing the interests of the Church in this part of the Diocese of Montreal."

VI. Church Societies.

We are glad to report that there are branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and of the C.E.T.S., which are all doing a good work in the several parishes in which they exist.

In conclusion, we are glad to note that at your Lordship's last visitation, there were 191 candidates presented for confirmation, three new churches were opened, and another consecrated; all of which we hope and trust is not only a sign of a visible increase of the Church, but also a sign that God's people are being built up in their Most Holy Faith.

RURAL DEANERY OF IBERVILLE.

The annual meeting of the Rural Deanery of Iberville was assembled in one of the rooms of the Synod building, on this 16th day of January, 1895. There were present the Rev. the Rural Dean in the chair, the Rev. Canon Rollit, Rev. T. B. Jeakins, W. J. M. Beattie, B. P. Lewis and Mr. J. Fulford Rollit.

The meeting being opened with prayer, the minutes of the last two meetings were read by the secretary, and approved, after which the Rural Dean submitted to the meeting his annual report.

The question of filling the vacancy in the parish of Edwardstown was then discussed, with the result of the adoption of the following resolution:—

Moved by the Rev. Canon Rollit, and seconded by the Rev. B. P. Lewis, that this meeting recommends that the services by a student at Edwardstown should cease, and that the recommendation of our last meeting for uniting Edwardstown with Franklin and Havelock be carried out.

After some conversation on the subject to Franklin and Havelock, and the place and time of our next gathering, the meeting was closed.

CHANGES.

The Rev. G. H. Butler, M.A., having resigned the charge of Chambly, was succeeded by the Rev. R. D. Irwin. Under the head of changes we are forced to notice the continual changes that are taking place in many of our missions and parishes, owing to the constant emigration of our people,—changes perhaps that we feel more strongly than any other.

On this subject the Rector of Christieville writes: "Very few parishes, I presume, have suffered more from emigration than Christieville, there being at one time eighty families, and now eighteen. The last of the pioneers of the Parish, Mrs. Wm. McGinis, who with her husband settled here over sixty years ago, passed peacefully away on the 19th December last, at the good old age of 86. Her name must be associated with that of her husband and Major and Mrs. Christie as the pioneers of this parish."

The Rector of Christieville also reports that the endowment in connection with the Mission of Savanne, mentioned in the last report, has been received and invested by the Synod.

CLERICAL STIPENDS.

It is with much satisfaction that we notice that no arrears on salaries have been reported. But we feel it to be our duty to draw the attention of the Executive Committee to the fact that the Incumbent of Sabrevois still received less than \$600. The whole amount of his salary for last year amounted only to \$570.

MISSION FUND.

We are sorry to report that the amount given to the Mission Fund for the year just closed falls far short of the amount given in the previous year. Possibly the year 1893 was no criterion to go by, as a special appeal and extraordinary effort was made throughout the Deanery as well as throughout the Diocese, to lessen if not to liquidate the indebtedness of this most important fund.

However, we are pleased to notice that one mission and two parishes exceeded even the amount given in 1893, and we have faith enough in our people to believe that it was owing to some local contingency or extra outlay in the parish or mission that prevented some of the missions and parishes from doing as did the mission and parishes referred to; and that this year will prove that it was not owing to any lack of interest, or that the people are any the less liberal. The amount given to the Mission Fund in 1893 was \$702.96, and for the year just closed \$586.60.

IMPROVEMENTS.

The Church people of Hallerton, Lacolle and Clarenceville are indebted to the ladies of their respective congregations for having placed beautiful and becoming carpets in the chancel of their churches.

A branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in the parish of Lacolle and Napierville has been organized. The Misses Ellerton have placed in St. John's church a Communion rail in memory of their late father; and Miss Margaret White has been instrumental in securing for St. John's church an electro-plated Communion service and two oak chairs for the Chancel.

DEBT.

The only debt reported last year was a trifling one on the Mission of Hemmingford and Hallerton, of \$260.86. We rejoice to see that this debt has been reduced to \$125.00, which is the only debt in the whole Deanery.

DEANERY STATISTICS.

There are 10 clergymen, 1 vacancy, 4 other stations where services are held, 567 families, 819 confirmed persons, 532 partook of Holy Communion during the year, 65 baptisms, 26 marriages, 54 confirmed, \$42,400 insurance, \$125 debt, \$21,879.16 endowment, \$2076.38 given through the Offertory, \$910 received from the Mission Fund, \$6320.00 Clerical Stipends, \$586.60 Mission Fund, \$112.32 Domestic Missions, \$75.14 Foreign Missions, \$232.17 raised by Woman's Auxiliary and Ladies' Guild, \$132.90 by Girls' Auxiliary, \$38.95 for Jews, \$1582.89 for general purposes, \$9361.33 total amount raised. All the Church property in the Deanery is reported insured.

REPORT OF THE RURAL DEANERY OF SHEFFORD.

MY LORD,—

I have the honor to submit to you through the Archdeacon of Bedford a report of the work done in the Rural Deanery of Shefford, as revealed by the accompanying table of statistics for the year, along with that of our annual Deanery meeting held in St. Luke's Church, Waterloo, on the 7th of this month, at which were present 7 clergy and 11 laymen.

The area covered by the year's work remains unincreased by any extension of missionary limits.

The number of cures is also the same.

We have 13 churches and 3 out-stations in operation, and others reported by one Incumbent as not kept open during the year.

The number of clergy working in the Deanery is 8, and that of lay-readers 3.

Rev. J. Thompson, B.A., has succeeded Rev. R. F. Taylor in the incumbency of N. Shefford and Roxton, along with Warden, which is still for a time longer served by the same man.

A reference to the table of statistics shows the following comparative results as between this and last year :

There has been a slight decrease in the amount of insurance on Church property and in that of the Stipends, one cure being served by a deacon. Also in those of the Widows and Orphans Fund, Superannuation Fund, and in that raised under the head of general purposes.

There has been less demand upon the Mission Fund, while more has been raised, notably in two Rectories.

There has also been an increase in the amounts raised for Domestic Missions, Endowments and Jews, the same for Foreign Missions, and double that of last year by Girls' Auxiliaries for Theological training, and by Sunday Schools of the Deanery.

The total amount of money raised for the year is not quite as much as that of the last year by \$250.00.

At the meeting of the Deanery above referred to, it was resolved that inasmuch as the Church buildings were growing in value from the continual gifts received as memorials and from improvements effected therein, the Incumbents and Wardens be urged by the Rural Dean to take the necessary steps to secure a more adequate insurance of the Church's property.

It was also decided to call a meeting of the Deanery at an early date, to consider the existing boundaries of our missions with a view to a possible re-arrangement of some or all.

The sense of the Chapter was also expressed upon the desirability of having all parochial accounts for the year closed on Dec. 31st, and also, if it can be brought, of having all the business heretofore done at Easter time transacted at a meeting early in the new year.

In the Mission of Boscobel the interior of the church has been lined with ash, at a cost of nearly \$300.00. A porch has also been erected to the church building in North Ely, at a cost of \$40.00.

In the Parish of North Shefford with Warden, about \$100.00 have been spent towards the completion of a commodious shed and lecture hall for Warden. A lot of land also adjoining the church has been acquired for general use at a cost of \$140.00.

A new east window of figured glass is being put into the church by the Ladies of St. John's Congregation, at a cost of \$140.00.

In S. Roxton the church has been painted and the grounds fenced at a cost of \$50.00. One Church woman has promised \$50 towards the purchase of a bell, the tower for which was built during the Rev. R. F. Taylor's incumbency.

Plans are about to be submitted for the erection of a much needed horse-shed and lecture hall in this place also.

Frost Village church has been carefully tended by the Ladies' Association this year. The windows have been painted and the walls repainted, and the expenses of Divine Worship met by the same Association.

In Waterloo the Girls' Auxiliary have added \$50.00 to the Tower Fund.

The tower of St. Matthew's Church, Stukely, has been repaired at a cost of \$25.00 by the Dorcas Society, and the parsonage and out-buildings at that of \$30.00 by Mrs. Garland. A new carpet was also laid down in the church costing \$45.00, and a fund has been begun towards the erection of a shed.

I cannot conclude this simple statistical report without mentioning the work of Mr. Groulx, who has been engaged during a portion of the year in presenting the Church and her claims to our French fellow-citizens, many of whom are inquiring about her, and disposed to place themselves under her guidance.

His work in Shefford compensates in a measure for the continued want of a bi-lingual missionary in Warden.

THE RURAL DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

MY LORD,—

The annual Deanery meeting was held at Lachine on Monday, January 14, when 7 clergymen and 10 laymen were present, representing 6 of the 10 parishes. The storm prevailing at the time prevented others joining us. The day's proceedings opened with celebration of Holy Communion and sermon.

1. All the parishes are now filled. During the year the Rev. Jas. Carmichael, jun., has entered upon his duties at Vandreuil; Rev. R. Emmett has

been appointed to Papineauville ; and the Rev. A. E. Mount succeeds Rev. R. D. Irwin at Lakefield.

2. Reports were presented from eight parishes. One was handed in later on, while the tenth, for some unexpected reason, has not been received. Some of the reports, I regret to say, are sadly incomplete, partly no doubt owing to changes in the incumbencies, but more likely I think because parish books are not properly kept. Indeed, the continued difficulty in obtaining easily full returns from every parish seems to call for some system of official inspection of the various parochial records, whereby the existing troubles may be removed.

From the returns made, the following may be noted :—

Insurance.—The Church property is fully insured, two parishes appear to have made a slight change in the amount, while a third has only given partial figures.

As regards the *special collections*, some parishes have fallen behind, while others are doing their best. Two parishes have failed to place their clergymen right with the Widows and Orphans Fund, and three are delinquents respecting the Superannuation Fund, while half of the parishes have done nothing for Foreign Missions. I regret to notice that 6 of our clergy do not rank on the Widows and Orphans Fund ; 8 have not paid in to the Superannuation Fund.

3. As regards *Church property*.—

ARUNDEL

Has secured from the Government a free grant of 50 acres of land in the Rochway settlement. A parsonage has also been built near the parish church, and will probably be completed early in the spring. The cost so far has been about \$500, all of which has been raised, but \$200 will be required to finish the undertaking. The Incumbent deserves all praise for his success in this work, as well as for the devotion he has manifested generally for the temporal and spiritual welfare of his Mission.

BUCKINGHAM

Has abandoned St. Stephen's church, and fitted up as a chapel, at a cost of \$150, the school-house standing on the land purchased for the new church.

PAPINEAUVILLE

Has built a shed for the parsonage, and hopes soon to be quite clear of debt.

LAKEFIELD.

St. John's church, Shrewsbury, has been repaired and painted at a cost of \$90. This action was much needed.

4. Last summer the Executive Committee kindly consented to make a grant of \$70 towards the expenses of a student to assist the Rev. Mr. Marriott of *Buckingham* in his work up the Lievre River. The assistance was very necessary, as work in that district demands much time, more than can be given by the incumbent when alone.

5. I understand at the last Easter meeting of the *Grenville* Vestry, promises of bequests to the Parochial Endowment Fund, to the extent of \$1000 each, were made by three of its members. This is a good way of making one's contributions to the Church permanent. The example is excellent and worthy of imitation, unless indeed one can be his own executor, which is better still.

PORTLAND.

6. Portland last year thought to work in with Cantley, but after trial the Incumbent finds the long and very bad roads render it impossible to make that experiment a definite arrangement. It is now proposed that a lay reader from Ottawa should take the Cantley services, while the Rev. Mr. King of course retains incumbency over the united districts.

7. The Deanery by resolution expressed its gratification at the appointment of Rural Dean Naylor as Archdeacon, to assist Archdeacon Lonsdell, and assured him of sympathy and co-operation whenever he might be able to visit the various parishes in the discharge of the duties of his office. May he long enjoy the new mark of his Bishop's favor and confidence, and be able for its responsibilities.

8. Again it is my privilege, on behalf of the Deanery, to express our obligations to the Montreal Woman's Auxiliary, and to record indebtedness for valuable assistance rendered to many of our parishes at Christmas time. Their aid will prove a special benefit to the Sunday School work.


